



### Leveraged Initiatives Taken

**Grant-funded planning:** In November 2023, the County received a Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) grant to plan for expanded MOUD services, which was awarded through the **Building Bridges Program.** Future planning included enhancing reentry programs which links individuals with post-release services. This resulted in us becoming a peer site for other facilities.

**Health Partnerships:** In partnership with Presbyterian Medical Services (PMS), the County is participating in a HRSA-funded initiative to establish medical services for individuals prior to release from SFCADF—ensuring access to continued medical, dental, and behavioral care.

**Recovery Housing:** A contract with a local nonprofit, which supports the R.I.S.E. House, a recovery residence for graduates of the Matrix program to promote more successful re-entry into the community.

**Employment Pathways:** Innovate and Educate partnership is intended to provide enhanced job opportunities for Matrix graduates, connecting them with County employment opportunities, as well as other employers.

## Leveraged Initiatives Taken Continued

**Re-entry Fairs:** SFCADF now hosts quarterly re-entry fairs to connect incarcerated individuals with community providers such as Santa Fe Recovery, NAMI-Santa Fe, Engage, and Life Link. These events help address post-release needs like housing, employment, and healthcare to reduce recidivism and overdose risks.

**Regional Collaboration:** Santa Fe County participated in a community forum in Rio Arriba to share strategies and coordinate on opioid settlement fund priorities.

**Public Awareness:** In Fall 2024, Santa Fe County proudly co-sponsored the **Fentanyl Summit**, hosted by Bernalillo County. The event drew stakeholders from across the state. County Manager Greg Shaffer delivered opening remarks, emphasizing collaboration and innovation in tackling fentanyl-related challenges.

Crisis and Detox Services: The County continues to support La Sala Crisis Triage Center, which provides detox, crisis stabilization, and behavioral health support.
