Some legislative sessions adhere to a narrative, while others just happen. They begin and end without too much fanfare or a defining moment. Still others feature too many storylines to neatly shoehorn into one notion or quote. The 2023 legislative session probably comes closest to the last category.

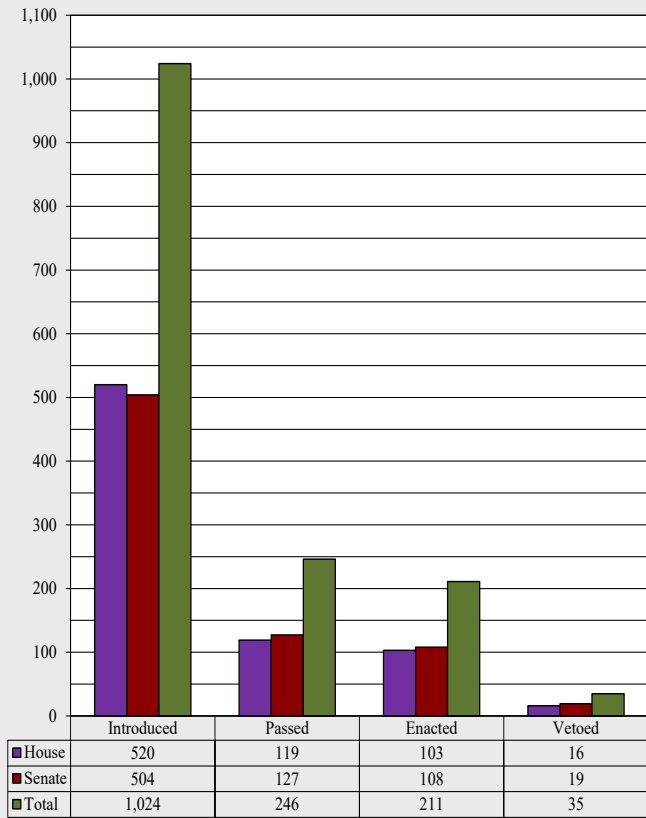
Just before session convened, things became scary. In early January, reports emerged of gunshots being fired into the homes and offices of several Albuquerque-area politicians, including a state senator and the incoming speaker of the house. In a bizarre twist, just days before the session began, the suspect apprehended in connection to those shootings was a primary election challenger to an incumbent member of the House of Representatives. Needless to say, the session began with nerves a bit more on edge than is typical.

Election years always bring a few new faces to the legislature. After the 2022 election, 17 new members of the House were set to be sworn in. Sort of. In October, an incumbent senator from Albuquerque resigned and a member of the House was appointed as his replacement. That same House member was also the only name on the ballot for the November election, and his resignation from the House created another vacancy. Most years, it would be simple enough to appoint someone to the seat and be done with it. However, redistricting created, in essence, two separate districts: one in effect for the Fifty-Fifth Legislature, and another (featuring some different precincts) in effect for the Fifty-Sixth Legislature. Thus, a member was appointed in December to serve the remainder of the term related to the Fifty-Fifth Legislature, resulting in a term that lasted only a few weeks. In the meantime, changes to the makeup of the Bernalillo County Board of Commissioners meant that another member was appointed to serve in the Fifty-Sixth Legislature. Twists and turns indeed.

Of course, newly elected or appointed members were only part of the shift in the legislative landscape as a number of changes occurred in the leadership of the House of Representatives and the Senate. The House of Representatives elected a new speaker, and both caucuses elected completely new leadership teams. While the president pro tempore of the senate was reelected, a new senate majority whip and a new senate chief clerk were elected.

Once all of the twists and turns leading to the session played out, the work of the First Session of

the Fifty-Sixth Legislature was more or less straightforward.

The single greatest influence on the 2023 legislative session was the influx of increased revenue, almost entirely attributed to oil and gas development in the southeastern region of the state, totaling an estimated \$3.6 billion in "new money". Spending such a massive windfall does not tend to be a problem for public bodies; doing in a manner responsive to the state's needs is the trick. To that end, the legislature had its work cut out for it.

First and foremost, each legislature must develop and pass a budget. The record amount of new money resulted in a \$9.6 billion budget, a 13% increase over the previous year that featured significant increases in funding for public education, higher education, Medicaid, law enforcement and roads. The legislature also took advantage of the financial windfall to create a pair of funds for conservation projects and to keep a healthy amount of money in reserves. A robust \$1.2 billion capital outlay package was also passed.

The other major piece of fiscal legislation passed by the legislature was a \$1.1 billion tax package. The bill offered taxpayer rebates, child income tax credits, increased liquor taxes and expanded film production tax credits. However, citing concern over an unpredictable economy, the governor used her line-item veto power to eliminate most of the bill's provisions.

During the spring and summer of 2022, the largest wildfire in state history, which notably started as a prescribed burn by the United States Forest Service, scorched almost 350,000 acres in northern New Mexico. One of the legislature's first acts was to make \$100 million in zero-interest loans available to communities affected by the fire and waiting for federal compensation. In another fire-related measure, the legislature prohibited prescribed burns during high wind events.

In the end, the legislature passed 246 bills, with the governor signing 211. Other important measures passed by the legislature in 2023 included changes to elections and voting rights, reproductive and gender-affirming health care protections, two measures regarding access to firearms and a prohibition on the storage of certain types of radioactive waste.

Two high-profile measures that failed to pass were a pair of proposed constitutional amendments, one to provide salaries for legislators and the other changing various aspects of legislative sessions.

The *Highlights* is an annual publication of the Legislative Council Service (LCS) that summarizes much, but not all, of the legislative action during each session. The omission of certain legislation or issues should not be interpreted as an indication that those are not important; each is important to someone. Many issues in the *Highlights* defy single-topic categorization, so every effort has been made to organize and cross-reference the contents. A complete listing of bills that passed is included in the Concordance located in [Appendix E](#).

ALCOHOL

In the 2023 regular legislative session, one law relating to alcohol was enacted. **House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 364 (Chapter 77)** amends the Liquor Control Act to remove restrictions on alcohol beverage delivery permits for licensed alcohol retail premises of greater than 10,000 square feet located in a class A county and allows those large retailers to make deliveries of alcohol, which can now include spirituous liquors, using a third-party delivery service. The bill also implements a prohibition on the acceptance of advertising money to preferentially list or display a certain product.

ANIMALS

Three bills became law regarding animals, two of which address issues concerning horses and the other creating a fund to reduce collisions between wildlife and motor vehicles.

The New Mexico Horse Breeders' Association administers a fund to pay merit and incentive awards to breeders of New Mexico-bred racehorses. Previously, 7% of that fund was distributed to owners of stallions that sired first-place winners at horse races. In an effort to stimulate increased horse breeding in New Mexico, **House Bill 459 (Chapter 191)** increases the payout to high-quality stallion owners from 7% to 12%.

Senate Bill 271 (Chapter 45) accomplishes two main goals. First, the bill changes the statutory term "horse" to "equine" and includes within that term ponies, mules, donkeys and hinnies as well as horses. Second, in the case of an equine found running at large whose owner is unknown (an "estrays"), registered equine rescue or retirement facilities now are granted a right of first refusal to purchase the equine estray for a fee equal to the cost of the impounding agency for care during impoundment. If such a facility does not purchase an equine estray, the New Mexico Livestock Board is required to auction the equine estray through a sealed bid process. Also, the bill specifies the public notice that is required to be given when an equine estray is impounded and specifies the process for the disposition of equine estrays.

Over the past 17 years, there has been an annual average of 670 vehicular crashes involving large wildlife. In 2019, the Wildlife Corridors Act was enacted and mandated the creation of a wildlife corridors action plan and the publication of a prioritized wildlife corridors project list. **Senate Bill 72 (Chapter 27)** creates the Wildlife Corridors Fund to cover the costs related to providing safe road crossings for wildlife and reducing wildlife-vehicle collisions, including the projects contained in the wildlife corridors project list. The Department of Transportation (DOT) is required to report annually all money expended from the Wildlife Corridors Fund during the prior fiscal year as well as all projects receiving funding from the fund and the amount of funding for each project during the prior fiscal year.

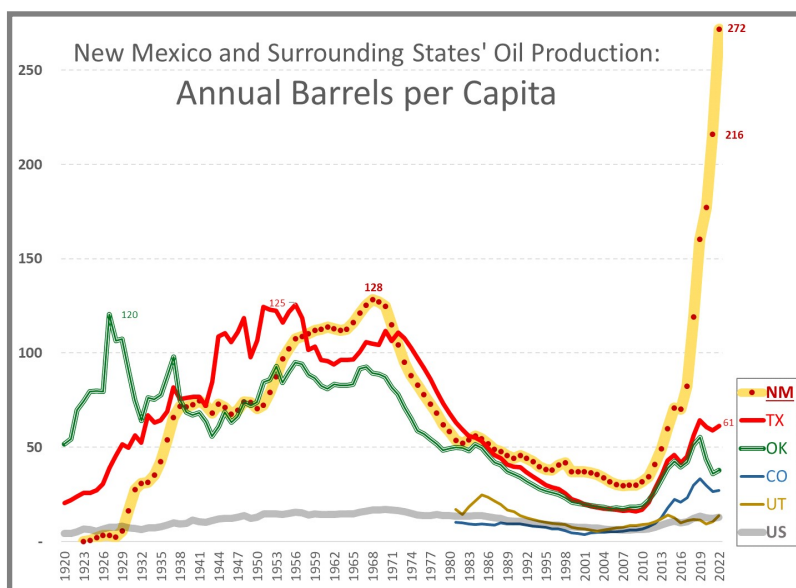
APPROPRIATIONS AND FINANCE

At the beginning of the 2023 session, New Mexico's employment levels had climbed back to near their pre-pandemic levels, concerns swirled around a possible recession in the United States and Russia's invasion of Ukraine continued to cast trepidation and uncertainty on global trade and stability. However, for New Mexico, oil and inflation were, by far, the two overarching factors shaping the economic situation for the 2023 legislative session.

Inflation peaked at 9% in June 2022, the highest rate in over 40 years. Even without much change in real levels of consumption or population, this extreme level of inflation led to significant nominal revenue growth and increased nominal spending needs and household budget demands.

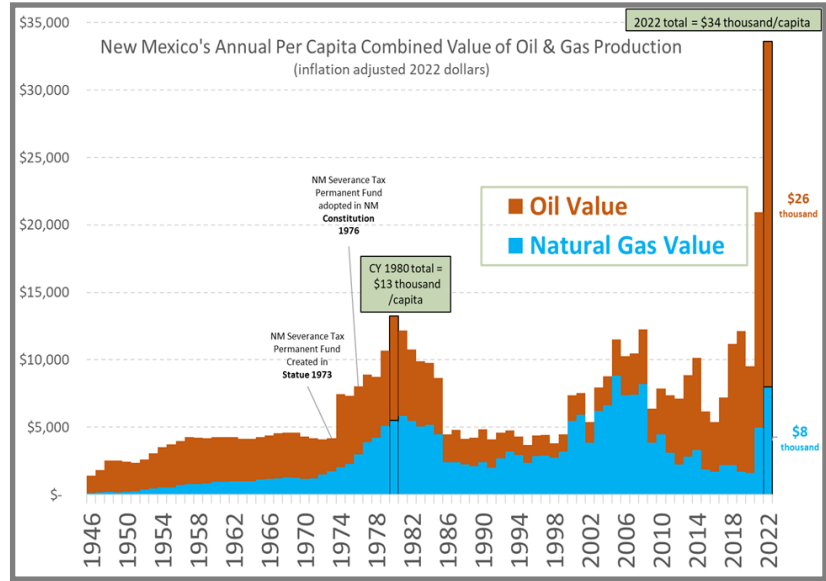
The magnitude of the effects of oil and natural gas on New Mexico is harder to put in historic perspective or summarize. 2023 marked just over a century of commercial oil and gas production in New Mexico and 50 years since the creation of the Severance Tax Permanent Fund (STPF) in 1973, but nothing in the entire history of booms and busts compared to the heights of the value of oil and gas produced in New Mexico in 2021 and 2022. Direct oil and gas revenues in New Mexico generated over \$4 billion in fiscal year (FY) 2022 and were expected to generate over \$5 billion in FY 2023.

As shown in the chart below, the oil production history of Oklahoma and Texas began a generation earlier than New Mexico, and then from the 1930s until recently, all three neighboring oil states followed relatively similar paths. Beginning in 2018, trajectories diverged; the growth in New Mexico's oil production far outpaced Oklahoma and Texas (and all other major oil producing states in the nation), and today, New Mexico is in a fundamentally different place than the state or its neighbors have



ever been. When making an apples-to-apples comparison on the relative impact to the state economy and state budgets by adjusting for population, the amount of oil produced per person in New Mexico is now over seven times higher than Oklahoma, over four times higher than Texas and more than double any previous per capita peak seen by any of these states over the last century of booms and busts.

In the chart to the right, production volumes are combined with prices to get the value of production for both oil and natural gas. It illustrates how, from the 1980s through 2010, the value of natural gas produced in New Mexico was equal to or greater than the value of oil produced in New Mexico, but more recently, oil has dominated. In calendar year 2022, New Mexico produced 574 million barrels of oil and almost 2.7 million cubic feet of natural gas; the combined market value of this



oil and gas surpassed \$70 billion, or around \$34,000 per capita. For 2022, New Mexico's total oil production was second in the nation only to Texas, and on a per capita basis of 272 barrels per resident, New Mexico was higher than even Alaska and Wyoming and second only to North Dakota's per capita oil production.

As budgets for the 2023 regular session were initially crafted, the August 2022 consensus revenue estimate expected 6.8% growth in General Fund revenue to \$9.85 billion for FY 2023, but then increasing to 10.3% growth and reaching \$10.86 billion by FY 2024. The August 2022 forecast was based on oil averaging \$90.50 per barrel for FY 2023 and \$78.50 per barrel for FY 2024. It was also based on oil production of 590 million barrels in FY 2023 and 640 million barrels in FY 2024.

The revenue estimate made in December 2022 called for lower oil prices averaging \$85.00 in FY 2023 and \$76.50 in FY 2024; however, it revised oil production levels higher to 620 million barrels in FY 2023 and reaching 660 million barrels in FY 2024. It also forecast overall FY 2023 revenue to be revised upward by over \$900 million to \$10.8 billion, with expectations for FY 2024 General Fund revenues also revised significantly upward to just under \$12 billion.

High levels of General Fund reserves provided some stability with so much of New Mexico's economy and revenues dependent on the single globally priced commodity of oil. At the end of FY 2022, General Fund reserve balances were \$3.2 billion, or 43% of recurring appropriations, and were estimated to grow to \$5.1 billion, or 61% of recurring appropriations, in FY 2023 before any 2023 legislative actions. Also before any 2023 appropriations, the FY 2024 "new money" estimate (defined as FY 2024 recurring revenue less FY 2024 recurring appropriations) was forecast to be \$3.6 billion, which was more than twice the amount expected at the prior legislative session.

The revenue situation in New Mexico was aptly and often described as "unprecedented" leading up to and during the 2023 legislative session. It was true that nothing in the entire history of New Mexico or any of the surrounding states compared. On the other hand, New Mexico can and did look to the prior experiences of three other states (Alaska, Wyoming and North Dakota) and a small handful of other nations (such as Kuwait, Saudi Arabia and Norway) to learn from their successes and struggles managing this level of oil wealth.

At the mid-session revenue update, there was no official revision to the General Fund forecast by the Consensus Revenue Estimating Group. The mid-session update reviewed the nation's recession risk, took special note of the potential risk of uncapped growth in film partner tax credits on top of the capped non-partner film credits and highlighted the sensitivity of revenues to oil and gas prices. It noted that a \$1.00 change in the annual average price of New Mexico's oil has approximately a \$48 million impact on the severance tax and royalties, and a \$.10 change in the annual average price of New Mexico's natural gas has approximately a \$20 million impact.

Price movements in the last week and a half of the session provided an unpleasant, but relatively mild, reminder of the volatility of energy prices when oil fell from over \$80.00 per barrel to only \$66.61 at session's end, the lowest oil price seen since 2021. Natural gas also saw some of the largest swings in recent memory. After spiking following the initial Russian invasion of Ukraine and seeing a peak of \$9.85/MMBtu in August 2022, Henry Hub natural gas prices stayed below \$3.00/MMBtu through the session and then even dipped below \$2.00/MMBtu briefly before the governor used her line-item veto pen to pare back the tax cuts in the omnibus tax bill on April 7.

General Appropriation Act

After line-item veto action taken by the governor, the General Appropriation Act of 2023 (GAA), enacted in **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bills 2 and 3 (Chapter 210, p.v.)**, appropriates more than \$26.7 billion from all sources for the operation of state government in FY 2024, including \$9.6 billion¹ from the General Fund (a year-over-year increase of 13%) and just more than \$10.7 billion from the federal government. Special appropriations, from FY 2023 nonrecurring revenue, account for another \$1.5 billion and supplemental and deficiency appropriations claim another \$131 million in FY 2023 revenue from all sources.

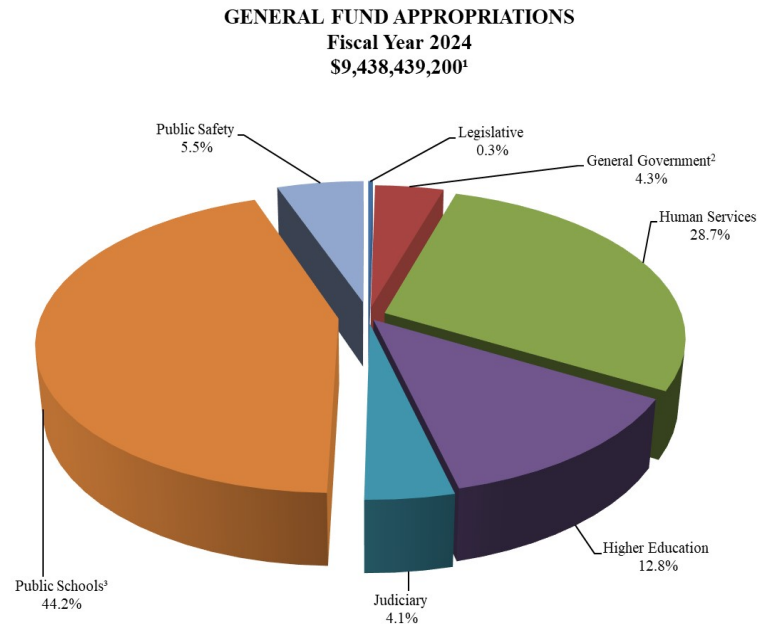
The GAA directs \$11.6 billion in recurring and nonrecurring appropriations and transfers from the General Fund in FY 2023 and FY 2024. The total General Fund effort for the GAA represents a 27% increase over last year.

As part of the recurring FY 2024 appropriations, the GAA allocates \$125 million for compensation increases, primarily to provide a 6% cost-of-living salary increase for state government employees and employees at the state's public and higher education institutions. Also included in the

compensation appropriations are sufficient funds to ensure that all state government employees earn an hourly salary of at least \$15.00 and to cover the General Fund share of a 10% employer medical insurance premium rate increase.

The "Public School Support" category receives the most recurring General Fund appropriations of any category of the GAA at \$4.1 billion, which includes \$3.97 billion in funding for the state equalization guarantee distribution that finances K-12 public education and nearly \$127 million for the FY 2024 transportation distribution. Also provided in this category is a \$20 million General Fund appropriation for the Indian Education Fund.

The second largest category of General Fund appropriations is \$2.7 billion to the "Health, Hospitals and Human Services" category, which also receives more than \$9 billion in federal funding. The General Fund appropriation to the Medicaid program is increased to \$1.4 billion in FY 2024 due to a reduction in the federal match rate and the choice to increase provider rates for provider, facility, nursing home and rural health care rates to 100% of Medicare rates and to increase provider rates of primary care, behavioral health and maternal and child health care rates to 120% of Medicare rates.

The "Higher Education" category receives \$1.2 billion of recurring funding split among the Higher Education Department and New Mexico's 18 higher education institutions (up one this year with the addition of Southeast New Mexico College as a standalone institution). A major change this year is fully funding New Mexico's Opportunity Scholarship Program at a cost of \$146 million in recurring appropriations.

◆ *Other Appropriations and Fund Transfers*

In lean years, the DOT does not usually receive appropriations from the General Fund; however, this was not a lean year. In fact, 2023 is the fourth consecutive year that General Fund money is allocated to the DOT. This year, the GAA appropriates \$292 million to the DOT for expenditure beginning in FY 2023 that will revert to the General Fund if unexpended at the end of FY 2026. The appropriation is split into a number of parts, with the largest amount of \$232 million designated for expenditure on any new or existing state-owned, tribal-owned or locally owned roads. The second largest portion of \$55 million is

appropriated for regional airports statewide. Lastly, \$5 million is designated for the design and construction of wildlife corridors to mitigate collisions between wildlife and vehicles on state-managed roads.

The GAA makes a number of fund transfers, totaling \$675 million, from the General Fund into various funds. By far the largest of these transfers is a major investment of current General Fund revenue to supplement the stream of General Fund revenue available in future years by transferring \$475 million of General Fund revenue to the STPF. Additionally, the transfers include \$100 million to the Water Trust Fund and \$50 million each to the newly created Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund and Land of Enchantment Legacy Fund.

