The Second Session of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature, and the pair of special sessions closely bookending it, accomplished an impressive amount of work in a few short months and by passing a relatively small number of bills to do so. The sessions took place against the backdrop of a world still grappling with the COVID-19 pandemic and a handful of changes to the legislative landscape.

While the fence that surrounded the State Capitol complex during the 2021 regular session was no longer standing, some issues pertaining to entry into the State Capitol were still within the realm of legislative discussion. For one, the New Mexico Legislative Council enacted a policy prohibiting deadly weapons inside of the State Capitol. Somewhat similarly, proof of vaccination against COVID-19 was also required of all visitors to the building.

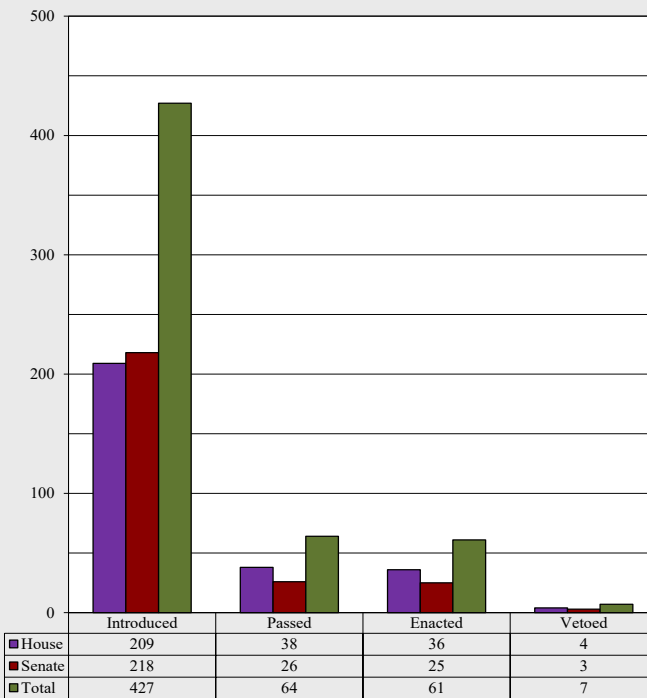
The makeup of the legislature itself also underwent a few changes as three members of the House of Representatives had resigned, including the house majority floor leader, necessitating appointment or election of successors. Also, one member of the Senate changed his party affiliation from Democrat to Declined to State.

Over the course of 2021, COVID-19 and its variants wreaked havoc on attempts at normalcy. As an obscure but important example, federal decennial census data normally available the spring after a census year was delayed until August 2021. The special session for redistricting, normally held in September, had to be rescheduled for December.

For the most part, summer and fall legislative interim committee meetings featured the long-awaited transition from videoconferences to in-person meetings. However, the rise of COVID-19 variants as the special session approached necessitated continued tweaking of the rules to keep members, staff and the public safe, mostly by allowing virtual participation in certain circumstances. This also allowed members of the public to provide input on legislation in committee meetings without having to set foot in the State Capitol, proving that some of the COVID-19-related havoc could actually be useful.

The once per decade task of redrawing boundaries for congressional, legislative and Public Education Commission districts tends to be even thornier than the normal legislative briar patch. In addition to intensifying partisan divisions, the process can sometimes pit members of the same party against one another in a fight over various precincts. Another wrinkle was added in 2021: the formation of a Citizen Redistricting Committee, tasked with providing the legislature with suggestions for maps that

did not account for political considerations.

Somewhat surprisingly, the Second Special Session of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature, called for the purpose of redistricting, began without much rancor and appeared to be headed toward a relatively quiet resolution. However, that sense of calm was relatively short-lived, as disagreement over the plan to redraw Senate districts exploded in committee and onto both the Senate and House floors. Additionally, the medical malpractice bill that had passed with the understanding that all interested parties were in agreement on not making any changes during the previous regular session had to be amended during the redistricting session, which also became somewhat contentious. In the end, plans for congressional seats, the House and Senate and the Public Education Commission, as well as the tweaked medical malpractice bill, were approved and signed by the governor just before the holidays.

Less than a month later, the Second Session of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature began, with the most significant influence on the legislature being a massive influx of money. First, a handful of members of the legislature prevailed in court over the governor regarding appropriation of over \$1.75 billion in federal pandemic stimulus funds, giving the legislature

authority to determine how that money would be spent. At the same time, increased oil and gas revenue provided the legislature with still more money to appropriate as it began the session focused on its primary task of crafting the state budget.

The result: a nearly \$8.5 billion budget, representing a 13.9% increase over the previous year's spending level. Key features of the budget were increased spending on public education (including

significant pay raises for teachers), pay raises for other state employees, a \$15.00 per hour minimum wage for all state workers and almost \$400 million for transportation projects.

In addition to the budget, dozens of tax bills were introduced during the session and eventually combined into a massive tax package that featured provisions reducing the state's gross receipts tax by a total of .25% over two years (the first such cut in 40 years), exempting social security and military retirement pay from state income taxes and providing 2021 income tax rebates and a child tax credit.

Partly in response to rising crime rates, particularly in Albuquerque (where the record number of homicides was shattered in 2021), the legislature also passed an omnibus crime package that included provisions eliminating the statute of limitations on second degree murder, increasing penalties for certain violent crimes, providing retention bonuses for police officers and creating the crime of threatening a judge or a judge's family.

Other significant bills that the legislature passed during the regular session included changes to teacher residency programs, the creation of a fund earmarking gross receipts taxes for use by qualified land grants, requirements for cleanup of abandoned uranium mines and a lowering of the interest rate cap on small installment loans.

As with any session, several high-profile bills failed to pass. Those included authorization for a hydrogen hub in northwestern New Mexico; changes to the state's process for detaining criminal defendants before their trial; revisions to the Cannabis Regulation Act; and two bills changing several aspects of the state's Election Code.

In any given session, the threat of a filibuster during the final hours is always a possibility. As prescribed by the Constitution of New Mexico, sessions must conclude at noon on their final day. As that time approaches, each chamber often kicks into the legislative equivalent of warp speed: bills passing with no debate, rushed motions for concurrence and a flurry of messages from chamber to chamber. At the opposite end of that spectrum is one member rising to speak, and talking until 11:59 a.m., effectively killing any legislation that has not already passed. Such was the case at the end of the regular session in 2022, but some surprises still remained. First came a last-minute announcement by the speaker of the house of representatives that he would not be seeking reelection just as the curtain closed on the Second Session of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature.

Next, after the session, the governor took the curious step of vetoing in its entirety the so-called junior appropriations bill making appropriations to programs and projects favored by individual members, a bill she applauded only a year earlier. As talk of an extraordinary session to override the governor's veto began to swirl, the governor called the legislature back into special session to pass a slightly modified junior spending bill and another bill providing tax rebates to New Mexicans filing tax returns in 2021.

The four-month stretch from December until the first week of April featured one regular session; two special sessions (including one for the heavy lift of redistricting); court cases; a significantly increased

state budget; a capital outlay package worth over \$800 million; sweeping tax code and criminal justice packages; rebates for New Mexico taxpayers; culmination of the decades-long fight over installment loan interest rates; and a handful of bombshell announcements along the way. A long way in a short time, indeed.

The *Highlights* is an annual publication of the Legislative Council Service (LCS) that summarizes much, but not all, of the legislative action during each session. The omission of certain legislation or issues should not be interpreted as an indication that those are not important; each is important to someone. Many issues in the *Highlights* defy single-topic categorization, so every effort has been made to organize and cross-reference the contents. APPROPRIATIONS AND FINANCE

The 2022 regular legislative session began with the nation expecting the worst of the pandemic to be over, but with much uncertainty remaining on the path to full normalcy for both public health and the economy. New COVID-19 waves and variants continued to unpredictably affect economies and the lives of those around the globe, triggering drops in equities markets and hampering long-term business planning, especially in supply chains where international trade was required.

As budgets for the 2022 regular session were initially crafted, the August 2021 consensus revenue estimate expected slight growth for fiscal year (FY) 2022 revenue at only \$8.109 billion, but then recovering to \$8.8 billion by FY 2023. The August 2021 forecast was based on oil averaging \$63.50 per barrel for FY 2022 and \$58.00 per barrel for FY 2023. However, in the following months, a direct economic consequence of the possibility for war and then the actual progression of war between Russia and Ukraine could be felt in New Mexico's revenues through rising oil and natural gas prices.

The nominal revenue picture in New Mexico showed continued upward progression leading up to and through the legislative session, but not necessarily for predominantly positive national or global reasons. Oil price growth and increased inflation more broadly increase New Mexico's nominal General Fund revenues; however, they are a double-edged sword to the average New Mexico household, whose members feel their reduced purchasing power every time they fill up their cars with gasoline, buy groceries or pay their utility bills.

Quickly rebounding oil demand combined with slower growth in oil supply led to a march upward in oil prices. There was near universal agreement that high energy prices and unprecedented supply chain disruptions led to a spike in inflation toward the end of 2021; however, there was disagreement and uncertainty on the lasting impact versus the transitory nature of this inflation. The estimate made in December 2021 called for oil prices to average \$71.50 in FY 2022 and \$64.50 in FY 2023, and it also forecast overall FY 2022 revenue to be revised upward slightly to \$8.16 billion, with expectations for FY 2023 General Fund revenues revised upward to just over \$9 billion.

High General Fund reserve balances continued to give some relief from uncertainty. At the end of FY 2021, General Fund reserve balances were \$2.5 billion, or 35% of recurring appropriations, and were estimated to grow to \$3.3 billion, or 44% of recurring appropriations, in FY 2022 before any 2022 legislative actions. Also before any 2022 appropriations, the FY 2023 "new money" estimate (defined as FY 2023 recurring revenue less FY 2022 recurring appropriations) was forecast to be \$1.6 billion.

At the mid-session revenue update toward the end of January 2022, there was no official revision; however, there were some positive signs for the General Fund. On the opening day of the session, oil prices were over \$85.00 per barrel, which was about 20% and \$14.00 above the fiscal year average assumption. Monthly natural gas prices had reached \$5.51 per thousand cubic feet in October 2021, the

highest in over seven years since February 2014, and then climbed to a new peak in April 2022 of \$6.60 per thousand cubic feet, which was the highest in over 13 years.

Inflation began to spike through the end of 2021, and the last United States inflation report released before the 2022 regular session began showed the highest monthly year-over-year inflation that some legislators had experienced in their lifetimes. The December 2021 inflation (as measured by the overall Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers) showed a year-over-year growth of 7.1%; this was the highest in 39 years since June 1982. Inflation-adjusted targeting of flat salaries and flat budgets (zero real growth) would require nominal increases somewhat above 7%.

General Appropriation Act

After line-item veto action taken by the governor, the General Appropriation Act of 2022 (GAA), enacted in **House Appropriations and Finance Committee Substitute for House Bills 2 and 3 (Chapter 54, p.v.)**, appropriates \$10.1 billion in recurring and nonrecurring spending in FY 2022 and FY 2023. In FY 2023, appropriations to agencies for operating expenses total over \$8.4 billion, a year-over-year increase of 13.9%.

The GAA also allocates \$171.6 million to provide a 7% cost-of-living salary increase for state government employees and employees at the state's public and higher education institutions. The increase is split between two fiscal years in which employees receive a 3% increase beginning April 1, 2022 and then an additional 4% increase beginning July 1, 2022. Also in the compensation appropriation section of the GAA, \$12.5 million is appropriated to fund a 1% employer contribution increase to retirement for employees in higher education served by the Educational Retirement Board system.

