	1970, Chapter 9, Section 1, as amended by Laws 1989,

	amended to read:
	"21-1-2. MATRICULATION AND TUITION FEES
	A. Except as otherwise provided in this section
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1 and in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978, the boards of regents 2 of the university of New Mexico, New Mexico state univer-3 sity, New Mexico highlands university, western New Mexico 4 university, eastern New Mexico university, New Mexico 5 military institute, New Mexico institute of mining and ß technology and New Mexico junior college shall establish 7 and charge matriculation fees and tuition fees as follows: 8 (1)each student shall be charged a 9 matriculation fee of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) 10 11 upon enrolling in each institution; 12 each student who is a resident of New (2)13 Mexico shall be charged a tuition fee of not less than 14 twenty dollars (\$20.00) a year; 15 each student who is not a resident of (3)16 New Mexico shall be charged a tuition fee of not less than 17 fifty dollars (\$50.00) a year; 18 each student shall be charged a 19 (4) 20 tuition fee of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) for each 21 summer session; and 22 each student may be charged a tuition (5) 23 fee for extension courses. 24 Except as otherwise provided in this section **B**. 25 . SB0031 - 2 -

and in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978, the board of regents of northern New Mexico state school shall establish and charge each student a matriculation fee and a tuition fee.

С. The board of regents of each institution may establish and grant gratis scholarships to students who are residents of New Mexico [by waiving] in an amount not to exceed the matriculation fee or tuition and fees, or both. Except as provided in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978, the number of scholarships established and granted shall not exceed three percent of the preceding fall semester enrollment in each institution and shall not be established and granted for summer sessions. The president of each institution shall select and recommend to the board of regents of his institution, as recipients of scholarships, students who possess good moral character and satisfactory initiative, scholastic standing and At least thirty-three and one-third percent personality. of the gratis scholarships established and granted by each board of regents each year shall be granted on the basis of financial need.

D. The board of regents of each institution set out in this subsection may establish and grant, in

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1 addition to those scholarships provided for in Subsection 2 C of this section, athletic scholarships [by waiving] for 3 tuition and fees. In no event shall the board of regents 4 of any institution be allowed to [waive the] award 5 scholarships for tuition and fees for more than the number ß of athletic scholarships set out in this subsection and in 7 no event shall more than seventy-five percent of the 8 [waivers] scholarships granted be for out-of-state 9 10 residents: 11 the board of regents of the university (1) 12 of New Mexico may grant up to two hundred ninety-three 13 athletic scholarships; 14 the board of regents of New Mexico (2) 15 state university may grant up to two hundred seventy 16

(3) the boards of regents of New Mexico highlands university, eastern New Mexico university and western New Mexico university may each grant up to one hundred forty athletic scholarships; and

the board of regents of New Mexico (4) junior college [board] may grant up to fifty-two athletic schol arships.

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athletic scholarships;

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E. Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection D of this section, in computing tuition credits the commission on higher education shall accept the value of [waivers of] scholarships for tuition and fees established by the boards of regents of the university of New Mexico, New Mexico state university, eastern New Mexico university, western New Mexico university and New Mexico highlands university for athletes for the seventy-eighth fiscal year and all fiscal years thereafter. In no event shall the board of regents of any such institution be allowed to [waive the] establish scholarships for tuition and fees for more than the number of athletic scholarships permitted that institution by regulations and bylaws of the national collegiate athletic association or the national association of intercollegiate athletics of which that institution is a member.

F. Matriculation fees and tuition fees shall be fixed and made payable as directed by the board of regents of each institution, collected by the officers of each institution and accounted for as are other funds of the Matriculation fees shall be charged only institutions. once for each institution in which a student enrolls."

