Mission: Build healthier communities by connecting all veterans and their families to the highest quality care, services, and eligible benefits through advocacy and collaboration.

Vision: All Veterans and their families in this state will be educated about and the have an opportunity to attain all earned benefits through collaborative and synchronized efforts of all community service organizations.



NMDVS Division Services



Administrative Services: Provides essential support to the agency to encompass required functions designed to ensure efficient and effective support. Support includes financial administration, contract and procurement processes, official record keeping, policy implementation, resource management, Human Resources, IT support, compliance and risk management, and facilities management.

Field Services: Veteran advocates, assisting veterans and eligible family members with filing federal claims and applying for state benefits.

State Benefits: Manages state veterans' benefits, memorials, and state cemeteries.

Healthcare Coordination: Educates veterans about available health benefits and connects veterans to community resources; manages transportation and homeless and suicide prevention initiatives.

State Approving Agency (SAA): Reviews, evaluates, and approves eligible programs at educational institutions and training establishments in New Mexico for those individuals wishing to enroll and utilize their GI Bill® education benefits.*

Veteran Business Outreach Center (VBOC): Assists veterans, reserve component members, and their eligible spouses with business planning, funding, marketing, and all other assistance needed to start or grow a business.

Veteran Tribal Liaison: works to promote government-to-government relationships by strengthening agency collaborations with tribal government, the Dept of Veterans Affairs and other key agencies to enhance access to services and benefits for veterans in rural areas and tribal lands.

Women's Veteran Coordinator: advocates for women veterans throughout New Mexico to ensure women veterans and their eligible dependents are knowledgeable of available state and federal benefits and that women veterans have equitable access to veteran programs and specialized services.

NMDVS PROGRAMS FISCAL YEAR 2024



NMDVS Programs have contributed to the agency's continued success in outreach efforts to New Mexico Veterans and their families.

Community Engagement helps connect the agency with diverse communities, ensuring that services are accessible and tailored to meet specific needs. Awareness/Educational initiatives raise awareness about the agency's services, leading to increased participation and support from the community. Partnership Collaboration with local communities expand the agency's reach and resources, fostering a network of support for shared goals. Feedback Outreach programs often incorporate feedback loops, allowing the agency to understand community concerns, needs and adapt services accordingly.

Constituent Services assisted 84 New Mexico constituents with specific concerns.

Capacity Building Training and workshops empower community members, enhancing their ability to utilize available resources and participate in agency initiatives.

State Approving Agency (SAA)

Became a bureau within NMDVS, July 1, 2017, and is under annual cooperative agreement with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to provide approval, oversight, training, outreach, and liaison activities to ensure the quality and integrity of programs of education and proper administration of GI Bill® benefits. In addition, the SAA evaluates and approves specific eligible educational for use of Veterans' education and training benefits.

- 90.24% increase in complete application packages processed in a timely and accurate manner, with zero returns from VA compared to FY23
- 3.65% increase in programs approved compared to FY23

Veteran Business Outreach Center (VBOC)

Offers business training workshops on military bases, National Guard facilities, and community settings. A significant initiative is the introduction of a third program within VBOC, specifically designed for military spouses, called "Military Spouse Pathway to Business." The current Boots to Business (B2B) training and Boots to Business Reboot workshops have shown a steady increase in FY24. All programs are planning to expand initiatives to reach more participants with step-by-step guidance on how to start or grow their own businesses. In FY24, VBOC trained 497 transitioning service members and National Guardsmen.

Veteran Tribal Liaison

Our Tribal Liaison is dedicated to collaborating with and addressing any shared Veterans' issues and concerns for the State's Pueblos, Nations, and Tribes. Recognizing the unique challenges and sacrifices made by our Native American Veterans, the NM Department of Veterans' Services remains committed to fostering a strong partnership with the State's Pueblos, Nations, and Tribes. - DVS conducts (2) trainings and competitions/year









STATE BENEFITS FISCAL YEAR 2024



NMDVS Honor Guard Program	 The Honor guard program has grown over the past 2 years and now encompasses 29 teams. NMDVS Honor Guard Training conference and competition continues to be held twice a year to accommodate initial and validation training in both northern and southern parts of the state.
General Election Amendment 1, 2	 The possibility exists that these two amendments, if passed, will increase state benefits workload significantly (any veteran with a percentage of disability will be allowed to refile for tax exemption equal to their disability rating).
Construction of the Carlsbad State Veterans Cemetery in 2025	 The Carlsbad State Veterans Cemetery construction project is awaiting the National Cemetery Administration Cemetery Grants Program to fund this build out. NMDVS is currently 4th on the Veterans Cemetery Grants Program list. This project is anticipated to be funded in Federal Fiscal year 26' or 27'.

