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15	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
16	SECTION 1. Section 1-19-29.1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1993,
17	Chapter 46, Section 6, as amended) is amended to read:
18	"1-19-29.1. CAMPAIGN FUNDSLIMITATION ON USE
19	A. It is unlawful for a candidate or the
20	candidate's agent to make an expenditure of contributions
21	received, except for the following purposes or as otherwise
22	provided in this section:
23	(1) expenditures of the campaign, <u>excluding</u>
24	<pre>personal expenses;</pre>
25	(2) expenditures of legislators that are

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1 reasonably related to performing the duties of the office held, 2 including mail, telephone and travel expenditures to serve 3 constituents, but excluding personal expenses and legislative 4 session living expenses; donations to the state general fund; 5 (3) donations to an organization to which a 6 (4) 7 federal income tax deduction would be permitted under Subparagraph (A) of Paragraph (1) of Subsection (b) of Section 8 9 170 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended; expenditures to eliminate the campaign 10 (5) debt of the candidate for the office sought or expenditures 11 12 incurred by the candidate when seeking election to another public office covered by the Campaign Reporting Act; 13 14 (6) donations to a political committee or to another candidate seeking election to public office; or 15 disbursements to return unused funds pro 16 (7) rata to the contributors if no campaign debt exists. 17 Β. A judge subject to a nonpartisan retention 18 19 election or a candidate for judicial office shall solicit or 20 accept campaign funds and return unused funds in accordance with the provisions of the Code of Judicial Conduct. 21 C. 1	(1) "expenditures of the campaign" means the
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	promoting of the nomination or election of the candidate who
3	established the campaign committee; provided that a candidate
4	for lieutenant governor may use funds raised in the election
5	cycle to support the candidate's joint candidacy for the
6	offices of governor and lieutenant governor. "Expenditures of
7	the campaign" includes:
8	(a) advertising in electronic and print
9	<u>media;</u>
10	(b) any other form of printed
11	advertising or communications, including "thank you"
12	advertising after the election;
13	(c) campaign items, including brochures,
14	leaflets, flyers, invitations, stationery, envelopes, reply
15	<u>cards, return envelopes, campaign business cards, direct</u>
16	mailings, postcards, palm cards, "thank you" notes, sample
17	ballots and other similar items;
18	(d) political banners and billboards;
19	<u>(e) political paraphernalia that is</u>
20	customarily given or sold to supporters, including campaign
21	buttons, stickers, pins, pencils, pens, matchbooks, balloons,
22	pads, calendars, magnets, key chains, hats, tee shirts,
23	sweatshirts, Frisbees, potholders, jar openers and similar
24	<u>items;</u>
25	(f) purchasing office supplies for
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1	campaign or political purposes, campaign photographs, permits
2	required by law, fundraiser prizes, postage, express mail
3	delivery services, bulk mail permits and computer supplies and
4	services;
5	<u>(g) banking service charges to maintain</u>
6	campaign and political accounts;
7	(h) subscriptions to newspapers and
8	periodicals that enhance the candidacy of the candidate or
9	party;
10	(i) lease or rental of office space for
11	campaign or political purposes and related expenses, including
12	furniture, parking, storage space, utilities and maintenance of
13	vehicles for campaign use only;
14	(j) lease, rental or use charges of any
15	ordinary and necessary campaign office equipment, including
16	copy machines, telephones, postage meters, facsimile machines
17	and computer hardware, software and printers;
18	<u>(k) compensation for campaign or</u>
19	campaign committee staff, fringe benefits and payroll taxes;
20	provided that the candidate and any member of the candidate's
21	family shall not receive compensation;
22	(1) travel, meals and lodging expenses
23	of speakers, campaign or campaign committee workers, the
24	candidate and the candidate's spouse for political and campaign
25	purposes;

2	(n) reimbursements to candidates and
3	<u>campaign or campaign committee workers made in accordance with</u>
4	the provisions of this section for expenditures of the campaign
5	for which a receipt is received by the treasurer;
6	<u>(o) campaign or campaign committee</u>
7	services of attorneys, accountants, consultants or other
8	professional persons for campaign activities, obtaining or
9	contesting ballot status, nomination or election and compliance
10	with the Election Code;
11	(p) auditing, accounting and filing of
12	<u>campaign finance reports;</u>
13	(q) conducting polls concerning any
14	political party, issue, candidate or individual;
15	<u>(r) gifts to campaign or campaign</u>
16	committee workers or purchasing flowers or other commemorative
17	items for political purposes not to exceed one hundred dollars
18	<u>(\$100) to any one recipient in a calendar year or for the</u>

20	(s) purchasing tickets or advertising
21	from charities, inaugural committees or other civic
22	organizations, if for a political purpose, for any candidate, a
23	candidate's spouse, a member of a candidate's campaign staff or
24	members of campaign committees;
25	(t) the inauguration of an elected
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1	<u>candidate;</u>
2	(u) hiring of halls, rooms, music and
3	other entertainment for political meetings and events; and
4	(v) any other necessary routine and
5	normally recognized campaign or political expense;
6	(2) "family" means an individual's spouse,
7	parents, children or siblings, by consanguinity or affinity;
8	and
9	(3) "personal expenses" means expenses for
10	personal use, including:
11	(a) expenditures to defray normal living
12	expenses for the candidate, the family of the candidate or any
13	other individual and expenditures for the personal benefit of
14	the candidate or any other individual having no direct
15	connection with, or effect upon, the campaign of the candidate
16	or the lawful purposes of the campaign committee;
17	(b) telephone, cell phone or internet
18	services for the candidate or candidate's family having no
19	direct connection with, or effect upon, the campaign of the
20	candidate or the lawful purposes of the campaign committee;
21	(c) clothing, shoes, jewelry, watches or
22	grooming for the candidate, including manicures, pedicures or
23	hair styling; and
24	(d) medical expenses of the candidate or
25	candidate's family, including all health care and alternative

	2	health insurance or deductibles, massages and gym or spa