Feed Bill

House Bill 1 (Chapter 1), known as the "feed bill" because it funds the legislative session, appropriates \$57 million from the General Fund for the legislative session and for legislative agencies in FY 2023, FY 2024 and beyond. Of that amount, \$11.7 million provides for the operations of the 2023 legislative session, and the remainder supports interim activities and year-round operational costs of the legislative agencies that include the LCS (\$8.5 million), Legislative Education Study Committee (\$1.7 million), Legislative Finance Committee (\$5.7 million), house and senate chief clerks' offices (\$3 million each) and Legislative Information System (\$2.1 million for non-salary expenses). Also, the feed bill includes the following nonrecurring appropriations from the General Fund for expenditure in FY 2023 and subsequent fiscal years: \$9.5 million for the planning, design and development of a new legislative processing system; \$1.5 million for audiovisual upgrades to committee rooms; \$500,000 for a constituent services platform; \$1.3 million for display board upgrades in the House and Senate chambers; and \$2.5 million for a study on the logistics and resources needed for district staff offices and operations for the legislature.

Other Appropriations

This year's House Bill 2 Junior bill, **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 192 (Chapter 208, p.v.)**, after taking into account the governor's line-item vetoes, spends \$96,705,000 from the unappropriated surplus of the General Fund for expenditure in fiscal years 2023 and 2024 to fund state, local and tribal special projects. In addition to junior projects, the bill also includes a current-year transfer section, normally part of the GAA, that provides that the governor may transfer \$430 million from the operating reserve to the appropriation account of the General Fund if at the end of FY 2023 revenue and other transfers to the General Fund are not sufficient to meet appropriations contained in the General Appropriation Act of 2022. See [Table 7](#) in [Appendix B](#) for a detailed list of projects by agency.

Public Finance

The legislature was committed this year to increase the amount of money flowing to the STPF and, thereby, increasing distributions to the General Fund. The GAA transfers \$475 million from the General Fund to the STPF in FY 2024; the same act would have had certain reversions go to the STPF instead of the General Fund, but the governor vetoed those attempts. **Senate Bill 378 (Chapter 124)** provides for a minimum transfer from the Severance Tax Bonding Fund to the STPF of \$92 million each year for 10 years (2023 through 2033), unless the State Board of Finance determines that a lesser amount is required to avoid potential shortfalls in debt service obligations. Furthermore, the bill protects public school capital outlay bonds, also known as supplemental severance tax bonds or junior bonds, for FY 2023 by allowing the State Board of Finance to issue up to \$682.2 million in junior bonds.

Likewise, **Senate Bill 26 (Chapter 22)** creates another mechanism to build STPF balances by ultimately increasing stable STPF outflows to the General Fund in future years. Beginning in FY 2025, the bill directs certain amounts of oil and natural gas revenue from federal mineral leasing royalties and the oil and gas emergency school tax to the STPF. Threshold amounts will be established based on the amount of revenue received by the General Fund in FY 2024. After that, excess amounts following distributions to the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund and the tax stabilization reserve will be invested in the STPF. While the long-term implications of this change are based on highly uncertain oil and natural gas prices and production levels, under forecasts and assumptions by the Legislative Finance Committee and State Investment Council, the General Fund is expected to forgo billions of volatile near-term revenue and gain a stable stream of revenue in the long term. For example, it is anticipated that \$1.2 billion will be diverted from the General Fund to the STPF in FY 2026, rising to \$1.7 billion in FY 2027. Increased distributions from a larger STPF back to the General Fund are forecast to begin to offset revenue diversions sometime in the 2030s. Thus, the legislature in 2023 has chosen to forgo spending for more than a decade in order for legislators in the 2040s and beyond to have greater and more stable amounts to spend on future generations of New Mexicans.

Another fund is set to see increased distributions with the enactment of **House Bill 191 (Chapter 146)**. In this bill, the amount annually transferred to the Early Childhood Education and Care Program Fund from the Early Childhood Education and Care Fund is increased to \$150 million.

New Mexico has been in a dire housing crisis for many years, particularly in affordable rental units. In 2022, the legislature took a big step by passing Senate Bill 134, which provides that 2.5% of the estimated severance tax bonding capacity be dedicated to the New Mexico Housing Trust Fund, effective with the bonding capacity estimate in January 2024. **Senate Bill 381 (Chapter 9)** moves that date up to the January 2023 estimate.

Audits are expensive, no matter the type of business or organization. They are especially burdensome to small and nonprofit organizations. Previously, a tax-exempt organization was required to

perform an audit if its gross annual income exceeded \$250,000. **Senate Bill 240 (Chapter 43)** increases that minimum threshold to \$750,000 of total annual expenses.

New Mexico Finance Authority

Legislation enacted during the 2023 session addresses the operations of the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) and allows the NMFA to disburse funds more efficiently. After funds are created through the passage of legislation, the needs of entities intended by such legislation to be eligible to receive funding may change as the state economy changes. **Senate Bill 423 (Chapter 129)** is an example of a bill that addresses such changing needs. It amends the Behavioral Health Capital Funding Act, the Primary Care Capital Funding Act and the Child Care Facility Loan Act to allow eligible entities to use the funds created by those acts for operating capital necessary to meet short-term obligations. In addition, the NMFA is now required to work in conjunction with the Health Care Authority Department², instead of the Department of Health, to promulgate rules for the Behavioral Health Capital Funding Act. Similarly, the Early Childhood Education and Care Department, instead of the Children, Youth and Families Department, is tasked with administering the Child Care Facility Loan Act, in conjunction with the NMFA. An eligible entity can use funding for capital projects under these acts to acquire new facilities and may apply to receive operating capital for the short-term needs of the entity. Along with providing loans, the NMFA and the Health Care Authority Department may now, through contracts for services, provide funding from the Behavioral Health Capital Funding Act to eligible entities for capital projects in exchange for those entities' provision of free or reduced-fee primary care services for sick and medically indigent persons. Moreover, the bill adjusts the remedies available to the NMFA in securing its interests in investments pursuant to the Behavioral Health Capital Funding Act and the Primary Care Capital Funding Act.

In 2022, the legislature passed the Venture Capital Program Act, which allows the NMFA to make limited investments in venture private equity funds and early stage investments in New Mexico businesses whose investments or enterprises enhance the economic development objectives of the state. **Senate Bill 402 (Chapter 127)** removes the requirements that venture private equity funds raise matching investment funds, that investments in New Mexico businesses be made in conjunction with cooperative investment agreements and that the NMFA obtain a bond or blanket bond for employees performing duties related to the administration of the act. Additionally, the bill increases the maximum investment in any one industry to 30%, allows the NMFA to make differential rate investments for the purposes of economic development and adds an exception to the Inspection of Public Records Act for confidential, proprietary technical, trade secret or business information obtained by the NMFA for purposes of administering the Venture Capital Program Act.

²With the enactment of Senate Bill 16 in the 2023 session, effective July 1, 2023, all statutory references to the Human Services Department are deemed to be references to the newly created Health Care Authority Department. The Statewide Economic Development Finance Act is a method for implementing the economic development assistance provisions of Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico, also known as the anti-donation clause. **Senate Bill 327 (Chapter 120)** extends the date by which Statewide Economic Development Finance Act standard projects must be approved by law to July 1, 2027. Until then, the NMFA may approve standard projects pursuant to that act without first seeking approval for each project through law.

House Bill 298 (Chapter 16) makes appropriations from the Public Project Revolving Fund (PPRF) to four funds that are administered by the NMFA. Specifically, this bill appropriates: \$3.5 million to the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund to provide state matching funds for federal Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974 projects and to carry out the purposes of the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund Act; \$3.7 million to the Wastewater Facility Construction Loan Fund to provide matching funds for clean water state revolving fund projects that meet the eligibility requirements of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act; and \$5 million to the Cultural Affairs Facilities Infrastructure Fund and \$2 million to the Local Government Planning Fund to carry out the purposes of those respective funds.

The legislature approved a variety of public projects around the state with the enactment of two bills. **House Agriculture, Acequias and Water Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 525 (Chapter 82)** authorizes the NMFA to make loans or grants from the Water Project Fund to 59 qualifying water projects. Meanwhile, **Senate Bill 332 (Chapter 121)** authorizes the NMFA to make loans from the PPRF to qualified entities for 48 public projects that require a loan of more than \$1 million relating to building, equipment, infrastructure, debt refinance, road, airport, land acquisition, water, wastewater, water rights, solid waste, public transportation system, public recreation facility and education technology projects. Details of the projects authorized in these bills may be found in [Table 8](#) and [Table 9](#), respectively, in [Appendix B](#).

Capital Outlay

House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 505 (Chapter 199, p.v.) appropriates \$1,234,259,983 in capital outlay project funding for FY 2023 through FY 2027. The bill includes \$1,073,729,983 in General Fund appropriations for capital projects and \$160,530,000 in appropriations from other state funds. The use of General Fund appropriations as the anchor for capital project funding during the 2023 regular session represents a departure from the previous three years, when proceeds from severance tax bonds were used as the primary funding source for capital projects. Other state fund appropriations in the bill include over \$142 million from the Public School Capital Outlay Fund and \$10 million from the Forest Land Protection Revolving Fund.

The bill dedicates more than \$270 million to 504 infrastructure projects, equipment purchases and vehicle purchases for various local entities through the Local Government Division of the

Department of Finance and Administration. More than \$130 million is appropriated for Capital Program Fund projects administered by the General Services Department, including \$68 million to construct a forensics unit at the New Mexico Behavioral Health Institute in Las Vegas, \$20 million for facility renovations and master planning for the Corrections Department and \$12 million for renovations to General Services Department facilities statewide. The DOT receives in excess of \$42 million, including more than \$4.4 million to expand Paseo del Norte Boulevard in northwest Albuquerque. In addition, more than \$2 million is appropriated to improve a highway interchange in Belen and a major intersection in Los Lunas, both in Valencia County.

One hundred thirty-six Department of Environment projects receive funding totaling close to \$65 million. These projects include \$5 million for a wastewater reuse system for the Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority, roughly \$3 million for three projects to provide water and sewer system improvements in Carlsbad and \$1.4 million for drainage and flood control improvements in Chaparral, Dona Ana and La Union in Dona Ana County. Two million dollars is appropriated for sewer system improvements in Hobbs, and two water and wastewater projects in Tularosa receive a combined total of \$2.5 million. Taos Ski Valley receives \$1.7 million for water system improvements, while Santa Fe County is allocated \$5 million for a wastewater treatment plant and \$1.1 million for improvements to the sewer system in Agua Fria Village. Also, Los Alamos County receives \$7 million for a Jemez Mountain fire protection project.

Funding for education programs is abundant in the bill. The Public Education Department (PED) receives nearly \$79 million, including significant funding for school bus purchases and tribal libraries. The Public School Facilities Authority is allocated \$105 million for distributions to school districts for career technical education facilities, pre-kindergarten facilities, building maintenance and school security infrastructure. The University of New Mexico tops the list of higher education institutions receiving funding with appropriations totaling nearly \$43 million, followed closely by New Mexico State University with appropriations of more than \$39 million.

The Economic Development Department receives \$10 million for mainstreet and arts and cultural district improvements throughout the state. A Department of Information Technology project to modernize and stabilize public safety radio communications statewide receives a \$26 million appropriation. In addition, the Office of the State Engineer is allocated more than \$61 million, including \$30 million to restore aquifers in the lower Rio Grande Basin, \$14 million for improvements to dams and reservoirs and \$10 million to restore habitat and control flooding in the middle Rio Grande Basin.

The Indian Affairs Department is allocated \$120 million for infrastructure projects throughout the state. Legislators and the governor agreed to provide a package of \$100 million for projects on Native American lands, coordinated through the Office of the Governor. Major appropriations are made to the Shiprock Chapter of the Navajo Nation for an incident command center, to the Pueblo of Santo

Domingo for a housing rehabilitation project and to the Chichiltah Chapter of the Navajo Nation to construct a daycare and Head Start facility. Significant funding is also included to build a fire and emergency medical services facility at the Pueblo of Sandia, for construction of a Pueblo of Santa Ana public safety, judicial and social services complex and for construction of housing at the Pueblo of Pojoaque. Additionally, \$6.4 million is appropriated to construct a Navajo Code Talkers Museum in McKinley County.

The governor vetoed three projects totaling \$260,000, citing insufficient funding to effectively implement the projects and potential constitutional conflicts. Legislative delegations throughout the state sought to coordinate with the Office of the Governor to fund the larger and more costly projects in their areas in an effort to ensure full funding for those projects.

The LCS continues to collect capital project requests online, after implementing a paperless system in 2021. The system is gradually helping to move the collection of capital outlay project requests and sponsorship selections forward in the session time frame, which gives legislators additional time to coordinate project funding.

Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 309 (Chapter 203, p.v.) reauthorizes 304 prior-year appropriations before action taken by the governor, more than doubling the number of reauthorization requests processed in 2022 or in any of the last 10 years. The high number of reauthorization requests during the 2023 regular session is attributed to the many business closures and supply chain issues that arose during the past three years, hampering the completion of many capital projects. Eighty-six percent of the reauthorization requests included in the bill are requests to extend the time of expenditure for the project. Five percent of the projects had already been reauthorized once, and two projects (less than 1% of the total) had already been reauthorized twice. Projects are reauthorized to extend the time of expenditure, change the administering agency or expand, change or clarify the purpose of the original appropriation. The governor vetoed seven of the proposed reauthorizations; in those cases, the provisions of the original appropriation remain intact.

BROADBAND AND TELECOMMUNICATIONS

In recent sessions, the legislature has enacted a number of laws related to broadband and telecommunications services, and this topic continued to be the subject of legislative focus in the 2023 session. Telecommunications services continue to be a vital component of the market for high-speed, long-distance communications, and the legislature made a couple of changes to laws that regulate those services. However, much of the legislature's efforts regarding telecommunications this year were focused on the increasing importance of broadband internet access as a foundation for economic and community vitality throughout the state. Also, the legislature passed a bill to enable the state to better develop cybersecurity measures for information technology and broadband networks.

With regard to the regulation of telephone or voice telecommunications services, the legislature removed the tiering for regulation of those services and expanded the types of services telecommunications companies may provide. Previously, incumbent local exchange carriers serving fewer than 50,000 access lines operating in service areas with effective competition as determined by the Public Regulation Commission had reduced filing and approval requirements for proposed service changes compared to larger companies. **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 41 (Chapter 92)** establishes that effective competition now exists as a matter of law, rather than upon a determination by the Public Regulation Commission, when a service area has two or more service providers not affiliated with the incumbent local exchange carrier providing comparable voice services. In that serving area, all providers regardless of size are now subject to the reduced regulation requirements. Also reflecting technology changes in the telecommunications service market, **House Bill 170 (Chapter 186)** amends the definition of "cramming" to allow telecommunications companies to charge for non-telecommunications services so long as a customer authorizes the charge.

To increase the development of broadband infrastructure around the state, two bills became law. First, **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 155 (Chapter 37)** increases the amount of the State Rural Universal Service Fund dedicated to the broadband program from \$8 million per year to \$30 million per year. It also requires the Public Regulation Commission to study and report on the status of the fund and recommend whether various changes to it would facilitate the build-out of broadband service infrastructure in the state. The second bill, **House Rural Development, Land Grants and Cultural Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 160 (Chapter 143)**, authorizes the State Transportation Commission to promulgate rules for the installation of broadband infrastructure on or through DOT public highways and other properties and allows for the waiver of annual fees for installations that are used to provide broadband services to unserved or underserved locations as defined in the Connect New Mexico Act.

Additionally, two bills were enacted that restructure the state's broadband program established in 2021. **House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 262 (Chapter 155)** transfers the Connect New Mexico Fund's grant program from the Connect New Mexico Council to the Office of Broadband Access and Expansion and clarifies that the council shall act as an advisory body to the office. The bill also makes several technical amendments to the Connect New Mexico Act, including defining areas and properties as unserved if they either do not have access to internet service at all or only have access to internet service offering speeds below 25 megabits per second downstream or three megabits per second upstream and defining such areas and properties as underserved if they have access to internet service offering speeds greater than 100 megabits per second downstream and 20 megabits per second upstream.

Meanwhile, **Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 452 (Chapter 132)** amends both the Department of Information Technology Act and the Broadband Access and Expansion Act. It permits the Department of Information Technology to lease or sell portions of the state's broadband network to private companies for the provision of services to underserved or unserved populations and to provide cybersecurity risk prevention response options and testing for broadband projects for which it has administrative oversight. In addition, the new law allows Indian nations, tribes and pueblos to connect to state agency broadband networks in exchange for mutually agreed upon right-of-way or service agreements with the chief information officer.

Investment in broadband networks, service availability and interconnected information technology systems could be jeopardized if those networks and systems suffer from cybersecurity attacks, which are an increasingly common occurrence. In response, the legislature passed **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Rules Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 280 (Chapter 115)**, which enacts the Cybersecurity Act. This act creates a Cybersecurity Office, attached to the Department of Information Technology and headed by the newly created state chief information security officer, to oversee cybersecurity- and information-security-related functions for executive state agencies, including incident response coordination, minimum cybersecurity control development and training. Also created is a Cybersecurity Advisory Committee to supervise the state chief information security officer, help the Cybersecurity Office develop a statewide cybersecurity plan and develop regular reports regarding the status of the state's cybersecurity preparedness for the legislature and the governor.

BUSINESS AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Encouraging business in the state and developing its economy continue to be a focus of introduced and passed legislation. Tourism is one mechanism at play in two bills passed to help strengthen the state's economy. To diversify economic development, a variety of New Mexico's creative

industries are set to receive additional funding and support with the creation of a new division in the Economic Development Department. Adapting to technological advancements is the focus of another measure, as the use of electronic and blockchain transactions, including cryptocurrencies, and artificial intelligence become increasingly common in business.

Recognizing that sports tourism plays an important role in the way communities structure their tourism marketing and planning, **Senate Bill 389 (Chapter 202)** expands the reach of the Sports Authority Division of the Tourism Department to include not only professional and amateur sports, but also high school and college sports. Also, the bill amends the composition of the Sports Advisory Committee.

House Bill 377 (Chapter 18) creates the Marketing Bureau of Excellence within the Marketing Division of the Tourism Department to serve as a centralized collection of marketing-focused expertise, provide guidance, information and training and lead the marketing strategy and asset creation for the state's Economic Development Corporation and all executive branch agencies, as requested.

The Economic Development Department has a new Creative Industries Division with the passage of **House Bill 8 (Chapter 183)**. The Creative Industries Division is tasked with the general development of creative industries in New Mexico other than the film industry, including: performing, visual and literary arts; entertainment, media, information and broadcasting; applied arts and design, including architecture, landscape architecture, museum and gallery professions; promotion, marketing, graphics and industrial design; technology and computer system design, software design, coding and digital media; and crafts and artisan professions, including metal, wood, glass, ceramics, paper, printing, textile and culinary arts. Moreover, the bill establishes the Creative Industries Fund to provide for competitive grants for local projects to support or expand creative industries.

The Uniform Commercial Code is a comprehensive set of laws governing commercial transactions that has been enacted by most states. **House Bill 90 (Chapter 142)** updates New Mexico's version of the Uniform Commercial Code to incorporate the 2022 amendments to the Uniform Commercial Code adopted by the Uniform Law Commission. These amendments revise the first nine articles of New Mexico's version of the code to address emerging technologies, providing updated rules for commercial transactions involving virtual currencies, distributed ledger technologies such as blockchain, artificial intelligence and other technological developments. Furthermore, the bill enacts a new Article 12 of the Uniform Commercial Code entitled "Controllable Electronic Records" to address certain types of digital assets defined as controllable electronic records, which are records stored in an electronic medium that can be subjected to control as provided in that article.

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

In light of the *Kevin S.* settlement and concerns from advocacy groups, one of the main focuses of the 2023 regular session was children, families and their collective welfare. With more than 30 bills filed regarding children and families, the session saw a push for major changes to the child welfare system, and attention was given to current statutes in need of revisions to keep up with neighboring states.

Two bills passed this session that address the placement of children, with the first bill being in response to other states' actions on updating guardianships and voluntary placement procedures. **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 31 (Chapter 90)** amends and updates the law surrounding guardianships, voluntary placements of children and the rights of parents and guardians. The bill renames the Family Services Act as the Voluntary Placement and Family Services Act and provides new definitions in that act, including "guardian", "guardianship assistance agreement", "guardianship assistance payments", "guardianship assistance program", "kinship", "subsidized guardianship" and "voluntary placement agreement". The bill updates the voluntary placement agreement procedures, notifications, court procedures, time frames and financial subsidies for guardianships. Additionally, the bill allows a child to remain in a voluntary placement for up to 180 days and, prior to the expiration of the first voluntary placement agreement, a parent or guardian may elect to continue that agreement for an additional 180 days. Furthermore, the bill updates the procedures around the return of a child from a voluntary placement agreement by allowing a parent or guardian to demand and obtain the return of a child who has been voluntarily placed outside of the home without seeking or obtaining court approval; in this case, the child shall be returned to the parent or guardian within 48 hours of the demand. Lastly, the bill provides rulemaking authority to the Children, Youth and Families Department.

The second bill concerns the Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children, which was originally adopted in New Mexico in 1977. **Senate Bill 315 (Chapter 118)** enacts the Revised Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children. This revised compact provides for the timely interstate placement of children in safe, suitable homes, eases the process of interstate placement of children and provides for ongoing supervision of out-of-state placement of children and the promulgation of guidelines for such placements, including, when applicable, collaboration with Indian nations, tribes and pueblos. Assignment of state of residence of military families is also addressed. The revised compact and corresponding statutory revisions become effective only when 34 other states have adopted the revised compact.

In addition to the updates to the placement of children, the legislature passed two bills addressing the abuse and neglect of children. The Abuse and Neglect Act provides that the Children, Youth and Families Department may file with the court a petition alleging neglect or abuse when a child is taken into custody following a report alleging neglect or abuse. **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate**

Bill 107 (Chapter 172) changes the time frame for filing such a petition from two to three days, and in some instances five days, and requires notification to the Office of Family Representation and Advocacy and, if applicable, the child's Indian nation, tribe or pueblo. In cases where a child is taken into custody for a second time within a one-year period, the child shall not be released from custody until a more strict review is conducted to determine whether the child should be released to the child's parent, guardian or custodian or if it is in the best interest of the child to file a petition alleging neglect or abuse.

