



Institute for Indigenous Knowledge & Development

Provide Public Health Education. Design and delivery of culturally-centered community health assessment (CHA) training. CNAH has engaged 50+ Native communities and native-serving entities, including 21 in NM, in CHA training, mentorship, and technical assistance.

Creation of the *Tribal Leaders' Public Health Symposium* (TLPHS) to build on public health knowledge and skills and to promote health policy development.

Address Social Determinants of Health. Cofounded the All Nations Wellness & Healing Center with the First Nations Community HealthSource (FNCH) to address health-related issues, e.g., food access, employment, cultural connection, education, racism/discrimination, legal concerns, as experienced by Natives living in Albuquerque.

Expand Local Partnerships. CNAH offers training on a *cultural humility curriculum,* including orientation to Indigenous Pueblos, Tribes & Nations in New Mexico. The training increases knowledge and enhances capacities and skills to work across different cultures and diverse groups.
