SUMMARY

Synopsis of House Memorial 32

House Memorial 32 (HM32) calls for the Indian Affairs Department and the Commission on the Status of Women to conduct a comprehensive study into the history, scope, and continuing impacts of the forced sterilization of Indigenous women and women of color in New Mexico.

The study is to include a list of all known and potential cases of forced or coerced sterilization conducted through the U.S. Indian Health Services or their contracted health providers, a record of survivor testimony, an assessment of the accessibility of reproductive health services for Indigenous women and other women of color, and a review of educational, policy, and potential reparations with recommendations.

The study—with proposals to establish a “truth and reconciliation commission,” a statewide

reproductive justice program, and a public memorial—should be presented to the governor and Legislature no later than December 31, 2027.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Memorials do not contain appropriations and are not enforceable as state law. However, the study requested in this memorial is outside of the normal operations of the agencies involved and is likely to result in additional costs for the agencies of up to \$100 thousand for staff time, travel, and contracted services.

The Commission on the Status of Women notes that without an appropriation, they are unable to complete the work outlined in HM32.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

Indigenous women and women of color in New Mexico were subjected to forced sterilizations until 2018, according to the memorial. The federal Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Indian Health Service often engaged in forced sterilizations of Indigenous women. The memorial says research dating to the 1970s indicates that between 25 and 50 percent of Indigenous women were sterilized, with some of the highest incident rates occurring in New Mexico.

The Indian Affairs Department notes that it may be difficult to obtain information from the Indian Health Services
