#### **SUMMARY**

## Synopsis of Senate Bill 235

Senate Bill 235 appropriates \$1 million from the general fund to the Higher Education Department (HED) for the purpose of expanding existing efforts to retain students and improve graduation rates at public post-secondary higher education institutions.

This bill does not contain an effective date and, as a result, would go into effect 90 days after the Legislature adjourns, or May 15, 2024, if enacted.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The appropriation of \$1 million contained in this bill is a recurring expense to the general fund. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of FY25 shall revert to the general fund.

## SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

## HED reports:

Data from the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) provide one hundred fifty percent (150%) graduation rates and fall-to-fall retention rates for all colleges and universities in the country. For New Mexico universities, graduation rates vary from a low of twenty-five percent (25%) to a high of fifty-five percent (55%), average of forty-two percent (42%), compared to a national average of fifty-nine percent (59%) for public universities. The graduation rates for independent and branch community colleges ranges from a low of sixteen percent (16%) to a high of fifty-two percent (52%), average of twenty-eight percent (28%), compared to a national average of thirty-one percent (31%). Seven out of 17 two-year colleges have a rate that exceeds the national average.

For retention rates, New Mexico universities range from fifty-three percent (53%) to seventy-five percent (75%), average of sixty-six percent (66%), compared to a national average of seventy-five-point-seven percent (75.7%). For two-year colleges, retention rates range from forty percent (40%) to a high of seventy-one percent (71%), average of fifty-eight percent (58%). The national average is sixty-one percent (61%).

## CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

The General Appropriation Act includes \$3 million distributed to higher education institutions statewide for student support services.
