SUMMARY

Synopsis of Senate Bill 162

Senate Bill 162, (SB162) would appropriate \$1.8 million from the general fund to the Human Services Department to provide funding to an organization in Dona Ana County implementing a transitional housing program in an approximately 32 bed facility for people with serious mental illnesses (SMI), people who have substance use disorder (SUD), and people who have recently been released from incarceration.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$1,843.0 contained in this bill is a nonrecurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY24 shall revert to the general fund.

The Behavioral Health Services Division (BHSD) of the Human Services Department (HSD) reports BHSD operates three crisis housing units each with budgets of \$40 thousand annually. Increasing the budget of this program by 150 percent as proposed in the bill would require additional staff time of 0.5 FTE pay band 70, calculated at \$49.5 thousand annually including salary, fringe benefits, and operational costs.

SB162 relates to an appropriation in the General Appropriation Act including \$1 million recurring funding in the LFC recommendation for the Linkages housing program at BHSD and \$20 million in nonrecurring funding for the Linkages housing program in the Executive's special appropriation recommendation.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

BHSD notes, according to the New Mexico Coalition to End Homelessness Point in Time Report, as of January 2022, there were 154 unhoused and unsheltered individuals in Doña Ana County.

BHSD's crisis housing program provides temporary, transitional housing for individuals who would otherwise be homeless and with serious mental illness being discharged from psychiatric centers, hospitals, jails, or other institutional settings. The program offers 120-day maximum stay in short-term housing with support services to include and not limited to life skills, income entitlements reinstatement assistance, employment, and support with finding permanent housing in the community of choice. The program serves approximately 45 to 50 single beneficiaries annually.

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
