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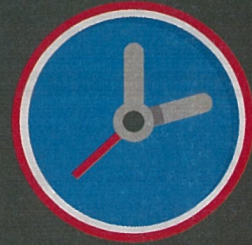

Protecting Patient Safety New Mexico's hospitals are making major gains in quality and safety.

2014-15

New Mexico hospitals:⁶

- Reduced falls with injury:
Down 47%
- Reduced hospital acquired stage 3-4 pressure ulcers:
Down 84%
- Reduced adult readmissions from all causes:
Down 1.2%

2016

- NMHA led 19 hospitals in Hospital Engagement Network (HEN 2.0):
- *Prevented 181 patient harms*
- **Saved \$1.9 million** through prevention of hospital acquired conditions



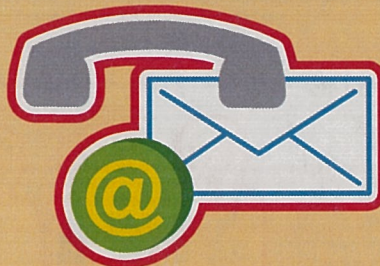
2017

- **Secured \$1.4 million** in Hospital Improvement Innovation Networks (HIIN) funds for technical assistance, education, training and one-on-one support to 36 acute care hospitals
- Contracted with NM Department of Health to support 9 Critical Access Hospitals and 4 more rural hospitals