Where year-over-year comparisons are noted, they represent the difference between an appropriation recipient's FY 2023 appropriation under the GAA (apart from the broad compensation increases) and the prior year's ultimate recurring appropriation it received.

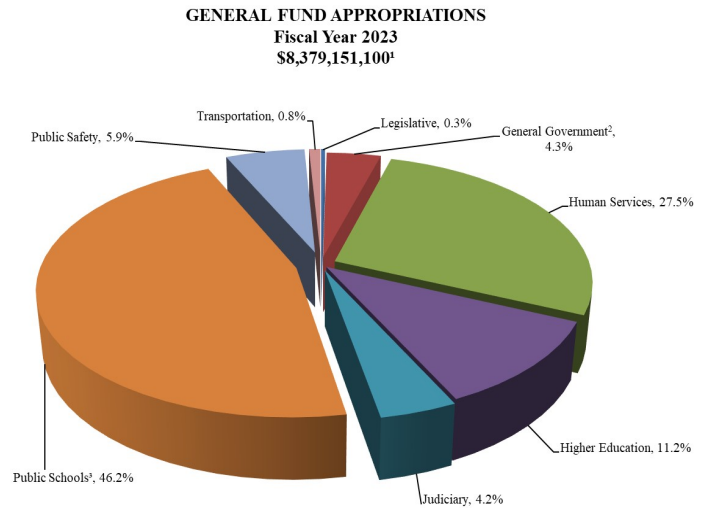
◆ *Public School Support; Other Education*

The "Public School Support" category receives the most recurring General Fund appropriations of any category of the GAA at \$3.8 billion, which includes funding for the state equalization guarantee distribution that finances K-12 public education as well as the public school personnel salary increases noted above. Also provided in this category is \$120 million for the K-5 Plus Program, \$95 million for extended learning time programs and \$43 million for school districts and charter schools to purchase culturally and linguistically appropriate instructional materials for eligible students.

In the "Other Education" category, \$56.7 million is appropriated from the General Fund in FY 2023. Of that amount, \$19.5 million is appropriated for the operating budget of the Public Education Department (PED), \$1.1 million is allocated to regional education cooperatives and \$36.2 million is provided for special appropriations to the PED.

◆ *Higher Education*

The GAA increases the General Fund appropriation by 5% to \$939.1 million overall for New Mexico's public post-secondary educational institutions and the Higher Education Department. The two largest universities in the state are allocated approximately 61% of the funding in the higher education category, with the University of New Mexico and New Mexico State University set to receive \$353.8 million and \$222.8 million, respectively, increases of 4.3% and 3.7%. Moreover, the Higher Education Department receives just under \$47.1 million, including \$12 million for the Opportunity Scholarship Program.

◆ *Judiciary*

Judicial agencies are appropriated \$345.2 million in the GAA, an overall increase of 5.3%. No judicial appropriations decreased, and only the New Mexico Compilation Commission's allocation is flat. The largest single component of judicial appropriations is to the Public Defender Department, which receives an increase of 5.1%, bringing its FY 2023 appropriation to \$60.8 million. All other judicial agencies see budget growth ranging from 2.6% (for the Tenth Judicial District Court) to 10.7% (for both the First Judicial District Attorney and Thirteenth Judicial District Attorney). In addition, the New Mexico Supreme Court's budget increases by 4.5% to \$6.9 million, and the budget for the Administrative Office of the Courts is boosted 8.1% to \$40.4 million, while the Bernalillo County Metropolitan Court receives \$26.2 million, an increase from the prior year of 3.1%.

◆ *General Control*

In the GAA, general control agency General Fund appropriations increase 4.8% to \$166.4 million for FY 2023. The agency receiving the largest General Fund appropriation in this category, the Taxation and Revenue Department, has a budget increase of 4.1% to \$68 million. Also, the Office of the Governor's budget is raised 12.3% to \$5.2 million. The only agency in this category with a budget decrease is the Secretary of State, whose allocation fell 16.4% to \$13.9 million from the General Fund; this reflects the fact that only one election is held in odd-numbered fiscal years such as FY 2023 instead of two elections in even-numbered fiscal years.

◆ *Commerce and Industry*

After a slight drop in the prior year, the commerce and industry category appropriations are

significantly enhanced, growing 7.6% to \$77.1 million for FY 2023. The only reduction is in the allocation to the New Mexico State Fair from \$285,000 in FY 2022 down to \$200,000 in FY 2023. As in prior years, almost one-half of the commerce and industry category is composed of the two agencies with the largest budgets in this category, the Tourism Department and the Economic Development Department, which are increased by 15.9% and 18.9% respectively, to \$19.4 million and \$16.9 million. After being tied for the steepest cut in this category for FY 2022, the State Ethics Commission's budget surges 31.1% to \$1.2 million for FY 2023. The Spaceport Authority enjoys the largest percentage increase in this category as its budget skyrockets by 81.3% to \$3.8 million.

◆ *Health, Hospitals and Human Services*

An overall increase of 16.3% is provided for health, hospitals and human services agencies for a total of over \$2.3 billion. The Human Services Department receives the largest share, by far, at over \$1.4 billion, a 23.2% increase, followed by the Department of Health at \$344 million, an 8.7% boost. The third largest share of \$230 million is appropriated to the Children, Youth and Families Department, an increase of 7.8% from the prior year. However, the overall size of the budgets for most agencies in this category is much larger than their General Fund appropriation alone would suggest; for example, when including other state and federal funds, the overall budget for the Human Services Department in FY 2023 totals \$9.2 billion.

◆ *Public Safety*

Public safety agencies are appropriated \$491.5 million in FY 2023, a 3.1% uptick from their prior budgets. The Corrections Department receives two-thirds of the appropriations in this category, and its \$326.7 million allocation is a 0.8% reduction made possible by a continued decline in New Mexico's prison population. The second largest recipient in this category, the Department of Public Safety, is allocated a budget increase of 11.2% to \$144.3 million. In addition to expanded police training, this increase includes additional resources for police oversight. The largest percentage growth in this category is an increase of 35.4%, bringing the Crime Victims Reparation Commission's appropriation to \$9 million.

◆ *Other Appropriations and Fund Transfers*

While for many years the Department of Transportation (DOT) did not receive appropriations from the General Fund and instead relied on funding from other sources, the previous two regular sessions have seen General Fund money allocated to the DOT. The trend continues in 2022 with the GAA appropriating \$373.5 million from the General Fund to the DOT in FY 2022 and subsequent fiscal years. The appropriation is split into a number of parts, with the largest amount of \$247.5 million designated for acquisition of rights of way, planning, design, construction, equipment and capital facility improvements and to match federal and other state funds for projects, specifically including a number of projects named in Section 9 of the GAA. The second largest portion of \$60 million is appropriated to the

DOT for the Transportation Project Fund, which is used to make grants to counties, municipalities and Indian nations, tribes and pueblos. Another \$25 million is appropriated for Interstate 10 and Interstate 40 planning, and \$20 million is allocated for statewide rest area improvements. Additionally, an allocation of \$9 million is made to purchase equipment in transportation district offices statewide, and two separate \$5 million portions are allocated for air transportation, one for essential air service and another to plan, design, construct, renovate and equip upgrades to regional airports statewide. Lastly, \$2 million is designated for the design and construction of wildlife corridors to mitigate collisions between wildlife and vehicles on state-managed roads.

The GAA makes a number of fund transfers, totaling \$235 million, from the General Fund into various funds. These transfers include \$130 million to the Lottery Tuition Fund, \$45 million to the Technology Enhancement Fund, \$30 million to the Patient's Compensation Fund, \$20 million to the Forest Land Protection Revolving Fund and \$10 million to the Rural Libraries Endowment Fund.

Feed Bill

House Bill 1 (Chapter 1), known as the "feed bill" because it funds the legislative session, appropriates \$28.7 million from the General Fund for the legislative session and for legislative agencies in FY 2022 and FY 2023. Of that amount, \$5.9 million provides for the operations of the 2022 legislative session, and the remainder supports interim activities and year-round operational costs of the legislative agencies that include the LCS (\$7.5 million), Legislative Education Study Committee (\$1.4 million), Legislative Finance Committee (\$4.8 million), house and senate chief clerks' offices (\$1.8 and \$1.9 million, respectively) and Legislative Information System (\$1.7 million for non-salary expenses). Also, the feed bill includes a nonrecurring appropriation of \$1.5 million from the General Fund for expenditure in FY 2022 and subsequent fiscal years for the planning, design and development of a new legislative processing system.

Other Appropriations

During the regular 2022 session, Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 48, known as "House Bill 2 junior", passed the legislature, spending \$50.4 million from the General Fund, split evenly between nonrecurring and recurring expenditures. Although this bill passed with bipartisan agreement and no opposition, it was vetoed by the governor. In her veto message, the governor noted that she was "unconvinced that SB 48's distribution of over \$50 million in funds for various projects upholds principles of fiscal responsibility or, on the whole, represents a wise investment at present". A revamped supplemental appropriation bill addressing the governor's concerns was passed in a subsequent one-day special session and was ultimately signed by the governor without any line-item vetoes. New Mexico Finance Authority

In the ongoing effort to foster economic development, the legislature passed and the governor signed **House Bill 7 (Chapter 57)** enacting the Opportunity Enterprise Act. The bill tasks the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) with providing financing, leasing or lending options to private partners for the purpose of developing projects that will create or expand economic development opportunities within the state. Financing may be provided to fund the development of projects, which will be ultimately owned by the NMFA and leased according to this act. Alternatively, a private partner may instead seek a loan that will be repaid, if that partner wishes to own the property related to a developed project. Money generated from leasing or lending under the Opportunity Enterprise Act will be redistributed for future projects through the use of the newly created Opportunity Enterprise Revolving Fund. The use of money pursuant to this act will be subject to review by an oversight board, and additionally, the NMFA shall provide the legislature with annual reporting. In the GAA, \$70 million is allocated for the Opportunity Enterprise Act.

With the enactment of **Senate Bill 37 (Chapter 15)**, money is appropriated from the Public Project Revolving Fund to three funds administered by the NMFA. Specifically, the bill allocates: \$6.72 million to the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund to carry out the purposes of the Drinking Water State Revolving Loan Fund Act and provide state matching funds for federal Safe Drinking Water Act of 1974 projects; \$5 million to the Cultural Affairs Facilities Infrastructure Fund to pay the costs of Cultural Affairs Department facilities and exhibits; and \$2.5 million to the Wastewater Facility Construction Loan Fund to carry out the purposes of the Wastewater Facility Construction Loan Act and to provide matching funds for federal Clean Water Act of 1977 projects.

The legislature approved a variety of public projects around the state with the enactment of two bills. **House Bill 42 (Chapter 7)** authorizes the NMFA to make loans from the Public Project Revolving Fund to qualified entities for 190 public projects that require a loan of more than \$1 million relating to building, equipment, infrastructure, debt refinance, road, airport, land acquisition, water, wastewater, water rights, solid waste, public transportation system, public recreation facility and education technology projects. Meanwhile, **Senate Bill 17 (Chapter 14)** authorizes the NMFA to make loans or grants from the Water Project Fund to qualified entities for 32 local public water projects. Lists of the projects authorized in these bills may be found in [Table 9](#) and [Table 10](#), respectively, in [Appendix B](#).

Capital Outlay

Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 212 (Chapter 53, p.v.) authorizes \$823,106,421 in capital outlay project expenditures for FY 2022 through FY 2026. The bill includes \$676,479,921 in severance tax bond projects and \$30 million in General Fund appropriations. The General Fund appropriations are directed specifically to capital projects on Native American lands. Other

state fund appropriations in the bill total \$116,626,500 and include appropriations in excess of \$85.5 million from the Public School Capital Outlay Fund (PSCOF).

