

The number of school days New Mexico students attend has historically been a local decision. The Legislature has regulated school time by enacting statutory instructional hour minimums, giving school districts and charter schools the flexibility to plan school calendars according to local priorities, as long as they meet those instructional hour requirements.

Lawmakers have considered establishing a minimum number of school days, usually 180, even passing such a requirement only to repeal it before its implementation. The Public Education Department (PED) also recently promulgated a rule requiring 180 school days, but a court stopped its implementation. There is still no current statutory or regulatory minimum number of school days.

While the number of school days has varied across the state, most school districts and charter schools — with the exception of small, rural districts — maintained five-day school week calendars. In recent years, however, that trend changed, with more districts and charter schools choosing four-day week calendars. School officials cite goals of cutting operational costs, providing family flexibility, and attracting staff as reasons for the change.

The Legislature also has not enacted statutory requirements governing the length of school weeks, though for a number of years it included language in the General Appropriation Act (GAA) effectively prohibiting school districts and charters from adopting a four-day school week if they had not already done so. The line-item veto and eventual omission of that language in recent years is one reason more school districts and charters have moved to a four-day school week. Another is the ability for school districts and charters to generate additional funding in the state funding formula by adopting a four-day calendar while maintaining the same number of school days, a loophole created when the Legislature stopped including language prohibiting the new adoption of four-day calendars.

As more school districts and charter schools move to four-day school weeks, it is important for the Legislature to examine whether such calendars are appropriate for all students, especially considering consistently low student outcomes, the court's finding in the *Martinez-Yazzie* sufficiency lawsuit that at-risk students could benefit from more time in school, and the state's constitutional obligation to provide a sufficient education.

This brief includes a history of school calendars in the state, research on the impacts of four-day school weeks on finances and student outcomes, as well as an overview of the current landscape of school calendars. Finally, it will provide considerations for lawmakers to determine how, or if, they want to regulate school calendars.

Four-Day Calendars in New Mexico

Background of Variable School Calendars

The Legislature has done little to regulate school calendars in New Mexico, preferring to leave decisions to local school boards and charter school governing councils. Section 22-22-1 NMSA 1978, the Variable School Calendars Act, allows school districts and charter schools to extend school calendars to 10, 11, or 12 months, and was intended to “create an opportunity for public schools or school districts to operate beyond a nine-month period...to achieve optimum and maximum use of school facilities and personnel.”

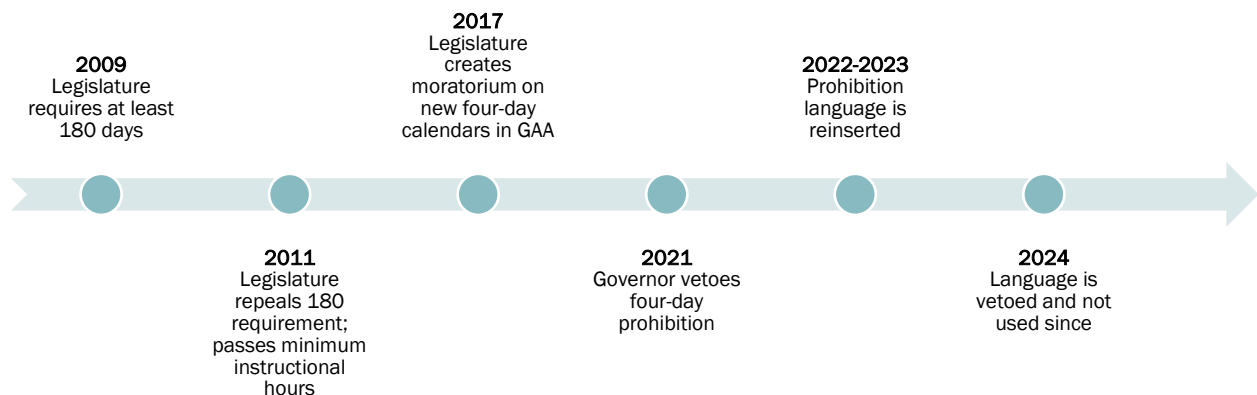
The act directs PED to set criteria for the establishment of a variable calendar, including a requirement that local school boards demonstrate “substantial community support for implementation of the variable school calendar.” The act, however, is silent on the number of school days students should attend or in what configuration those days school be structured.

