A licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed 4 nutritionist may accept or transmit oral, verbal or delegated or electronically transmitted orders from the referring provider consistent with applicable laws and rules, including 7 any protocols established to implement medical nutrition 8 therapy.

9 D. A licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed 10 nutritionist may order patient diets, including therapeutic 11 diets, pursuant to this section. Oral therapeutic diets may be 12 ordered by either a licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed 13 nutritionist. Therapeutic diets include enteral and parenteral 14 nutrition therapy that consist of specialized enteral or 15 intravenous solutions and shall only be ordered by an 16 individual licensed pursuant to the Nutrition and Dietetics 17 Practice Act who also meets one of the following criteria:

(1) the individual is a registered dietitian nutritionist registered with the commission on dietetic registration;

the individual is a certified nutrition (2) support clinician certified by the national board of nutrition support certification; or

(3) the individual meets other requirements as determined by the board, consistent with competencies necessary .219732.1

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1 for evaluating, ordering and administrating enteral and 2 parenteral nutrition.

E. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the ability of any other licensed health care provider in this state to order therapeutic diets, so long as the ordering of therapeutic diets falls within the scope of the license held by the health care provider.

F. A licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed nutritionist may order medical laboratory tests related to nutritional therapeutic treatments consistent with state law.

G. A licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed nutritionist may implement prescription drug dose adjustments for specific disease treatment protocols within the limits of their knowledge, skills, judgment and current evidence-informed clinical practice guidelines as indicated in a facilityapproved protocol and as approved and delegated by a licensed prescribing physician.

H. Licensed dietitian nutritionists and licensed nutritionists may advise a patient or client under the care of that licensed dietitian nutritionist or licensed nutritionist to consume vitamin, mineral and other nutritional supplements or discontinue use of unnecessary vitamin and mineral supplements.

I. Nothing in this section shall be construed to licensees practicing pursuant to the Nutrition and Dietetics .219732.1 - 19 -

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Practice Act to prescribe or initiate drug treatment."

A person who is not licensed as a dietitian nutritionist or nutritionist pursuant to the Nutrition and 13 14 Dietetics Practice Act shall not: 15 (1) provide medical nutrition therapy with or 16 without compensation; or 17 (2) allow a business entity or a business entity's employees, agents or representatives to use any other 18 19 title, designation, words, letters, abbreviations or insignia 20 indicating that the person is a provider of medical nutrition therapy or licensed under the Nutrition and Dietetics Practice 21 22 Act. Nothing in this section shall be construed to 23 Ε. prohibit an individual from using a title trademarked by the 24 25 United States patent and trademark office."
