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


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
Our Project







Began in 2016 as a link between high rates of student mobility at Van Buren Middle Community School and UNM SOL clinical program. To date:

- tenant advocacy and know your rights at homework diner programs across APS;
- ABC Community School Coordinators attend housing court and receive training;
- ABC awarded \$97,000 in eviction prevention family stability grant funds;
- NM Legal Aid and APS Title I McKinney Vento Project added to the partnership to increase capacity for legal assistance and homelessness prevention.






Van Buren Middle School Data: Student Mobility, Eviction Rates, Academic Proficiency Rates














Domino Effect





- High eviction rates can unravel the fabric of a community, thwarting efforts to establish and maintain social capital, local cohesion and community investment
- Mothers who are evicted experience more material hardship, are more likely to suffer from depression, report worse health for themselves and their children, and report more parenting stress. Ongoing, chronic stress from homelessness for children can have profound and lasting effects.
- Individuals under threat of eviction present negative health outcomes, both mental depression, anxiety, psychological distress, and suicides and physical poor self-reported health, high blood pressure and child maltreatment.
- Students with high rates of residential instability perform worse on standardized tests, have lower school achievement and delayed literacy skills, are more likely to be truant, and are more likely to drop out.

STRATEGIES:

1. Reduce Risk & Stress

 prevent homelessness & housing loss, provide crisis services

2. Provide Resources

 nutrition, health care, affordable housing, recreational opportunities

3. Educational Supports

 preK, tutoring, summer programs, transportation in high mobility areas

4. Mobilize Adaptive Systems

 foster self-regulation skills, school engagement, support parenting skills, bonds with caring adults