Federal law permits certain immigrant children who have suffered abuse, neglect or abandonment and thus have been classified as special immigrant juveniles to seek lawful permanent residence in the United States, but many children across New Mexico are not receiving the benefit of this program. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 15 (Chapter 134)** provides better access to the program by empowering state juvenile courts to classify an immigrant child who has been the subject of a proceeding for abuse, neglect or abandonment as a special immigrant juvenile.

During this regular session, the legislature responded to the initial recommendations of the Child Support Guidelines Review Commission, which was created in 2021 to review and evaluate the child support guidelines, by passing **Senate Bill 223 (Chapter 106)** to update and modernize the child support guidelines. Beginning January 1, 2024, the bill removes the child support schedule from statute and requires the Health Care Authority Department to promulgate a new child support schedule, and it outlines strict requirements that the department must satisfy when promulgating and updating the schedule. When published, the newly promulgated child support schedule will be available to the public through the New Mexico Administrative Code, the New Mexico Supreme Court's website and the Health Care Authority Department's website.

In order to provide health care coverage for children, **Senate Bill 224 (Chapter 107)** amends portions of the Mandatory Medical Support Act to establish that parents can satisfy the obligation to provide health care coverage for their children by obtaining Medicaid coverage for their children.

To provide protection for children who are seeking a name change, **House Bill 31 (Chapter 28)** amends the notice requirements for an applicant seeking a petition for a name change. An applicant who is 14 years of age or older or the legal parent or guardian of an applicant under 14 years of age is no longer required to provide notice with a proof of publication when petitioning a district court for a name change. Additionally, this legislation provides safeguards for applicants who may risk their safety in seeking a name change. If a district court finds that providing notice to legal parents of an applicant who is under age 14 will result in such a risk, the court shall not require notice and shall seal the applicant's petition.

To comply with Federal Bureau of Investigation requirements for background checks, **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 337 (Chapter 75)** provides definitions for various types of licensees and contractors that work with the Early Childhood Education and Care Department, including child care home programs, department-contracted providers, licensed child care centers, licensed child

care facilities, licensed family child care homes, licensed group child care homes, licensed out-of-school time programs and registered child care homes. Moreover, the bill expands the department's duties for conducting background checks on the aforementioned groups of licensees and contractors.

Upon the request of an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo, the Early Childhood Education and Care Department is now required to enter into intergovernmental agreements with an Indian nation, tribe, pueblo or a tribal organization authorized by tribal resolution of the Indian nation, tribe or pueblo to plan, conduct, disburse funding to and administer one or more early childhood education and care programs on tribal land through the enactment of **House Bill 148 (Chapter 20)**. These agreements allow Indian nations, tribes and pueblos to create and administer family, infant, toddler, child care, pre-kindergarten, early pre-kindergarten, home visitation, early Head Start, Head Start, early childhood special education and early intervention and family support programs using the Indian nation, tribe or pueblo's own culturally and linguistically relevant standards, assessments and evaluations.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Two out of the 24 joint resolutions that were introduced during the 2023 session proposing amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico passed the legislature and will appear on the November 2024 ballot, and both resolutions involve property tax exemptions for veterans. Two joint resolutions, one to provide salaries for legislators and one to extend the number of session days in even-numbered years, failed to pass the legislature. The LCS publishes a summary of and arguments for and against proposed amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico prior to any election in which they appear. The next publication, titled *Summary of and Arguments for and Against the Constitutional Amendments Proposed by the Legislature in 2023 and 2024*, will be released by the LCS in the summer of 2024.

Contingent on voter approval, **House Joint Resolution 5 (C.A. 1)** proposes to amend Article 8, Section 15 of the Constitution of New Mexico to extend a property tax exemption for disabled veterans, which currently only allows the exemption for 100% disabled veterans and their widows and widowers, to veterans with less than 100% disability and their widows and widowers, and it bases the percentage of the exemption on the veteran's federal disability rating. Additionally, another proposed amendment to Article 8, Section 5 of the Constitution of New Mexico in **House Joint Resolution 6 (C.A. 2)** would, if approved, increase a property tax exemption for all honorably discharged veterans and their widows and widowers from the current \$4,000 to \$10,000, and thereafter the amount would be indexed to inflation.

CORRECTIONS

While a number of bills relating to corrections were introduced and debated during the session, only three were passed and signed into law. These new laws make significant changes to medical and geriatric parole and juvenile incarceration.

In an effort to alleviate the costs of incarceration while still maintaining public safety, **Senate Bill 29 (Chapter 89)** makes substantial changes to the parole program that allows certain inmates who are deemed geriatric, permanently incapacitated or terminally ill to seek early parole. Most notably, the bill reduces the qualifying age for geriatric parole from 65 years of age to 55 years of age, and it creates a rebuttable presumption that inmates who are geriatric, permanently incapacitated or terminally ill do not constitute a danger. With regard to the administration of the program, the bill transfers to the Corrections Department much of the authority that previously belonged to the Parole Board.

Amid nationwide juvenile justice reform efforts, the legislature passed laws addressing the incarceration of juveniles. **Senate Bill 64 (Chapter 24)** prohibits courts from sentencing juvenile offenders to life imprisonment without the possibility of parole. In particular, the bill entitles serious youthful offenders to a parole hearing after 25 years of incarceration if the conviction was for two or more convictions of first degree murder, after 20 years of incarceration if the conviction was for either first degree willful and deliberate murder or first degree depraved-mind murder and after 15 years of incarceration if the conviction was related to another qualifying provision of law. The bill recognizes that children possess diminished culpability and a lack of impulse control, and it brings New Mexico in line with the plurality of other states across the country that have recently banned life sentences without parole for juveniles. In the same vein, **Senate Bill 388 (Chapter 125)** amends existing law to increase the age at which a child can be held in custody from 11 years old to 12 years old.

COURTS

The legislature placed a special emphasis on the New Mexico court system this session, with bills affecting a wide range of issues surrounding the courts, including changes to probate courts, court funds, court fees, records expungement and garnishment of wages.

Perhaps the bill making the biggest change is **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 139 (Chapter 184)**, which eliminates court fees in criminal and traffic cases, although the elimination of fees will not go into effect until July 1, 2024. The bill does not change any fines the court may impose, but it eliminates the imposition of fees on defendants. Sections dealing with installment plans for fees,

lowering the service time for fines, expanding community service definitions and increasing the credit for time served in jail go into effect on June 16, 2023.

Additionally, small but important changes were made regarding court services and funds. **House Bill 76 (Chapter 139)** clarifies that the Administrative Office of the Courts shall administer the Judicial Education Fund, and it renames the Judicial Services Center as the Court Education Services Division and transfers its administration from the University of New Mexico School of Law to the Administrative Office of the Courts. **House Bill 175 (Chapter 60)** establishes the New Mexico Sentencing Commission as the administrator of the Crime Reduction Grant Act and includes the creation of the Crime Reduction Grant Fund. This bill also clarifies and expands the role of criminal justice coordinating councils in each judicial district.

When the legislature legalized cannabis in 2021, included in the legislation was the expungement of cannabis records for any past offenses that were no longer illegal. However, identifying all past offenses eligible for expungement has proven to be an immense challenge for the Administrative Office of the Courts. **House Bill 314 (Chapter 74)** creates a procedure that allows persons charged with offenses that are eligible for expungement to verify whether expungement has occurred or to request the court to automatically expunge the records. The bill also clarifies that expungement applies to public records and only to charges regarding cannabis and cannabis paraphernalia.

Individuals who have a judgment entered against them in court are subject to having their wages and bank accounts garnished to help satisfy that judgment. **Senate Bill 216 (Chapter 104)** increases the amount of an individual's wages that is exempt from garnishment, except in the case of child support, and provides for a new exemption in the amount of \$2,400 for funds on deposit in bank accounts. The bill also significantly increases the descriptions and value of certain types of a debtor's property that are exempt from collection by judgment creditors or receivers or trustees in bankruptcy, including a 150% increase in the value of the homestead exemption and a tripling of the exemption in lieu of a homestead exemption. These valuations will now be subject to a biennial cost-of-living adjustment. Exempt funds that are commingled with other funds in a bank account remain exempt if the exempt funds are reasonably traceable.

Most of the laws setting up the probate courts were written in the 1880s and brought forward into the Code 1915 with no further changes until now, and the two probate court fee sections were written in 1923 and only one had been amended – in 1993. **Senate Bill 248 (Chapter 44)** repeals many of the outdated sections and brings clarity and modernity to the administration and jurisdiction of the probate courts. The law also adjusts the terms of current probate judges so that they will all be elected at the same gubernatorial election.

CRIMINAL LAW

Crime was a much-discussed topic during the 2023 session, and although many crime-related bills were introduced and debated, in the end a handful of bills addressing gun violence, animal abuse and shoplifting became law.

House Bill 9 (Chapter 5), which aims to tackle New Mexico's outsized rate of child gun violence, creates two new crimes for failure to securely store a firearm. In particular, a person is now guilty of a fourth degree felony if the person negligently makes a firearm accessible to a minor who then uses the firearm to inflict great bodily harm or death. A person is guilty of a misdemeanor if the person negligently makes a firearm accessible to a minor who then either brandishes or displays the firearm in a threatening manner or causes injury not resulting in great bodily harm or death.

House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Consumer and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 306 (Chapter 195) attempts to keep firearms from felons and would-be criminals by making so-called "straw purchases" illegal. That is, the bill prohibits a person from knowingly purchasing or transferring a firearm on behalf of another who either is a felon or intends to use the firearm in the furtherance of any crime involving a firearm. While these acts are already illegal under federal law, the criminalization of these acts in New Mexico provides local prosecutors with the ability to file charges for this offense and to do so as a fourth degree felony.

Another issue addressed was bestiality, which surprisingly was not previously a crime in New Mexico. That fact had given New Mexico the dubious distinction of being one of only two states in which it was legal to engage in sexual contact with an animal. Rectifying this, **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 215 (Chapter 42)** creates the crimes of bestiality, promoting bestiality and aggravated bestiality. In addition to making these crimes fourth and third degree felonies, the bill requires sentencing courts to include in the judgment and sentence that all animals under the direct care and control of a convicted person be seized and that the convicted person not be allowed to own, possess, reside with or exercise control over an animal or engage in any occupation or profession, paid or unpaid, anywhere animals are kept or cared for up to 15 years after conviction, not counting incarceration time. The bill also permits courts to require the convicted person to submit to psychological assessment and appropriate counseling and to pay restitution for incurred costs of veterinary care, boarding, food and other costs of care for an animal harmed by the crime.

Finally, **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 234 (Chapter 194)** tackles the proliferation of shoplifting in three ways. First, the bill amends the existing shoplifting statute such that prosecutors can aggregate the total value of merchandise shoplifted from one or more retailers to charge the crime as a felony instead of a misdemeanor. Second, the bill creates the crime of aggravated shoplifting, a third degree felony, for assaulting or striking at another person immediately after shoplifting

in order to escape the scene of the shoplifting. This fills a gap in the robbery statute where the use of force during an escape from a robbery was not previously proscribed. Third, the bill creates the crime of organized retail crime, a second degree felony, which is intended to target groups of people who conspire to shoplift from multiple retailers. Under the provisions of organized retail crime, prosecutors may aggregate the value of all merchandise stolen by the group over a one-year period, which greatly increases the severity of the punishment beyond simple shoplifting.

CULTURAL AFFAIRS

Two laws relating to cultural affairs were enacted during the 2023 legislative session, both creating days of recognition.

Dolores Huerta is a labor and civil rights activist who was born in Dawson, New Mexico, on April 10, 1930. She co-founded the United Farm Workers of America, led boycotts and strikes that resulted in better working conditions for farm workers and coined the famous rallying cry "Sí, se puede!" (Yes, we can!). To honor the tireless activism and many accomplishments of Dolores Huerta, **Senate Bill 468 (Chapter 179)** declares April 10 of each year as "Dolores Huerta Day".

To recognize and celebrate the cultural, economic and historic contributions that Asian Americans, Pacific Islanders and Native Hawaiians have made to New Mexico, **House Bill 274 (Chapter 6)** designates the first Tuesday of February of each odd-numbered year as "Asian American, Pacific Islander and Native Hawaiian Day".

EDUCATION

As in years past, the legislature in 2023 focused greatly on the education of New Mexico's students. This year, the legislature appropriates in the GAA an approximate total of \$165 billion to the PED, the Public School Facilities Authority, regional education cooperatives and other special appropriations. The special appropriations include such programs as early literacy and reading support; school leader professional development; teacher professional development; the graduation, reality and dual-role skills program; national board certification assistance; advanced placement and international baccalaureate test assistance; the science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics initiative; and the teacher residency program.

In addition to the GAA funding, the legislature passed numerous bills that could have significant impacts on New Mexico's public schools, including universal free breakfasts and lunches; extended school years through the new K-12 plus program; changes to the public school funding formula program unit and

family income index amounts; increases to the minimum salary amounts for licensed educational assistants; the creation of a teacher vocational license; increased employer contributions for school personnel health insurance benefits; clarification on school employee background checks; expanded health-related services for students; support for military families regarding public school enrollment; and measures to increase literacy and keep up with educational technology advances. Laws concerning changes to public school capital outlay funding, as well as several post-secondary-education-related measures to establish Native American technical assistance centers, provide financial assistance to teachers pursuing graduate degrees and certain students at New Mexico Military Institute and clarify student athlete compensation, were also enacted.

Public Schools

Universal free school lunch is the key concept in **Senate Education Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 4 (Chapter 30)**, which requires all public school districts and charter schools operating the national school lunch program and the school breakfast program to establish a program to offer high-quality breakfasts and lunches at no charge to all students without consideration of a student's eligibility for a federally funded free or reduced-price meal. Bureau of Indian Education schools, tribally controlled schools and private schools operating the national school lunch program and the school breakfast program may establish a universal free lunch program. State funding will cover the cost of meals not paid by federal funds, and incentives are available for school food authorities that meet meal quality improvement requirements that may include purchasing New Mexico-produced food, freshly preparing scratch-cooked foods, providing culturally relevant meals and engaging student and family voices and choices in menu development. In addition, the legislation requires provision of up to 20 minutes of seated lunch time for students in kindergarten through fifth grade. Requirements are also included to minimize food waste.

Extended school time in New Mexico began in 2007 with K-3 plus, a pilot project conducted in high-poverty schools to determine if additional time in kindergarten through third grade would make a difference, particularly in reading and mathematics, for at-risk students. Originally crafted to be a six-year pilot, the results were so promising it was turned into permanent law and later extended through fifth grade. New Mexico's experiment showed concrete evidence of the benefits of increased instructional time, including a narrowing of the achievement gap, increased cognitive skills and higher test scores. Now comes **House Bill 130 (Chapter 19)**, which creates the K-12 plus program. Although participation in K-12 plus is voluntary for now, it is hoped that providing more money to school districts and charter schools that increase instructional time will result in universal K-12 plus in public schools. The bill requires a minimum of 1,140 instructional hours per year, or its equivalent; half-day kindergarten requires 550 instructional hours. An instructional hour is defined as time in which students receive instruction aligned

to academic content and performance standards and includes enrichment programs; technical knowledge, skills and competency-based applied learning; and research- or evidence-based social, emotional or academic interventions. The law recognizes the importance of teacher collaboration and professional development and allows up to 60 instructional hours per school year for elementary school teachers and up to 30 hours for middle and high school teachers to be used as professional work hours. A professional hour is time during which a teacher participates in professional work aligned to challenging academic content and performance standards, including home visiting or parent-teacher conferences; educator training or professional development; and mentorship, coaching and collaboration between school employees. For participating school districts and charter schools, the number of additional K-12 plus program units is determined by multiplying the membership in PED-approved K-12 plus schools by the cost differential factor of 0.012 for additional instructional days between 181 and 190 and 0.016 between 191 and 205 instructional days. For public schools with four-day calendars, the instructional days are between 156 and 165 and between 166 and 175 for additional funding. To make way for the new scheme, K-5 plus and extended learning time statutes are repealed. The GAA includes \$252,333,500 for extending the school year, including \$94 million from the increased distribution from the Permanent School Fund approved by the voters in 2022.

Two bills regarding public school funding passed this year, including **House Bill 199 (Chapter 148)**, which amends and increases three different program units within the public school funding formula. The bill increases: the at-risk index program unit from 0.30 to 0.33; the fine arts education program unit from 0.5 to 0.55; and the principal responsibility factor for all public school principals and assistant principals by 0.05. Meanwhile, **Senate Bill 3 (Chapter 23)** amends the Family Income Index Act to remove the restrictions on family income index allocations that formerly required eligible schools with high poverty concentrations to spend one-third of the allocation on structured literacy interventions, one-third on evidence-based mathematics interventions and one-third on at-risk student programming. Now, participating schools have more local discretion on how they spend this funding for interventions and services within their schools.

The formula for allocating payments in lieu of taxes made to school districts for industrial bond projects for electricity generation or transmission facilities is amended by **Senate Bill 474 (Chapter 180)**. The previous formula provided that payments be allocated equally among all school districts in a municipality or county area, but the formula now requires that 50% be shared equally among the school districts in which a project is located, 40% be allocated to all school districts in a municipality or county area in proportion to the area of each school district within the municipality or county and 10% be allocated to all school districts in a municipality or county area in proportion to the average of each school district's student membership.

A number of bills relating to school personnel became law as well. In response to the legislature increasing the minimum teacher salaries during the 2022 regular session, **House Bill 127 (Chapter 14)** increases the minimum annual salaries of licensed educational assistants from \$12,000 to \$25,000 starting with the 2023-2024 school year. Also in regard to school employees, **House Bill 181 (Chapter 145)** changes the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards program units to apply to all licensed school employees who have received national board certification. These units provide board-certified licensed school employees with a one-time salary differential that is the equivalent of the money generated by the program units. Units are determined by multiplying by one and one-half the number of board-certified licensed school employees in a school district or charter school and multiplying the result by the unit value set by the secretary of public education based on the legislature's state equalization guarantee distribution appropriation.

In an effort to increase career technical education in public schools, **Senate Floor Substitute for Senate Bill 417 (Chapter 128)** amends the teacher licensure sections of the School Personnel Act to include a new vocational license to the three-tier licensure system and provides exceptions in which all levels of vocational teachers are excluded from minimum salaries required for the three-tier licensure system to allow for local discretion when it comes to paying for vocational teachers. Also, the bill adds language in which all types of teachers holding a level one license are not required to meet any changed license requirements until the time of license renewal.

In order to meet Federal Bureau of Investigation criminal background check requirements, **Senate Bill 383 (Chapter 177)** amends the School Personnel Act to clarify the types of school personnel subject to criminal history record checks. The bill requires the PED and the Department of Public Safety, in conjunction with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, to conduct a criminal history record check on all applicants for licensure, school volunteers and school contractors and authorizes local school governing authorities to develop additional criteria for criminal history record checks. Further, the bill allows a court of competent jurisdiction to subpoena or require compliance with discovery requests for criminal history information that would otherwise be confidential and not a public record. The bill prohibits the PED from excluding an otherwise qualified person from licensure solely based on previous arrests or convictions, unless that person has a qualifying criminal conviction.

To combat rising health insurance rates for employees of school districts, charter schools and other participating entities in the Public School Insurance Authority, **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bill 533 (Chapter 83)** increases the required employer contributions for employee health insurance, ranging from 80% for those earning less than \$50,000 per year, 70% for those earning between \$50,000 and \$60,000 per year and 60% for those whose annual salary is more than \$60,000. Additionally, the bill allows entities that have available funding to cover up to 100% of the health insurance premiums.

To ensure that students have access to emergency medical services, the legislature passed **Senate Bill 450 (Chapter 178)**. This bill requires all licensed coaches employed by school districts, including charter schools, to be certified in cardiopulmonary resuscitation and trained in the use of automated external defibrillators.

With the passage of **House Bill 134 (Chapter 56)**, sanitary pads and tampons must now be provided in public school bathrooms at no cost to students. The requirements for providing menstrual products in public schools vary depending on the age and gender of the students using a particular restroom. For example, each public elementary school will be required to provide menstrual products in at least one women's, one men's and one gender-neutral bathroom. On the other hand, public middle schools, junior high schools, secondary schools and high schools will be required to provide menstrual products in every women's bathroom and gender-neutral bathroom and at least one men's bathroom.

Military families are often required to relocate, and delays and complications with public school enrollment can occur. This process is streamlined with the enactment of **Senate Bill 120 (Chapter 33)**, which amends current public school enrollment statutes to allow for open enrollment flexibility at public schools and charter schools for children of military families prior to a family's actual physical relocation.

In response to the consolidated *Yazzie/Martinez v. State of New Mexico* lawsuit, **House Bill 198 (Chapter 65)** allows secondary schools funded by the federal Bureau of Indian Education to participate in the career technical education pilot project. Such participation would make these schools eligible to apply for and receive grants to establish career technical education programs.

To keep up with modern technological advances, **House Bill 401 (Chapter 161)** renames the Technology for Education Act as the Digital Equity in Education Act and requires school districts and charter schools to submit educational technology plans to the PED. The bill also requires the PED to establish guidelines for distributions from the Educational Technology Fund and updates membership on the Council on Technology in Education by removing representation from post-secondary experts and adding representation from the Office of Broadband Access and Expansion, small and large school districts and experts in the education of at-risk student groups. In addition, the bill repeals multiple sections of law regarding annual reporting, Educational Technology Fund distributions and obsolete computer replacement and educational technology programs.

