Housing Policy & Funding Legislation

Housing New Mexico tracked 53 housing and homelessness related bills during the 2025 legislative session. Of these bills, 43 had policy or tax implications and 10 proposed an appropriation to a particular project or program. Of the policy or tax bills, the Governor signed 4 into law:

SB 1 – Creates the Behavioral Health Trust Fund

SB 3 – Behavioral Health Reform Act directs coordination and planning among various state agencies involved in behavioral health issues and appropriates \$200 million for several programs and initiates.

Appropriations for Housing

Across all bills that included appropriations, Housing New Mexico tracked \$270 million in funding passed for housing and homelessness.

These appropriations in HB 2 totaled \$178 million and included the following notable special grants:

- \$110 million to DFA "to support housing, affordable housing, transitional housing and the expansion of housing services providers."
- \$5 million to DFA for "the Local Government Division for grants to local governments to support a direct-to-housing encampment response."
- \$8.1 million to HCA "for startup costs to build capacity for housing providers for people experiencing homelessness."
- \$10.3 million to HCA for Linkage, which is a \$5 million increase for previous years.

These appropriations in HB 450 totaled \$44 million and included a few of the following notable grants:

- \$13.5 million to DFA for "housing projects statewide."
- \$7.6 million to the Local Government
 Division housed within DFA "to acquire land
 and rights of way and to plan, design,
 construct, furnish, equip and rehabilitate
 affordable, transitional and supportive
 housing in Albuquerque in Bernalillo
 County."

SB 3 – Behavioral Health Reform Act directs coordination and planning among various state agencies involved in behavioral health issues and appropriates \$48 million.

- SB 3 appropriates \$200 million for several grant programs and the implementation of the sequential intercept model.
- The appropriation within SB 3 designates \$48 million for "expansion of housing service providers."



Appropriations Designated for Housing New Mexico

Housing New Mexico was designated as the fiscal agent for five appropriations, totaling \$14.8 million.



Housing New Mexico's Legislative Agenda

Housing New Mexico's two legislative priorities, \$500,000 to implement the Affordable Housing Act (SB 144) and \$500 million for the NMHTF (SB 145) with a local government set-aside, were positively received and passed their hearing with the Senate Health and Public Affairs Committee.

Both bills were referred to the Senate Finance Committee (SFC) but never added to the SFC calendar or incorporated into either the General Appropriations bill or the Capital Outlay Projects bill.





Policy Bills that Gained Traction

While only a few housing and homelessness policy bills were enacted into law, there was significant traction around the following bills that reached the House or Senate Floor calendar:

- HB 98 Automatic Expungement of Eviction Records
- HB 215 No Use of AI for Rent Manipulation
- HB 442 Mobile Home Rent Stabilization
- HM 35 Mobile Home Park Regulatory
 Framework

Housing New Mexico was named in HM 35 -Mobile Home Park Regulatory Framework, which requires the Regulation and Licensing Department, the New Mexico Mortgage Finance Authority, the Public Regulation Commission, the Governor's Office of Housing, the chair of the Opportunity Enterprise and Housing Development Review Board, the New Mexico Attorney General, a landlord of a mobile home, and a resident of a mobile home to develop a regulation framework for mobile home park tenancies and rent stabilization for mobile home residents. Housing New Mexico considers such legislation to be an important opportunity to provide leadership over mobile home and manufactured housing policy.