In 2009, the Legislature passed Laws 2009, Chapter 276, requiring at least 180 school days, exclusive of time for in-service, and at least 151 days for school districts and charters on a variable school calendar. The passage of the bill coincided with the Great Recession, and school districts and charter schools were never required to implement the changes. In 2011, the Legislature enacted Laws 2011, Chapter 154, effectively repealing minimum school day requirements and replacing them with instructional hour requirements, 990 for elementary students and 1,080 for secondary students. In 2003, the Legislature increased those requirements to 1,140 instructional hours for all students, though elementary schools can set aside up to 60 instructional hours for professional work, and secondary schools can set aside 30 hours for professional work time.

Prior to 2024, PED regulation did require school districts on a condensed school calendar to have at least 150 full instructional days and all others to have at least 180 full instructional days, though it’s unclear whether all school districts and charter schools complied with those requirements. In 2024, PED promulgated a rule requiring all schools to have at least 180 instructional days. It did not prohibit four-day school weeks, but the requirement effectively meant year-round school for any school district or charter school choosing a four-day school week. Arguing the rule was counter to the Legislature’s intent when it passed increased instructional hour requirements, school districts sued to stop the implementation of the rule. The court sided with school districts, stopping the implementation of the 180-day school year.

Beginning in FY18, the Legislature effectively placed a moratorium on new four-day school week calendars with language in the state budget prohibiting school districts and charters from adopting a four-day calendar if they did not have one prior to FY18. That moratorium stood until FY22, when the governor vetoed the prohibition language. It was put back in place for FY23 and FY24 but was vetoed again in FY25. It’s been omitted from the budget since.

