Changing Landscape: House vs. NCAA

- The NCAA and plaintiffs have reached a \$2.6 billion settlement approved on June 6, 2025 to compensate former student-athletes (from 2016 to Sept. 15, 2024) for past NIL restrictions. UNM and NMSU have opted in to the settlement terms and may begin compensating student-athletes.
- As a result, both UNM and NMSU Athletics will forfeit NCAA revenue in back damages over the next 10 years adding pressure to our long-term budget planning.
- The settlement also establishes a new model allowing schools to directly compensate student-athletes.
 - A new permissive cap of ~\$20.5M per school begins in FY26.
 - Power Four schools will fund at the cap, while Mountain West and C-USA schools will operate at much lower levels.
 - Even at reduced levels, this will create significant budget pressures and require disciplined financial planning to stay competitive.





Changing Landscape: Federal Legislative Update

SCORE Act

- Creates a national NIL standard; preempts state patchwork.
- Reaffirms student-athletes as non-employees.
- Allows NIL deals with valid business purpose; bans pay-for-play.
- Protects Olympic and non-revenue sports.

Institutional Impact

- Requires academic, mental health, and medical support (3 yrs post-graduation).
- Protects scholarships; adds degree-completion program.
- Schools must maintain 16 varsity sports.
- Demands fee transparency; limits student-fee use at high-revenue schools.





Changing Landscape: Federal Legislative Update

Executive Order: Saving College Sports

- Preserves scholarships and opportunities in women's and Olympic sports.
- Bans third-party pay-for-play schemes.
- Allows fair-market NIL compensation (endorsements, sponsorships).
- Directs Labor and NLRB to clarify student-athlete status.
- Requires revenue-sharing safeguards to protect non-revenue sports.





Changing Landscape: Transfer Portal

Year	Change	
2018	Transfer Portal introduced to formalize the process	
2021	One-time transfer allowed with immediate eligibility	
2024	Unlimited transfers permitted for eligible athletes	

What It Means for UNM & NM State

- Retention is harder than ever.
 - With greater mobility, programs must fight to keep their talent.
- NIL and Revenue Sharing are now essential.
 - These tools are critical for attracting and retaining top student-athletes.





Changing Landscape: What drives conference realignment?

- TV revenue is one of the biggest drivers for college athletics.
- Conferences pool all member schools' games into multi-year media deals.
- TV partners pay the conference, which then distributes money to schools.
- When contracts expire, schools can "shop" their rights which is exactly what drove the most recent round of realignment in the Mountain West.





Changing Landscape: Conference Realignment, UNM

- Five Mountain West schools are set to depart on July 1, 2026:
 - Boise State, San Diego State, Utah State, Fresno State, Colorado State
 - These schools are chasing larger media rights payouts projected to earn \$10M-\$15M+ annually in new conference affiliations.
- In comparison, Mountain West media distributions are currently around \$4–6 million per school annually creating a growing revenue gap.
- In response, the Mountain West is adding five institutions: UTEP, Hawaii, Grand Canyon (non-football), UC Davis (non-football), Northern Illinois (football only)

Conference Realignment: Why was UNM not considered?

Football Performance

- Recent results have shaped UNM's national reputation.
- Football success is the single biggest driver of perception in realignment decisions.

Football Infrastructure

- University Stadium requires continued investment and upgrades.
- Peer schools that recently invested in football facilities (Colorado State, San Diego State, Boise State) are better positioned from an infrastructure standpoint.


Total Athletic Budget & Investment

- UNM's athletic budget lags behind comparable conference peers both current and future.
- This budget gap will be highlighted on the next slide.
- Decision-makers see a need for greater investment in facilities, staffing, and fan experience to remain competitive in realignment.




Conference Realignment - NM State

- While this wave of conference realignment has settled, we know there will be another wave.
- The institutions that are leaving Conference USA are doing so for different reasons.
 - OUTEP will receive an increased media rights payment by joining the Mountain West.
 - oLouisiana Tech will gain four conference opponents within driving distance and expect significant savings on travel each year.
- With State and institutional support, we have invested in new turf for the football field and the practice field, and the football locker room. Aggie Memorial Stadium requires continued investment and upgrades.
- NM State trails Conference USA peers from a budget standpoint.









NM State vs. Peer Institutions




UNM Athletics Budget Summary

- National Context: Many athletic departments across the country are facing multi-million-dollar deficits.
- UNM Success: We've delivered a balanced budget for five consecutive years
 — a point of real pride.
- How We've Done It: Disciplined planning, responsible management, and strategic execution have kept us financially stable.
- **Looking Ahead:** We are projected to balance again in FY26, but with major revenue shifts coming in FY27 and beyond, we must keep investing to remain competitive.



FY26 UNM Expenses




NM State Athletics Budget Summary


- National Context: Many athletic departments across the country operate in a multi-million-dollar deficit.
- NM State Success: We've delivered a balanced budget the last two years.
- How We've Done It: Implemented a mindful budget oversight process, established weekly meetings with university finance department, raised football season ticket prices, and institutional assistance.
- Looking Ahead: We're not projected to balance again in FY26 without institutional support. We've raised men's basketball season ticket prices. We plan to make a sizable payment toward the deficit.





FY26 NM STATE DEPARTMENT OF ATHLETICS - REVENUES








FY26 NM State Revenues
