SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

House Bill 484 amends the Public School Code (Section 22-5-5 NMSA 1978) adding language stipulating that a local school board will vote, by majority, to determine a stipend amount to be received by local board members, not to exceed seventy-five dollars (\$75.00). The board member will only receive the stipend at the conclusion of the local school board meeting and may either elect to receive or waive the receipt of the stipend. The absence of an election will constitute a waiver of the stipend. The bill further provides that the members of a local school board are to receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The PED notes that many individual school board members currently receive per diem from their school districts to attend board meetings. The total amount spent statewide for board member per diem on single day meetings during FY12 was \$233 thousand. The total amount of stipends will be approximately the same amount. This may create an additional burden on the operational funds of those small rural districts with declining enrollment that are on emergency supplemental.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The PED reports that one unintended consequence of this bill is that school boards may elect to hold more meetings than is really needed to conduct the business of the district. Further, elected school board positions are unpaid positions and all candidates know or should know this when running for election. While provisions contained in this bill call the payment a stipend it is a form of compensation beyond per diem.