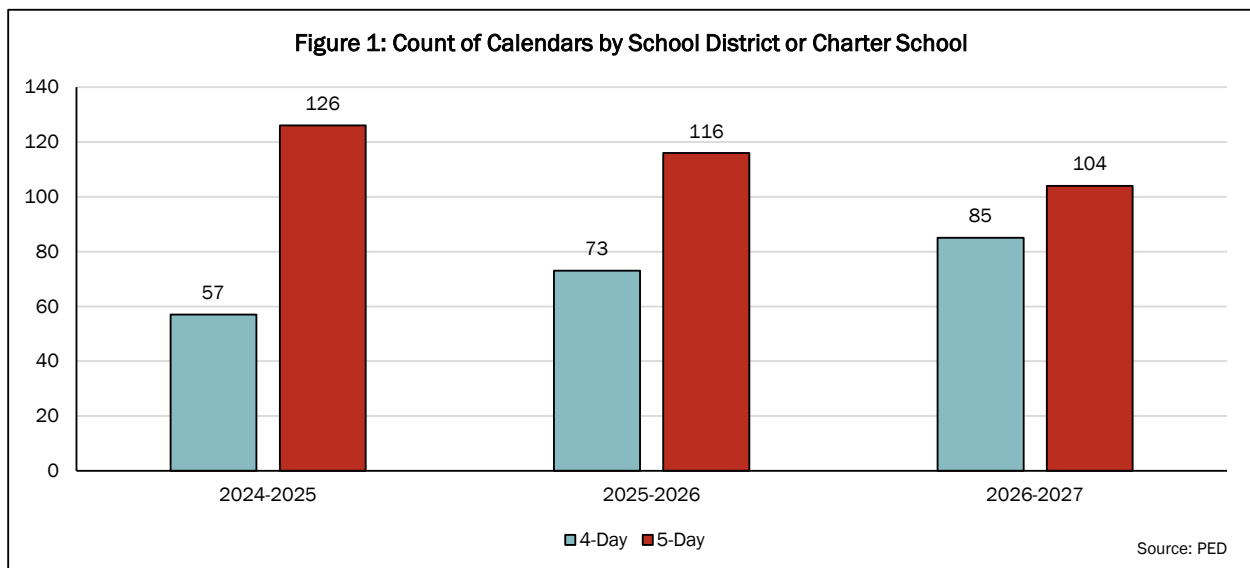
Timeline of Legislative Action

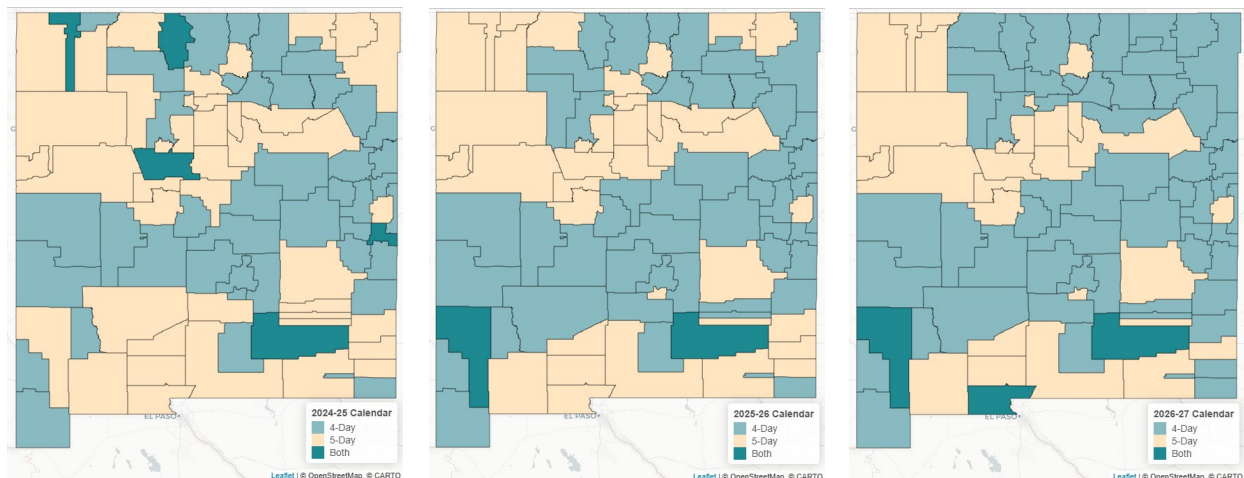
Current Four-Day Calendar Landscape

During the 2024-2025 school year, 57 of a total of 183 school districts and charter schools operated on a four-day school week. Since then, additional school districts and charters have chosen the option. As shown in **Figure 1: Count of Calendars by School District or Charter School**, 85 chose a four-day week in the 2026-2027 school year (SY27), representing a 50 percent three-year increase, about 45 percent of school districts and charter schools, and including 241 schools serving nearly 40 thousand students.



And while four-day weeks historically were limited to small, rural districts, the practice has spread across the state, including to more populous regions, with 26 of the 85 districts and charters with four-day weeks in SY27 enrolling more than 500 students, including 10 with between 1,000 and 1,500 students, five with between 1,500 and 2,000, and three with more than 2,000. More charters located in urban areas are also choosing four-day weeks. Nine operate in Albuquerque, two in Las Cruces, one in Rio Rancho, and one in Santa Fe. **Figure 2: School Calendars by Type** demonstrates the spread of four-day weeks, and **Appendix 2: Four-Day Weeks by School** includes a list of all school districts and charters that operate a four-day school week.

The increasing number of school districts and charters opting for shorter weeks comes as most deal with declining enrollment, increasing inflationary pressure, and the challenge of filling vacancies, which can be especially acute in specialty areas such as math or science and in rural communities that sometimes struggle to recruit staff. A 2026 Legislative Finance Committee (LFC) evaluation included school officials who cited some of those reasons for choosing four-day weeks, in hopes the change would save money or help to recruit and retain teachers. However, national research has shown mixed results in whether four-day weeks lead to substantial

cost savings or increase staff recruitment or retention. Where it has shown some positive impacts, in staff recruitment for example, research also has shown those impacts fade over time.

Academic Outcomes in Four-Day Districts

Academic outcomes for students in school districts and charter schools operating four-day school weeks in New Mexico have historically outpaced statewide averages in math and reading. There are many possible reasons for this including rural school districts having smaller class sizes, fewer numbers of special education and English learner students, and lower rates of student poverty, all factors associated with lower assessment scores. Of the 184 schools designated as “Spotlight” schools — meaning they are in the top 25 percent of all schools based on 2024-2025 assessment results – more than 70 operate on a four-day school week.

However, as more school districts and charter school adopt four-day weeks, they include many in which student academic performance is below state averages. As shown in **Table 1: Four-Day Schools Identified for Improvement**, 15 schools on a four-day week recently were designated as needing improvement based on 2025-20256 assessment scores and graduation rates. One school district that recently adopted a four-day week scored well below state proficiency levels, with only one in 10 students scoring proficient in math and fewer than one in 3 scoring proficient in reading. The same school district’s growth rates were below the 50th percentile, demonstrating worse progress than school districts serving similar students.

While time is just one factor impacting student outcomes, and four-day school weeks must still meet minimum instructional hour requirements, it is worth considering whether the state should allow consistently poor performing school districts and charter schools to reduce school days.

National Landscape of Four-Day School Weeks

The issue of schools adopting four-day school weeks is not limited to New Mexico. The National Conference of State Legislatures reported in 2023 that 24 states had at least one school district operating a four-day school week, a 600 percent increase since 1999. Approximately 850 school districts across the country used a four-day week, an increase from 650 in 2020.

