BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 174 (SB174) appropriates \$110 thousand to the Public Education Department (PED) for Las Cruces Public Schools (LCPS) to support the Engaging Latino Communities for Education (ENLACE) partnership program, a national initiative dedicated to increasing the number of Latino high school and college graduates.

FISCAL IMPACT

The bill appropriates \$110 thousand from the general fund to PED for expenditure in FY19. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY19 shall revert to the general fund.

SUBSTANTIVE ISSUES

ENLACE began as a pilot project created by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation as part of a national initiative to increase higher education attainment for Latino students. Currently in New Mexico, ENLACE is a statewide collaborative organized into five regions, central, eastern, northeastern, northwestern, and southern. The southern region, led by New Mexico State University (NMSU), partners with Hatch Valley Public Schools, Las Montañas Charter High School, Gadsden Independent School District, the Alliance for the Advancement of Teaching and Learning, and LCPS. ENLACE has been a partner with LCPS since 2000 serving students enrolled in Las Cruces High School, Mayfield High School, Oñate High School, Centennial High School, Lynn Middle School, Vista Middle School, and Mesa Middle School.

According to Southern New Mexico ENLACE (ENLACE Southern), between 2000 and 2011, 1,100 LCPS students participated in the program. Table 1 shows the participation numbers from 2012 to 2017.

According to ENLACE Southern, while LCPS student enrollment has more than doubled in the past five years, the program has experienced a nearly 50 percent budget cut. Prior to 2009, ENLACE Southern received \$300 thousand each fiscal year from the Legislature to support their partnerships in the region, including LCPS. After 2009, ENLACE Southern received \$175 thousand each fiscal year. ENLACE Southern has also been successful in receiving grant funding. In 2012, the program was awarded \$45 thousand from the Bridge of Southern New Mexico for parent engagement. In 2017, it was awarded \$23 thousand from the U.S. Department of Education for support of a parent engagement project in Southern New Mexico.

In 2017, 99 percent of 12th-grade students participating in ENLACE Southern graduated from high school and 79 percent enrolled at NMSU or Doña Ana Community College (DACC) (see Table 2).

ENLACE Southern employs NMSU students, many of whom are former ENLACE students, to serve as mentors to ENLACE public school students and assist in the day-to-day work of ENLACE in the schools and community. ENLACE provides culturally and linguistically relevant curricula, professional development, a network of support for ENLACE teachers, preparation for college entrance exams, and assistance with applying to college. Participating students conduct and present research projects at conferences and participate in school and community activities.

The mission of ENLACE Southern is "to develop and weave communities (programs) together to accomplish systemic changes which will improve educational outcomes for Latino students in southern New Mexico." ENLACE has been actively engaged in southern New Mexico school systems to provide social and academic support to multicultural, multilingual, and low-income students and their families as they prepare for higher education. It operates at the following LCPS schools: Centennial High School, Las Cruces High School, Mayfield High School, La Academia Dolores Huerta Charter School, Las Montañas Charter High School, and Oñate High School.

The majority of LCPS students, about 75 percent, are Latino. Table 3 shows the four-year graduation rates for groups of students statewide and at LCPS for the cohort of 2016.
