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INTERIM SUMMARY

Public School Capital Outlay Oversight Task Force 2024 Interim Summary

The Public School Capital Outlay Oversight Task Force held one planning meeting and four substantive meetings during the 2024 interim. In accordance with the Public School Capital Outlay Act (PSCOA), the task force:

1. monitored the overall progress of bringing all public schools up to the statewide adequacy standards;

2. monitored the progress and effectiveness of the programs administered pursuant to the PSCOA and the Public School Capital Improvements Act;

3. monitored the existing permanent revenue streams to ensure that they remain adequate long-term funding sources for public school capital outlay projects; and

4. conducted oversight of the Public School Capital Outlay Council (PSCOC), the Public School Facilities Authority (PSFA) and the implementation of the statewide process for making grant awards to fund capital outlay projects.

During the 2024 interim, the task force focused on reviewing the funding formula established in the PSCOA that is used to calculate the state and local shares of the cost of an approved capital outlay project. Particularly, the task force examined how the funding formula affects small, rural school districts and, over several meetings, heard testimony from superintendents from small school districts, analysts from the Legislative Finance Committee and the Legislative Education Study Committee, staff of the PSFA and experts in bonding and public finance. In response to its findings through this examination, the task force proposed and endorsed legislation that amends the PSCOA to:

1. extend through fiscal year 2027 the temporary provision that reduces the local share by one-third for some school districts and one-half for certain small school districts; and

2. eliminate some of the criteria that the PSCOC is required to consider before making an adjustment to a school district's local share.

Additionally, the task force monitored the ongoing litigation in *Board of Education of the Zuni Public School District, et al. v. State of New Mexico and the Public School Capital Outlay Council*, which challenges the constitutionality of the PSCOA based on the "education clause" in Article 12, Section 1 of the Constitution of New Mexico. As of the date of the task force's final meeting, the PSCOA remains in effect as the Supreme Court of New Mexico ruled that the case was moot and ordered a remand to the district court for further proceedings.

Background

The legislature created the Public School Capital Outlay Oversight Task Force (PSCOOTF) in 2001 and charged it with overseeing the Public School Capital Outlay Council's (PSCOC) and the Public School Facilities Authority's (PSFA) implementation of the Public School Capital Outlay Act (PSCOA). The task force consists of 25 members and includes legislators, appointed state and local officials and members of the public. The task force holds five meetings during the interim and most of its agenda is required by statute; however, as time permits, it will also explore and analyze issues relevant to its statutory obligations. Before the start of each regular legislative session, the task force shall report its findings and recommendations to the governor and the legislature.

Work Plan

Pursuant to its statutory obligations, the PSCOOTF will:

A. monitor the overall progress of bringing all schools up to the statewide adequacy standards developed pursuant to the PSCOA;

B. monitor the progress and effectiveness of programs administered pursuant to the PSCOA and the Public School Capital Improvements Act;

C. monitor the existing permanent revenue streams to ensure that they remain adequate long-term funding sources for public school capital outlay projects; and

D. oversee the work of the PSCOC and the PSFA as they perform functions pursuant to the PSCOA, particularly as they implement the statewide-based process for making grant awards.

Additionally, as time permits, the PSCOOTF will:

E. review the history of and receive an update on current developments in the *Zuni* lawsuit;

F. review the changes to public school capital outlay as enacted in House Bill 207 and Senate Bill 76 from the 2024 regular legislative session;

G. examine the impact of inflation on school construction and maintenance costs and the ability of the current funding framework to respond to changing costs;

H. receive the updated forecast of supplemental severance tax bond proceeds and review the long-term trends in severance tax revenue, along with the range of upside and downside risks;

I. review the expenditure of federal funds and possible additional federal funding opportunities; and

J. address other matters within the task force's purview as it deems necessary.

On behalf of the task force, Mr. Rounds proposed a joint resolution (228788.1) to amend Article 8, Section 2 of the Constitution of New Mexico to increase the annual levy on real and personal property to twenty-two mills and mandate an annual statewide tax levy amounting to two mills for distribution for the support of public schools.