Regarding structured literacy and the science of reading, **House Education Committee Substitute for House Bill 481 (Chapter 165)** specifies that money from the Reading Materials Fund can be spent on elementary literacy instructional materials, rather than reading programs, and includes on the list of permissible materials those materials that must be on the New Mexico instructional materials adopted list correspondent to structured literacy or on the advisory list of instructional programming established by the Colorado Department of Education. Further, the bill requires school districts that are awarded

funding from the Reading Materials Fund to have a structured literacy professional development plan and to use no more than two core reading programs.

Public School Capital Outlay

An update to the public school capital outlay funding structure, **Senate Bill 131 (Chapter 98)** temporarily reduces the share of local school capital project costs by one-third (or one-half for pre-kindergarten facilities projects and for micro-districts with 200 students or fewer) between FY 2024 and FY 2026. The bill also forgives and eliminates legislative offsets and removes federal impact aid capital expenditures from the local-state match formula. In addition, the bill sets the Public School Facilities Authority's operating budget limit at 5% of the five-year average annual grant assistance from the Public School Capital Outlay Fund.

Post-Secondary Education

A bill whose idea is part of the tribal remedy framework, which was developed in response to the *Yazzie/Martinez* decision, **House Bill 280 (Chapter 72)** requires the Higher Education Department to establish two American Indian education technical assistance centers to provide assistance and support for tribal education departments and tribal communities, including assisting in the development of: culturally relevant and linguistically appropriate curriculum and instructional materials; career pathways for American Indian educators; professional development opportunities for licensed school employees in culturally and linguistically relevant pedagogy; and education policy and capacity building for tribal communities. The centers will facilitate collaboration with state and tribal education agencies and educational institutions serving American Indian students. The Higher Education Department's request for proposals for operating the centers shall prioritize applications from tribal colleges in New Mexico, American Indian programs at public higher education institutions and tribally controlled institutions and shall include how a center is expected to set goals, objectives and benchmarks; provide progress, status and annual reports to the department for dissemination to appropriate stakeholders; and report contracting and financial accounting information to the department.

The federal government made changes to the uses of educational savings plans, known as 529 plans, by broadening their use, and New Mexico followed suit with **House Bill 342 (Chapter 17)**. In addition to paying for post-secondary education, an account may be used for other federally allowable expenses, including tuition for elementary and secondary education and repayment of student loans.

To allow New Mexico teachers an opportunity to advance in their careers, **Senate Bill 307 (Chapter 201)** amends the Teacher Preparation Affordability Act to remove the requirement that an eligible student be enrolled at least half-time and allows for a licensed teacher to be eligible for the

program if the teacher is pursuing a graduate degree in education or a field related to the individual's teaching specialty.

House Bill 145 (Chapter 58) amends the General Richard T. Knowles Legislative Scholarship Program at the New Mexico Military Institute to remove the current four-year term requirement for the scholarship, thus allowing fifth- and sixth-year students at the institute's junior college program to receive the scholarship. Additionally, the bill eliminates the July 1 candidate selection deadline.

Lastly, **Senate Bill 219 (Chapter 105)** amends the law regarding student athlete compensation to allow a post-secondary educational institution to: prohibit a student athlete from wearing footwear of the student athlete's choice during official team activities; and arrange third-party compensation for use of a student athlete's name, image, likeness or athletic reputation or use such deals as inducements to recruit prospective student athletes. The bill also broadens the prohibition on post-secondary educational institutions from interfering or preventing a student athlete from fully participating in athletics for obtaining representation in relation to contracts or legal matters.

ELECTIONS

2023 was a significant year for elections-related legislation. Proposals that had been introduced in previous years, including a bill that was filibustered during the last morning of the 2022 session, were passed and signed into law. In total, four elections-related bills, covering topics as diverse as elections administration, elections crimes and voting rights, became law.

Senate Bill 180 (Chapter 39) is an omnibus elections bill covering various amendments, repeals and enactments to the Election Code. In addition to general cleanup, the provisions of this legislation make clarifications and additions to the administration and conduct of elections. Some of the elections administration topics addressed are: the qualifications of election board members; training for challengers and watchers; the establishment of voter convenience centers; requirements for the issuance, qualification and handling of mailed ballots; voter registration procedures; reconciliation processes for voter registration lists; the establishment of an election security program; the certification of voting machines and voting system rechecks; the order of offices on the ballot; post-election duties of county clerks and the county canvassing board; and elections crimes, such as unlawful possession of absentee ballot and obstruction of the polling place, among others. Also, a voter notification will now be mailed to each voter at least 42 days prior to a statewide election.

Additionally, this bill includes revisions to the requirements for candidates to qualify for the ballot. For example, the secretary of state is directed to implement a secure internet application so that potential candidates may gather electronic nominating petition signatures; changes are made to the number of signatures required for nominating petitions for certain offices and candidates; and nominating petition signatures are allowed to be submitted in lieu of a filing fee for certain offices.

Other issues of note in this legislation include: a requirement that when a form is specified by the Election Code, the form approved by the secretary of state must be used; and when the disclosure of documents is established in the Election Code for elections-related public records, the provisions of the Election Code, not the Inspection of Public Records Act, govern their disclosure. Furthermore, the secretary of state is required to receive service of process for elections-related litigation, regardless of whether the secretary of state is a party to the action, and home addresses of public officials may be deemed to be confidential upon request of the public official and redacted from election- and financial-related disclosures that are filed with the secretary of state or county clerks.

Dubbed the "Voting Rights Protections" bill, **House Bill 4 (Chapter 84)** amends and enacts sections of the Election Code to provide greater voter registration opportunities and voting access for qualified electors. Specifically, the bill provides for automatic voter registration and updates to a certificate of registration upon a qualified elector conducting a transaction to apply for or renew a driver's license, allows a voter to automatically receive an absentee ballot for each election in which the voter is eligible to vote by being added to a permanent absentee voter list and allows a person convicted of a felony to vote once released from incarceration. Additionally, counties are required to supply monitored secured containers for the collection of voted ballots, and other political subdivisions may request additional monitored secured containers. This legislation also enacts the Native American Voting Rights Act and consolidates requirements that ensure that tribal communities have access to election day polling places, early voting locations and monitored secured containers on and near tribal lands. Further, beginning January 1, 2024, the day of a general election and a regular local election is declared to be a school holiday.

After the general election of 2020, secretaries of state, county clerks and election workers around the country began to receive increased threats of violence against themselves and their staff. With the enactment of **Senate Bill 43 (Chapter 32)**, criminal penalties are extended to intimidation tactics and threats of violence that are made against voters and election officials and their employees, where, formerly, only election boards, challengers and watchers were protected.

Lastly, **Senate Bill 335 (Chapter 46)** delays until 2025 implementation of the Local Election Act as applied to districts organized pursuant to the Conservancy Act of New Mexico. In 2018, the Local Election Act was enacted to standardize the dates and procedures for most local elections and special elections and established the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of each odd-numbered year

as the regular local election day for most local elections. In that 2018 law, certain special districts, including conservancy districts, that had previously administered their own elections became subject to the provisions of the Local Election Act. Due to administrative challenges with conforming the elections of those districts to the requirements of the Local Election Act, an implementation delay was secured through enactment of this 2023 act.

ENERGY, ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Among the 2023 session's new energy, environment and natural resources laws, new restrictions are placed on conducting prescribed burns; more authority is given to the Forestry Division of the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department to prevent forest fires; and an assistance program to help people affected by the 2022 wildfires is established. Additionally, two conservation funds are created to facilitate conservation projects; the Renewable Energy Office is established in the State Land Office; further barriers to the development of new facilities for storing radioactive waste in the state are implemented; a study is ordered to monitor land and water affected by the operation of the San Juan Generating Station for contamination; and the eligibility for financial assistance from the Energy Transition Displaced Worker Assistance Fund in the Energy Transition Act is expanded.

In 2022, wildfires devastated large parts of the state, forcing evacuations and burning hundreds of thousands of acres of forest as well as hundreds of structures. The Calf Canyon-Hermits Peak Fire, the largest and most destructive wildfire in the history of the state, started when the United States Forest Service lost control of a prescribed burn on Hermits Peak, a pile burn operation rekindled in Calf Canyon and the two fires merged. As a result, three bills were enacted during this session to help address the catastrophic effects of the wildfires.

Current law prohibits conducting prescribed burns when the state forester or a local government has issued a restriction on prescribed burns due to drought conditions. **Senate Conservation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 21 (Chapter 88)** further restricts prescribed burns by prohibiting starting a prescribed burn when the National Weather Service has issued a red flag warning.

House Bill 195 (Chapter 64) updates the Forest Conservation Act to expand the authority of the Forestry Division to protect against forest fires and remove outdated references. The law establishes the Forestry Division as being responsible on nonfederal and nonmunicipal lands for the conservation of forests and forest resources, as well as the prevention and suppression of forest fires. Furthermore, the law authorizes the division, in cooperation with landowners, to maintain and improve forest health; prevent, control and suppress fires; conduct rehabilitation and repair; conduct post-fire slope stabilization, erosion control, riparian restoration, seeding and reforestation of burned areas; research forestry and forest fires;

and prescribe uses of fires. The division is also authorized to investigate violations and enforce laws and rules regarding forests and forest resources and products.

Federal public assistance funding has been promised to help affected communities recover from the Calf Canyon-Hermits Peak fire; however, setting up that assistance program is expected to take a number of months. To expedite the process of recovery, **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 6 (Chapter 2)** provides up to \$100 million in zero-interest loans to political subdivisions for projects to replace or repair public infrastructure damaged by fire, flooding or debris flows caused by or stemming from that fire. These zero-interest loans must be paid back to the state from the federal funding when it becomes available.

To provide a permanent revenue stream for a variety of conservation projects statewide, **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 9 (Chapter 26)** creates the Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund and the Land of Enchantment Legacy Fund. The Conservation Legacy Permanent Fund serves as an investment fund that makes an annual distribution to the Land of Enchantment Legacy Fund of investment income in excess of \$5 million; provided that the total amount in the fund is in excess of \$150 million. On July 1 of each year, a distribution of the greater of \$12.5 million or 25% of the total balance of the Land of Enchantment Legacy Fund is made as follows: 22.5% to the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department for forestry and conservation projects; 22.5% to the New Mexico Department of Agriculture for land conservation and management; 10% to the Department of Environment for surface water quality and river habitat programs; 15% to the Economic Development Department for outdoor recreation programs; 8% to the Cultural Affairs Department for cultural protection projects; and 22% to the Department of Game and Fish for programs for the protection and propagation of game and fish.

Although the Renewable Energy Office already exists in practice, **House Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 95 (Chapter 13)** establishes the office in statute within the State Land Office for the purpose of advancing the production and development of renewable energy on state trust land.

The state has stored radioactive waste underground at the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in southeastern New Mexico since 1999. Current law prohibits the creation of a new radioactive waste disposal facility without concurrence by the state. **Senate Conservation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 53 (Chapter 25)** creates further safeguards against more radioactive waste being stored in the state by amending the Radioactive and Hazardous Materials Act to prohibit local governments from issuing, certifying or approving a permit, contract, lease or license for the construction or operation of a disposal facility for spent fuel or high-level waste unless a national permanent storage facility is operational. The bill also expands the membership of the Radioactive Waste Consultation Task Force to include the

secretary of homeland security and emergency management, the secretary of Indian affairs and the commissioner of public lands.

In an effort to address remediation and restoration concerns in northwestern New Mexico, **House Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 142 (Chapter 185)** creates the San Juan Generating Station Facility and Mine Remediation and Restoration Study Act. Through this bill, the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department and the Department of Environment are tasked with conducting a comprehensive study of the San Juan Generating Station facility and accompanying mine to determine if there has been any environmental contamination of the lands and waters surrounding the facility and mine. The two departments have until July 1, 2025 to complete the study and provide the legislature with a copy of the study, which shall contain specific measurable steps for the full remediation and restoration of the facility and mine.

In 2019, the Energy Transition Act was enacted and created the Energy Transition Displaced Worker Assistance Fund to provide financial and other assistance to "displaced workers" as defined in that act. **House Bill 449 (Chapter 81)** increases the flexibility of the term "displaced worker" by revising the definition to include a New Mexico resident who was terminated from employment, or whose contract was terminated, due to the abandonment of a New Mexico facility producing electricity that resulted in the displacement of at least 40 workers and those who meet other eligibility criteria established by the Workforce Solutions Department.

GAME AND FISH

During the 2023 regular session, the legislature passed three bills relating to game and fish. Each of the bills increase access to outdoor recreational activities, particularly for children and low-income families.

The passage of **House Bill 35 (Chapter 135)** demonstrates that there are certain issues and principles that everyone can support, regardless of their background or party affiliation. Passing through both chambers with unanimous support, the bill provides free three-day camping passes at state parks and free fishing licenses to foster parents and children in the custody of foster parents, young adults enrolled in the Fostering Connections Program and children in the custody of the Children, Youth and Families Department or in tribal custody.

The Department of Game and Fish has provided educational and recreational statewide programs for youth ranging from hunting and fishing camps to conservation education. Amid the COVID-19 pandemic and decreased funding, the ubiquity of the youth programs diminished. However, 12-year-old Braden McIntosh observed this change and developed a concept to jump-start the Department of Game and Fish youth programs and provide a means of funding them by allowing anyone making a purchase on

the department's website to make a donation for the provision of youth programs across the state. This concept was translated into **Senate Bill 392 (Chapter 168)**, and it passed the legislature without any opposition.

Finally, **House Bill 197 (Chapter 147)** increases the number of free fishing days from two nonconsecutive Saturdays to two nonconsecutive two-day weekends. On free fishing days, members of the public are able to exercise the same privileges as someone who holds a fishing license.

GAMING AND LOTTERY

Nonprofit gaming and racinos were topics of legislative interest during the 2023 regular session, as demonstrated by the enactment of three bills covering nonprofit gaming and insurance for jockeys and exercise riders.

Concerning nonprofit gaming, **House Bill 253 (Chapter 154)** changes the time frame of when gaming machines may be operated on the premises of a nonprofit organization; they now can be operated for any consecutive 12 hours instead of operating from noon to midnight. The bill also decreases the percentage of the nonprofit gaming licensee's net take from 30% down to 20%, and it adds allowable gaming expenses to be added in the calculations for the balance of the net take.

Prior to the 2023 session, gaming machines on a nonprofit organization's premises were limited to awarding a maximum prize of \$4,000. **Senate Bill 143 (Chapter 173)** increases the amount of the maximum award to \$10,000.

In an effort to ensure that jockey and exercise rider insurance can be adequately covered, **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 336 (Chapter 122)** temporarily changes the formula of the gaming tax for a racino licensee to require that part of the net take is used to offset the costs of jockey and exercise rider insurance and to comply with federal and state laws affecting horse racing. The bill includes a temporary provision that requires the State Racing Commission to review the effectiveness of this change and report no later than December 1, 2026 on its findings. Barring future legislative action, the changes to this section will revert back on July 1, 2027.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

With the COVID-19 pandemic mostly in the rear-view mirror, the 2023 session saw the legislature enact a wide range of laws relating to health and human services. Two bills preserving access to reproductive and gender-affirming health care became law, as well as several measures designed to provide targeted health care funding for rural areas of the state and opioid addiction remediation services. Special emphasis was given to health care providers, with a number of bills aiming to ameliorate the provider shortage in the state through increased recruitment and retention in addition to expanding the scopes of

practice of several types of health care providers. Also enacted were three bills aimed to improve the lives of those with disabilities, one bill to help individuals experiencing behavioral health crises and one bill requiring state correctional facilities to offer medication-assisted treatment for incarcerated individuals with substance use disorders. Other notable health- and human-services-related measures include ensuring funding for school-based health care centers, improving Alzheimer's disease and dementia care training in long-term care facilities and providing free identification cards for the homeless population. Additionally, there were many bills enacted that address health insurance issues, which are described in the [Insurance](#) section.

The provision of abortion and gender-affirming health care services has become an increasingly polarizing issue in the United States, with some states prohibiting these services and others enacting statutes to ensure access to these services, and the legislature passed two bills pertaining to this topic. **House Bill 7 (Chapter 11)** prohibits public bodies from enacting their own measures that would restrict access to reproductive and gender-affirming health care and from discriminating against those seeking such services. The legislation provides the Office of the Attorney General and district attorneys with the power to enforce the statute and also creates a private right of action for aggrieved individuals. The second bill, **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 13 (Chapter 167)**, protects individuals engaging in activities related to providing or receiving reproductive and gender-affirming health care services from civil, criminal or professional disciplinary proceedings commenced in other states. First, this bill prohibits public bodies and certain third parties from releasing confidential information in furtherance of such proceedings. Second, it limits the ability of a plaintiff from another state to commence such proceedings in New Mexico courts, and it also shields providers engaged in reproductive and gender-affirming health care services in New Mexico from extradition to other states. Third, the bill prohibits professional licensing boards in New Mexico from sanctioning health care providers solely because they offer reproductive and gender-affirming health care.

To enhance access to health care in rural areas of the state, the Rural Health Care Delivery Fund is created by **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 7 (Chapter 204)**. The new fund provides one-year grants to private and public health care providers located in counties that have a population of 100,000 or fewer, and such grants can be used to defray operating losses incurred by the providers for providing new or expanded health care services that are approved by the Health Care Authority Department. The grants are subject to certain conditions before being awarded, including that the providers serve Medicaid recipients and provide the department with audited financial data.

In response to the closure of many rural hospitals around the country, Congress created the rural emergency hospital designation in the federal Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021, as a new category of hospitals that are eligible to receive enhanced federal funding and reimbursement through Medicare. To provide New Mexico hospitals the ability to access the federal funding, **Senate Bill 245 (Chapter 109)**

authorizes the Department of Health to establish a rural emergency hospital license. Facilities that qualify for and obtain this rural emergency hospital license are able to apply for the enhanced federal funding.

In the past two years, the Office of the Attorney General has secured more than \$387 million through settlements with companies that contributed to the opioid epidemic, and there are still settlements pending that could bring millions of dollars to the state. About 45% of the settlement money is available to the state to use for programs that remediate the harms of opioids, and the rest of the money is disbursed to local governments across the state. Until now, the state's portion of opioid settlement money was deposited in the Consumer Settlement Fund of the Office of the Attorney General, which is composed of money from various settlements that the Office of the Attorney General has secured. To simplify administration of opioid settlement money and to ensure that this money is only used for opioid remediation, **House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Bill 527 (Chapter 166)** creates two new funds comprised exclusively of opioid settlement money: the Opioid Settlement Restricted Fund and the Opioid Crisis Recovery Fund. The Opioid Settlement Restricted Fund consists of all of the state's portion of opioid settlement money. Each year, approximately 5% of the year-end market value of the Opioid Settlement Restricted Fund will be distributed to the Opioid Crisis Recovery Fund. Money in the Opioid Crisis Recovery Fund can then be used directly to facilitate opioid remediation.

As part of an effort to encourage health care providers to stay in New Mexico, the legislature has passed multiple bills over the past decade that limit the enforceability of non-compete provisions against certain categories of health care providers. **Senate Bill 106 (Chapter 97)** builds upon the legislature's previous work by prohibiting the enforcement of non-compete provisions against three new types of health care practitioners: psychologists, physician assistants and pharmacists.

One of New Mexico's most effective tools for recruiting and retaining health care providers is the Health Professional Loan Repayment Program, which is part of the Health Professional Loan Repayment Act. The act allows the Higher Education Department to award loan repayment to a health care professional in exchange for the health care professional's commitment to practice in New Mexico for a specific period of service. **House Bill 209 (Chapter 66)** amends the Health Professional Loan Repayment Act to make more types of health care professionals eligible for loan repayment and to extend the minimum required period of service from two years to three years.

Previously, only licensed physicians could provide a medical exemption for childhood immunizations. With the enactment of **Senate Bill 81 (Chapter 94)**, physician assistants and certified nurse practitioners are granted the ability to certify that immunization is detrimental to the physical condition of a child.

The scope of practice for pharmacists, as set forth in the Pharmacy Act, is expanded by **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 92 (Chapter 95)**. Pharmacists may now: administer or

prescribe devices or supplies for prescribed drug therapy for health conditions, including diabetes; order, perform and interpret certain tests; and maintain proper records consistent with the standard of care in general medical practice. Pharmacists now may also order, test, screen, treat and provide preventive services for health conditions or situations that include COVID-19, influenza, group A strep pharyngitis, uncomplicated urinary tract infections, certain HIV treatment and other conditions of public health importance identified by the Department of Health.

As a way to expedite death pronouncements, **Senate Bill 168 (Chapter 101)** allows for a registered nurse employed by a hospice agency to pronounce the death of a resident of a nursing home.

In 2019, the legislature passed a bill that created additional requirements for health care providers who prescribe opioid analgesics and opioid antagonists. The bill required each prescription for an opioid antagonist such as naloxone or Narcan to be accompanied by written information that includes a warning to the person administering the opioid antagonist to call 911 immediately after the administration. Due to concerns that health care providers would be obligated to call 911 each time they administer an opioid antagonist, **Senate Bill 181 (Chapter 102)** updates the required warning by clarifying that health care providers who administer an opioid antagonist do not need to call 911.

Senate Bill 471 (Chapter 133) amends the Elizabeth Whitefield End-of-Life Options Act to shield providers who refuse to participate in the medical aid in dying process, including providing information or referrals, due to reasons of conscience from criminal liability or professional disciplinary action.

New Mexicans with disabilities stand to benefit from bills passed this session. For instance, to ensure that those with physical and mental disabilities have equal access to organ transplants, **Senate Bill 71 (Chapter 171)** prohibits health care providers and health insurers from discriminating against people with disabilities who require organ transplants. Now, a person's disability may only be considered in the organ transplant selection process if the disability has been determined by a physician to be significantly relevant to the transplant or recovery after performing an individualized evaluation of the person.

In an effort to remove outdated language from New Mexico statutes, **Senate Bill 260 (Chapter 113)** amends various statutory references to "mental retardation" and similar phrases and replaces them with "developmental or intellectual disabilities". The bill also provides an updated definition of "developmental or intellectual disability" in the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Code.