The bill appropriates nearly \$186 million to the Local Government Division of the Department of Finance and Administration for 453 infrastructure projects, equipment purchases and vehicle purchases. Over \$125 million is appropriated to the Capital Program Fund, including: \$15 million to construct an executive office building on the main capitol complex in Santa Fe, which is supplemented by a separate \$70 million appropriation included in the GAA; \$20 million to construct a new facility for the New Mexico Veterans' Home in Sierra County; and \$20 million to construct a new administrative building for the Department of Public Safety in Albuquerque. The DOT receives in excess of \$60 million, including over \$17 million for gas pipeline construction along roads and highways in Taos County, \$10.6 million for street and pedestrian improvements in the Old Town and Sawmill area of Albuquerque, \$1.8 million for highway improvements in Eddy County and \$4 million for highway, road and drainage improvements in Valencia County. The governor vetoed language in the bill that would have steered appropriations for road improvements to specific city, county or state governing districts.

One hundred thirty-eight Department of Environment projects receive funding totaling over \$53 million, including a \$20 million project to install a water system for the Eastern New Mexico Water Utility Authority in Curry County. A \$2.9 million appropriation is included in the bill for a wastewater collection system for Elephant Butte, and appropriations over \$1 million are also included for water system improvements in Eddy, San Juan and Santa Fe counties, as well as for a statewide river stewardship program.

The PED receives over \$35 million in severance tax bond funding for public and charter school capital improvements, including \$5 million for school bus replacements. Severance tax bond funding for the PED includes \$9.5 million for a range of school capital improvement projects in the Albuquerque Public School District. A total of \$75 million is appropriated from the PSCOF to the Public School Facilities Authority to make distributions to school districts for the maintenance and repair of public school buildings, and the Public School Facilities Authority also receives \$5 million from the PSCOF to construct, equip and improve pre-kindergarten facilities across the state. Over \$5 million in PSCOF funding is also included in the bill for school bus replacement.

Two major projects are included in the bill for the Economic Development Department. The New Mexico Film Division receives \$20 million to develop studio facilities statewide, while \$10 million is appropriated for main street and arts and cultural district improvements throughout the state. A Department of Information Technology project to modernize and stabilize public safety radio communications statewide receives a \$26 million appropriation.

The Indian Affairs Department receives nearly \$23.9 million in severance tax bond funding in the bill, in addition to \$29.4 million in General Fund appropriations. Appropriations of \$1 million or more

are included in the severance tax bond funding for the Navajo Preparatory School, the Church Rock Chapter, the Santa Fe Indian School Paolo Soleri Amphitheater, Ohkay Owingeh and for each of the Pueblos of Isleta, Laguna, Zuni, Sandia, Santa Clara, San Felipe, San Ildefonso, Tesuque, Cochiti, Santo Domingo, Jemez, Picuris and Taos.

The governor vetoed 24 projects totaling \$4,624,900, citing insufficient funding to effectively implement those projects. Gubernatorial discretion was also exercised to veto language that was deemed to be overly restrictive in some of the project descriptions, particularly with respect to road projects.

The LCS continues to collect capital project requests online, after implementing a paperless system last year. A pre-session deadline for submitting project requests for 2022 enabled legislators to receive listings of requested projects for potential sponsorship early in the session. The online system allows the LCS to collect a range of data important to the ongoing funding process.

House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 153 (Chapter 55, p.v.), the 2022 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, includes three ballot initiatives. Those initiatives seek voter approval for the issuance of general obligation bonds for capital improvements and acquisitions totaling \$258,759,165 for senior centers, libraries and higher education. Institutions of higher education, special schools and tribal schools will receive \$215,560,000 if voters approve the measure. Improvements and acquisitions for senior centers total \$24,199,165 in the bill, and \$19 million is included for library acquisitions and improvements.

Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 213 (Chapter 52, p.v.) reauthorizes 147 prior-year appropriations to extend the time of expenditure, change the administering agency or expand, change or clarify the purpose of the original appropriation. The governor vetoed 11 of the proposed reauthorizations; in those cases, the provisions of the original appropriation remain intact.

BUSINESS AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

In recognition of the hardships faced by businesses and the economy as a whole, the legislature took steps to assist companies suffering from the COVID-19 pandemic and the associated repercussions. In addition, the state took affirmative steps to make New Mexico more investor-friendly.

Originally enacted in the 2020 first special session, the Small Business Recovery Loan Fund was created to provide pandemic relief for small businesses via loans funded by money from the Severance Tax Permanent Fund. **House Bill 148 (Chapter 25)** extends the date that applications can be received for a

loan from the fund to December 31, 2022, and the bill extends the reversion date of unencumbered money in the fund to December 31, 2023.

House Bill 104 (Chapter 21) enacts the Venture Capital Program Act and establishes the Venture Capital Program Fund, allowing the NMFA to make limited investments in venture private equity funds and early stage investments in New Mexico businesses whose investments or enterprises enhance the economic development objectives of the state. The act sets forth requirements for businesses and venture private equity funds qualifying for investment by the NMFA. Additionally, the NMFA is required to provide annual reports regarding investments pursuant to the act.

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

During the 2022 regular legislative session, two bills related to children and families were passed: one bill relating to representation of children and families in child welfare cases, and another addressing the rights of Native American children.

In the continuing effort to improve child welfare in New Mexico, **House Floor Substitute for House Consumer and Public Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 46 (Chapter 51)** enacts the Family Representation and Advocacy Act. Among its provisions, the act creates an independent Office of Family Representation and Advocacy for children and families in abuse and neglect matters that present the potential risk of a child being placed in the custody of the Children, Youth and Families Department. The office will provide legal representation for parents and children in child welfare cases, including appeals before the New Mexico Court of Appeals and New Mexico Supreme Court. The director of the office is directed to establish at least five regional offices throughout the state. Also, the act creates a 13-member Family Representation and Advocacy Commission to oversee the office, including the review and approval of fair and consistent policies for the operation of the office.

To preserve Indian families and to ensure that adopted Indian children maintain cultural ties, the federal government enacted the Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978. Since 1978, there have been challenges to that federal act, and the United States Supreme Court has recently agreed to hear *Haaland v. Brackeen*, a case challenging the placement preferences required pursuant to the federal act. A group consisting of members of New Mexico's Indian nations, tribes and pueblos; representatives from the Children, Youth and Families Department, the Indian Affairs Department and the Human Services Department; and advocates and other stakeholders thus collaborated to develop a state law to preserve and expand the rights of New Mexico's Indian children and families. **House Health and Human Services Committee Substitute for House Bill 135 (Chapter 41)** enacts the Indian Family Protection Act, which codifies provisions of the federal act into state law, consolidates into the same short-title act several

previously existing provisions of the Children's Code pertaining to the adoption of Indian children and expands upon existing federal and state protections for Indian children and families. The bill requires that Indian nations, tribes and pueblos be notified of an investigation within 24 hours and be provided with: the ability to oppose termination of parental rights; the opportunity to have jurisdiction in cases and investigate through the tribal court system; the ability to determine who is considered part of the extended family or a preferred placement; and the ability to designate expert witnesses. Additionally, a staff member of the Children, Youth and Families Department is to be assigned to work with Indian children who are not in a preferred placement and must conduct monitoring every 30 days to determine whether the placement preferences provided by the Indian Family Protection Act are available. Furthermore, judges, lawyers and caseworkers are required to obtain training on the Indian Family Protection Act. Finally, a cultural compact is established to ensure that Indian children have access to their Indian communities, cultures and practices.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Of the 28 joint resolutions proposing amendments to the Constitution of New Mexico that were introduced in the 2022 session, two were passed by both houses and will appear on the November 8, 2022 ballot, along with Constitutional Amendment 1 that was passed by the legislature in the 2021 regular session. The LCS publishes an analysis of and arguments for and against proposed constitutional amendments prior to any election in which they appear. This publication, titled *Summary of and Arguments For and Against the Constitutional Amendments Proposed by the Legislature in 2021 and 2022*, is available at https://www.nmlegis.gov/Publications/Constitutional_Amendments.

For a number of years, various presenters to legislative interim committees have raised concerns about the challenge to get the private sector to invest in utility service line build-outs in some, particularly rural, communities. Factors cited have included challenging geological terrain, differing permitting requirements when crossing county and tribal regulatory jurisdictions, the low density of population and the general lack of civil engineering firms that work in rural areas. The issue has become an increasing topic of legislative discussion during the last two years as the state's efforts to address the need for distance learning and telemedicine during the COVID-19 pandemic have had to overcome limited or no residential access to broadband internet in many areas. To address the challenge, **House Joint Resolution 1 (C.A. 2)** proposes an amendment to Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico to allow the state to directly build residential service lines for internet, energy, water, wastewater or other similar utilities upon the enactment of implementing legislation to build utility service lines. It is anticipated that enacting legislation would specify any criteria, limitations and scope for such a program.

Under current constitutional law, when a vacancy occurs in the position of justice of the Supreme Court, judge of the Court of Appeals, district court judge or metropolitan court judge, the person

appointed to the position is up for election at the next general election following the appointment, which is often only a few months after appointment. According to testimony during the session, this approach has hindered recruitment for judgeships. **Senate Joint Resolution 3 (C.A. 3)** aims to address this challenge through proposing an amendment to Article 6, Section 35 of the Constitution of New Mexico to provide that the person appointed to the judgeship serve until the first general election after the person has served one year in the appointed position.

COURTS, CRIMINAL LAW, LAW ENFORCEMENT AND PUBLIC SAFETY

Largely in response to skyrocketing crime rates statewide, courts, criminal law, law enforcement and public safety were areas of concern during the 2022 regular session, with the vast majority of reforms enacted in these areas being compiled into one omnibus bill. Also enacted was a bill addressing temporary guardianships and conservatorships.

The omnibus crime bill, **House Judiciary Committee Substitute for House Bill 68 (Chapter 56)**, encompasses changes to criminal law, law enforcement, court structure, sentencing provisions and overall public safety. The bill creates a number of new crimes, including threatening a shooting, threatening a judge or immediate family member of a judge, maliciously sharing personal information of a judge or immediate family member of a judge, operating a chop shop and criminal damage to property by theft or attempted theft of regulated material, and it also prohibits the "gay panic" defense. The bill increases the statute of limitations for second degree murder, clarifies penalties for unlawful possession of a handgun, adds penalties for aggravated fleeing a law enforcement officer and provides a sentencing enhancement when a firearm is used in a drug transaction or serious violent offense. Additionally, the bill creates the Violence Intervention Program Fund and establishes application and reporting requirements for violence intervention program grants to state and local governmental entities. With regard to the courts, the bill creates additional judgeships in the second, fifth and thirteenth judicial districts. Also, the bill makes extensive changes to the licensing of law enforcement officers, as it creates the Law Enforcement Certification Board and the New Mexico Law Enforcement Standards and Training Council. Moreover, the bill provides enhanced death benefits for peace officers, New Mexico mounted patrol members and reserve police officers, expands the distribution of the Law Enforcement Protection Fund, creates the Law Enforcement Retention Fund and makes global positioning system data on defendants on pretrial release more accessible to law enforcement officers.