1 Section 21-1-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws Section 2. 2 1971, Chapter 235, Section 1) is amended to read: 3 "21-1-4. TUITION CHARGES--DEFINITIONS. --4 A. Except as provided in Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 5 1978. the state educational institutions set forth in ß Article 12, Section 11 of the [state] constitution of New 7 <u>Mexico</u> shall charge tuition, which is in addition to 8 earmarked fees, at rates provided by law. 9 10 B. During the regular academic year, "full-time 11 student" means a student who is taking twelve or more 12 credit-hours in one semester or quarter. Full-time 13 students during the academic year shall be charged tuition 14 at rates provided by law. 15 During the summer session, "full-time С. 16 student" means a student who is taking at least a minimum 17 number of credit-hours, which minimum is in the same 18 proportion to twelve credit-hours as the duration and 19 20 normal credit-hour load of the summer session in the 21 particular institution is to the duration and normal 22 credit-hour load of the institution's regular semester or 23 Full-time students in the summer session shall quarter. 24 be charged tuition at resident and nonresident rates in 25

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each institution, which rates shall be in the same proportion to the full-time resident and nonresident rates of that institution for the regular semester or quarter as the minimum number of credit-hours is to twelve hours.

"Part-time student" means a student who is D. taking less than the minimum number of credit-hours in a semester, quarter or summer session than that required for full-time student status. Part-time students shall be charged tuition at rates per semester- or quarter-credithour as provided by law.

Е. The [board of educational finance] commission on higher education shall define resident and nonresident students for the purpose of administering tuition charges in accordance with the constitution and statutes of the state and after consultation with the appropriate officials of the institutions concerned. Each institution shall use the uniform definitions so established in assessing and collecting tuition charges from students."

A new Section 21-1-4.3 NMSA 1978 is Section 3. enacted to read:

"21-1-4.3. [NEW MATERIAL] TUITION SCHOLARSHIPS

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AUTHORIZED--CERTAIN EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.--

A. To the extent that funds are made available by the legislature from the lottery tuition fund, the boards of regents of New Mexico state university, New Mexico institute of mining and technology, eastern New Mexico university, western New Mexico university, the university of New Mexico, New Mexico highlands university and northern New Mexico state school shall award tuition scholarships for qualified resident students attending their respective institutions and branches of those institutions.

B. Except as authorized in Subsection C of this section, the tuition scholarships authorized in this section shall apply only to full-time resident students who, immediately upon completion of a high school curriculum at a public or accredited private New Mexico high school, are accepted for entrance to and attend one of the state educational institutions set forth in this section or one of the branches of those institutions. Each tuition scholarship shall be awarded for up to four consecutive years beginning the second semester of the recipient's first year of enrollment, provided that the

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recipient has maintained residency in New Mexico and maintained a grade point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale during his first semester of full-time enrollment.

C. The tuition scholarships authorized in this section shall also apply to full-time resident students who, immediately upon completion of a high school curriculum at a public or accredited private New Mexico high school, attend a two-year public post-secondary educational institution in New Mexico and who, upon the completion of that curriculum or at the end of two years, whichever is sooner, transfer to one of the post-secondary state educational institutions set forth in this section. Those students shall be eligible for a tuition scholarship for two consecutive years, provided that those students maintain residency in New Mexico, maintain a grade-point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale and attend the institution full time during the regular academic year.

D. The commission on higher education shall prepare guidelines setting forth explicit student continuing eligibility criteria and guidelines for administration of the tuition scholarship program. Guidelines shall be distributed to the board of regents of

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each institution to enable a uniform availability of the resident student tuition scholarships."

Section 4. A new Section 21-1-4.4 NMSA 1978 is enacted to read:

"21-1-4.4. [<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION--DETERMINATION OF TUITION SCHOLARSHIPS--USE OF LOTTERY TUITION FUND. -- Prior to June 1 of each year, the commission on higher education shall determine the amount of money available for tuition scholarships at state public post-secondary educational institutions. Based on the amount appropriated by the legislature from the lottery tuition fund and on the projected enrollment at all public post-secondary educational institutions, the commission on higher education shall establish the percentage of tuition that shall be awarded for qualified resident students attending New Mexico public postsecondary educational institutions. The percentage of tuition awarded shall be the same for each institution, regardless of the actual cost of tuition at each institution."