Under an existing Medicaid waiver program, people with developmental disabilities can receive services that enable them to live in the community independently. These services are furnished by licensed direct support provider agencies that contract with and receive reimbursement from the Department of Health. **House Bill 395 (Chapter 160)** requires direct support provider agencies to submit an annual report to the Department of Health that includes demographic data about its employees as well as the wages they are paid. It also requires the Department of Health to conduct an independent biennial study about the operating costs of these direct support provider agencies. Then, based on the results and

contingent upon available funding, the Department of Health, with the approval of the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, may then recommend higher reimbursement rates, which would allow agencies to pay their employees higher wages.

Established by statute in 2015, crisis triage centers are health facilities, licensed by the Department of Health, that provide stabilization services, either on a residential or nonresidential basis, to people experiencing mental health crises. Admission to a crisis triage center can often provide a better option for stabilization than a visit to a busy hospital emergency room or being booked into a correctional facility. However, until this year, crisis triage centers were only permitted to accept voluntary admissions. **Senate Bill 310 (Chapter 117)** amends the Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Code to allow for involuntary admissions to such centers. The bill further amends the code by broadening the definition of "evaluation center" to include crisis triage centers, which is significant since pursuant to current law, under certain circumstances, peace officers are authorized to detain and transport people in crisis to an evaluation center for a mental health evaluation.

Studies have shown that medication-assisted treatment, the use of United States Food and Drug Administration-approved drugs combined with counseling, is a more effective form of treatment for substance use disorder than either counseling or medication alone. Methadone, naltrexone and buprenorphine are widely prescribed to combat opioid addiction, and disulfiram is a drug used to treat alcohol dependence, although patients often need to be maintained on these drugs for extended periods of time. Estimates suggest that 65% of the prison population in the United States has an active substance use disorder. States and local governments that have implemented medication-assisted treatment programs in corrections settings have reported positive outcomes, including fewer overdoses, continued engagement in treatment and reduced rates of recidivism among individuals who participated in such treatment. **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 425 (Chapter 49)** requires state correctional facilities that currently operate medication-assisted treatment programs to continue them and to offer such treatment to all incarcerated individuals in state correctional facilities by the end of FY 2026. Also, the bill creates the Medication-Assisted Treatment for the Incarcerated Program Fund to allow county-operated jails, with the assistance of the Health Care Authority Department, to establish and operate medication-assisted treatment programs.

Senate Bill 242 (Chapter 108) amends the Lynn and Erin Compassionate Use Act by changing the validity period for a medical cannabis patient registry identification card. Cards now expire two years from the date of issue, rather than three years from the date of issue. In addition, this bill clarifies that patients are required to reapply for a new card no sooner than 30 days before the expiration of the patient's current card.

School-based health centers are clinics located on or near school grounds that provide primary, preventive and behavioral health services to students and sometimes staff and community members as well. Currently, there are 78 school-based health centers in New Mexico, and they operate through an agreement between the Health Care Authority Department and the Department of Health. **Senate Bill 397 (Chapter 48)** creates a new section of the Public Health Act to codify school-based health centers in statute to ensure that they continue operating. The bill requires the Department of Health to provide funding, technical assistance and clinical oversight for the creation and operation of school-based health centers and outlines where such centers are to be established and what services they may offer.

In 2021, the legislature passed the Long-Term Care Facility Dementia Training Act to ensure that employees in long-term care facilities have training on treating patients with Alzheimer's disease and dementia. However, the Department of Health and the Aging and Long-Term Services Department ran into several roadblocks while implementing the act. **House Bill 446 (Chapter 163)** updates the Long-Term Care Facility Dementia Training Act to make the act easier to implement and administer. The bill streamlines the training requirements for long-term care facility employees and provides the Department of Health and the Aging and Long-Term Services Department increased discretion when reviewing compliance with the act.

Having an identification card is a basic and common element of participating in modern society. Because there is an administrative cost to process applications and a development cost to producing the cards, almost everyone pays a nominal fee for this vital resource. However, any fee, even a nominal one, poses a sometimes insurmountable hurdle to the homeless population. **House Bill 389 (Chapter 78)** attends to this burden by providing identification cards to homeless individuals at no cost.

INDIAN AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS

While several bills from the 2023 session became law relating to the Indian nations, tribes and pueblos of the state, one bill is discussed in detail in this section regarding a century-old annual intertribal celebration held in Gallup. The other enacted bills are referenced at the end of this section.

Continuing with the importance of maintaining cultural and linguistic teachings and keeping Native American traditions alive for future generations, **House Bill 161 (Chapter 144)** administratively attaches the current Intertribal Ceremonial Office to the Local Government Division of the Department of Finance and Administration. The push to move the office from the Tourism Department was based on the desire for local control and local participation. The bill renames the Intertribal Ceremonial Office as the Intertribal Indian Ceremonial Association and renames the accompanying fund, board and ceremonial celebration as well. Further, the bill changes the makeup of the Intertribal Indian Ceremonial Association Board to include nine members, instead of eight, appointed by McKinley County and allows board members to serve five-year terms.

INSURANCE

A number of bills pertaining to insurance were introduced and became law during the 2023 session, with a majority of these bills focused on providing better health care coverage for New Mexicans. Health insurers are now required to: increase the scope and coverage of diabetes benefits; provide more parity in prescription drug cost sharing; eliminate cost sharing for breast cancer screenings and sexually transmitted infection testing and treatment; place limits on cost sharing for chiropractic physician services; cover the costs of biomarker testing; offer coverage for a second prosthetic device; cover mental health and substance use disorder treatment at the same rate as medical and surgical treatment; and complete the health care provider credentialing process more expeditiously. In addition, legislation was enacted to study the feasibility of creating a state-administered health plan, and a crucial fix to the Medical Malpractice Act became law as well. Other insurance measures not related to health care were also enacted regarding title insurance rate hearings and public insurance adjuster surety bonds.

The World Health Organization has declared diabetes to be a worldwide epidemic, including in the United States. In New Mexico, over 217,000 adults have been diagnosed with diabetes and nearly 600,000 have pre-diabetes, and it is estimated that 53,000 have diabetes but are undiagnosed. Between 10% and 15% of adults in each health region of the state have been diagnosed with diabetes, and the disease strikes Native Americans (18.1%) and Hispanics (15%) at a frightening rate. Diabetes is the leading cause of blindness, kidney failure and lower extremity amputations. Effective self-management of diabetes is a cost-effective way to ameliorate the complications of the disease, but that requires a ready supply of medications, glucose monitors, insulin delivery devices and other related medical supplies, equipment and appliances to treat and manage diabetes and its complications. Delays in obtaining these items can be life-threatening and often require diabetics to search for and obtain necessary items at their own expense. **House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Bill 53 (Chapter 50)** requires health insurance companies to have and maintain an adequate network of providers and suppliers to ensure continuity of care; prohibits the lapsing of provider and supplier contracts; clarifies that single-case agreements do not satisfy the requirements to maintain an adequate network; and requires health insurers to monitor performance of network providers and suppliers to ensure timely delivery of covered items. The law also guarantees reimbursement for out-of-pocket expenses if covered persons have to buy their own covered items when not timely delivered by a contracted supplier and eliminates multiple prior authorizations for the same medically necessary drug, device or category of covered items. Each health insurer is required to report quarterly to the Office of Superintendent of Insurance on its previous quarter's compliance with reimbursement requirements, performance of network suppliers and disruptions of supplier contracts, and the office is required to annually audit all health insurers for compliance with the law.

Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 17 (Chapter 169) addresses a number of issues related to coverage for dental services, including placing limitations on the ability of a dental insurer to rescind its prior authorizations for services, the manner in which dental insurers reimburse providers, the process for settling erroneously paid claims and requiring opt-outs for providers regarding provider network leasing arrangements.

Insurance plans generally require cost sharing, which requires policyholders to contribute to the cost of their covered care, including copayments and deductibles. Most policies require insurers to pay the full cost of care only after a policyholder's required cost-sharing contributions meet the annual out-of-pocket maximum set by the policy. **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 51 (Chapter 206)** requires that when drug manufacturers, insurers or pharmacy benefits managers provide policyholders discounts, including coupons, rebates or other offers to lower the cost of covered pharmaceutical products, the value of those discounts is included when calculating an insured's cost-sharing obligation. This bill also prohibits pharmacy benefits managers from discriminating against

entities that participate in the federal 340B Drug Pricing Program by imposing stricter operational requirements and reimbursing these entities for pharmacy services at lower rates than those paid to non-340B participants.

The legislature also enacted a series of bills that will, as of January 1, 2024, prohibit cost sharing for several different types of health care services covered by most insurers. Under the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, passed by Congress in 2010, most private health insurers must provide coverage of women's preventive health care, including mammograms. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 27 (Chapter 12)** requires insurers to eliminate cost sharing for breast cancer screenings, including breast magnetic resonance imaging and breast ultrasound. This requirement goes a step further than the federal act and extends the elimination of cost sharing for supplemental breast examinations when no abnormality is seen or suspected. Additionally, **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 132 (Chapter 99)** requires most health insurance contracts to provide screening and preventive care for sexually transmitted infections without cost sharing. Lastly, **House Bill 75 (Chapter 51)** prohibits commercial health insurance plans that cover chiropractic services from imposing cost-sharing requirements for chiropractic physician services that exceed the cost-sharing requirements for primary care services.

House Consumer and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 73 (Chapter 138) requires insurers to cover biomarker testing, which is often used as a cancer screening tool. Under this legislation, "biomarker testing" is defined as an analysis of a patient's tissue, blood or other biospecimens for the presence of a biomarker and includes single-analytic tests, multi-plex panel tests, protein expression and whole exome, whole genome and whole transcriptome sequencing.

Currently, insurers cover the cost of prosthetic and custom orthotic devices that allow patients to participate in activities of daily living. These devices, however, are often not designed to allow such individuals to play their favorite sports, participate in recreational activities or improve their physical fitness. Beginning in 2024, **House Floor Substitute for House Bill 131 (Chapter 196)** expands insurance coverage to provide these individuals with a second prosthetic or custom orthotic device, which will allow them to incorporate these active pursuits into their lives.

The federal Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act of 2008 prohibits certain health insurers from imposing more stringent requirements on coverage for mental health and substance use disorder treatment than those applicable to medical or surgical benefits. For example, before the enactment of the federal act, insurers could charge higher deductibles and copayments, place restrictions on access to out-of-network providers and apply arbitrary limitations on the duration and nature of treatment for mental health and substance use disorders. In this regard, the federal act empowers mental health providers by requiring insurers to cover treatment based on their professional recommendations,

rather than on the cost of such treatment. Some states have enacted their own laws that mirror the federal statute and impose even stricter requirements on insurers. With the passage of **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 273 (Chapter 114)**, New Mexico has joined their ranks. In addition to requiring health insurers to comply with the federal act, the bill also includes raising reimbursement rates for mental health providers to ensure parity with medical and surgical providers and network adequacy.

When a health care provider applies to join an insurer's network, the insurer must complete the credentialing process to ensure that the provider is able to file claims and receive reimbursement for covered services. Under the current law, insurers are required to complete the credentialing process, which includes validating information regarding education and licensure submitted by the provider. If there are no issues, the insurer approves the provider's application and then loads this information into its payment system to ensure proper reimbursement. The current law requires the insurer, generally, to complete this process within 40 days of receiving a complete application; however, providers have complained about longer waiting periods. **Senate Bill 232 (Chapter 175)** now requires insurers to complete the process within 30 days.

In 2019, the Surprise Billing Protection Act was enacted to protect health care consumers from unknowingly or unavoidably being billed directly by a provider outside their insurance company's network. To ensure that health care providers are fairly reimbursed, Section 59A-57A-13 NMSA 1978 of that act provides a reimbursement formula that health insurance companies are required to use when reimbursing out-of-network providers for services covered by the act. With the understanding that the Office of Superintendent of Insurance would develop a new reimbursement formula, the Surprise Billing Protection Act included a delayed repeal of that section that would have been effective July 1, 2023. However, the Office of Superintendent of Insurance requested additional time to develop the new reimbursement formula. Thus, **House Bill 370 (Chapter 7)** delays the repeal until July 1, 2028.

To clarify how health insurance plans sponsored by employee leasing contractors are regulated in New Mexico, **House Labor, Veterans' and Military Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 255 (Chapter 68)** establishes that plans sponsored by employee leasing contractors are treated as multiple employer welfare arrangements for purposes of the New Mexico Insurance Code. The bill also acknowledges that the plans sponsored by employee leasing contractors are subject to the rules and requirements of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act.

House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bill 400 (Chapter 198) requires the Health Care Authority Department to conduct a study about the feasibility of implementing a state-administered health plan, which would provide medical assistance to individuals under the age of 65 whose household incomes exceed 300% of the federal poverty level and offer subsidies for health coverage to families with annual incomes below \$120,000. The bill requires the study to include information about

the operational and administrative costs of the proposed plan and the fiscal impact upon the state as well as how such a plan will affect the insurance market, provider reimbursement rates and obtaining a waiver to leverage federal funding.

In 2021, the legislature amended the Medical Malpractice Act for the first time since its enactment in 1976. The changes to this act were focused on ensuring the solvency of the Patient's Compensation Fund because the fund's deficit was growing by millions of dollars each year. To bolster the solvency of the fund, the 2021 amendments capped the amount that the Patient's Compensation Fund would cover for claims against hospitals and outpatient facilities at \$750,000 until January 1, 2027, and after that, the fund would not cover hospital or outpatient facilities at all. Furthermore, these amendments provided a phased increase in the caps on recovery limitations per occurrence for hospitals and outpatient facilities that would culminate in a cap of \$6 million per occurrence beginning in 2026.

Since the passage of the 2021 amendments, an issue arose relating to small, independently owned outpatient facilities. These facilities would be unable to sustain the higher caps on recovery, especially since they would no longer be covered by the Patient's Compensation Fund. To rectify the issues facing these independent outpatient health care facilities, the legislature passed **Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 523 (Chapter 207)**. The bill creates a new classification, the "independent outpatient health care facility", for the purposes of the Medical Malpractice Act, which includes only ambulatory surgical centers, urgent care facilities or free-standing emergency rooms that are not owned or controlled by a hospital. This change will allow independent outpatient health care facilities to qualify under the Medical Malpractice Act and be covered by the Patient's Compensation Fund. Additionally, claims against independent outpatient health care facilities will be capped at \$1 million, beginning in calendar year 2024, and the cap will be adjusted annually to keep pace with the Consumer Price Index. Finally, the bill increases transparency by requiring the superintendent of insurance to track and report information relating to the effects of creating the new classification.

Aside from health insurance, two other insurance bills were enacted. Biennial title insurance rate hearings for the consideration of premium rates and other related matters that are held by the superintendent of insurance have gotten increasingly expensive and difficult, especially over the past few years. **House Bill 79 (Chapter 140)** changes the frequency of these hearings to occur every three years instead of two years.

A surety bond requires a third party, usually a surety company, to cover the debt or contractual obligation of another in the event that a borrower defaults on a loan or a party to a contract fails to fulfill a contractual obligation. Statute requires public insurance adjusters to obtain a surety bond for at least \$10,000 in favor of the superintendent of insurance to cover damages owed to the state or a state resident, which stems from the adjuster's violation of the law when acting in a professional capacity. Previously, the

adjuster also had the option of posting a cash bond; however, with the passage of **House Bill 229 (Chapter 151)**, this option is eliminated.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY

On the law enforcement and public safety front, the legislature focused much of its attention this year on issues of underfunding, resulting in the enactment of two bills. Also, new laws were created to create exceptions to the requirement that law enforcement officers use body-worn cameras and clarify statutes pertaining to the training and certification of law enforcement officers and dispatchers and use of force procedures for law enforcement officers.

Recently, the Law Enforcement Protection Fund, which distributes money to local law enforcement agencies, the New Mexico State Police and the New Mexico Law Enforcement Academy, has experienced a decrease in revenue. To reverse this trend, **Senate Bill 491 (Chapter 182)** adds a health insurance premium tax distribution, equal to 10% of net receipts from health insurance businesses, and a portion of fees from health insurance businesses to be credited to the fund.

House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 357 (Chapter 188) addresses the understaffing, largely due to underfunding, of law enforcement officers, detention officers and public attorneys who practice in the criminal justice system. For each of these groups, the bill creates a separate fund from which a committee of representative stakeholders awards money to qualifying agencies for recruitment and retention efforts.

This session, the legislature also revisited a law it passed three years ago that requires law enforcement officers to wear body-worn cameras. Since the law's passage, several practical, operational problems arose with it. Recognizing this, the legislature passed **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 368 (Chapter 47)**, which carves out two exceptions to the body-worn camera requirement in order to allay these problems. Now, an officer is no longer required to wear a body-worn camera when the officer is conducting either an undercover operation or an explosive recovery and disposal operation.

In 2022, the legislature made several changes to the procedures governing training and certification of law enforcement officers and public safety dispatchers. This year, with **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bills 19 & 252 (Chapter 86)**, the legislature expanded upon those changes, largely with the aim of clarifying last year's changes. In particular, the bill changes and increases the membership of the New Mexico Law Enforcement Standards and Training Council and the Law Enforcement Certification Board; requires the implementation of a public, searchable database for officer misconduct investigations; and provides temporary provisions that will bridge the existing system of

training and certification to the new system. Additionally, the bill creates the Use of Force Procedures Act, which requires law enforcement agencies to develop and maintain use-of-force policies, proscribes certain uses of force by law enforcement officers and establishes a duty for officers to intervene in unlawful uses of force.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND SPECIAL DISTRICTS

With regard to local government and special districts, the legislature enacted laws providing authority for local regulation of refrigerants to conform with federal regulations, increasing the salary limitations for qualified county assessors, creating more local flexibility in the use of gross receipts tax increments, creating improvement special assessment districts, changing municipal penalties and procedures for nuisance violations, updating provisions on the disposition of dead bodies and restructuring the statute governing community land grants as well as designating five additional community land grants as land grants-mercedes within Section 49-1-2 NMSA 1978.

To continue the transition away from ozone-depleting refrigerants, **House Bill 379 (Chapter 189)** requires local governments to allow for the use of refrigerants that the United States Environmental Protection Agency has designated as an acceptable substitute or alternative to class one and class two refrigerants.

The salaries of elected county assessors are limited by Sections 4-44-4 through 4-44-5 NMSA 1978; however, additional compensation is allowed pursuant to Section 4-39-4 NMSA 1978 if an assessor obtains an appraiser's certificate. The amounts of additional compensation are increased with the passage of **Senate Bill 324 (Chapter 119)**. The bill also increases the amounts of additional compensation that may be paid to county appraisers and other employees in the office of a county assessor, but the salaries of these employees are not limited by statute.

Multiple provisions of the Metropolitan Development Code are amended by **Senate Bill 251 (Chapter 112)** to expand the financing options for metropolitan development projects. In addition to the current property tax increments that can be used to directly fund projects, a municipality, a county or the state may dedicate up to 75% of the increase in gross receipts tax revenue attributable to businesses in a metropolitan redevelopment area to fund projects directly or to bond for construction or reconstruction of buildings within the metropolitan redevelopment area. Approval of a municipality's or a county's tax increment dedication is approved by each entity's governing body, and dedication of a state gross receipts tax increment must be approved by the State Board of Finance. Bonds secured by the state gross receipts

tax increment must be specifically authorized by law. The law also removes a requirement for a sealed bidding procedure and approval of an award of contract by a local government for certain rehabilitation contracts between private property owners and contractors, and it allows a municipality or county to delegate to a metropolitan redevelopment agency the power to approve loans, grants and leases of more than one year's duration.

House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 228 (Chapter 150) repeals the Solar Energy Improvement Special Assessment Act and enacts in its place the Improvement Special Assessment Act, a new financing mechanism to encourage projects on privately owned commercial, industrial, agricultural or multifamily residential property with five or more dwelling units for energy efficiency, renewable energy, water conservation or resiliency improvements. To establish an improvement special assessment program, a board of county commissioners enacts an ordinance establishing a comprehensive program in which improvement loans would be repaid through special assessment liens on eligible property benefiting from the financed improvements. Although an improvement special assessment program is created by a county and administered through the county, the Economic Development Department or a third party, funding for projects is provided by private capital investors.

The authority of a municipality to regulate nuisances is limited by state statute, and **House Bill 462 (Chapter 192)** amends penalties and procedures for failure to obey a traffic sign or signal, including a red light offense or violation, or for a speeding offense or violation. The bill prohibits a municipality from assessing and collecting fees and costs for such violations. Municipalities may retain from assessed penalties and fines an amount equal to the cost of administering nuisance violations. One-half of the remaining amount now goes to the General Fund, and one-half is retained by the municipality for traffic safety programs and administrative costs. The burden of proof for alleged violations is on the municipality and is a preponderance of the evidence. In municipalities with a population of 200,000 or more, an alleged violator has the option of contesting the violation through a mail-in process; this option is discretionary for smaller municipalities.

To alleviate the growing logistical problems faced by New Mexico counties that must store and process unclaimed bodies, **House Bill 407 (Chapter 162)** allows counties to authorize the disposition of an unclaimed body after a reasonable opportunity to claim the body has been given to the next of kin. Additionally, the law: reduces the amount of years that a county must store the cremated remains of eligible veterans who qualify for veteran burial benefits from two years to one year; sets a rate of \$1,000 for a county to pay for the cost of burial or cremation of an unclaimed body; and increases the cost paid by counties for opening and closing a grave after an investigation from \$600 to \$1,000.