In 2018, the legislature passed comprehensive revisions to the Uniform Probate Code to address abuses in the cases of guardianships and conservatorships. In 2022, the enactment of **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 35 (Chapter 36)** addresses issues related to temporary

guardianships and conservatorships. Specifically, this bill: expands the reasons for a temporary guardianship or conservatorship to include serious harm to the safety or welfare of the alleged incapacitated person; requires a hearing is held no later than 10 business days from the date a motion for a guardian or conservator is filed and requires the court to appoint a guardian ad litem for the alleged incapacitated person; limits the temporary guardianship or conservatorship to 30 days, with one extension for no more than an additional 60 days; requires the alleged incapacitated person and the person's attorney to be personally served within 24 hours of the appointment of a temporary guardian or conservator; prohibits a temporary guardian or conservator from selling or disposing of any property belonging to the alleged incapacitated person without specific court authorization; and requires the temporary guardian or conservator to file an initial report within 15 days after appointment and a final report within 15 days of the termination of the temporary guardianship and/or conservatorship.

EDUCATION

Due in part to COVID-19 and its long-lasting effects on education, education-related topics accounted for a significant portion of the bills introduced in the 2022 regular session. There were 17 bills and two memorials introduced covering post-secondary education, and 53 bills, four constitutional amendments and 15 memorials introduced on public school topics. In the end, a number of education-related bills became law, including bills to: increase the minimum salary for public school teachers; create salary parity for individuals who hold a Native American language and culture certificate; increase teacher residency programs and stipends for program participants; increase funding opportunities for charter schools; and allow individuals who qualify to receive a tuition-free education at New Mexico public post-secondary educational institutions and tribal colleges.

Public Schools

In an effort to recruit and retain more teachers in New Mexico, **Senate Bill 1 (Chapter 28)** increases the statutory minimum salaries for teachers to the following: level 1 teachers, \$50,000; level 2 teachers, \$60,000; and level 3A teachers and counselors, \$70,000. School administrators, who are level 3B licensees, are paid a level 3A salary multiplied by the applicable responsibility factor.

To help alleviate teacher shortages in the state, **House Bill 13 (Chapter 17)** amends the Teacher Residency Act to clarify which candidates qualify for a teacher residency program and establishes a minimum three-year commitment by teaching residents to teach in the state. The bill requires the

secretary of public education to partner with PED-approved teacher preparation programs to establish and maintain more teacher residency programs across the state. The bill also increases the stipend amount that a teaching resident receives, provides stipends for teachers who serve as mentors in the program and provides stipends for principals at participating schools.

To address issues identified by the court in the consolidated case of *Yazzie/Martinez v. State of New Mexico*, tribal leaders collaborated with educational leaders to develop the tribal remedy framework. One component of that framework is **House Bill 60 (Chapter 40)**, a bill that creates salary parity for people who hold a Native American language and culture certificate, which is issued to those proficient in a Native American language and culture of a New Mexico Indian tribe or pueblo. House Bill 60 requires that the minimum annual salary of the certificate holder be the same as a level 1 licensed teacher. Further, the bill requires that the Indian tribe or pueblo enter into a memorandum of agreement with the PED to establish the criteria to receive a Native American language and culture certificate in a specific Native American language.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, many schools in the state were operating in a virtual or hybrid manner, which caused a drop in the number of students using school buses, thus affecting the formula for determining public school transportation allocations. **House Bill 57 (Chapter 9)** addresses the issue by requiring the PED to calculate the FY 2023 transportation allocations for school transportation based on data collected on the second and third reporting dates in FY 2020 and actual expenditures in FY 2019. Additionally, for state-chartered charter schools that were not operating transportation programs in FY 2019 or FY 2020, a temporary provision requires the PED to calculate a transportation distribution for these charter schools using FY 2022 data.

Charter schools' access to facility funding is increased through the passage of **House Bill 43 (Chapter 19)**. The bill creates the Charter School Facility Revolving Fund within the NMFA and authorizes the NMFA to make loans to a charter school for the purchase, construction, expansion or renovation of facilities or to pay off lease-purchase agreements. The NMFA is required to provide an annual report to the NMFA Oversight Committee that includes details regarding charter school facility loans. House Bill 43 requires school districts to provide state-chartered and locally chartered charter schools located within their boundaries an increased opportunity to lease, purchase or enter a lease-purchase agreement for all available facilities and land, adding a deadline of notifying charter schools of availability by May 1 each year. Additionally, school districts are now required to establish a process to collaborate with charter schools inside their geographic boundaries to include the charter schools in local bond elections pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act. Also, the formula for lease assistance funding is amended to be based on the gross square footage of facilities, rather than classroom space.

Public School Capital Outlay

To help smaller school districts that do not generate enough funding for larger projects, **House Bill 119 (Chapter 22)** increases discretionary capital outlay funding for school districts. The bill adjusts amounts used in calculating state distributions to school districts that impose a public school capital improvements tax and to charter schools within those school districts and creates an additional distribution to those school districts and charter schools, but prohibits the funds to be used for capital improvements to administration buildings of a school district.

Post-Secondary Education

For many New Mexicans who seek to further their education, tuition and fees at public higher education institutions are now fully covered. **Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 140 (Chapter 42)**, also known as the Opportunity Scholarship Act, provides a tuition-free education for eligible individuals at all of New Mexico's public post-secondary educational institutions and tribal colleges. To be eligible for an opportunity scholarship, a student must not have already received a baccalaureate degree and must be enrolled in a minimum of six credit hours per semester. To continue to receive the scholarship each semester, a student must maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale and not have been awarded an associate degree or a baccalaureate degree. The GAA provides \$63 million in nonrecurring funding and \$12 million in recurring funding to pay tuition and fees for New Mexico residents enrolled at least half-time at a public post-secondary educational institution or tribal college.

EMPLOYMENT AND LABOR

Workers' rights were bolstered this session with the passage of two employment- and labor-related bills, with one bill authorizing employees of certain research and development facilities formed pursuant to the University Research Park and Economic Development Act to exercise their right to organize, and the other increasing certainty for workers employed on public works projects relating to the determination and implementation of the prevailing wage rates and the prevailing fringe benefit rates.

The University Research Park and Economic Development Act enables universities to form research and development facilities, including health care facilities. Prior to this session, the act specified that with limited exceptions, research park corporations shall not be deemed an agency, public body or other political subdivision of the state. Therefore, it had been held that employees of a health care facility

were not eligible to form a union pursuant to the Public Employee Bargaining Act. **Senate Bill 41 (Chapter 44)** amends the University Research Park and Economic Development Act to provide that a research park corporation shall be considered a public employer for the purposes of the Public Employee Bargaining Act if it owns, operates or manages a health care facility or employs individuals who work at a health care facility.

Contractors and subcontractors working for the state or a political subdivision of the state on public works projects that are in excess of \$60,000, including construction, alteration, demolition or repair of public buildings or public roads, must pay their workers minimum wages and minimum fringe benefits, such as time off for sickness or injury, health insurance and other benefits of employment, pursuant to the Public Works Minimum Wage Act. The minimum wages and minimum fringe benefits, called the prevailing wage rate and prevailing fringe benefit rate, are determined, implemented and enforced by the director of the Labor Relations Division of the Workforce Solutions Department and are to be based on the same wage rates and fringe benefit rates used in collective bargaining agreements governing similar classifications of laborers and mechanics in the locality of the public works project. **Senate Bill 4 (Chapter 5)** makes two modifications to the Public Works Minimum Wage Act. First, it clarifies that the director is required to establish the prevailing wage rates and prevailing fringe benefit rates no later than October 1 of each year and that the rates will become effective beginning January 1 of the following year. Second, once the rates are established, the rates must continue in effect and are not to be automatically stayed if an administrative or legal challenge is brought to the establishment of a rate, except upon motion of a party or other interested person. This closes a loophole in the Public Works Minimum Wage Act whereby one contractor may delay implementation of a rate for thousands of workers simply by filing an appeal, regardless of whether the appeal challenges the appropriateness of the established rate.

ENERGY, ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Despite over 30 bills relating to energy, environment and natural resources being introduced in the session, only three were passed and signed by the governor. One bill addresses the long-standing problem of abandoned and unremediated uranium mine and mill sites in the state, and the other two bills address residential energy use.

For years, multiple interim legislative committees have heard testimony on the community impacts of legacy uranium mining and the need for a coordinated effort to clean up the more than 1,000 legacy uranium mine and mill sites in the state, 500 of which are on or near the Navajo Nation. **House**

Energy, Environment and Natural Resources Committee Substitute for House Bill 164 (Chapter 26) empowers the state to take a leading role in pursuing the cleanup of these legacy uranium mine and mill sites and, recognizing the complicated jurisdictional issues involved in uranium mining cleanup actions, directs the Department of Environment to coordinate efforts across the state, develop a strategic plan to tackle the immense cleanup effort needed and establish an effective mechanism to work with the federal government, Indian nations, tribes and pueblos and other affected communities. The legislation additionally requires the creation of a database of all uranium mine and mill sites and reclamation activities being undertaken in the state, including information about the jurisdiction of each site and each site's cleanup status. To support the work needed to be done, the Department of Environment and the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department are required to create uranium mine reclamation coordinator positions that will be dedicated to the state's uranium mine cleanup and reclamation activities, and the Department of Environment is directed to work with the Economic Development Department, the Workforce Solutions Department and industry to establish uranium mine and mill reclamation as a target economic development industry in New Mexico. The Uranium Mining Reclamation Revolving Fund is also created as a repository for funding, including awards or settlements from uranium mining-related litigation, for the Department of Environment and Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department to undertake reclamation projects.

In December 2021, the Public Regulation Commission and the Office of the Attorney General reported that they received a number of complaints from liquefied petroleum (LP) gas users in northern New Mexico who were not receiving gas as the area was facing a brutal winter storm with prolonged cold temperatures. The law at that time did not give the Regulation and Licensing Department any leeway in forcing the delivery of LP gas. As people who live in rural areas know, propane tanks are usually owned by the LP gas dispenser, and the law did not allow for anyone other than the owner to dispense LP gas into an owner's tank. The legislature responded and passed **Senate Bill 141 (Chapter 34)**, which allows the LP Gas Bureau of the Regulation and Licensing Department, in an emergency, to require the owner either to deliver the LP gas or allow another LP gas dispenser to deliver LP gas to the tank user. An emergency is defined as "a situation in which the state, a county or municipality or a tribal government issues a declaration finding in whole or in part that a lack of LP gas for heating, cooling or refrigeration is endangering customers' health or safety".

On average, low-income households nationwide spend three times more of their income on energy than households that are not low-income. In New Mexico, this translates to a household living below the federal poverty line spending between 14% and 37% of its income on energy. **House Bill 37 (Chapter 10)** aims to lessen the energy burden on low-income communities across the state by creating the Community Energy Efficiency Development Program to be administered by the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department. The program allows cities, counties, Indian nations, tribes and pueblos

and the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority to apply for grants for community energy efficiency projects that in the aggregate reduce energy consumption, energy-related operating costs or the carbon intensity of energy consumption for low-income housing and underserved communities.

FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

Leading up to the 2022 regular session, small loan interest rates and the availability of housing were two widely reported topics. To address what many saw as predatory small loan interest rates, the legislature lowered the existing interest rate cap to 36%. For affordable housing, the legislature earmarked a small percentage of the available annual severance tax bonding capacity to be used by the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority to produce and preserve housing statewide.

Predatory lending found itself in the public spotlight during the 2022 regular session, and **House Bill 132 (Chapter 23)** was passed and signed to address this issue. The bill amends the New Mexico Bank Installment Loan Act of 1959 and the New Mexico Small Loan Act of 1955 to broaden the types of loans made pursuant to those acts by increasing the ceiling for affected loans from \$5,000 to up to \$10,000. Previously, lenders could make these loans with interest rates of up to 175%. The bill lowers the interest rate cap to 36% in most circumstances, provided that certain additional small fees may be collected. Also, the bill clarifies certain licensing and reporting requirements for lenders.

