SUMMARY

Synopsis of Bill

Senate Bill 253 enacts a new section of the Assessment and Accountability Act to require that New Mexico cease participation in the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) no later than July 1, 2017. SB253 also requires PED to design or contract for a new assessment beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Included in both the LFC and Executive budget recommendations for FY18 is \$6 million for PARCC Standards-based Assessments. It is uncertain if this amount would be sufficient to fund new student assessments in FY18.

In 2001, under the federal *No Child Left Behind Act*, every state was required to test students in mathematics and English language arts (ELA) in grades 3 to 8 and grade 11. That mandate is still in effect under the *Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015*. It might be possible to achieve some cost savings by not testing students in grades 9-10 which is the current practice in New Mexico

with PARCC.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

According to the PARCC website, PARCC is a consortium of states that work to create a standard set of K–12 assessments in mathematics and English language arts/literacy, based on the Common Core State Standards. The PARCC consortium was awarded Race to the Top assessment funds in September 2010 by the U.S. Department of Education to help in the development of the K–12 assessments. PARCC has included educators, administrators and postsecondary educators in the development of its assessments.

Prior to school year 2014, New Mexico used Standards-based Assessment for reading and mathematics. Subsequently, during school year 2014-2015, the Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) assessment for English language arts and mathematics was administered to students in 3rd-11th grade.

RELATIONSHIP

Relates to Senate Joint Memorial 1, which requests the public education department and the legislative education study committee to convene a working group to develop recommendations for a new student assessment policy aligned with the alternative assessment models allowed by the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).
