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AN ACT

MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE FISCAL YEAR 2021 APPROPRIATIONS.--

A. The following amounts are appropriated from legislative cash balances to the legislature for expenditure in fiscal years 2021 and 2022, and unexpended ~~or unencumbered~~ balances remaining at the end of fiscal year 2022 shall revert to legislative cash balances:

(1) one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for redistricting expenses;

(2) one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) for the capitol buildings planning commission; and

(3) three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000) for the citizen redistricting committee, contingent on enactment of Senate Rules Committee Substitute for Senate Bills 15 and 199 or similar legislation of the first session of the fifty-fifth legislature.

B. Five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) is appropriated from the state capitol maintenance fund to the legislature for expenditure in fiscal years 2021 and 2022 for capitol security and building upgrades, and the unexpended ~~or unencumbered~~ balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2022 shall revert to the state capitol maintenance fund.

1           C. One hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) is  
2 appropriated from the general fund to the legislative council  
3 service for expenditure in fiscal years 2021 and 2022 for a  
4 task force to consider a moratorium on private detention  
5 facilities, and any unexpended ~~or unencumbered~~ balance  
6 remaining at the end of fiscal year 2022 shall revert to the  
7 general fund.

8           SECTION 2. JUDICIAL FISCAL YEAR 2021 APPROPRIATIONS.--

9           A. The appropriations in this section are from the  
10 general fund for expenditure in fiscal years 2021 and 2022  
11 for the purposes specified. Unless otherwise indicated, the  
12 unexpended ~~or unencumbered~~ balance of an appropriation in  
13 this section at the end of fiscal year 2022 shall revert to  
14 the general fund.

14 dollars (\$150,000) is appropriated to carry out the purposes  
15 of the fund and shall not revert.

2 (\$2,500,000) shall be expended until the department of  
3 information technology submits an expenditure plan to the  
4 legislative finance committee. The appropriation is  
5 contingent on enactment of House Bill 10 or similar  
6 legislation in the first session of the fifty-fifth  
7 legislature creating the fund.

8 C. To the economic development department, ten  
9 million dollars (\$10,000,000) is appropriated from the  
10 general fund for projects that support emerging broadband  
11 technology pursuant to the Local Economic Development Act.

12 SECTION 18. UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE APPROPRIATION.--

13 A. One hundred million dollars (\$100,000,000) is  
14 appropriated from the general fund to the workforce solutions  
15 department to repay federal unemployment trust fund loans  
16 pursuant to 42 U.S.C. Section 1321-1324 in fiscal year 2021.  
17 Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end  
18 of fiscal year 2021 shall revert to the general fund.

19 B. If a determination by both the secretary of  
20 finance and administration and the secretary of workforce  
21 solutions is made that no eligible federal assistance exists  
22 either through federal loan forgiveness for unemployment  
23 trust fund loans or federal coronavirus disease 2019 pandemic  
24 aid directed to the state is available to forgive or to repay  
25 any outstanding federal unemployment loans pursuant to 42

1 U.S.C. Section 1321-1324 in fiscal year 2021 or fiscal year  
2 2022, the state board of finance may authorize up to two  
3 hundred million dollars (\$200,000,000) from the general fund  
4 operating reserve to repay federal unemployment loans in  
5 fiscal year 2022.

6 SECTION 19. TRIBAL EDUCATION APPROPRIATIONS.--

7 A. The following amounts are appropriated from the  
8 public education reform fund to the public education  
9 department for expenditure in fiscal years 2021 through 2023  
10 for the following purposes:

11 (1) four million five hundred thousand  
12 dollars (\$4,500,000) for tribal education departments in each  
13 of New Mexico's twenty-three nations, tribes and pueblos to  
14 develop and implement education blueprints and governance  
15 structures, engage in collaborations with school districts  
16 and plan and deliver community-based education programs and  
17 social support services for Native American students; and

18 (2) four million five hundred thousand  
19 dollars (\$4,500,000) for tribal libraries in each of New  
20 Mexico's twenty-three nations, tribes and pueblos to develop  
21 and staff culturally and linguistically relevant after-school  
22 student services and community-based summer programs.

23 B. One million six hundred fifteen thousand seven  
24 hundred dollars (\$1,615,700) is appropriated from the general  
25 fund to the public education department for tribally based

1 Native American language programs to plan and develop  
2 programs; recruit, train and certify language teachers;  
3 coordinate curriculum and materials development; and develop  
4 culturally and linguistically appropriate student, teacher  
5 and program assessments and evaluations.

6 C. Any remaining balances from these  
7 appropriations at the end of fiscal year 2023 shall revert to  
8 the public education reform fund or the general fund, as  
9 applicable." \_\_\_\_\_

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