Research on the impact of four-day school weeks has shown mixed and sometimes negative results. A 2021 [report](#) found there was no effect on student achievement and only small cost savings in Oklahoma school operating four-day school weeks, while more recent analysis from the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) found small to moderate negative impacts on student outcomes, with some students making two to seven weeks less academic progress than similar five-day districts.

One important factor in student outcomes was how many hours per week students spend in school. Students attending fewer than 30 hours per week drove negative results, while those attending 32 hours or more showed no statistically different outcomes.

NWEA's analysis also examined the assumption that shortened weeks save school districts money, finding cost savings average about 2 percent, primarily from transportation, food service, and other operations. Those savings come with their own concerns, as some opponents argue students miss out on critical meals and other services when they don't have school.

Schools often assume a four-day week will recruit and retain school staff. However, research in Arkansas, Colorado, Missouri, Oregon, and Oklahoma found only modest impacts on retention rates and no evidence that a shortened week increased applicants or reduced vacancies.

How Other States Regulate Four-Day School Weeks

Across the country, states are proposing ways to curb or prohibit schools from going to four days. Analysis from the Education Commission of the States (ECS), a national, non-partisan education research organization, shows those actions range from limiting four-day weeks to only the highest performing schools to requiring a minimum number of instructional days per month. Others require communities to vote to approve four-day calendars or require schools to get state approval before changing their calendar. Below are a few examples of actions states have taken.

Colorado. State law requires any school district that wants to adopt a calendar with fewer than 160 days get specific approval from the state commissioner of education. The state also has a grant program that provides funding for fifth-day academic enrichment and support, which allows the provision of supplemental programs on the fifth day of the week for children in four-day week schools.

Indiana. The state recently enacted a law requiring schools meet certain criteria before than can apply and be approved for a four-day waiver. They are required to provide transportation to a school that conducts a five-day school week, maintain an A rating on the state's accountability system, provide enrichment and remediation opportunities for students when school is not in session, and meet state teacher salary minimums.

Missouri. A law enacted in 2024 requires a school district located in a county or city with more than 30,000 inhabitants to provide a ballot measure to voters in the school district to adopt a four-day school week. The law came after a district serving 15,000 students adopted a four-day week.

Utah. State regulations require local education agencies to submit a waiver from minimum school day requirements that includes how the change will support the learning environment and lead to educational excellence. Applicants are also required to hold two public hearings.

Other states have proposed various new requirements for schools considering four-day weeks or other decisions that could reduce instructional time. In Oregon, which already has some of the lowest number of required instructional hours and where school districts have reduced instructional time as a way to balance budgets, Governor Tina Kotek issued an executive order in 2026 requesting the state board of education initiate emergency rulemaking to prioritize and preserve current student instructional time. The order also asks school district to commit to not reducing instructional time any more than they've already done.

And in North Dakota, the state is considering rule changes that would make student academic outcomes the sole factor in whether a school district received a waiver to operate a four-day school week. Currently, school districts can also cite cost savings and local flexibility as reasons for the shortened week.

Policy Considerations and Recommendations

The impact of four-day weeks depends on many factors. In some cases, a shortened week has resulted in greater community satisfaction, less school bullying, and fewer fights. In others, however, the change has not resulted in anticipated cost savings or less teacher turnover, and has even meant less academic progress for some students.

The history of four-day school weeks in New Mexico, however, goes back decades, and many communities have maintained a lifestyle predicated on the schedule. Families in small, rural communities depend on Fridays off to make trips to nearby towns for groceries, doctor visits, and other appointments.

The Legislature should consider whether a school schedule with broad support from local communities is appropriate for all students, especially in historically low performing school districts or in communities whose characteristics do not inherently face the same issues four-day school weeks were intended to address.

The Legislature should...

- Consider whether school districts and charter schools should meet certain geographic or academic criteria before being allowed to operate a four-day school week.
- Consider whether or how a school district or charter school wanting to adopt a four-day school week should demonstrate local community support.
- Consider whether a school district or charter school wanting to adopt a four-day school week needs PED approval.
- Continue to monitor and study the impact of four-day school weeks on educational outcomes, including academic performance, attendance, teacher recruitment and retention.
- Consider whether to exempt school districts and charter schools already operating four-day weeks from any new requirements.
- Consider reinstating language in the GAA prohibiting school districts and charter schools from adopting a four-day school week if they didn't already have one.

The Public Education Department should...

- Develop guidance for school districts and charter schools on a four-day school week to ensure effective use of instructional hours.
- Consider requiring school districts and charter schools planning to adopt a four-day school week to submit a reorganization request, including a demonstration of local community support.
