# **TPAL - Recent & Ongoing Math Initiatives**

- Math for All Grant Collaboration between NMSU, Bank Street College and Education Development Center
  - Our focus is currently on K-8 classrooms in LCPS and GISD
  - Making math accessible to all students
  - o Provides professional development to schools in implementing high-quality, standards-based math instruction
  - Helps build collaboration among general and special education teachers
  - Implemented with Early Childhood and Elementary Preservice Teachers
  - Build local capacity in districts/schools
- Elementary Math & Science Specialist Master of Arts in Education: Third cohort began in 2025
- EMSS courses are taught by math & science experts among TPAL and STEM Outreach Faculty

## **Building Capacity for Quality Math Instruction**

#### Elementary Math and Science Specialist Masters Program (2-year program)

- Leads to Elementary Math
   Specialist (EMS) Endorsement
- 60 graduates, 16 current
- Goal: EMS in every elementary school to support math intervention, mentoring, and highquality math instruction
- 30% of graduates serving in leadership / coaching positions
- Cost per teacher: \$12,500
- NEED: Funding for Scholarships

## High Dosage Math Tutoring District Partnerships in GISD, Santa Fe, and Farmington

- Game-based Math Intervention
- Can be implemented in-school or in OST programs
- Targeted Intention based on math fluency screener
- Builds professional knowledge for teacher on foundational math concepts and psychology of math learning
- Targeted intervention that leads to a deep conceptual understanding of number and flexibility in problem-solving
- Builds student confidence in math understanding
- Need: Funding to support teacher professional learning and OST intervention

Think Inside the Box (Micro): Colorful, locally-designed, and fabricatedclassroom kits are resourcesfor teachersto implement meaningful lessons in the classroom that align with the NMPEDSocial Studies standard Ethnic and Cultural Identities. The kit contains games, activities, and posters to spark creative inquiry about place-based learning and cultivate critical thinking skills that foster deep conversations about social understanding.



Think Inside the Box (Macro): Mobile museum offers students and teachers opportunities to explore thematic content and place-based learning, interpretive planning, and exhibit design as a novel approach to curriculum co-development. The 40-foot custom-built shipping container will be displayed on NMSU's campus in Preciado Park as a pilot to build and understand the impact of culturally and linguistically sustaining curriculum. The mobile museum will serve as a space for professional development.



Cordova Sisters Archival Project:Collection recognizes,validates, and preservesthe efforts of the Cordovasisters, Nadineand Patsy, in their work to teach Chicano history in ways that affirm and foster pride and resilience in New Mexican communities. The Cordova sisters taught in rural Vaughn, NM in the 1990's. This project represents the struggle for inclusive and culturally responsive teaching and underscores the importance of archiving material related to marginalized voices in education.