Affordable housing and housing availability have been perennially discussed issues; however, the COVID-19 public health emergency both exacerbated and further highlighted needs for more accessible housing statewide. **Senate Bill 134 (Chapter 38)** allocates a small percentage of the available annual severance tax bonding capacity for the New Mexico Housing Trust Fund to be used by the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority for the production and preservation of housing throughout the state.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Two bills related to health and human services were passed by the legislature and signed into law this session: one that makes the Health Care Quality Surcharge Act permanent; and one that expands the scope of a program to prevent overdoses and other negative health outcomes related to drug use.

In 2019, the Health Care Quality Surcharge Act was enacted to provide funding for increased per diem and reimbursement rates for skilled nursing and intermediate care facilities based upon quality performance data. **Senate Bill 40 (Chapter 37)** removes the delayed repeal provision from the Health Care Quality Surcharge Act. Thus, the Health Care Quality Surcharge Act will not be repealed upon the original delayed repeal date of January 1, 2023.

Enacted 25 years ago, the Harm Reduction Act created the Department of Health's Harm Reduction Program, which targeted intravenous heroin users. In addition to education and treatment,

the program provided participants with sterile supplies to reduce blood-borne diseases. In recent years, however, the Department of Health has reported a decline in intravenous heroin use and a spike in synthetic opioid consumption and related overdose deaths. Fentanyl, a synthetic opioid used for severe pain relief, was responsible for over 300 overdose deaths in New Mexico in 2020. In addition to its high potency, fentanyl is often mixed with other substances on the illicit drug market at inconsistent and potentially lethal levels. To address this recent development, **House Bill 52 (Chapter 4)** amends the Harm Reduction Act and the Criminal Code in order to make the Harm Reduction Program better equipped to respond to the current situation and more prepared for future circumstances. For example, the bill enables the Department of Health to develop guidelines to identify and authorize the distribution of additional items through the Harm Reduction Program, such as certain testing materials to screen drugs for fentanyl or other dangerous adulterants. It also adds language to clarify the process for registering and identifying program participants. Finally, to ensure that the expansion of the Harm Reduction Program does not create criminal liability for distributing additional supplies or devices authorized by the Department of Health, which were classified as illegal paraphernalia, the bill amends the Criminal Code to make possession of those items not a violation of the Controlled Substances Act.

INDIAN AND INTERGOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS

During the 2019 regular session, the legislature unanimously passed a bill to create the 11-member Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Task Force, which was tasked with conducting a study to determine how to increase state resources for reporting and identifying missing and murdered indigenous women in the state. The task force reported its initial findings to the legislature and the governor in 2020, but it was dissolved in June 2021. The governor, through Executive Order 2021-013, re-established the task force to continue its work and to develop legislation that would address the inequities in reporting and identifying missing indigenous women and relatives. In the 2022 regular session, two pieces of legislation that derived from the work of the task force became law.

Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 12 (Chapter 2) provides the Office of the Attorney General with the duty to investigate and prosecute all missing persons cases in which one or more of the victims is reasonably believed to be an indigenous person, and it creates the position of a "missing indigenous persons specialist" within the Office of the Attorney General. The missing indigenous persons specialist will work in collaboration with local, state, federal and tribal law enforcement agencies on missing indigenous persons cases pursuant to the Missing Persons Information and Reporting Act. In addition, the bill creates the Partnership in Native American Communities Network Grant Program and the Partnership in Native American Communities Network. The network is

an online portal where the 23 sovereign New Mexico Indian nations, tribes and pueblos are able to input data regarding missing and murdered indigenous women and relatives from their communities, while the grant program awards grants to develop and administer the network and grants to the Indian nations, tribes and pueblos to create and maintain access to the network.

The second piece of legislation, **Senate Bill 13 (Chapter 3)**, creates a "missing in New Mexico event" and tasks the Department of Public Safety and the Missing Persons Information Clearinghouse to annually hold this one-day event in which family members of missing people can come together, both in person and online, to file missing persons reports, update missing persons reports, submit DNA records and meet with local, state, tribal and federal law enforcement officers. The missing in New Mexico event will also provide the opportunity for family members of missing people to access support services as well as media outlets to distribute information about missing relatives to the general public.

INSURANCE

Two bills relating to insurance, one dealing with health coverage and the other regarding reinsurance, were passed by the legislature and signed by the governor this session.

House Bill 95 (Chapter 33) creates the Easy Enrollment Program, which provides a new approach for bringing health coverage to the uninsured. The Taxation and Revenue Department will revise tax forms, beginning with tax year 2022, to allow taxpayers to: indicate that they or members of their household are uninsured and interested in obtaining health coverage; provide consent to the Taxation and Revenue Department to share certain tax return information with the Human Services Department to determine whether taxpayers and their household members qualify for Medicaid programs; and provide consent to Human Services Department to enroll these individuals in a Medicaid program for which they qualify. The bill also amends the Tax Administration Act to allow for the sharing of certain tax information so that the Human Services Department can provide certain information to the New Mexico Health Insurance Exchange. Upon receiving this information, the exchange will determine whether uninsured taxpayers who do not qualify for Medicaid are eligible to enroll in one of the plans it offers at no cost, and it will provide enrollment information and create a special enrollment period.

Senate Bill 150 (Chapter 35) repeals the existing section of the New Mexico Insurance Code regarding reinsurance and replaces it with the Credit for Reinsurance Act, which is based upon a model act provided by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners. The new act is necessary to bring New Mexico law regarding reinsurance into conformance with the United States covered agreements with

the European Union and United Kingdom, which prohibit less favorable treatment of a non-United States insurer domiciled in a foreign jurisdiction. Enactment of the Credit for Reinsurance Act prevents state law regarding reinsurance from being preempted by federal law.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AND SPECIAL DISTRICTS

During the 2022 regular session, one bill was enacted into law regarding local governments and special districts that addresses funding for land grants. In 2004, the legislature clarified the status of community land grants by designating them as political subdivisions of the state similar to special districts. However, community land grants do not have taxing authority and have often struggled to fund the operations of their governing boards and provide community services. Starting in FY 2024, **House Bill 8 (Chapter 32)** provides some baseline funding to community land grants by dedicating .05% of the state's gross receipts tax revenues into the newly created Land Grant-Merced Assistance Fund that is then divided among the community land grants in amounts based on their previous year's budget. To qualify for the funding, a land grant must submit its previous year's budget to the Department of Finance and Administration, be in compliance with its responsibilities pursuant to Chapter 49, Article 1 or 4 NMSA 1978, including having a duly elected board, and be in compliance with the state's Audit Act. The yearly amount available for distribution will vary each year, but the amount distributed to a given land grant is determined by the revenue that land grant generated from other sources in the previous year as follows: annual revenue of less than \$50,000 equals a full distribution; annual revenue of \$50,000 to \$250,000 equals a 75% distribution; annual revenue of \$250,000 to \$500,000 equals a 50% distribution; and annual revenue over \$500,000 equals a 25% distribution. In years when some land grants do not receive a full distribution, not all of the money dedicated to the program will be distributed. In those years, the undistributed money will revert to the General Fund.

MOTOR VEHICLES AND TRANSPORTATION

Motor vehicle and transportation bills passed and signed into law in the 2022 regular session include those that affect the DOT's powers with regard to the delivery method of highway construction projects and that extend grants to fund new and expanded aviation routes. In addition, changes were made to the New Mexico Commercial Driver's License Act to come into compliance with federal requirements.

Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 84 (Chapter 12) enacts the Transportation Construction Manager General Contractor Act. In this bill, the secretary of transportation is permitted to use a construction manager general contractor delivery method on eligible highway construction or reconstruction projects. This delivery method involves a contract for

construction manager general contractor services that is procured separately from a contract for project design services and a contract for independent cost estimate services. A construction manager general contractor shall provide a range of preconstruction services and participate in project design, cost control, scheduling and value engineering efforts for the project and, if the second phase of the contract is entered into, provide the construction work for the project at a guaranteed maximum price for which the construction manager general contractor is financially responsible. Additionally, the bill sets forth the criteria to be considered before a decision to use the construction manager general contractor delivery method and procedures to be followed in awarding contracts using this method. While the bill eliminates the \$50 million cap for transportation projects using a design and build project delivery system, no more than 25% of the projects placed on the DOT's letting schedule in any calendar year may use the design and build project delivery method or the construction manager general contractor delivery method.

House Bill 171 (Chapter 11) amends the Rural Air Service Enhancement Act to broaden eligibility for grants from the Rural Air Service Enhancement Fund to new and expanded air routes and to increase the maximum passenger capacity of aircraft used from nine to 30 persons. The bill also increases the amount of grants and, if funds are available, allows the director of the Aviation Division of the DOT to extend the term of an existing grant up to three additional years.

In **House Bill 144 (Chapter 24)**, the New Mexico Commercial Driver's License Act is amended to align its provisions with federal law. Moving forward, commercial driver's licenses and permits will be issued under standards introduced in preparation for the state to come into compliance with the federal REAL ID Act of 2005. The bill defines the terms "nonresident" and "non-domicile" to have identical meanings to better follow federal terminology, and it adjusts age and training requirements for the issuance of commercial driver's licenses.

PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL LICENSURE

Making it easier for businesses to recruit qualified professionals from out-of-state and for people who have recently moved to the state to be employed in their professions were topics of legislative interest, as demonstrated by the enactment of two bills in the 2022 regular session.

To address a current shortage of veterinarians trained in the areas of zoological and marine veterinary medicine, **House Bill 56 (Chapter 8)** helps to alleviate the situation by allowing for the issuance of six-month temporary permits to nonresident veterinarians employed by or contracted with the state, a municipality or a county to provide veterinary services at nationally accredited zoos or aquariums located in the state.

Concerning occupational licensure across several professions, **House Commerce and Economic Development Committee Substitute for House Bill 191 (Chapter 39)**, while lengthy, is a fairly simple bill. Much of it is cleanup, correcting references to rulemaking, which is done pursuant to the State Rules Act, and including references to the Uniform Licensing Act, to which all professions and occupations in Chapter 61 NMSA 1978 are subject. The major change is the requirement that most licensing boards under the jurisdiction of the Regulation and Licensing Department must expedite the licensure in New Mexico of persons licensed in other licensing jurisdictions. A board has 30 days in which to issue a provisional license that is good for one year. A board may require a provisional license holder to take an examination before applying for a renewal license if the board requires one of New Mexicans for original licensure; it may also require a temporary or provisional licensee to show proof of insurance, if that is a requirement for regular licensure. In addition, the bill amends the Uniform Licensing Act and other provisions of Chapter 61 NMSA 1978 to clarify that the Constitution of New Mexico requires all fines to be deposited in the Current School Fund and are not to be retained by the licensing boards.

PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

For the 2022 regular session, the governor issued special messages to consider several bills relating to public retirement plans; however, only three ultimately became law. Two bills addressed the Educational Retirement Act, with one bill slightly increasing employer contributions to address fund solvency and the other bill providing a return-to-work option to allow recent retirees to return to the classroom without a loss of benefits. Additionally, benefits were increased for the legislative retirement plans due to an abundance of funding in the Legislative Retirement Fund.

Teachers have been in high demand as the state has faced a shortage of educators. To assist with addressing this demand, **House Bill 73 (Chapter 20)** provides an option for a recently retired educator to return to work without suspending the educator's retirement benefit. Under this additional return-to-work option, these educators are limited to 36 months of employment, and they are required to make the contributions that would otherwise be required of them.