Section 5. Section 21-13-10 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1963, Chapter 17, Section 9, as amended) is amended to

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"21-13-10. **BOARD DUTIES. - -**

A. It shall be the duty of the community college board to determine financial and educational policies of the community college. The community college board shall provide for the management of the community college and execution of these policies by selecting a competent president for the

community college, and, upon the president's recommendation, the board shall employ other administrative personnel, instructional staff or other personnel as may be needed for the operation, maintenance and administration of the community college.

**B**. The community college board shall have the power to fix tuition and fee rates for resident and nonresident students of the district, to accept gifts, to accept federal aid, to purchase, hold, sell and rent property and equipment and to promote the general welfare of the institution for the best interest of educational service to the people of the community college district.

C. To the extent that funds are made available by the legislature from the lottery tuition fund, the

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community college board shall award tuition scholarships for qualified resident students attending their respective institutions.

4 D. The tuition scholarships authorized in this 5 section shall apply only to full-time resident students who, immediately upon completion of a high school 7 curriculum at a public or accredited private New Mexico 8 high school, are accepted for entrance to and attend a 9 community college. Each tuition scholarship shall be 10 11 awarded for up to two consecutive years beginning the 12 second semester of the recipient's first year of 13 enrollment, provided that the recipient has maintained 14 residency in New Mexico and maintained a grade-point 15 average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale during his first 16 <u>semester of full-time enrollment.</u> 17

E. The commission on higher education shall prepare guidelines setting forth explicit student continuing eligibility criteria and guidelines for administration of the tuition scholarship program. Guidelines shall be distributed to community college boards to enable a uniform availability of the resident student tuition scholarship."

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A new section of the Technical and Section 6. Vocational Institute Act is enacted to read: 3 TUITION SCHOLARSHIPS AUTHORIZED. --"[NEW MATERIAL] Α. To the extent that funds are made available by the legislature from the lottery tuition fund, the board of a technical and vocational institute shall award tuition scholarships for qualified resident students attending a technical and vocational institute. **B**. The tuition scholarships authorized in this section shall apply only to full-time resident students 12 who, immediately upon completion of a high school 13 curriculum at a public or accredited private New Mexico 14 high school, are accepted for entrance to and attend a technical and vocational institute. Each tuition scholarship shall be awarded for up to two consecutive years beginning the second semester of the recipient's 18 first year of enrollment, provided that the recipient has 19 maintained residency in New Mexico and maintained a gradepoint average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale during his 22 first semester of full-time enrollment. 23

С. The commission on higher education shall prepare guidelines setting forth explicit student

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continuing eligibility criteria and guidelines for administration of the tuition scholarship program. Guidelines shall be distributed to the boards of technical and vocational institutes to enable a uniform availability of the resident student tuition scholarships."

Section 7. A new section of Chapter 21, Article 17 NMSA 1978 is enacted to read:

"[<u>NEW MATERIAL</u>] TUITION SCHOLARSHIPS AUTHORIZED. --

A. To the extent that funds are made available by the legislature from the lottery tuition fund, the board of an area vocational school shall award tuition scholarships for qualified resident students attending its area vocational school.

B. The tuition scholarships authorized in this section shall apply only to full-time resident students who, immediately upon completion of a high school curriculum at a public or accredited private New Mexico high school, are accepted for entrance to and attend an area vocational school. Each tuition scholarship shall be awarded for up to two consecutive years beginning the second semester of the recipient's first year of enrollment, provided that the recipient has maintained

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residency in New Mexico and maintained a grade-point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale during his first semester of full-time enrollment.

C. The commission on higher education shall prepare guidelines setting forth explicit student qualification criteria and guidelines for administration of the tuition scholarship program. Guidelines shall be distributed to the boards of all area vocational schools to enable a uniform availability of the resident student tuition scholarships."

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
