


# **Recovery Statistics (FEMA-PA)**



- As of August 22, \$10.4 million in obligated funds has been reimbursed.
- Large projects (i.e., more than \$1M) comprise \$55 million of obligations across 10 different projects.
- DHSEM is compiling the documentation and reducing the burden on applicants in order to get reimbursed

#### **State Disaster Case Management**


Goal: To provide individual support to disaster-affected residents through a single point-of-contact who is positioned to alleviate the bureaucratic burden of multiple program processes.

- State case management is funded through a **FEMA DCM Grant**.
- State DCM is active in Mora, San Miguel, and Lincoln counties.
- State DCM coordinates access to 30+ individual programs from a range of state, local, and federal partners.
- State Case Managers are a partner to Claims Office Navigators in helping impacted residents recover from the Hermit's Peak / Calf Canyon Fire.



### Disaster Case Management Statistics

- Based on Individual Assistance registrations, there are approximately 4,000 in the HPCC fire area.
- Approx. 15% of people in case management did not register for FEMA Individual Assistance.
- There are currently **274 cases** being managed by the State's Disaster Case Management program.
- An additional **179 residents** are interested in the program; we will be able to serve them pending FEMA's approval of a modification request to the grant.



*Tier 4 statuses represent the most* complex cases and comprise most of all State-managed cases.

Recovery is most effective when it is locally executed, state managed, and federally supported.

#### **Interagency Coordination Efforts**

We have coordinated **75+ agencies** as partners in the Lines of Effort for Recovery
















- The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is providing advanced protective measures in Mora.
- The U.S. Forest Service is supporting holistic watershed assessments via LiDAR.
- FEMA, DHSEM, and the Claims Office have deployed strike teams to support Applicants.

#### Flood Risks in 2023

- The State is prepared for and is responding to flooding statewide in 2023, and specifically in burn scar areas.
- Already, the 2022 Monsoon Season broke statewide records for flash flood warnings (see right) due to elevated risk.



Preparing for floods will be a critical priority for at least the next five years.

## **Watershed Mitigation Strategy**

Purpose: Facilitate landscape restoration and resilience through a recovery and mitigation approach that enables prioritized projects to be written, approved, and funded. Focus on the identification of projects that can be communicated and implemented locally.

**Improve** watershed resilience through slope stabilization, reforestation, and watershed health projects.

Develop watershed-based recommendations for improving critical infrastructure (e.g., utilities).

**Engage with** communities to install mitigation projects that support traditional lifeways.

Maintain water quality standards in the long term.

**Establish clear** communication between local, state, and federal agencies engaged in watershed mitigation efforts.

**Coordinate with** other Lines of **Effort to support** cross-cutting goals and outcomes.

### **Challenges in Partnership**

- Multiple partners including the Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Claims Office, and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development have not provided consistent representation in the LOEs.
- We lack regular quantitative reporting from all agencies, which is needed to track aggregate trends across the burn scar agency.
- It is a challenge to elicit clear, actionable commitments from partner agencies, even when verbal agreements are coordinated in meetings.
- Each agency continues to focus on amplifying its specific program rather than supporting coordinated messaging on recovery.

### **Senate Bill 6: Funding Status**

- DHSEM and DFA meet on at least a weekly basis to coordinate distribution of funding.
- Opportunities identified and coordinated to expand funding include:
  - Reevaluating the stage of FEMA review that constitutes "Approval."
  - Including applicable Category B work as eligible for assistance.
- A total of \$53.3 million in funding has been disbursed through the loan program to date.
- DHSEM is working closely with Applicants to formulate and obligate additional FEMA-PA funding for other Permanent Work.