To help address solvency issues faced by the Educational Retirement Fund, **Senate Bill 36 (Chapter 29)** provides a scheduled increase to the employer contribution for educational retirement by two percentage points over the previously required amounts. This provision is funded in the GAA.

The Legislative Retirement Fund has a current funded status of over 140%, meaning that the legislative retirement plans are funded in excess of the current benefit structure. **Senate Bill 159 (Chapter 16)** provides a slight increase in the calculation of retirement benefits, from 11% to 14% of the per diem rate at the time of retirement. Even with this increase in benefits, the plan is projected to remain funded above 100% into the future. The bill also provides a temporary buy-in for current and past legislators who

wish to join the retirement plan, provided that the legislator pays contributions for past years of credited service plus interest to the fund.

STATE GOVERNMENT

In the 2022 regular session, the legislature passed laws that affect the operation and entities of state government, including bills that provide: new powers and duties to the Early Childhood Education and Care Department; a delay to the termination of the State Racing Commission; an authorization to the Workforce Solutions Department to obtain background checks on employees who have access to federal tax information; a requirement for executive agencies to provide access to services for persons with limited English proficiency; and the repeal of a section of the Revised Uniform Law on Notarial Acts that allowed the public to request journal entries or audiovisual recordings. In addition, the Procurement Code is amended to increase preferences for New Mexico resident businesses and contractors and businesses located in whole or in part on an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo.

Entities

Senate Bill 38 (Chapter 30) includes a mixture of new powers and duties and statutory cleanup relevant to the Early Childhood Education and Care Department. For instance, the secretary of early childhood education and care is included in the membership of the Interagency Behavioral Health Purchasing Collaborative, the Governor's Commission on Disability and the Developmental Disabilities Council, and the duty to convene a Family Infant Toddler Interagency Coordinating Council is moved from the Department of Health to the Early Childhood Education and Care Department. Furthermore, the bill establishes the Early Childhood Education and Care Department as the licensing authority for child care facilities and gives it independent authority to require criminal history records checks through the Department of Public Safety and the Federal Bureau of Investigation for child care providers, employees and volunteers.

As required by the state's Sunset Act, the Legislative Finance Committee periodically reviews regulatory agencies to determine if they are still necessary and, if so, recommends legislation to delay the agencies' termination, or "sunset", dates. **Senate Bill 123 (Chapter 31)** extends the termination date of the State Racing Commission, which regulates horse racing in New Mexico, to July 1, 2027 and extends the repeal date of its governing statute, the Horse Racing Act, to July 1, 2028.

The federal Internal Revenue Service provides guidelines to ensure the security and confidentiality of federal tax information, including requiring that people who have access to federal tax information

undergo a state and federal background check. To comply with this requirement, the legislature passed **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 103 (Chapter 13)**, which provides authority to the Workforce Solutions Department to obtain background checks through the Department of Public Safety and the Federal Bureau of Investigation on employees, finalists for employment, contractors and subcontractors who have or may have access to federal tax information.

House Bill 22 (Chapter 18) amends the Executive Reorganization Act to require department secretaries to develop and implement a plan to provide meaningful access to services provided by their respective agencies to persons with limited English proficiency. This departmental plan is composed of a public assessment, conducted annually, that considers the language access needs during that year, the department's plan to meet the needs outlined in the annual report and the associated costs. To ensure accountability, this report is submitted by each executive agency to the governor and the Legislative Finance Committee annually.

Operations

During the 2021 regular session, the legislature passed the Revised Uniform Law on Notarial Acts. One section of that act, Section 14-14A-29 NMSA 1978, allowed members of the public to request, pursuant to the Inspection of Public Records Act, journal entries or audiovisual recordings related to a specific notarial act transaction. **House Bill 180 (Chapter 27)** repeals that section.

Property and Procurement

The Procurement Code has provided preferences for New Mexico-based businesses and contractors, businesses owned by New Mexico veterans and New Mexico-based veteran contractors. **Senate Floor Substitute for Senate Bill 39 (Chapter 6)** increases the preference for New Mexico resident businesses and contractors from 5% to 8% and doubles the eligibility of veteran businesses to include those with up to \$6 million in annual gross revenues. The bill eliminates the 10-year eligibility restriction for New Mexico resident veteran businesses and contractors and provides new preferences for New Mexico businesses on lands located in whole or in part on an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo in New Mexico with at least 51% ownership by an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo or by members of an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo, including Native American veteran-owned businesses and veteran contractors.

TAXATION

Continuing a trend since the 2020 regular session, the legislature again enacted multiple bills in the 2022 regular session to provide tax relief for individuals and businesses, led by this year's tax package

that is estimated to ultimately cost the General Fund a total of approximately \$1.75 billion in recurring and nonrecurring revenue by FY 2026.

This year's tax package, **House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 163 (Chapter 47)**, reduces certain tax rates and creates and amends various tax credits, deductions and exemptions. The provisions of the bill include:

- creating a one-time \$1,000 income tax credit for nurses employed by hospitals in New Mexico;
- creating a one-time 2021 income tax rebate of \$500 for heads of household, surviving spouses and married individuals filing joint returns with income of less than \$150,000; and \$250 for single individuals and married individuals filing separate returns with income of less than \$75,000;
- creating a child income tax credit for 10 years of \$25.00 to \$175 per qualifying child. The amount of credit is determined by the taxpayer's income;
- creating an income tax exemption for military retirement income starting at \$10,000 for taxable year 2022, \$20,000 for taxable year 2023 and \$30,000 for taxable years 2024 through 2026;
- exempting the social security income from income tax of married individuals with incomes of \$150,000 or less and single individuals with incomes of \$100,000 or less;
- extending the sunset date of the new solar market development income tax credit to January 1, 2032, increasing the aggregate cap of the credit and making the credit refundable and transferable;
- extending eligibility for the 2021 sustainable building tax credits, providing for an earlier sunset date for the credits and amending qualifications for the credits;
- defining "disclosed agency" in the Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax Act;
- reducing the 5.125% rate of the gross receipts tax and compensating tax by .125% in FY 2023, followed by another .125% reduction in FY 2024. The 5.125% rate will be restored if, between fiscal years 2025 through 2030, the General Fund transfer of revenues is less than 95% of the amount transferred in the previous fiscal year;
- creating gross receipts tax and governmental gross receipts tax deductions for the sale of certain business-to-business professional services to a manufacturer; and
- creating gross receipts tax and governmental gross receipts tax deductions for the sale of feminine hygiene products.

Various deductions pursuant to the Gross Receipts and Compensating Tax Act are amended by separate bills to expand a deduction as well as to extend several deductions' sunset dates. **Senate Bill 138 (Chapter 43)** expands a gross receipts tax deduction to receipts from a Medicare administrative contractor for medical and health care services. Bills extending sunset dates are as follows:

- **House Bill 39 (Chapter 50)** extends the sunset date to July 1, 2027 for gross receipts tax and governmental gross receipts tax deductions for nonathletic special events at New Mexico State University;

- **House Bill 67 (Chapter 45)** extends the sunset date to July 1, 2027 for the technology readiness gross receipts tax credit. The bill also changes the funding mechanism for the credit from a distribution from a dedicated fund to a typical credit that is applied against the taxpayer's gross receipts taxes due; and

- **House Bill 82 (Chapter 49)** extends the sunset date to July 1, 2032 for a gross receipts tax deduction for dialysis facilities. The bill also amends the definition of "dialysis facility" to an explicit definition instead of referencing a citation to a federal regulation.

If the motor vehicle excise tax is paid on a vehicle purchased on reservation or trust land within an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo, **House Bill 167 (Chapter 48)** provides a credit against the tax if a similar tax is paid to the Indian nation, tribe or pueblo where the vehicle is purchased.

The federal Tax Cuts and Jobs Act that came into effect in 2018 placed a cap on the deduction taxpayers could take for state and local taxes on a federal return. Since then, multiple states have enacted a pass-through entity-level tax election, such as the one created in **House Bill 102 (Chapter 46)**, to provide income tax relief for higher income individuals. The bill allows pass-through entities to elect to pay an entity-level tax in lieu of the withholding tax, and it also exempts income subject to the entity-level tax from the Income Tax Act and the Corporate Income and Franchise Tax Act.

FIFTY-FIFTH LEGISLATURE
SECOND SPECIAL SESSION, 2021

Every 10 years, after the United States decennial census figures are finalized, the New Mexico Legislature convenes a special session to redistrict congressional, state house and senate and Public Education Commission districts throughout the state. In the past two redistricting special sessions, the legislature met in early fall, and the courts ultimately had to adopt redistricting plans for most of the entities required to be redistricted. The Second Special Session of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature proved to be different, in that it convened in December 2021, largely due to delays in finalized census numbers caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, and in that the legislature and the governor were in agreement on the redistricting plans for the entities, four bills of which became law. During the special session that lasted 11 days, other legislation was passed and signed into law as well, which includes a general appropriations bill to allocate federal COVID-19 pandemic recovery funds and a bill to make timely amendments to the Medical Malpractice Act.

Of the 10 redistricting bills introduced in the House of Representatives and four redistricting bills introduced in the Senate, four were ultimately enacted into law: **Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 1 (Chapter 2)**, the new redistricting plan for the United States House of Representatives; **House Bill 8 (Chapter 6)**, the new redistricting plan for the New Mexico House of Representatives; **Senate Floor Substitute for Senate Judiciary Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 2 (Chapter 7)**, the new redistricting plan for the New Mexico Senate; and **House Floor Substitute for House State Government, Elections and Indian Affairs Committee Substitute for House Bill 9 (Chapter 3)**, the new plan for the 10 Public Education Commission districts.

In addition to **House Bill 1 (Chapter 1)**, the feed bill that pays for the special session costs, two other non-redistricting bills became law. To address financial issues caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, the United States Congress passed numerous pieces of legislation that provided significant amounts of stimulus funding to the states. One of those pieces of federal legislation is the federal American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA), which distributes \$1.75 billion to the state of New Mexico to be used through 2024. In response to a lawsuit filed by several members of the legislature, the New Mexico Supreme Court affirmed that the authority to appropriate this federal funding is held by the legislative branch, although it should be noted that at the time of writing this, a formal opinion has yet to be issued. Following the order issued by the court, and during the redistricting special session, **House Bill 2 (Chapter 4, p.v.)** was passed and chaptered. The bill transfers the remaining ARPA funding subject to the order, totaling \$1,069,175,000, to the Appropriation Contingency Fund and then appropriates a portion of those funds to numerous departments and funds for projects and programs statewide. Additionally, the bill makes appropriations from the ARPA Capital Projects Fund, with the three largest appropriations as follows: \$142.5 million for statewide infrastructure projects; \$123,066,812 for statewide broadband; and \$50 million for an acute care hospital in a county with a population of less than 100,000. See [Table 3](#) in [Appendix B](#) for further details of the appropriations.

