


Ignition Interlock History


1999	Interlock Optional for 2 nd and 3 rd DWI offenses
2002	Mandatory Interlock for 1st Aggravated and all subsequent offenses
2002	Interlock Indigent Fund created-Determined by Court
2003	Interlock License Act created
2005	Mandatory interlock for all DWI convictions
2006	Interlock Fund moved from DFA to NMDOT
2007	Out of state applicants to be interlocked
2008	Penalties added for tampering and circumvention attempts
2009	Must show proof of interlock for 6 months before reinstatement
2010	Objective standard for Indigency-Determined by DOT











NMDOT Crash Database as of 04/06/2016. Preliminary 2015 data.



New Mexico Current Law

--NMSA 66-8-102 (N) Person Under the Influence...

--Upon a conviction pursuant to this section, an offender shall be required to obtain an ignition interlock license and have an ignition interlock device installed and operating on all motor vehicles driven by the offender, pursuant to rules adopted by the bureau. Unless determined by the bureau to be indigent, the offender shall pay all costs associated with having an ignition interlock device installed on the appropriate motor vehicles. The offender shall operate only those vehicles equipped with ignition interlock devices...

Administrative Revocations

- --Administratively the Motor Vehicle Division has revoked an average of 67% of all DUI offenders within 20 days of arrest.
- --An additional 18% of DUI citations are administratively revoked after the MVD Implied Consent Hearing Process.
- --An average of 85% of DUI citations result in a revocation through the administrative process

Reinstatement

- --Driver must complete 6 months on Interlock and Interlock License
- --Driver must have no evidence of tampering or circumvention
- --All court requirements must be completed

Interlock Program Information

- --Currently 12,669 interlocks in use in NM
- --10 Manufacturers, 57 service centers and 10 mobile service centers statewide
- --Wiring is covered with tamper seals, devices have temperature and pressure gauges and minimum volume of air required
- --Method for providing breath samples vary depending on manufacturer
- -- Devices calibrated on a regular basis

Interlock Program Information

- -- Only detects alcohol (no other drugs)
- -- Devices available with camera
- -- Devices set to "fail" if BAC is over .025
- -- Devices require rolling retests
- --DOT funds Albuquerque Metro and Santa Fe County for compliance

Interlock Indigent Fund

--\$300K appropriated from Liquor Excise Tax yearly

--Fees imposed upon non-indigent offenders who install and utilize interlock. Currently fee is \$50 per year.

Indigent Fund Participation

2005 - 2006 400 individuals utilized the fund

4000+ utilized the indigent fund (approximately 40% of the

individuals interlocked at that time)

Fund became insolvent and was suspended from 2/1/2010 –

10/1/2011

2012-Present After revisions in the IIDF Law – Approximately 10% of those interlocked benefit from the Fund.

Interlock Costs and Subsidy Benefits

Average Interlock Costs - \$1130.00 yearly

Install - \$ 85.00

Removal - \$85.00

Monitor/Service - \$80.00

Subsidy Benefits prior to changes implemented July 1, 2010
Install, Removal & Monitor averaged \$650.00 yearly. That in
combination with the number of individuals benefiting (from the fund)
drove the fund insolvent.

Interlock Costs and Subsidy Benefits

Current Subsidy Benefits - \$460.00 yearly

Install – up to \$50.00

Removal – up to \$50.00

Monitor/Service – Up to \$30.00

Indigent clients do no have to pay the IIDF fund fee

Eligibility Criteria

Indigency shall be based on proof of enrollment in one or more of the following types of public assistance:

TANF-Temporary Assistance for Needy Families

GA-General Assistance

SNAP-Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (food stamps)

SSI-Supplemental Security Income

FDPIR-Federal Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations

Other criteria approved by the Bureau

Indigent Fund Information

- -- Traffic Safety Division has staff of 5 that manages program and fund
- --Applicants can get assistance by phone, website, email, walk-in services.
- --Once approved, applicants can use any interlock provider
- --Interlock Providers provide the service and are reimbursed by the Traffic Safety Division
- --95% of the time, interlock providers are reimbursed within 30 days
