

development of the APRN Consensus Model in 2008, APRN licensure, accreditation, certification, and education were aligned to provide structure to the role and to create a pathway to develop new population foci and specialties as the profession changes. By December 2010, the APRN Consensus Model was endorsed by 47 national or international nursing organizations. APRNs graduating after approximately 2010 are educated and certified in accordance with the APRN role and population foci identified in the APRN Consensus Model. The APRN Consensus Model also calls for full practice authority (previously termed independent practice), including prescriptive authority. New Mexico received credit for meeting fully the APRN Consensus Model standards even though the BON has not adopted or ratified the APRN Consensus Model at the state level. Table 4 presents the current population foci/specialties of APRNs in New Mexico. APRNs are able to hold more than one certification for a particular role (CNP, CNS, CRNA). Three CNSs and 76 CNPs hold two or more national certifications and therefore at least two population foci.