For a law that saw very few changes since its inception in 1976, the Medical Malpractice Act went through much debate, negotiation, compromise and change in 2021. Introduced in the 2021 regular session, House Bill 75 made significant changes in the law in an attempt to salvage New Mexico's medical malpractice system and the Patient's Compensation Fund. The bill raised personal liability and recovery caps; phased out participation in the Patient's Compensation Fund by hospitals and outpatient facilities; required third-party administration and annual audits and actuarial studies of the fund; and required surcharges to be sufficient to eliminate the fund's deficit by December 31, 2026. During the second special session, to address concerns raised by physicians that they were unable to get malpractice insurance, which would necessitate some closing their offices come December 31, 2021, **House Bill 11 (Chapter 5)** was enacted to amend the phase-in of recovery caps and to distinguish between claims brought against outpatient health care facilities that are not majority-owned and -controlled by a hospital and against hospitals and outpatient health care facilities that are majority-owned and -controlled by a hospital. For those facilities that are not so owned and controlled, the phased recovery cap per occurrence is raised as follows: for 2022 and 2023 calendar years, \$750,000; for 2024, \$5 million; for 2025, \$5.5 million; for 2026, \$6 million; and for 2027 and subsequent years, adjusted annually by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers. For claims brought against a hospital or health care facility that is majority-owned and -controlled by a hospital, the phased recovery cap per occurrence is raised as follows: for 2022, \$4 million; for 2023, \$4.5 million; for 2024, \$5 million; for 2025, \$5.5 million; for 2026, \$6 million; and for 2027 and subsequent years, adjusted annually by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers.

FIFTY-FIFTH LEGISLATURE
THIRD SPECIAL SESSION, 2022

Due to record-high inflation, soaring gas prices and the governor's veto of a bill allocating \$50.4 million to a variety of projects selected by legislators, the legislature was called back to the State Capitol less than two months after the 2022 regular session adjourned. On April 5, 2022, the Third Special Session of the Fifty-Fifth Legislature was convened, which appears to be the first time three special sessions have occurred in a two-year legislative cycle. In one day, three bills were introduced and passed both houses to address topics outlined in the governor's proclamation.

As concerns quickly mounted regarding the high cost of food and \$4.00 per gallon gasoline, the legislature and governor agreed to put more money in the pockets of New Mexico residents. In addition to the tax rebates provided in House Taxation and Revenue Committee Substitute for House Bill 163 from the 2022 regular session, **House Bill 2 (Chapter 2)** provides supplemental income tax rebates to residents who file an income tax return for taxable year 2021. The supplemental rebates will equal \$1,000 for heads of household, surviving spouses and married individuals filing joint returns, and \$500 for single individuals and married individuals filing separate returns. The rebates will be divided into two equal payments, the first being made no later than June 30, 2022 and the second in August 2022. Residents who do not file a 2021 income tax return and apply to the Human Services Department may receive by July 1, 2022 a one-time relief payment of \$1,000 for households of married couples or single individuals with one or more dependents, and \$500 for households of single individuals without dependents. Twenty million dollars is appropriated for these relief payments, which will be made on a first-come, first-served basis until the appropriation is exhausted. If money in the General Fund is not sufficient to meet appropriations at the end of FY 2022 due to the cost of the rebates and relief payments, up to \$200 million may be transferred from the tax stabilization reserve to meet those appropriations.

Despite being passed unanimously by both houses in the 2022 regular session, the governor vetoed Senate Finance Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 48, also known as House Bill 2 junior. After much negotiation between the legislature and the executive, a slightly revamped House Bill 2 junior, **Senate Bill 1 (Chapter 3)**, was introduced in the third special session and ultimately signed into law by the governor. The projects from the regular session are, essentially, the same, but projects are moved to or from nonrecurring/recurring or moved to different funding agencies. Nonrecurring projects are funded for FY 2022 and FY 2023; recurring projects are funded for FY 2023. Senate Bill 1 appropriates a total of \$50.6 million from the General Fund, with a portion directed by each legislator. See [Table 8](#) in [Appendix B](#) for a breakdown of these appropriations. A temporary provision additionally requires the publication of a searchable list of the appropriations contained in the bill, including the name of each legislator who allocated a portion of the appropriation and the amount of the verified allocation.

Lastly, **House Bill 1 (Chapter 1)**, the feed bill paying for expenses of the third special session, was enacted. The bill also appropriates \$2 million from the State Capitol Maintenance Fund and \$2 million from legislative cash balances for State Capitol building system upgrades and renovations.

