Children's Governor's Cabinet Collaboration on Childhood Hunger in NM

Summary: The Governors office has put a Committee together with PED, HSD, CYFD, and DOH aimed to reduce Childhood Hunger in New Mexico.

Public Education Initiatives/Goals:

1. Increase feeding in the summer with the SSO and open sites available for students to receive meals in the winter break.
2. Provide Shared tables with extra food items in the cafeteria to be available for all students to eat.
3. Work closely with our School Food Authorities to have more of them provide CYFD CACFP At Risk Supper Program which will give students an additional meal during the day.
4. Collaborate with HSD/SNAP agency to qualify more families for SNAP benefits and feed more students for free meals.
5. Work with non-profit organizations to use NSLP excess food to provide meals to high poverty households and children.
6. Universal Feeding for Students in NM
