### NM Spotlight Designations and ESSA

- Under the New Mexico Public Education Department's (NMPED) approved Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) plan, the state's lowest-achieving schools are identified as Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) schools.
- As a result, CSI schools, with the support of the larger Local Education Agency (LEA/District) and school community, have an opportunity to develop and implement targeted interventions, as defined in their NM DASH, with the goal of achieving dramatic student achievement gains such that the school is in good academic standing within three years.



### NM Spotlight Designations and ESSA

- The New Mexico Spotlight dashboard, to be released in Fall 2019, will celebrate the success of our highest performing schools, identify schools that the department will support with federal grant money, and provide families with an opportunity to learn more about their local schools.
- Based on indicators of academic performance and school climate, the NM PED will collaborate with districts, schools, and communities to determine what resources are needed to support schools on their path to student success.
- This shift in philosophy will allow the NM PED to allocate federal resources where they can make the most impact and help every student succeed.



### What are CSI schools?

- New Mexico has identified schools for either Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) or Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) status based a streamlined set of rules and criteria that focus intervention at the LEA level in addition to the school level.
- A school is identified as being in need of Comprehensive Support and Improvement by:
  - Being in the lowest-performing five percent of Title I schools in New Mexico as identified by the results of the state's assessment; or
  - Having a 4-year graduation rate (high schools only) less than 67% for two of the past three years; or
  - Having been a Title I school that was previously identified for targeted support due to low performing student subgroups, that has not demonstrated sufficient improvement after three years.



### CSI Schools in NM

Comprehensive Support and Improvement status has a three-year implementation timeline, which started in school year 2018-19.

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An identified school is expected to exit CSI status within 3 years of fully implementing their improvement plans and can do so by improving the metric that was responsible for identifying the school for comprehensive support.

### CSI Schools in NM

✓ 91 schools currently identified as CSI.

 Dulce Elementary School is a designated CSI school through SY 2020-21.

 In May 2019, the Public Education Department released a list of 27 schools under CSI designation that have improved student outcomes at a level high enough to exit PED oversight through the 2020-2021 school year.



### Exiting CSI Status in NM

- A CSI school is no longer subject to PED oversight, including on-site visits, when school performance has improved to a point where the school no longer meets the criteria – lowest five percent or graduation rate – that led to the designation. However, PED will continue to hold these schools accountable for appropriate use of school improvement funds, since these schools still receive funding all three years.
- The 27 schools that have exited PED oversight will retain the CSI designation through the end of the 2020-2021 school year, which is when PED will identify a new group of CSI schools. Until then, PED will evaluate the existing list of CSI schools annually to determine whether additional schools may exit oversight due to improved school performance.

### **CSI Funding Purpose**

The primary purpose of the CSI process is to provide LEAs with schools identified as CSI the opportunity to apply for additional funding to <u>support participation in an evidence-based school</u> <u>improvement program or innovative school interventions</u> <u>designed to address Tier 1 (Core) Instruction.</u>

 <u>Tier 1 (Core) Instruction must be an identified Focus Area for the</u> <u>CSI school's NM DASH Plan for school years 2019-20 and 2020-21.</u>



### Title One School Improvement Funding for CSI

- In the 2019-2020 school year, all CSI schools will receive equitable funding, based on an approved application, to support the implementation of evidence-based interventions to improve outcomes for all students.

### **Evidence-Based Interventions in NM**

- LEAs are leveraging CSI funds to provide a variety of EBIs based on their individualized school and community data. Examples include:
  - Supplemental materials for targeted small group intervention for reading and math;
  - Professional development and onsite coaching for teachers focusing on language and culture connections;
  - Positive behavior interventions and supports;
  - Truancy supports;
  - Community Schools wrap-around services.



### Role of the LEA

 It is incumbent on the LEA and school to work collaboratively to identify the root cause of the barrier(s) interfering with instruction and student performance.

 Each CSI application is driven by the individual needs, as identified by data from the LEA and school who then identify the school's chosen evidence-based intervention (EBI), ensuring clear alignment to the performance challenge and root cause.