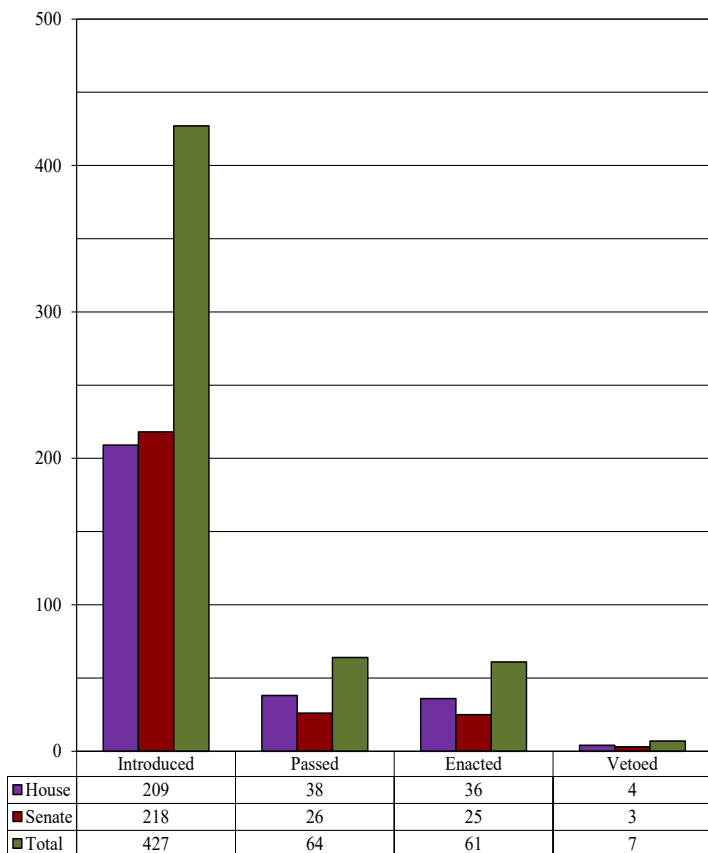

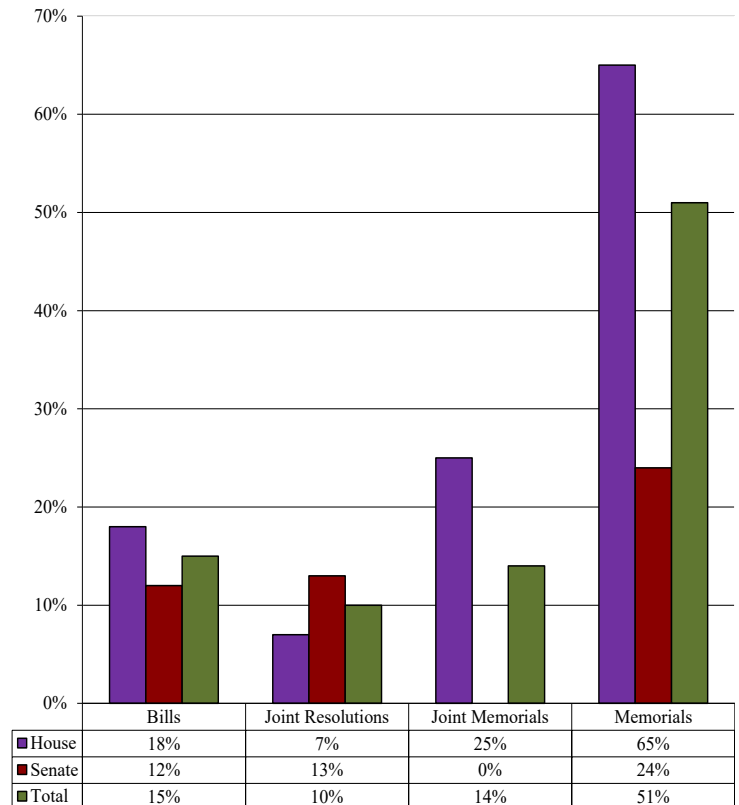

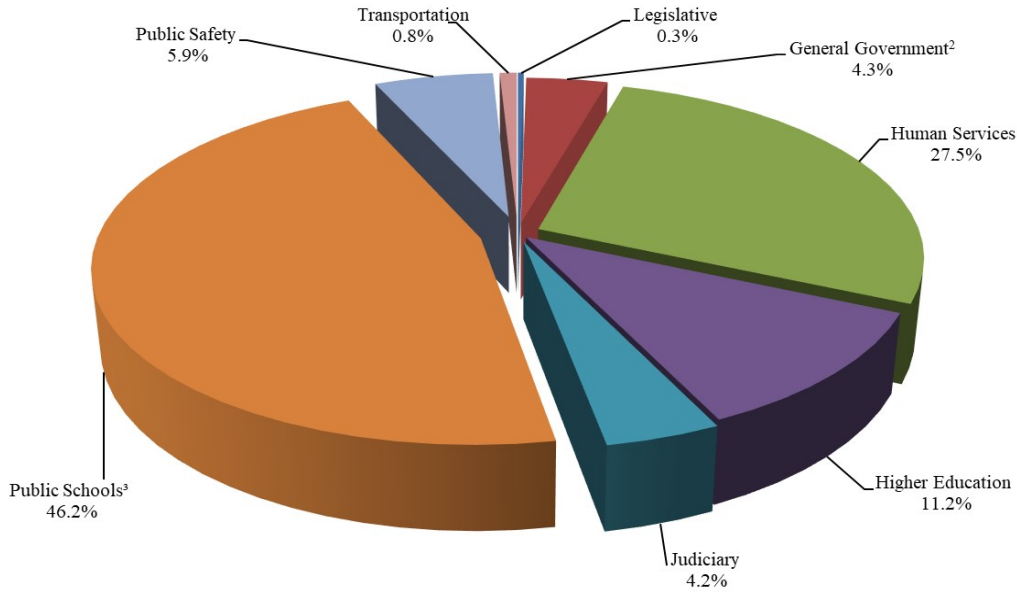

\$8,379,151,100¹**

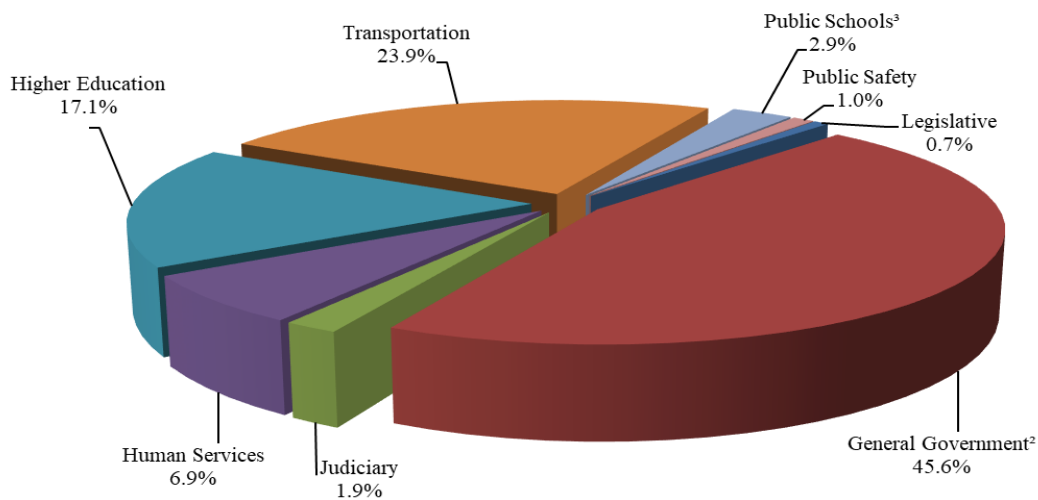

\$1,272,504,800¹**

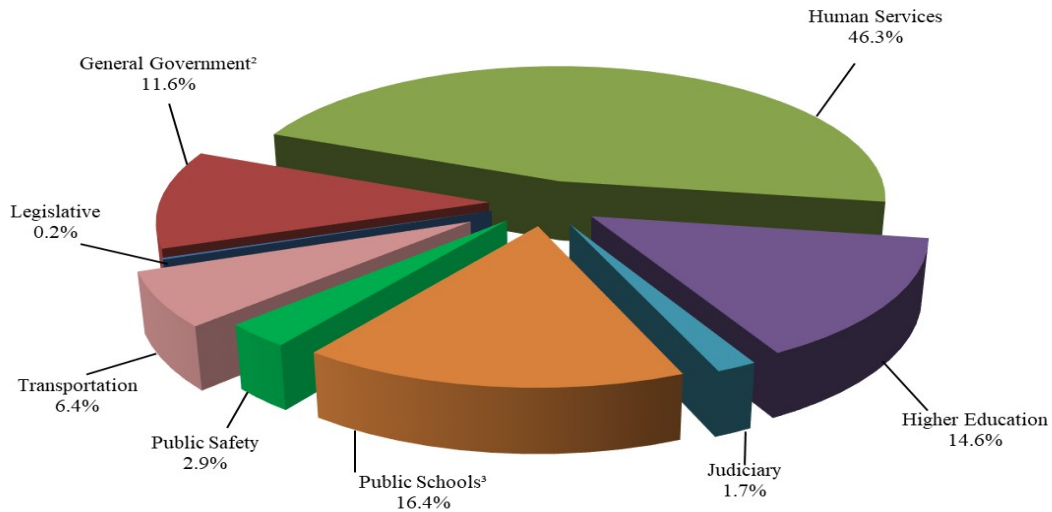

\$24,503,327,200¹**

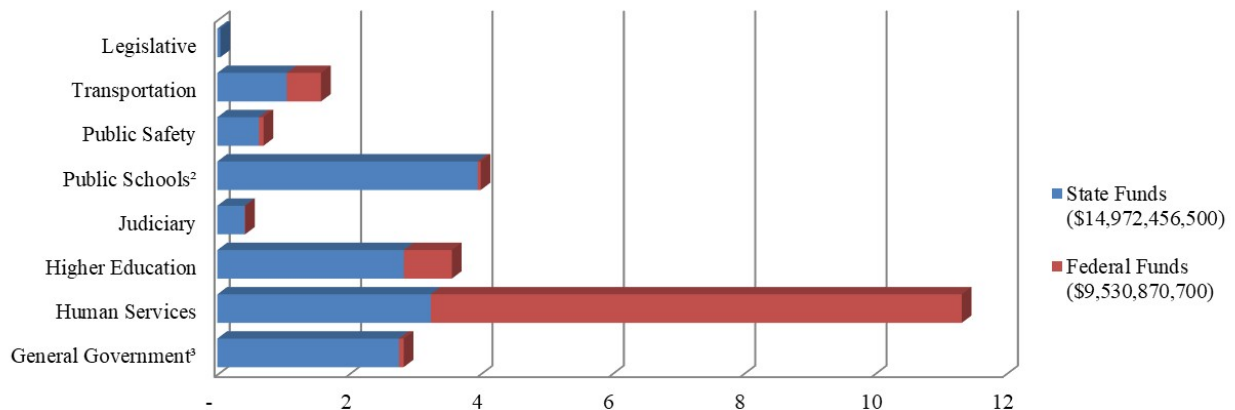

\$24,503,327,200**



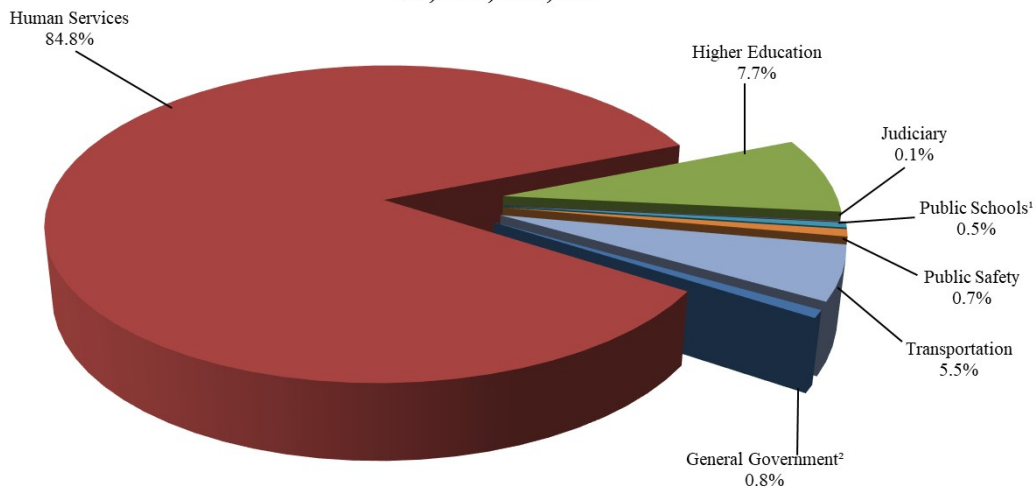

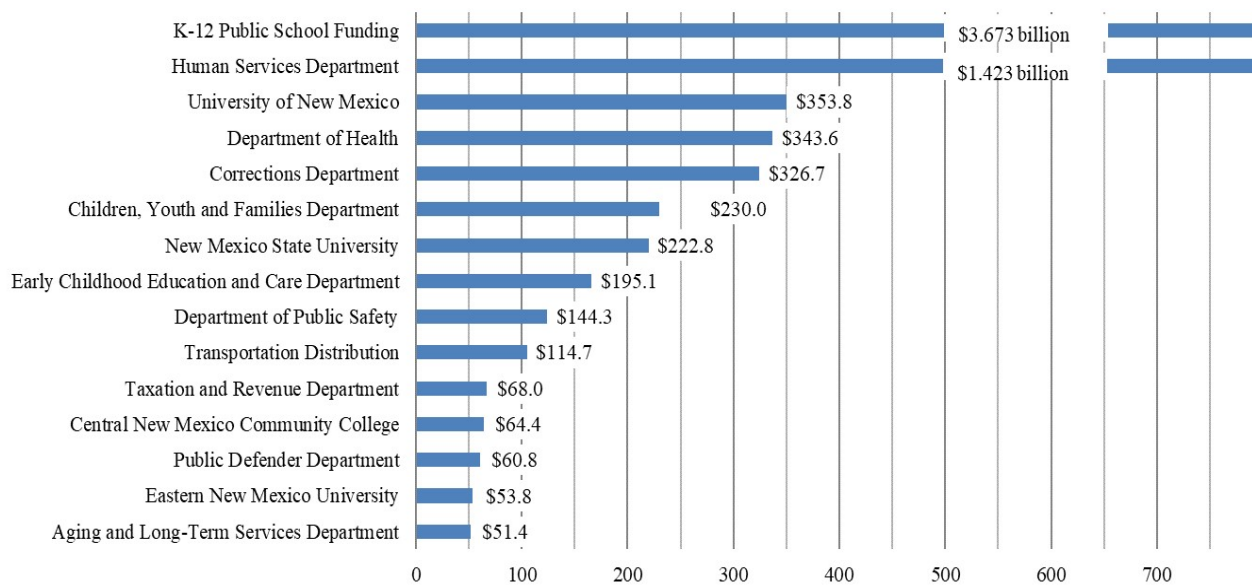

Since the appropriation is for the remainder of FY 2022 and for fiscal years 2023 through 2025, the legislature is within its authority to limit annual expenditures and awards to ensure that funding remains for the entire period. The governor's veto of "community policing" results in applicable portions of the appropriation: (1) open to more law enforcement agencies than just those that use or plan to use community policing; and (2) for police training and officer recruitment and retention other than stipends.

¹⁸ The Supreme Court has not issued its formal opinion on *State ex rel. Candelaria v. Lujan Grisham*. The question is whether ARPA funds, having been moved into the General Fund, have become state funds subject to constitutional limitations such as anti-donation and absolute control or whether they remain as federal funds able to be appropriated by the legislature and not subject to New Mexico constitutional limitations.

(Laws 2022, Chapter 53, p.v.)

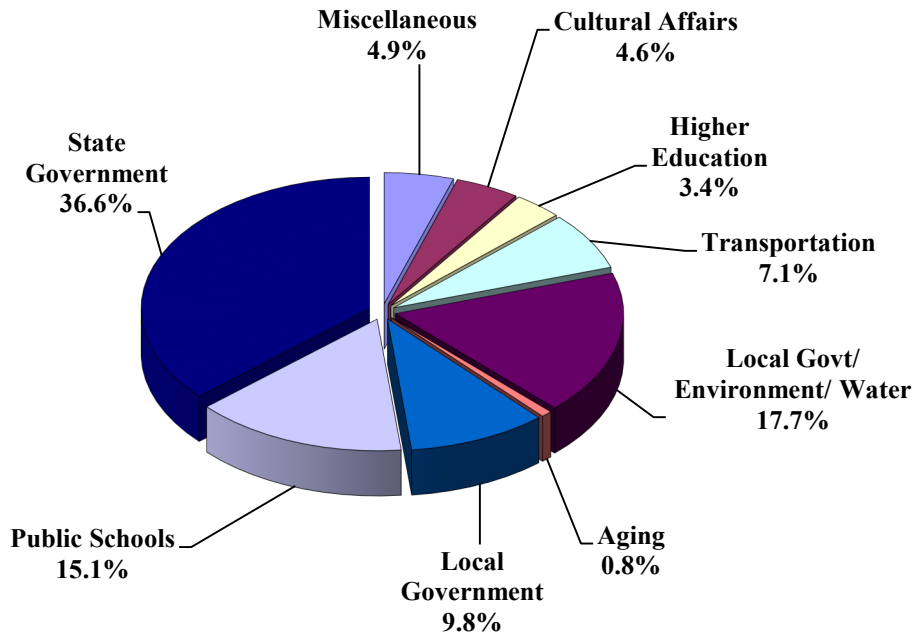

(Laws 2022, Chapter 55, p.v.)

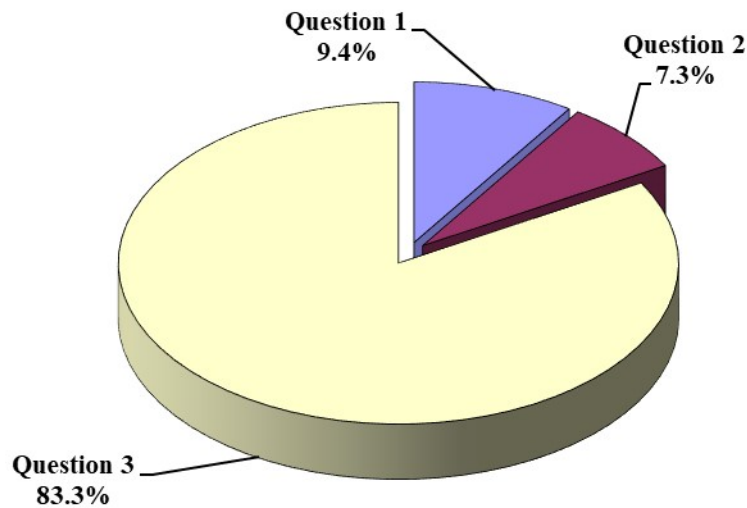

The legislature may reauthorize funds that have previously been appropriated for a particular project to change, expand or clarify the project purpose; to extend the expenditure or certification period for the project; or to change the project's location or administering agency.