In 2004, community land grants meeting the requirements of Section 49-1-2 NMSA 1978 were designated as land grants-mercedes and political subdivisions of the state. However, that statute did not

list which community land grants were land grants-mercedes. The lack of a statutory list produced two unintended consequences. First, the statute governing community land grants only listed a few land grant communities that had valid historical status despite the lack of congressional confirmation, but the statute did not list the land grant communities with congressional confirmation. Second, some community land grants that had received congressional confirmation were not single land grant communities. For example, the Arroyo Hondo Land Grant on the northern border of the town of Taos had been divided into two separately governed land grant communities, Arroyo Hondo and Arroyo Hondo Arriba, and the board of trustees for the Las Vegas community land grant had divided that land grant into four separate partitions. All of these land grant divisions had been judicially recognized by district courts in New Mexico, but they were not reflected in either federal documents or state statute.

For undivided community land grants, **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 268 (Chapter 21)** removes the apparent inconsistency in the statute by amending some of the qualifications for eligibility for land grant-merced status and by specifically listing the qualified land grants-mercedes. Other than community land grants that were directly confirmed by Congress, the qualifications are designation by one of two federal entities tasked by Congress to determine land grant status and specific designation of the land grant as a land grant-merced by the legislature in statute. The bill also provides for community land grant divisions to qualify for legislative designation as land grants-mercedes; provided that their lands are within the geographic boundaries of a land grant confirmed by Congress or designated by one of the two land grant evaluation programs established by Congress. Lastly, the bill specifically lists the community land grants that are political subdivisions of the state as land grants-mercedes, including the community land grants that had been recognized by state agencies prior to 2023, as well as clarifying the political subdivision status of the Cristobal de la Serna Land Grant-Merced and incorporating the Arroyo Hondo Arriba division of the Arroyo Hondo Land Grant and the Lower Gallinas, Los Vigiles and San Augustin divisions of the Las Vegas grant as separate land grants-mercedes within Section 49-1-2 NMSA 1978.

MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRANSPORTATION

A variety of legislation concerning motor vehicles and transportation was enacted during the 2023 legislative session, including new laws to: realign the regulation of portions of the transportation sector; provide for the regulation of new providers for non-emergency medical transportation services; allow for the modification of weight and size limits for freight trucks during emergencies; specify how truck tractors are to be operated on roadways; clarify provisions for private vehicle sales; put the brakes on the spate of catalytic converter thefts; increase motorcycle registration fees; and create five new special registration

plates. Three bills address provisions related to driver's licenses, and a new Nontraditional Communication or Disability Registry is established. Also passed were bills that codify the classes and operation of electric-assisted bicycles and increase the allowable size of passenger aircraft eligible for the Rural Air Service Enhancement Grant Program.

While the Public Regulation Commission has long been charged with regulating parts of the transportation sector, that role may have been inconsistent with the commission's greater focus on regulating the energy and utility service sectors. **Senate Bill 160 (Chapter 100)** realigns the state's regulation of transportation by transferring responsibility for motor carrier regulation and enforcement, railroad safety enforcement, ambulance standards and other administrative and regulatory functions from the Public Regulation Commission to the DOT.

Point-to-point passenger services are provided by limousine, shuttle and taxi service providers that are regulated under the Motor Carrier Act and by transportation network service companies, such as Uber and Lyft, that are regulated under the Transportation Network Service Company Act. **Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 485 (Chapter 181)** provides that transportation network service company drivers may offer non-emergency medical transportation services to individuals, including Medicaid recipients, and clarifies that those drivers are not subject to additional regulation for those services under the Motor Carrier Act.

Emergency conditions may cause disruptions in normal freight shipping delivery schedules and affect the availability of consumer products. To mitigate those disruptions, **House Bill 270 (Chapter 71)** authorizes the secretary of transportation to modify the state's weight and size requirements for freight trucks during a declared state or national emergency.

Senate Bill 102 (Chapter 96) adds new requirements for how truck tractors, defined as motor vehicles designed and used primarily for drawing other vehicles and constructed to carry a part of the weight of the vehicle and load drawn, are to be operated on roadways that contain more than one lane of traffic. The provisions include: that a truck tractor being driven on a roadway with multiple lanes must be driven within a single lane and not within the left or a center lane except in certain circumstances; when a truck tractor may move into another lane; and when a truck tractor may use the left lane to overtake another vehicle. The bill imposes a \$250 fine and misdemeanor penalty for the improper use of a travel lane.

In an effort to ensure that vehicles sold by a private person are actually owned by that person, **House Floor Substitute for House Bill 62 (Chapter 137)** requires the seller to legally possess the title for the vehicle, as opposed to the vehicle needing to be duly registered. Additionally, the bill limits a licensed dealer's ability to offer motor vehicles for sale at a location other than the licensed dealer's established place of business.

To help combat the increasing prevalence of catalytic converter thefts, **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 133 (Chapter 193)** requires that secondhand metal dealers purchasing or otherwise receiving a catalytic converter make a record of the transaction, including the seller's or offeror's personal identification document and basic information, the license plate and vehicle identification number of the vehicle used to transport the catalytic converter, the legal document or affidavit demonstrating ownership and a photograph of the catalytic converter. In addition, the bill amends existing law to allow a local governmental entity to impose reporting requirements on the purchase or acquisition of catalytic converters as long as the requirements are no more stringent than those imposed on regulated material pursuant to the Sale of Recycled Metals Act.

Registration fees are increased for two- and three-wheeled motorcycles from \$15.00 to \$20.00 in **Senate Bill 396 (Chapter 126)**, which also increases a distribution from the Motor Vehicle Suspense Fund to the Motorcycle Training Fund from \$2.00 to \$7.00 per registration.

A number of bills were introduced regarding special registration plates, culminating in the creation of five new plates. **House Bill 240 (Chapter 152)** creates a special registration license plate to express support for acequia and community ditch associations; a Concerns of Police Survivors, C.O.P.S., special registration plate is established in **House Transportation, Public Works and Capital Improvements Committee Substitute for House Bill 141 (Chapter 57)**; and a support for the national FFA (Future Farmers of America) organization special registration plate is created by **House Bill 360 (Chapter 76)**. In addition, **House Transportation, Public Works and Capital Improvements Committee Substitute for House Bill 287 (Chapter 73)** creates a look twice for motorcycles plate as well as a New Mexico miners plate. Lastly, 50% disabled veterans may now have more than two disabled veteran special registration plates with the enactment of **House Bill 366 (Chapter 158)**, as long as the plate and registration fees for this additional plate are paid.

Shifting gears to driver's licenses, **Senate Bill 47 (Chapter 8)** affects the penalties and reinstatement of suspended driver's licenses. With the enactment of this bill, a person whose license was suspended for nonpayment or failure to appear but is otherwise eligible to drive will automatically have the license reinstated without a reinstatement fee. Furthermore, the bill prevents the Motor Vehicle Division of the Taxation and Revenue Department from suspending driver's licenses for failing to appear in court as a consequence of a charge or conviction under the Motor Vehicle Code or for failing to pay a penalty assessment within 30 days of the date of issuance.

The Motor Vehicle Code provides for restricted driver's licenses for some individuals who are visually impaired and fail the usual eyesight test. **House Bill 267 (Chapter 69)** eliminates the role of the Health Standards Advisory Board in evaluating a visually impaired person's ability to drive. Instead, the Motor Vehicle Division is empowered to seek the advice of experts to advise the division on physical and mental criteria and vision standards relating to the licensing of drivers. If the division has cause to believe

that a driver may not be qualified to be licensed, it may request a written report from a health care provider of the driver's choice, after the driver has again undergone an on-the-road exam and any physical, visual or mental tests required by the division.

In order to maintain full eligibility for federal highway funding, **House Bill 269 (Chapter 70)** requires the Motor Vehicle Division to request records from the federal commercial driver's license drug and alcohol clearinghouse of an applicant for a commercial driver's license. If such records indicate that the applicant is prohibited from operating a commercial motor vehicle, the division must refuse to issue or renew the applicant's commercial driver's license or learner's permit, and it must downgrade an existing commercial driver's license or commercial driver's permit to a class D noncommercial license.

The nation has witnessed numerous avoidable conflicts resulting from communication challenges between peace officers and motor vehicle occupants with disabilities or medical conditions. **House Bill 40 (Chapter 136)** provides notice to peace officers that a driver or occupant of a motor vehicle has a condition or disability that may cause difficulties with communicating. The bill creates the statewide Nontraditional Communication or Disability Registry, which a motor vehicle owner may voluntarily join while registering a vehicle. A data field is then added in the electronic motor vehicle record management system indicating that the owner's motor vehicle is in the registry with a link for additional information. Prior to interacting with a motor vehicle's driver or occupant, a peace officer, if practicable, must check if the vehicle is on the Nontraditional Communication or Disability Registry and, if so, take appropriate safety precautions during the interaction.

The use of electric-assisted bicycles (eBikes) has become an increasingly popular mode of environmentally friendly transportation. **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 69 (Chapter 93)** defines three classes of eBikes that depend upon the power of the electric motor, whether the motor provides assistance while the operator is pedaling and the speed of the eBike when the motor is providing assistance. Also, eBikes are excluded from the definitions of "motorcycle" and "motor vehicle" in the Motor Vehicle Code and do not have to be registered with the state. Restrictions are imposed on how a person may modify and operate an eBike and how an eBike is equipped. Manufacturers and distributors of new eBikes intended for sale or distribution in New Mexico must now permanently affix to each eBike a label that contains the classification number, top assisted speed and motor wattage. Additionally, the bill regulates how and where the various classes of eBikes may be operated, and the Child Helmet Safety Act is amended to specifically include eBikes within its scope of regulations.

The Rural Air Service Enhancement Grant Program was created in 2021 to assist in the development of passenger air service to underserved communities. **Senate Bill 433 (Chapter 130)** raises the size of the aircraft eligible for the program from a 30-passenger size limit to a 100-passenger size limit.

PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL LICENSURE AND REGULATION

The bills passed by the legislature during the 2023 regular session that relate to professional and occupational licensure and regulation update the requirements for a wide variety of professions and occupations, including interior designers, private investigators, licensed physicians, veterinarians, social workers, podiatric physicians, anesthesiologist assistants, elevator mechanics, elevator inspectors, home inspectors, engineers and surveyors. Additionally, portions of the Uniform Licensing Act are modified to clarify the procedures and requirements related to professional discipline and applications for licensure.

Initially, House Bill 384 was a bill intended to allow expedited licensure for veterinarians and social workers, but it ended up as **House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 384 (Chapter 190)**. The reason it was substituted twice in the same committee is that it was re-referred to the committee after the original committee report was adopted on the floor. The bill, as passed, makes several changes to the Uniform Licensing Act, including clarifying provisions related to incomplete applications, hearings and expedited licensure; allowing for summary suspension of a license in certain cases and requiring a preliminary injunction in others; and providing that summary suspension is a final agency action that may be appealed to the district court. In addition, the law changes the administration and regulation of the Interior Designers Act from the Interior Design Board (which no longer exists) to the Regulation and Licensing Department; amends the Private Investigations Act to require registration of instructors and private patrol employees; requires coursework for private investigators to provide traffic crash reconstruction services; and provides for expedited licensure of licensed physicians and veterinarians and all license levels of social workers.

House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 83 (Chapter 141) amends and repeals various statutes that provide licensure requirements for podiatrists, now referred to in statute as podiatric physicians. Prior to the passage of this bill, the licensure of podiatrists was overseen by the Board of Podiatry. Now, that licensure occurs through the New Mexico Medical Board by placing podiatric physicians under the purview of the Medical Practice Act. The Podiatry Advisory Committee is created to advise the New Mexico Medical Board on the examination and licensure of podiatric physicians and on strategies for recruiting and maintaining active podiatric physicians who practice in this state. Additionally, this legislation provides circumstances for receiving reciprocity for podiatric physicians licensed in other jurisdictions.

To address the shortage of anesthesiologist assistants in New Mexico, **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 35 (Chapter 91)** amends the practice requirements and employment conditions for anesthesiologist assistants. The bill removes the requirement that

anesthesiologist assistants be employed by a New Mexico university. Furthermore, the number of anesthesiologist assistants that can be simultaneously supervised by one licensed anesthesiologist is increased from three to four, and a licensed anesthesiologist must be physically present at all times during the supervision of anesthesiologist assistants.

House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 115 (Chapter 54) amends the examination requirements for home inspectors by requiring the New Mexico Home Inspectors Board to adopt an approved examination for home inspectors that is conducted by a third party accredited as complying with the prevailing standards of the Standards for Educational and Psychological Testing. Moreover, the New Mexico Home Inspectors Board is tasked with ensuring that testing accommodations are made available for applicants with disabilities.

Historically, the regulation and inspection of elevators in the state have largely been left to local governments to enact their own policies and programs. **House Labor, Veterans' and Military Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 299 (Chapter 197)** provides statewide standards by establishing an elevator inspection and registration program administered and enforced by the Construction Industries Division of the Regulation and Licensing Department. The bill requires a license and certification for erecting, constructing, installing, altering, servicing, testing, performing electrical work on, repairing, maintaining, removing or dismantling an elevator or other similar conveyance.

Finally, **House Bill 411 (Chapter 79)** makes changes to the New Mexico Engineering and Surveying Practices Act to mirror uniform laws for engineers and surveyors set forth by the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying and streamlines the licensure process for engineers and surveyors wishing to relocate to New Mexico from other states. Also, the bill revises certification requirements for engineer interns, and it increases the annual funding amount from the Engineering and Surveying University Support Program from \$100,000 to \$250,000.

PROPERTY

The legislature passed four bills relating to property owners and the sale of property. The central theme of these bills pertains to instruments used to convey property and streamlining that process. Two pieces of legislation address issues relating to providing notice of encumbrance on property to purchasers, owners and government entities. The medium used to provide notice and transfer the property in the event of a sale is the focus of other legislation. As technology continues to advance, such legislation allows for electronic means to facilitate notice and to transfer property.

One concern in the doctrine of property law is ensuring that owners and potential purchasers are made aware of latent defects, liens and mortgages and other encumbrances on a property and that those encumbrances are recorded in the chain of title. In the past, mechanics' or materialmen's liens for work

performed or materials furnished were required to be filed with the county clerk, but no actual notice was required to be provided to the property owner. **House Bill 179 (Chapter 61)** fixes this issue by requiring the person who filed the mechanics' or materialmen's lien to email, mail or hand deliver notice of the lien to the property owner within 15 days of filing the lien with the county clerk.

Additionally, the Right to Repair Act, enacted in **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 50 (Chapter 200)**, sets forth the processes a purchaser and a seller are required to follow in the event of alleged construction defects in newly constructed single family dwelling units. Before a purchaser can file a lawsuit against a construction professional for alleged construction defects, the purchaser must first give notice of the alleged defect to the construction professional. The construction professional then must be allowed to inspect the dwelling and, within 60 days, make an offer to repair the alleged defect, offer the purchaser compensation or invoke any remedy provided for in the construction contract. If the purchaser reasonably rejects, in writing or by electronic means, the construction professional's offer, the purchaser may then file a lawsuit regarding the alleged construction defect.

Provisions that authorize corrections of drafting or clerical errors or omissions in recorded instruments of real property, also known as "scrivener's errors", are amended in **House Bill 250 (Chapter 153)**. The law clarifies that a scrivener's-error affidavit can only be used to correct minor drafting errors or omissions, adds a party's marital status and missing exhibits or addendums to the list of what can be corrected by a scrivener's-error affidavit and clarifies who can execute the affidavits.

While the demand and need for remote communications arose during the COVID-19 pandemic, these virtual means continue post-pandemic to facilitate timely property transfers. **Senate Bill 68 (Chapter 10)** removes notarization requirements for documents used in the conveyance of vehicles to insurance companies when a vehicle is declared to be a total loss, and any document related to such a conveyance may now be signed electronically.

PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

The bills enacted relating to public officers and employees during the 2023 legislative session include: changes that allow members of all of the state's public pension plans to designate a supplemental needs trust as a beneficiary; amendments to the Public Employees Retirement Act to increase the public employee pension maximum for certain members and grant additional service credit to non-retired state police members; and changes to the Educational Retirement Act to add certain members to the alternative retirement plan and change minimum pension distribution requirements. Additionally, laws were passed that increase the survivor benefits for firefighters killed in the line of duty, create a death benefit fund for

members of the New Mexico National Guard, provide for active duty New Mexico National Guard members to be employed by the state and increase the salaries of certain elected officers.

To ensure that a public pension plan member's intended beneficiary with a disability or special medical needs is not disqualified from needs-based assistance, such as Medicaid, **House Bill 304 (Chapter 156)** allows members to designate a supplemental needs trust as a beneficiary in lieu of an individual person. The bill, which applies to members covered by the Public Employees Retirement Act, Judicial Retirement Act, Magistrate Retirement Act and Educational Retirement Act, permits a beneficiary of the supplemental needs trust to receive benefits of the trust without putting public assistance benefits in jeopardy as the trust does not distribute income.

Two bills affect certain members of the Public Employees Retirement Association. The first bill, **House Bill 106 (Chapter 53)**, increases the maximum amount of pension that certain members are permitted to earn pursuant to the Public Employees Retirement Act from 90% of the member's final average salary to 100% of the member's final average salary. The following members are included in this increase: general members under coverage plan three; state police members under coverage plan one; correctional officers under coverage plan one; probation and parole officer members under coverage plan one; juvenile correctional officer members under coverage plan two; municipal general members under coverage plans two, three and four; municipal police members under coverage plans two, three, four and five; municipal fire members under coverage plans one, two, three, four and five; and municipal detention officer members under coverage plan one. The other bill, **Senate Bill 145 (Chapter 35)**, grants additional service credit to non-retired state police members of the Public Employees Retirement Association hired before June 30, 2013, who were excluded from a 2020 amendment that provided a 20% service credit enhancement to other state police and correctional officer members.

Also related to pensions, **Senate Bill 20 (Chapter 87)** amends the Educational Retirement Act to allow employees of Southeast New Mexico College to participate in alternative retirement plans offered by the Educational Retirement Board. The bill further amends the Educational Retirement Act to align the age at which an Educational Retirement Board member is required to take a minimum distribution with the age specified in federal law.

Firefighters face many risks in performing their job duties, and **Senate Bill 250 (Chapter 111)** recognizes these risks by increasing the death benefits for the surviving spouse or children of firefighters killed in the line of duty from \$250,000 to \$1 million. This increase is applied retroactively to include a death occurring on or after February 25, 2022.

Two bills concerning the New Mexico National Guard became law in 2023. **House Bill 116 (Chapter 55)** authorizes the adjutant general of the Department of Military Affairs to employ on state active duty, on a full-time or seasonal basis, members of the New Mexico National Guard to prepare, mitigate or respond to any type of disaster, as permitted within the department's appropriated budget. In

addition, the National Guard Death Benefit Fund is created in the National Guard Death Benefit Act enacted by **Senate Bill 210 (Chapter 41)**. Designated beneficiaries of members of the New Mexico National Guard or the State Defense Force Division of the Department of Military Affairs who are killed while on state active duty shall be paid \$500,000 in supplemental death benefits from the National Guard Death Benefit Fund.

Salaries of certain elected state officers were last increased in 2002. **Senate Bill 442 (Chapter 131)** raises the annual compensation of the governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands. While the governor's pay raise will not go into effect until January 1, 2027, the other elected officers receive salary boosts effective June 16, 2023.

STATE GOVERNMENT

A varied assortment of bills pertaining to state government are often characteristic of any legislative session. Because state government addresses a plethora of problems and needs, the bills passed by the legislature and signed by the governor in this category are necessarily wide ranging. Major agency overhauls, changes to legislative practices and fine-tuning of record-keeping requirements and procurement exemptions are among the initiatives in this category passing legislative scrutiny in 2023. The legislature also passed bills to continue to keep certain state government transactions or functions moving forward, evident in its approval of certain state property dispositions and its enactment of delayed or eliminated termination dates for certain licensing boards.

Entities and Operations

The legislature passed a number of bills making changes to procedures, operations or structures of certain state entities or boards. One such bill is **House Bill 466 (Chapter 164)**, which relates to the operation of the State Ethics Commission and makes changes to the procedure for determining probable cause on a complaint filed with that commission. Previously, the general counsel would determine probable cause, but the legislation now requires that an independent hearing officer make the determination.

Senate Bill 302 (Chapter 116) clarifies the jurisdiction of the Judicial Standards Commission over certain officials. In 2019, the commission's scope of oversight was statutorily expanded to include matters pertaining to court-appointed commissioners, hearing officers, administrative law judges or special masters while acting in a judicial capacity. However, a 2020 attorney general's opinion advised that the Judicial

Standards Commission's oversight authority is narrower under Article 6, Section 32 of the Constitution of New Mexico and does not extend to those officials. The new legislation thus clarifies that the commission's oversight extends only to matters involving justices, judges and magistrates and eliminates statutory references pertaining to the commission's authority over any other officials.

Additional bills passed during the 2023 legislative session include bills making changes to state agency structures. **Senate Bill 16 (Chapter 205)** overhauls the Human Services Department and creates the Health Care Authority Department in its place to administer laws and exercise functions relating to health care purchasing and regulation. In addition to the functions of the Human Services Department, the Health Care Authority Department will take over the public employees' health benefits functions of the Risk Management Division of the General Services Department and the developmental disabilities program and the health certification, licensing and oversight program of the Department of Health. Administratively attached agencies to the new department include the Group Benefits Committee and the New Mexico Health Policy Commission. The child support enforcement and income support divisions of the Human Services Department will remain in the newly created department for the time being.

In the event that uncertainties arise with respect to the assignment of various department duties during the transition to the new department, the law gives the governor the authority to issue an executive order to further delineate the organizational structure, powers and duties of the new department and move divisions and programs from or to other departments to accomplish the organizational goals of the act. Any reorganizational changes and statutory recommendations must be reported to the appropriate legislative interim committees by November 1, 2023, and a final reorganization report is due to the legislature by January 1, 2024. The Department of Finance and Administration, the Health Care Authority Department, the General Services Department, governor's staff and other persons assigned by the governor are required to develop a transition plan for the reorganization.

