
ECECD Top Priorities



- **Seamless transitions** from prenatal to early childhood programs to Kindergarten;
- Access to quality early childhood care and education programs;
- Effective **collaboration** with child welfare programs and health and behavioral health;
- Effective **data** systems
- Aligned early childhood workforce development system; and
- Promote culturally and linguistically appropriate programming and equal education and care opportunities to non-Englishspeaking families



ECECD Funding by Source






ECECD Budget for FY 2021 = \$419+ million

Over 50% of the Department's budget is federally funded, including TANF and Medicaid

Most of ECECD's budget supports direct services

ECECD Tribal Collaboration



- Established tribal liaisons for each ECECD program
- Partnered with the Indian Affairs Department on a survey of tribal partners to determine appropriations priorities
- Engagement with Indian Education Advisory Council and tribal leaders
- Submitted annual report on tribal consultation
- Established a cohort of Pueblo women pursing degree
- Set-aside funding for Summer Jumpstart program
- Delivered Infant Wellness packages to all tribal communities



Child Care and COVID-19

Child Care Services



Child Care Licensing and Regulatory Unit

- License and monitor the health, safety and quality of child care centers and homes
- Child care can be provided in licensed facilities for children six weeks to twelve years
- License and monitor 975 centers and homes and register over 1,500 homes annually

Child Care Assistance Program

- Serve an average of 19,000 children per month
- Support for low-income families
- implemented eligibility at 200% FPL entry and 250% FPL exit
- Provides a safe, nurturing learning environment for children

Child Care Services and COVID-19



Group Size

- Started with small group sizes (8)
- Expanded to 10
- Currently at 20 (1:10 ratio) for children 3 and older

COVID-19 Safe Practices (CSP)

- Full engagement and participation of the child care sector
- Daily health screenings
- Physical distancing
- Full mask compliance everyone over the age of 3
- Stable groups of children
- Intensified cleaning, sanitizing and disinfecting

Mandatory reporting requirements to ensure adherence to CSPs.



Monitoring, Technical Assistance and Professional Development



- Health and Safety Guidance for New Mexico Child Care Centers and Early Childhood Professionals
- Personal protective equipment (PPE)
- Surveillance testing
- Rapid response
- Regional provider meetings
- COVID-19 mandatory response training

Essential Child Care Wage Incentive

Child care assistance for essential employees

NM PreK, Summer Jumpstart and School Reopening



New Mexico PreK

Funded 7,327 PreK Students FY21 in Public Schools

- Converted 687 slots from half-day to full day
- 5,518 in full-day program
- 1,809 in part-day program

Funded 3,767 PreK Students FY 21 — Community-Based Settings

- 3,623 in a full-day program
- 144 in a part-day program

Funded 1,890 Early PreK Students FY 21 – Community-Based Settings

- 1,821 in a full-day program
- 69 in a part-day program

Funded 514 Mixed Age PreK Students FY 21 – Community-Based Settings

- 485 in a full-day program
- 29 in a part-day program



PreK and Early PreK - onsite and offsite SY19-20

- Home activities
- Online support
- COVID-safety child care guidelines

Summer JumpStart PreK Program

- 6-8 weeks of summer programming for Pre-K children.
- Prioritized access for low-income students and students with special needs
- Kindergarten transition and social and emotional development
- Served 1,334 children in 91 sites across the state

PreK SY20-21 Reentry

- Guidance to programs flexibility and parental needs
- COVID-Safe Practices
- Communication with families
- Most programs will transition to hybrid onsite-offsite home learning or in-person learning

NM PreK and COVID-19



School Reopening Cross Agency Work Group

- Public Education Department and ECECD
- Partnering with the Regional Education Cooperatives and the New Mexico Child Care Resource and Referral agency
- Developed a map of child care providers by school district
 - Connect families to licensed providers in their community
 - Strengthen partnerships among public schools and child care providers
- Conducted surveys:
 - Family survey on child care needs and other needs (e.g. food, behavioral health etc.)
 - Child care provider capacity survey

Family, Infant and Toddler Program (FIT)

Family, Infant and Toddler (FIT) Program



- Served 14,923 children FY20
 - □ 11,641 children with Individual Family Service Plans (IFSP) in FY20
- ☐ FY21 Budget: \$33,231,500 (SGF, IDEA Part C-Federal, private insurance)
- 33 FIT Provider Agencies
- 15 FIT Satellite Offices



FIT and COVID-19



FIT programs transitioned services to 100 percent telehealth.

- Services provided:
 - Video conferencing and telephone sessions
 - Phone calls/Text messaging and emails
- Other actives:
 - Virtual walks, story time, check-ins
 - Parent and child observations
 - Personalized letters
- 9,311 FIT children received telehealth services March 11 July 31,2020; providers conducted 199,391 hours of telehealth services
- 1,709 children were determined eligible between March 11 and July 31,
 2020; half are under the age of one
