Promote the education, success and well-being of the youth in our communities and provide community benefits of lasting value through the conservation and enhancement of New Mexico's natural, cultural and recreational resources.

### What we do



The New Mexico Youth Conservation Corps was established in 1992 to provide a process to employ youth between the ages of 14-25 in public projects of lasting value that improve the state's natural, cultural, historical, recreational, and agricultural resources. It is funded by a GGRT distribution.

Projects enhance work skills and career preparation through training. Seventy percent of each contract must go to youth corps wages, and 10% of project time must be spent in training. Returning Corps members are eligible for a \$1,500 educational voucher or a \$500 cash compensation.

The YCC is governed by a nine-person commission with five governor appointees and four state agency members. The Commission awards funds through a competitive RFP process and the next RFP will be released in a few weeks. The award cap is \$150,000

### Performance FY21 / 22

In FY22, the YCC received 35 proposals. Five proposals were found to be non-responsive, and five entities declined funding due to anticipated difficulties with hiring corps members.

Twenty-five project with awards totaling \$2.3 million hired approximately 400 youth hired across 17 counties in New Mexico.

Projects include: constructing a new tent campground in Sugarite Canyon State Park; improving municipal parks in Columbus and the Village of Santa Clara; improving ancestral sites in Santa Clara Pueblo; streamshed restoration; thinning projects in all five national forests; improving a public children's museum & senior center; building and maintaining trails in the Sacramento Mountains; two oral history projects connected to two public art projects and more.

## **Corps Member Benefits**




By statute, the YCC offers a \$1,500 educational tuition voucher OR a \$500 cash compensation to corps members who have worked on a YCC project for 12 months (48 weeks) within a 48 month period (4 years).

In 2020, the YCC initiated a process to ensure more corps members receive their benefits, and set a target of 85% of eligible corps members to receive their benefits. Out of 72 eligible corps members contacted, 51 responded and received their benefits = **71%**.

### FY21 / 22 Accomplishments

- Initiating multi-year cooperative procurement agreements with State Parks,
  Mining & Minerals, Game & Fish and Historic Sites to be budgeted from YCC fund balance.
- To increase accessibility to the program and reduce errors that result in projects not being funded, requested exceptions to the RFP template from State Purchasing. Most were approved.
- Worked with EMNRD IT to re-structure internal project tracking application software to streamline project entry and enable finer-grained reporting detail.
- Made four visits to projects in process (so far).
- Restructured website to adapt to new web host and content publisher.
- Re-classified second YCC position from Bus Ops Advanced to Budget Analyst to better conform with duties.


- 1) Increase of \$5.0 in contractual services from YCC's fund balance to support additional projects in FY23.