House Bill 424 (Chapter 80) also pertains to the organizational structure of a major executive department. Specifically, the legislation codifies prior changes made to the organization of the Workforce Solutions Department. The names of departments and titles of department heads for participants on the Apprenticeship Council are also updated. Furthermore, the bill gives the secretary of workforce solutions statutory authority to appoint members of the Apprenticeship Council and includes the secretary of public education or the secretary's designee as an ex-officio nonvoting member of the council.

House Bill 201 (Chapter 15) allows for continued operation of a number of licensure boards by delaying their termination dates from July 1, 2023 to July 1, 2029. Termination dates are so extended for the following licensure boards: veterinary medicine, architects, professional engineers and professional surveyors, private investigators, public accountancy, real estate appraisers and funeral services. Additionally, the bill removes the termination dates for certain health-related licensure boards, including the boards for dental health care, optometry, podiatry, pharmacy and acupuncture and oriental medicine.

Those boards will continue to operate without the periodic review previously required pursuant to the Sunset Act.

Some of the enacted bills pertaining to state entities and operations will affect certain transactional procedures for certain state entities and officials. For instance, **Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 246 (Chapter 110)** makes various changes to the Revised Uniform Law on Notarial Acts. The legislation adds new terms to identify those with the authority to perform notarial acts, including "automatic notarial officers" and "judicial officers". The legislation also amends the definitions of "notary public" and "notarial officer", with the latter defined to include any person with authority to perform notarial acts pursuant to the Revised Uniform Law on Notarial Acts. Changes to technical requirements for notarial acts are included, in addition to changes pertaining to the official stamp of a notarial officer and educational requirements for notarial officers. The legislation also provides the State Ethics Commission with the authority to adopt rules pertaining to the oversight of notarial officers and adds grounds for which adverse action against a notarial officer, such as suspension or revocation, may be taken.

The Inspection of Public Records Act allows members of the public to inspect public records. **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 232 (Chapter 67)** exempts from that act two types of information held by the Tourism Department: technical or business information that is related to specific state marketing or advertising campaigns; and a consumer's individually identifiable information provided during an online tourism-related transaction. In addition, the Inspection of Public Records Act is amended to create new disclosure exceptions for information that would reveal vulnerabilities in the state's information technology systems and in regard to submissions in response to competitive grants, land leases or scholarships until the finalists or awards are announced. The bill also exempts portions of law enforcement records from the act by requiring that nonpublic information and certain visual depictions contained in law enforcement written, visual and audio records be redacted or digitally obscured, and it requires additional specificity for requests of visual or audio records, including descriptors such as the date, approximate time or name of the officer involved.

House Bill 180 (Chapter 62) pertains to the storage of state records. In an effort to ensure that state records can be stored in the way most state records are currently created, the legislation allows officers of the state to keep records, papers or documents maintained as electronic records as opposed to only by photograph, microfilm or microphotograph or reproduced on film. Additionally, the bill allows records stored electronically to be considered original documents.

Another bill was passed that affects state agency procedures for publishing legal notices. Section 14-11-13 NMSA 1978 currently establishes a list of official Spanish language newspapers for the purpose of publishing legal notices as required by law for state agencies. **House Bill 182 (Chapter 187)** expands this list to include the *Camino Real*, which is published in Santa Fe.

While several bills affect transactional or operational matters, **House Bill 207 (Chapter 29)** makes a substantive change to enhance scrutiny of government agencies under the Human Rights Act. The bill adds government agencies to the list of entities that are prohibited from discriminating against a person on the basis of a protected classification. Amid a growing nationwide discussion of equal rights in the context of gender identity, the bill also expands the scope of the Human Rights Act to include gender identity among the list of protected classifications.

Legislature

The beginning of the 2023 legislative session was marked by efforts to reform the legislative process, including constitutional amendment initiatives to provide for legislative salaries and to increase the duration of legislative sessions. While those efforts did not pass the legislature in 2023, some legislative process reforms were enacted, including measures to increase legislative transparency, more clearly define activities allowed for legislators in their roles as public servants, change confidentiality provisions for an individual filing a complaint with the Interim Legislative Ethics Committee and expand eligibility for legislative interim committee membership.

An initiative to increase transparency in the process of appropriations made in a supplemental general appropriation act, more commonly known as "House Bill 2 Junior", garnered unanimous support from members of the legislature. **Senate Bill 153 (Chapter 209)** creates an exception to confidentiality provisions in Section 2-3-13 NMSA 1978 by requiring the LCS to publish on the legislature's website a searchable list of appropriations in any supplemental general appropriation act that passes the legislature. The list to be published includes the name of each legislator allocating a portion of each appropriation and the amount of that legislator's verified allocation. The list is required to be published 30 days after the adjournment of the legislative session in which the supplemental general appropriation act is approved by both chambers of the legislature.

Through the passage of **House Concurrent Resolution 1**, another step was taken to increase the information available to the public during the legislative process. The resolution requires that amendments and substitute legislation made available to standing committees must be made publicly available on the legislature's website as soon as practicable. The resolution further requires maintenance of the amendments and substitute legislation on the legislature's website, whether adopted by a committee or not. Moreover, the resolution requires that executive agency analyses submitted to the Legislative Finance Committee for development of fiscal impact reports be posted on the legislature's website. Those analyses must be posted as soon as practicable after the fiscal impact reports are posted.

Prior to the 2023 legislative session, there had been substantial confusion and debate about the scope of limitations on a legislator's ability to appear for, represent or assist another person in a matter before a state agency. This prompted conflicting interpretations and caused uncertainty for legislators.

Senate Bill 364 (Chapter 3) draws a clearer line. The law specifies that a legislator may appear for, represent or assist another person in a matter before a state agency if the legislator is not receiving compensation or when the legislator is an attorney or other professional who is making the appearance or providing the representation or assistance while engaged in the conduct of the legislator's profession. However, such a legislator engaged in the conduct of the legislator's profession must not use legislative stationery, email or any other indicia of the legislator's legislative capacity or make reference to the legislator's legislative capacity except as to matters of scheduling.

During the interim, the Interim Legislative Ethics Committee is charged with investigating complaints filed by other legislators or members of the public alleging misconduct of a legislator. When initially enacted, the provisions governing the workings of the committee prohibited the complainant, the committee and its staff from publicly disclosing information relating to the filing or the investigation of a complaint until after a finding of probable cause has been made that a violation has occurred. With the enactment of **House Bill 169 (Chapter 59)**, the complainant is removed from these confidentiality provisions; only the committee and its staff are barred from public disclosure until after a finding of probable cause.

When the legislature is not in session, a number of legislative interim committees are established by the New Mexico Legislative Council to discuss and study topics that are of interest to the legislature and the people of the state. **Senate Bill 351 (Chapter 176)** expands membership eligibility for those interim committees by allowing the New Mexico Legislative Council members to serve as voting members on interim committees appointed or created by the council.

Property

The legislature passed three joint resolutions in 2023 authorizing the disposition of state property. The General Services Department is authorized by **Senate Joint Resolution 13** to sell to Bernalillo County, for \$479,515, approximately four and four-tenths acres of real property located at 4003 Edith Boulevard NE in Albuquerque, valued at \$1,360,000, for use as a public recreational facility. Should the county ever decide the property is no longer needed for any county purpose, at the option of the state and at no cost to the state, the real property must be reconveyed by Bernalillo County to the state.

A land swap of four parcels of land between the state and the City of Albuquerque was approved and ratified through **Senate Joint Resolution 14**. The state is authorized to transfer real property at 401 Commercial Street NE in Albuquerque containing approximately three-fourths of an acre, and at 3401 Pan American Freeway NE in Albuquerque containing approximately 12 acres, with a combined value of approximately \$4.6 million, to the City of Albuquerque to be used for an expanded rail trail and solid waste operations. In return, the City of Albuquerque agrees to transfer to the state two tracts of real property at 1250 Menaul Boulevard NE in Albuquerque containing approximately three and three

hundred eighty-nine thousandths acres and 12 acres, with a combined value of approximately \$4.3 million, to be used for a new public safety headquarters.

There has long been a desire to open a magistrate court facility in Santa Fe. **Senate Joint Resolution 12** transfers property in Santa Fe County from the General Services Department to the Administrative Office of the Courts for use as a future building site for a magistrate court facility. If the Administrative Office of the Courts decides against using this property for a magistrate court facility, the property must be reconveyed to the General Services Department.

In addition to certain property dispositions, the legislature approved a state agency's acquisition of property. **Senate Bill 144 (Chapter 34)** authorizes the Facilities Management Division of the General Services Department to purchase a building on Camino de los Marquez in Santa Fe and to renovate, equip and furnish the building for eventual use by the Public Regulation Commission. While the Educational Retirement Board currently owns and occupies the building, it is in the process of constructing a new facility. Funds for the purchase of the Camino de los Marquez property are subject to legislative appropriation, and the lease of the property is subject to approval by the legislature pursuant to a joint resolution.

Procurement

The Procurement Code serves to maximize the purchasing value of public funds by establishing safeguards that ensure a competitive process for public purchases and providing for the fair treatment of all persons involved in public procurement. Exemptions from the Procurement Code are instituted when the application of the Procurement Code is not practical or advantageous for certain public purchases. This year, three bills were chaptered that provide limited exemptions from the Procurement Code.

House Bill 226 (Chapter 149) exempts certain purchases of educational instructional materials and other educational media from the requirements of the Procurement Code and removes the requirement of making purchases of educational instructional materials through the state purchasing agent. **Senate Bill 200 (Chapter 40)** allows multi-term contracts to exceed four years for services related to the design and engineering of a regional water project with an estimated cost of more than \$500 million. **Senate Bill 206 (Chapter 174)** provides an exemption from the Procurement Code for contracts entered into by the Forestry Division of the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department with nongovernmental entities and individuals selected by the federal government to administer forestry programs, including forest fire prevention, watershed and forest restoration and hazardous fuel reduction.

Symbols

While the yucca flower, roadrunner, pinon tree and bizcochito are regarded as a few of the symbols representing the special attributes of the Land of Enchantment, a new symbol has been added to

the list. After a group of fifth grade students from Las Cruces suggested a formal recognition of the cultural and economic importance of the aroma of roasted green chile in New Mexico, the legislature supported the initiative by passing **Senate Bill 188 (Chapter 31)**. The bill makes an addition to the list of established state symbols and adopts the aroma of green chile roasting as the official aroma of New Mexico. New Mexico is the first state in country to have an official state aroma.

TAXATION

Many tax-related bills passed the legislature this session, but most in the form of an omnibus tax package, and most of those did not survive the governor's veto pen. Still, several new tax provisions were enacted, including extensive tax administration changes, income tax rebates, a significant increase to the child income tax credit, an update to a property tax exemption for veterans and a new county hospital gross receipts tax.

The tax package, **House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 547 (Chapter 211, p.v.)**, as passed by the legislature included 26 different bills that were introduced individually before being combined into the tax package. But, after being partially vetoed by the governor, only four provisions became law. They include a tripling of the child income tax credit, additional income tax rebates for all New Mexico residents (\$1,000 for heads of households, surviving spouses and married individuals filing joint returns and \$500 for single individuals and married individuals filing separate returns), expanding a gross receipts tax deduction for copayments and deductibles for health care services and expanding and increasing film tax credits.

House Bill 368 (Chapter 159) converts an exemption for pass-through entities that elect to pay an entity-level tax to provide the relief in more taxpayer situations than were expected when the exemption was enacted in 2022. The tax relief is primarily realized at the federal level, and similar to last year's exemption, the change should have no impact on the state's revenues.

Two tax administrative cleanup bills were enacted with the passage of **Senate Bill 146 (Chapter 36)** and **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Tax, Business and Transportation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 147 (Chapter 85)**. Senate Bill 146 is the smaller bill that increases the amount of tax liability required to be assessed by the Taxation and Revenue Department or disputed by a taxpayer from \$25.00 to \$50.00, amends certain provisions for applying for tax credits, expands what constitutes

tax fraud to include the use of certain software and clarifies the processes for protesting the value or classification of property. The larger Senate Bill 147 provides multiple changes to the Tax Administration Act; amends certain definitions, exemptions, deductions and a credit in the Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax Act; clarifies when certain licenses can be granted, maintained or renewed if an applicant is a delinquent taxpayer, when the trip tax may be imposed and certain provisions relating to the insurance premium tax; and, after being published since 2012 pursuant only to Executive Order 2011-071, enacts a tax expenditure budget that requires the Taxation and Revenue Department to annually compile and report information on tax expenditures enacted by the legislature. A third tax administration bill, **House Bill 78 (Chapter 52)**, increases a distribution of the gross receipts tax to the State Aviation Fund and makes another temporary distribution of the gross receipts tax to that fund permanent.

An outdated provision relating to applications for a property tax exemption for veterans is replaced with a provision to allow more flexibility for the requirement to provide proof of eligibility for a disabled veteran's property tax exemption in **House Bill 186 (Chapter 63)**.

Regarding local governments, **Senate Bill 205 (Chapter 103)** authorizes certain counties to impose a new county hospital gross receipts tax to fund university-administered nursing programs in the county and to pay bonds for hospital projects in the county. Currently, Taos County is the only county that meets the requirements contained within the bill's definition of "county".

WATER

In this legislative session, four bills were enacted that address water issues in the state. Two bills address water management issues by providing comprehensive guidelines for developing regional water plans and allowing for the consolidation of small water systems into regional authorities. In other bills, the membership of the Interstate Stream Commission is overhauled to include more diverse experts and funds from the Acequia and Community Ditch Fund are made available for recovery and mitigation of wildfires.

Current state law regarding water planning does not provide much direction as to what a regional water plan should contain or the procedures for how a regional water plan should be created. **Senate Conservation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 337 (Chapter 123)** attempts to address this issue by creating the Water Security Planning Act to facilitate regional water planning. The Interstate Stream Commission is charged with developing rules and guidelines for regional water plans, including the

criteria for the commission to prioritize the funding of regional water plans and requirements to coordinate with regional stakeholders and the public and engage with Indian nations, tribes and pueblos.

Small community-owned water systems in rural areas of the state face challenges regarding water management due to a lack of resources and the small number of people served by the water systems.

Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 1 (Chapter 4) alleviates the situation by enacting the Regional Water System Resiliency Act to authorize the consolidation of two or more public utilities into regional water utility authorities to manage water and wastewater services.

Senate Conservation Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 58 (Chapter 170) diversifies the membership of the Interstate Stream Commission, imposes new qualifications for members, requires that the commission's appointments be made with the advice and consent of the Senate and staggers the members' four-year terms. Under this new law, the commission must include a representative of an acequia or community ditch, a representative of a drinking water utility that provides at least 500 acre-feet of water annually for domestic use, one member of the Water Resources Research Institute or civil or environmental engineering faculty of New Mexico State University or the University of New Mexico and one hydrogeologist with expertise in New Mexico ground water resources. Furthermore, members must have at least 10 years' experience with New Mexico water resources, no more than three members can be appointed from the same congressional district and at least three different state engineer water rights districts must be represented. Lastly, the law provides a process for the removal of members.

In response to the recent wildfires and natural disasters, **Senate Bill 176 (Chapter 38)** expands the scope of the Acequia and Community Ditch Fund to allow funding for infrastructure projects, disaster response, recovery and hazard mitigation and cost-sharing requirements of state and federal funding programs. The law also prioritizes funding for those projects that demonstrate the greatest need and project readiness.

