Alternative Licensure Program Increasing Native-Serving Educators Do you have an undergraduate degree and an interest in teaching Native students in the Four Corners? Are you meant to teach and inspire?

What is Project Alpine?

Project Alpine is a scholarship program that begins January 2019 for qualified individuals who enroll in SJC's Alternative Licensure Program and commit to teach for three years in a highmajority Native-serving school within FMS or CCSD. Project Alpine provides full tuition, as well as funding for books, fees, tests, and qualified travel. Candidates receive a two-year Alternative License in NM so that they can begin teaching while they complete their coursework. Our goal is to create a local pipeline for the development of teacher leaders in the Four Corners area.

Who are we seeking?

Passionate, degreed individuals who want to plant roots and to build long-term relationships within our local Native-serving communities.

Empowered ALP teacher candidates who commit to serving Native learners with culturally responsive pedagogy and who wish to improve their schools and communities.

When can participants begin?

Spring 2019! Project Alpine is now seeking interested applicants with bachelors degrees. We will provide guidance for the SJC application process and will offer free entrance test preparation in mid-November and early December. This partnership between SJC and our partner districts means candidates can be fully contracted and receive full benefits while completing our licensure program.

Where are classes? Where will I work?

ALP coursework (face-to-face at San Juan College and online) will support candidate placement at one of 15 partner schools in Central Consolidated or Farmington Municipal school districts. Project Alpine also provides

an experienced, local mentor who will make site visits for classroom coaching and ongoing professional development. PD opportunities with master teachers span the length of the program!


