### SUMMARY

#### Synopsis of Senate Bill 195

Senate Bill 195 appropriates \$1 million from the general fund to the Department of Finance and Administration for the purpose of training elected officials who serve as supervisors for soil and water conservation districts statewide.

This bill does not contain an effective date and, as a result, would go into effect 90 days after the Legislature adjourns, which is May 20, 2026.

### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$1 million contained in this bill is a nonrecurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY27 shall revert to the general fund.

### SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

There are 27 soil and water conservation districts according to the New Mexico Association of Conservation Districts. New Mexico has more than 77 million acres of forest, range, cropland, pasture, and other lands.