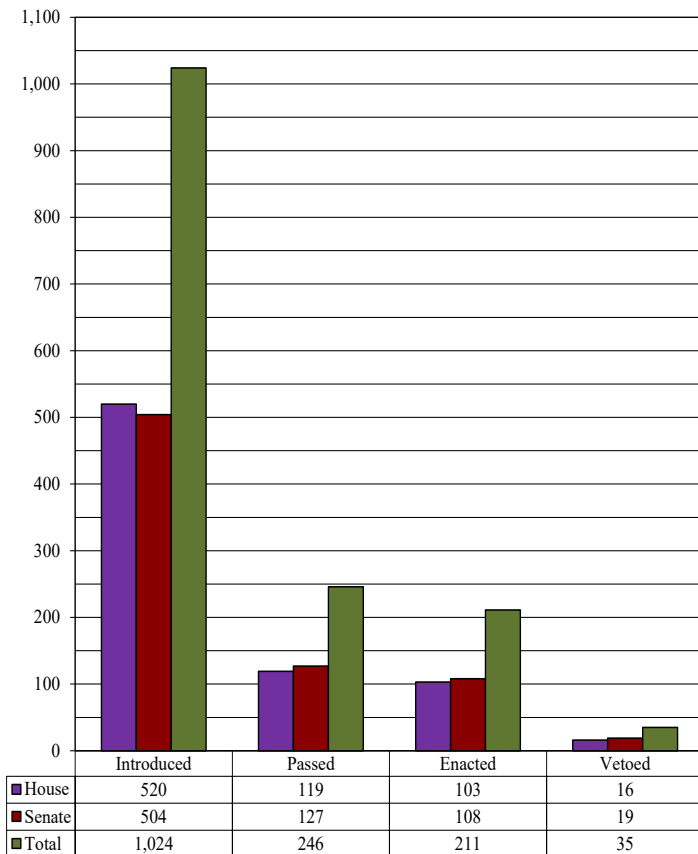

Percentage Passed, Regular Session 2023

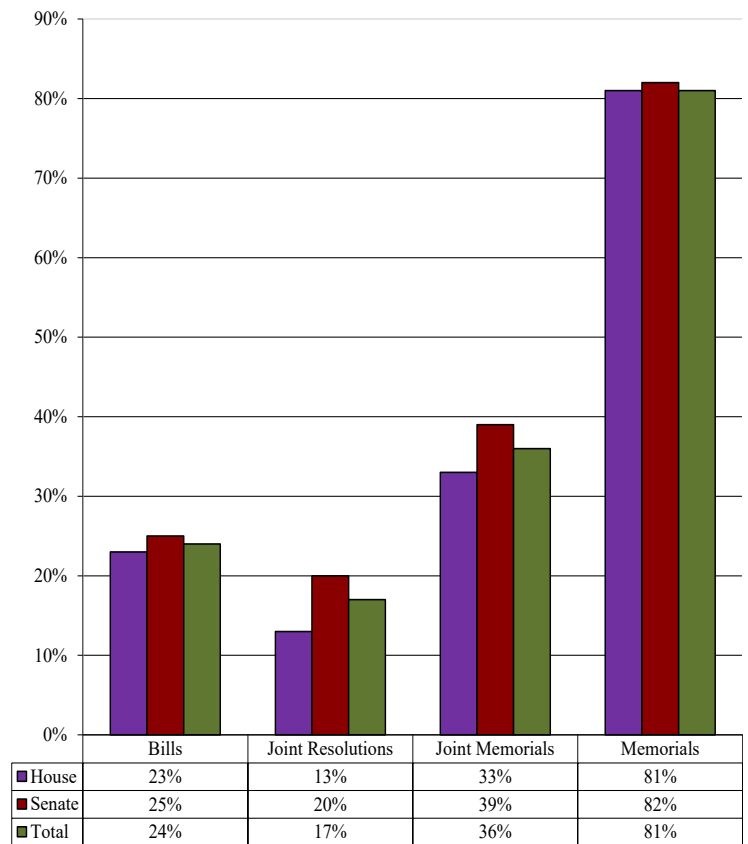

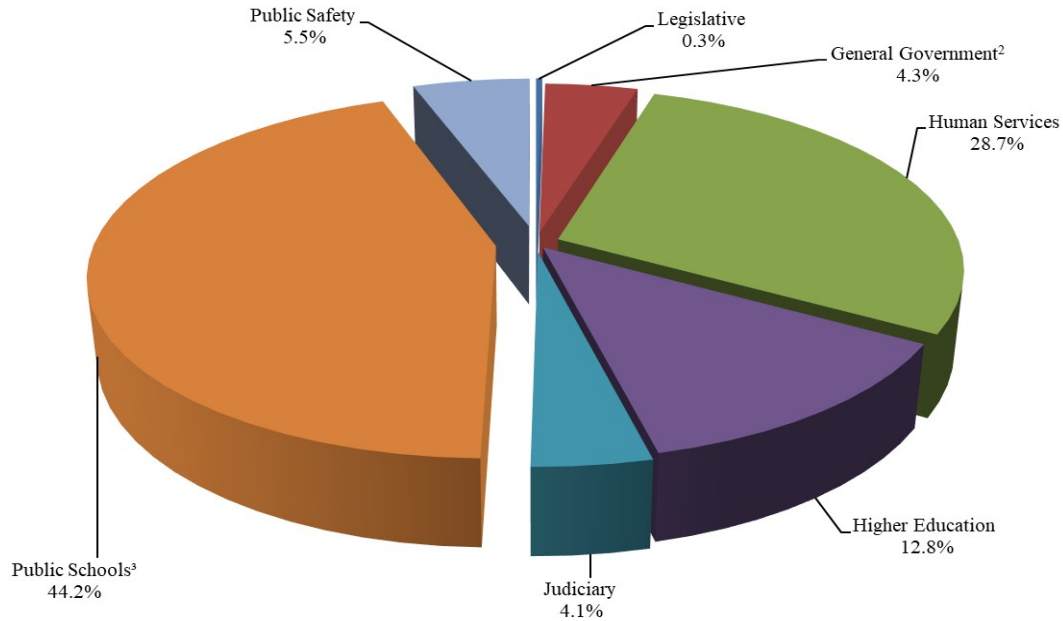

\$9,438,439,200¹

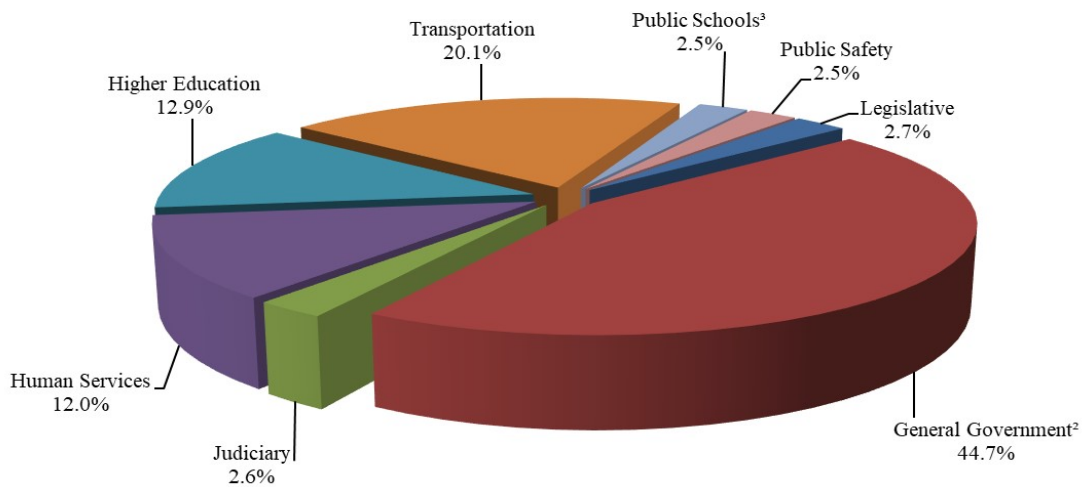

\$1,394,730,300¹

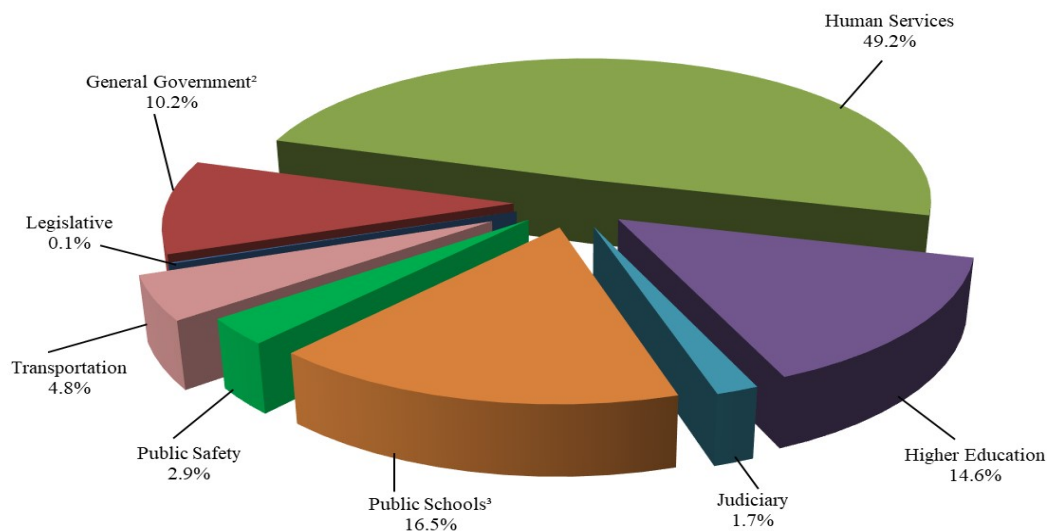

\$26,121,248,200¹**

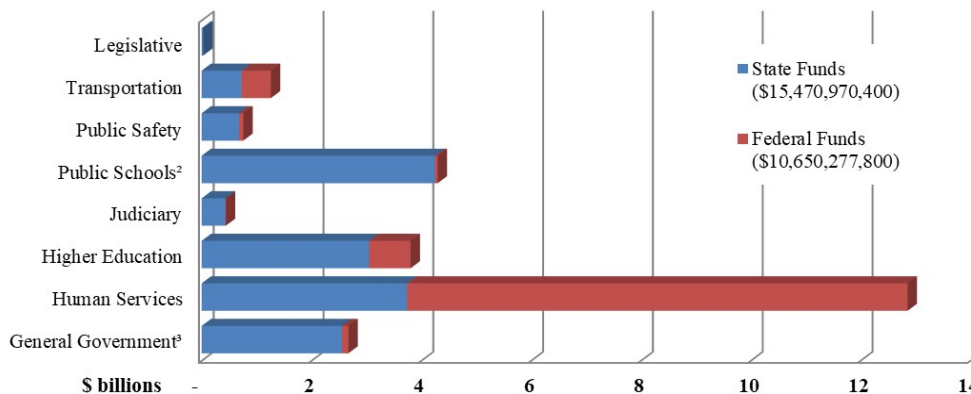

\$26,121,248,200**

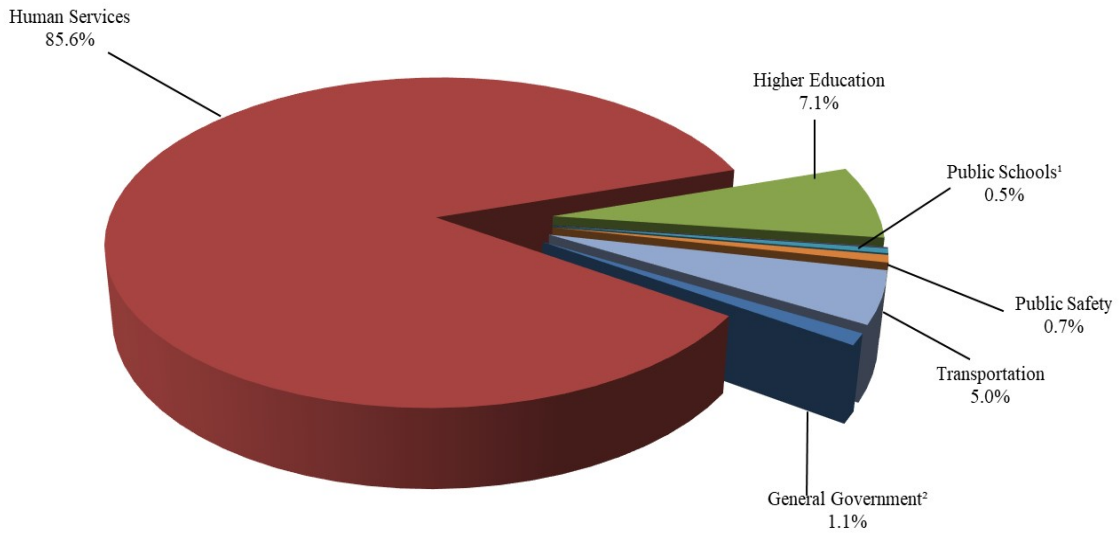

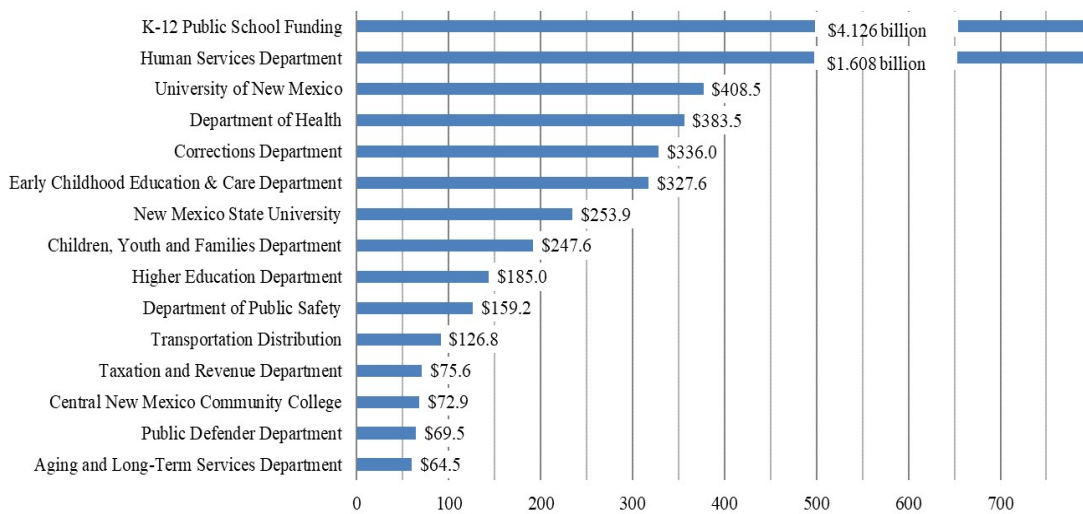
**CHART 5

GENERAL APPROPRIATION ACT OF 2023 VETO TABLE ENDNOTES

1. There are several court cases and attorney general opinions the LCS relies on when considering line-item vetoes, the main cases being *State ex rel. Sego v. Kirkpatrick*, *State ex rel. Coll v. Carruthers*, *State ex rel. Taylor v. Johnson*, *State ex rel. Smith v. Martinez* and *State ex rel. Cisneros v. Martinez*. In *Sego*, the New Mexico Supreme Court said, "The power of partial veto is the power to disapprove. This is a negative power, or the power to delete or destroy a part or item, and is not a positive power, or the power to alter, enlarge or increase the effect of the remaining parts or items. It is not the power to enact or create new legislation by selective deletions. . .". In *Coll*, the court said that an improper intrusion into the executive managerial function is one in which a legislative condition "purport[s] to reserve to the legislature powers of close supervision that are essentially executive in character" or attempts to "make detailed, minuscule, inconsequential executive management decisions". In *Sego*, the court made clear that "a partial veto must be so exercised that it eliminates or destroys the whole of an item or part and does not distort the legislative intent, and in effect create legislation inconsistent with that enacted by the Legislature, by careful striking of words, phrases, clauses or sentences". Court decisions have distinguished between proper and improper conditions or limitations. A governor may veto an improper condition or limitation and retain the appropriation; conversely, if a line-item veto is made to a proper condition, the appropriation fails.

2. The strike attempts to enlarge the appropriation and impermissibly substitutes the governor's judgment for that of the legislature. The stricken language would allow the Department of Finance and Administration to use money for personnel in its own department or departments other than the New Mexico Department of Agriculture.

3. This strike is problematic in that it distorts legislative intent by removing what a court may consider a reasonable condition precedent to implement an integrity review. In *Coll*, the New Mexico Supreme Court stated that executive managerial function concerns the management of the expenditure once approval is granted, not to a condition precedent to the expenditure of appropriated funds.

4. Striking the reversions is problematic because the fact that a fund is nonreverting does not negate the legislature's power to determine those instances when it wants the balance of an appropriation to revert to another source.

5. Having struck the purpose, the selective strike leaves merely a nonsensical recitation of the amount of the appropriation under the Other State Funds column.

6. The strike is problematic because with the deletion of "average", the effect is to give across-the-board raises rather than allow agencies to determine what raises are merited. The legislature knows how to distinguish between across-the-board, or cost-of-living, raises and likely did not intend that to be the case here.

7. The strike distorts the legislative prerogative, impermissibly enlarges the appropriation and substitutes the governor's judgment for that of the legislature.

8. This strike is problematic because it substitutes the governor's judgment for legislative prerogative. The legislature has invested over \$40 million for the Next Generation Film Academy and plans for two campuses, one in Albuquerque and one in Las Cruces, as a governmental effort among the Economic Development Department, UNM and NMSU and private partners. The veto would allow the executive to hold the purse strings and give the money to whomever the governor wanted, while the legislature wanted the money to go to the universities, which is a proper condition.

9. The strike distorts the legislative prerogative and attempts to create a new appropriation by impermissibly removing the specific purpose of an appropriation. "Species of greatest conservation need" is a specific group of species that is defined in statute, and the resulting language after the line-item veto makes an appropriation for general conservation.

10. The strike distorts the legislative prerogative and attempts to create a new appropriation by changing the appropriation for faculty and endowments to an amorphous, unspecific "Native American teaching". The portion of the line-item veto pertaining to Human Services Department participation might withstand judicial scrutiny, though the continuation of the veto through "for startup costs" may be suspect. The veto message states that "[v]etoing this language will provide the Indian Affairs Department with greater ability to transfer funding for the Native American Technical Assistance Centers. . .". However, the bill creating those centers had not become law when HB 2 was being considered. It is likely the appropriating committees were aware of the bill prior to finalizing HB 2, and it is clear that the legislature knows how to appropriate to something being considered in the same legislative session; it did not do that in this appropriation.

11. This strike may distort the legislature's intention that money be distributed in a timely fashion.

12. The strike is problematic in that it takes away what may be considered a reasonable condition precedent to ensure that state employee benefits are sustainable. The legislature is required to appropriate money for employee benefits and when the executive agency has not raised sufficient premiums, the legislature is forced to provide a supplemental or deficiency appropriation and, therefore, has reason to attach such a condition.

13. This strike distorts legislative intent and enlarges the appropriation by removing the increased amount that the legislature allocated for a medical insurance premium rate increase.

14. This strike may distort legislative intent and attempt to enlarge and impermissibly substitute the governor's judgment for that of the legislature. The veto allows the appropriation to be used in any way the executive chooses to improve reporting and adherence to plans of safe care for babies born with exposure to drugs rather than the legislature's choice of providing grants to hospitals for the same purpose.

2023 SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS VETO TABLE ENDNOTES

There are several court cases and attorney general opinions the LCS relies on when considering line-item vetoes, the main cases being *State ex rel. Sego v. Kirkpatrick*, *State ex rel. Coll v. Carruthers*, *State ex rel. Taylor v. Johnson*, *State ex rel. Smith v. Martinez* and *State ex rel. Cisneros v. Martinez*. In *Sego*, the New Mexico Supreme Court said, "The power of partial veto is the power to disapprove. This is a negative power, or the power to delete or destroy a part or item, and is not a positive power, or the power to alter, enlarge or increase the effect of the remaining parts or items. It is not the power to enact or create new legislation by selective deletions. . .". In *Coll*, the court said that an improper intrusion into the executive managerial function is one in which a legislative condition "purport[s] to reserve to the legislature powers of close supervision that are essentially executive in character" or attempts to "make detailed, minuscule, inconsequential executive management decisions". In *Sego*, the court made clear that "a partial veto must be so exercised that it eliminates or destroys the whole of an item or part and does not distort the legislative intent, and in effect create legislation inconsistent with that enacted by the Legislature, by careful striking of words, phrases, clauses or sentences". Court decisions have distinguished between proper and improper conditions or limitations. A governor may veto an improper condition or limitation and retain the appropriation; conversely, if a line-item veto is made to a proper condition, the appropriation fails.

1. Strikes "or unencumbered" in the reversion clause of every section of the bill.
2. Strikes "Aztec" as the court to which the appropriation was directed. The veto is infirm on two fronts: the governor has substituted her judgment for that of the legislature; and it changes and enlarges the purpose for which the legislature appropriated the money, namely, for security upgrades in the Aztec district court. The appropriation for the Aztec court does not intrude on the executive managerial function as to how court security upgrades will be accomplished. In *Coll*, the New Mexico Supreme Court stated that executive managerial function concerns the management of the expenditure once approval is given, not to a condition precedent to the expenditure of appropriated funds. A proper veto would have taken the whole item.
3. Strikes "east". The veto message said the word would "unnecessarily restrict the availability and efficient use of funds", but it is unclear how such a strike changes the availability of the money or its efficient use. A proper veto would have taken the whole item.
4. Strikes "resource officer". School resource officers are commissioned police officers assigned, and specially trained, to work in schools; they are not security guards. By the deletion of the purpose of the appropriation, what remains is meaningless and confusing. If the legislature simply wanted to give money to a school in Aztec, it would properly give the money to the Public Education Department. A proper veto would have taken the whole item.
5. Strikes language describing the appropriation for a type of youth golf program in Kirtland. The governor invoked the anti-donation clause. There are arguments on either side as to the part of the veto that eliminated the function of the program, but that function, building character, etc., is not necessarily determinative of an unconstitutional donation. Local governments may provide services like recreation directly or may contract, but they, as well as the state agency responsible for the appropriation, may not violate the anti-donation clause when expending the appropriation. In addition, in striking the location, i.e., Kirtland, the veto unconstitutionally distorts the legislature's intent and, essentially, creates a new appropriation for anywhere in San Juan County. A proper veto would have taken the whole item.
6. Strikes "and improvements". Although not consistently applied, the veto message explained the governor's aversion to what she considers to be capital appropriations in HB 2 Junior.
7. Strikes "repairs" language.
8. Strikes "operational funding".
9. Strikes "to contract". The veto message said the language had rendered the item unfeasible, but does not explain how that is true.
10. Strikes the nonreversion language. It is the practice of the legislature to specify whether an appropriation does or does not revert. Although a fund may be nonreverting, that does not mean that the legislature may not require an appropriation to the fund to revert; the language merely clarified that this appropriation would not revert. The effect of the veto is to fall back on the overarching reversion at the beginning of the section, so that the unexpended balance of this appropriation will revert at the end of fiscal year 2024. (Note that the nonreversion was not stricken in an appropriation to another nonreverting fund, the Energy Transition Displaced Worker Assistance Fund.)
11. Strikes three out of four uses for the appropriation. The veto message states that the language unnecessarily restricts the availability and efficient use of funds, but it appears that the opposite is true; the veto narrows the use of the appropriation. The veto distorts legislative prerogative and substitutes the governor's judgment for that of the legislature. A proper veto would have taken the whole item.
12. Strikes the purpose of the appropriation. The veto message says the language unnecessarily restricts the availability and efficient use of funds, but the veto leaves no purpose for the state engineer to engage with the east Puerto de Luna acequia and the constitutional requirement that an appropriation distinctly specify the object to which an appropriation is to be applied is ignored. Clearly, the legislature did not intend for the state engineer to simply turn over \$150,000 to the acequia. A proper veto would have taken the whole item.
13. Strikes the coordinator position.
14. Strikes the report requirement.
15. Strikes "interns" and the high school locations. The veto message states the vetoed language would provide recurring funds for personnel; however, nothing in a junior bill converts into a recurring obligation unless the affected state agency proposes continuation of the item in a future proposed budget and the legislature agrees and funds the proposal. See Endnotes 2 and 5 for discussion of the legislature's authority to direct where an appropriation is to be used. The legislature was not attempting to appropriate for all APS high schools, and the veto impermissibly distorts and enlarges the appropriation. A proper veto would have taken the whole item.
16. Strikes "facilities improvements".

(Laws 2023, Chapter 199, p.v.)

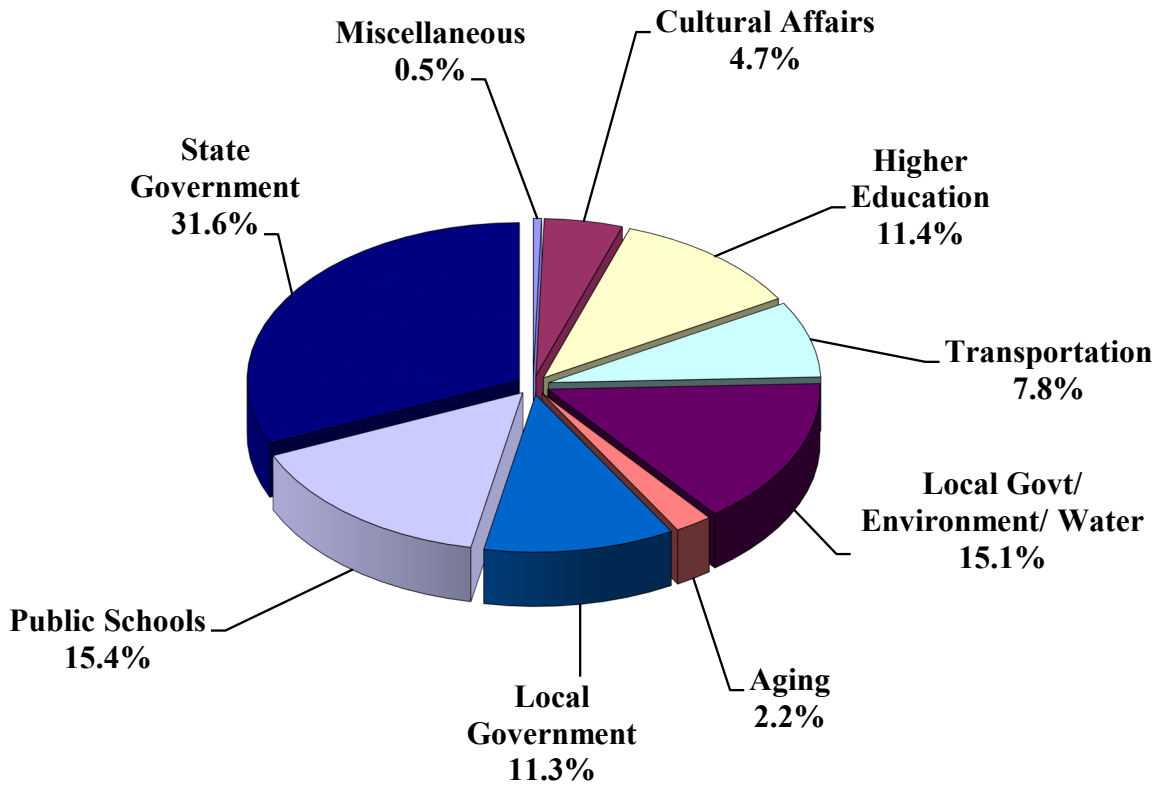

The legislature may reauthorize funds that have previously been appropriated for a particular project to change, expand or clarify the project purpose; to extend the expenditure or certification period for the project; or to change the project's location or administering agency. Descriptions of the projects that were reauthorized in 2023 are presented here in the numbered order in which they appear in the bill. Projects are arranged in alphabetical order by the county in which they have most recently been authorized. Original citations for the reauthorized projects appear in italics following the text of each project listing. The governor vetoed seven projects as indicated in the listings below.