VETERAN HOMELESSNESS

- Support for veteran service organizations and non-profits that specifically address veteran homelessness.
- Participate in outreach events, homeless stand-down event, and Point-in-Time counts of the unhoused.
- FY25 contracts address the statewide veteran homelessness challenge with programs in the 4-quadrants of the state and metropolitan Albuquerque

GOVERNOR'S CHALLENGE TO PREVENT SUICIDE

- DVS is the lead for the NM Governor's Challenge Team which researches and implements best practices of veteran suicide prevention
- FY24 and FY25 contracts for suicide prevention and awareness programs throughout the state; providers also address Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and Military Sexual Trauma
- Implemented 988 in conjunction with the VA and state organizations.



HIGHLY RURAL TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM FISCAL YEAR 2024



- 15 Counties and 5 Native American Nations funded for FY25 by VA Highly Rural Transportation Grant (HRTG).
- 5 Transportation contractors serve the 15 Highly Rural Counties.
- 4 additional contractors added in FY25 for expansion.

The NM Department of Veterans Services has requested a total budget of <u>\$12,259.0</u> for the fiscal year 2026.

- General Fund increase \$2.249.9 (25.1%) increase from the FY25 Operating Budget.
 - Personnel reclassifications and realignments in FY24
 - 3 FTE for program support: 2 VSO, 1 social worker
 - 86.7% increase in the agency's Civil Rights and Liability rates from FY25.

200 <u>Personnel services and Employee Benefits:</u> <u>\$ 1,350.4 increase for FTE- 3 position expansion</u>

The agency is seeking an additional 3-FTE, to support the agencies expansion initiatives to our NM Veteran Population in FY26. The agency experienced growth in a Suicide Prevention Act through FY24 Legislation which requires personnel to oversee and manage workloads in this area. The additional FTE would contribute to expansion of services to better serve rural NM communities and continue to support the PACT Act Law. We are seeking personnel assistance to meet the requirements of the Suicide Prevention Act as well as to promote career longevity within our agency.

- Over the last 12 months the agency reflects a 13% vacancy rate due to retirements and loss of state personnel to federal entities offering higher salaries for same scope of VSO work. We have since reclassified positions to mitigate future turnover.
- The agency currently holds 2 vacant exempt high-level positions, of which \$370k is the projected requirement to fill these appointments.
- The FY24 General Fund reversion amount of \$529,960 encompasses a portion of this vacancy savings that weren't filled in FY24.

300 Contractual Services: \$279.5k increase request

- 200K Suicide Prevention Behavioral Health
- 25K Veteran Homelessness Initiatives 3.5% inflation rate for services

*FY26 Deficiency Request \$881.4k

The agency requests a **Deficiency Appropriation** To cover a revenue shortfall created by the transfer of the Truth or Consequence Veterans Home from the Veterans Services Department to the Department of Health.

400 Other /Operational: <u>\$620k</u>

Increase of funding would include the impact of operational costs:

- 100K Travel/Outreach/Conference/Events
- 110K Vehicle Leases for field offices /Fuel
- 35K DoIT/ GSD/Communications
- 10K New VSO Certifications and Training
- 275K Office Leases and Operational cost: expansion of offices to extend DVS footprint throughout the state
- 45K Field Office Furnishings and Supplies
- 45K Governors Veteran Advisory Council funding



Key Initiatives for FY26 - Capital Funding Request

1. Veteran Resource Center – 15M Proposal is to establish the "New Mexico Veteran Resource Center" built on a One-Stop- Shop veteran-centric service delivery model. The concept is to enable veterans and their families a single access point to information and service transactions. The single access point would be provided by "Veteran Service Officers" and other service representatives to navigate, and directly assist veterans and dependents with their respective needs for VA and State claims;

- 1) Service-Connected Disability Compensation
- 2) Pension eligibility, Dependent Indemnity Claims
- 3) VA Healthcare access, proximity to the nearest military Base Exchange (BX) and Commissary privileges

4) State Veteran benefits (tax exemption & waiver, hunting/fishing license, special military license plates, state park & museum passes).

VSOs in this Veterans Resource Center will coordinate necessary assistance to apply for, SNAP benefits, unemployment compensation, MEDICARE & MEDICAID benefits, access to assisted living care facilities, higher education opportunities (GI Bill, NM Free tuition Assistance Program), Section 8 Housing, Low Income Home Energy Assistance, Emergency Food Assistance, Counseling & Childcare for Children, Domestic Violence Program, Substance Abuse Program. This resource center would be a statewide agency collaborative effort.







Key Initiatives for FY26 - Capital Funding Request

2. To plan, design, repair, mitigate, and make other improvements to site and grounds-5,522,100

The Department of Veterans Services is requesting priority one (1) funding due to emergency mitigation construction costs (4.1M) at the State Veterans Cemeteries. The cemeteries are in dire need of mitigation work that is required to correct matters caused by inadequate and defective construction during the initial build. This project includes the completion of the Gallup Cemetery Sound Wall Project, the Angel Fire Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall Fence and connecting walkway, and phase II irrigation for the Center Flag Plaza walkway. Lastly, it involves the replacement of the Ft. Stanton cemetery kiosk for burial information (1.4M).
