


Federal Funding OBAE Manages



- American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)
 - Capital Funds Project
 - The Connect NM Pilot Program
 - \$117M
 - Infrastructure for Broadband deployment to Un- & Underserved
 - 5 NM Tribes (Jemez, Laguna, Nambe, Santa Ana, Santo Domingo/Kewa)
 - > \$60M



State Funding OBAE Manages



Connect New Mexico


- \$70M
- Expand high-speed internet access & deploy infrastructure to un- & underserved
- Award Notices Have Begun
- 5 NM Tribes → \$20M

Grant Writing, Engineering & Planning (GWEP)

- \$5M \$100K max award
- 5 Tribes out of 15 Awardees (\$500K)
- Still taking applications encouraging Tribes to apply




BEAD: Challenge Process

- Challenge Process
 - Determined the final list of locations eligible for BEAD funding
 - Launched in early April
 - 30-Day Challenge Phase & 30-Day Rebuttal Phase
 - Office Hours
 - > 600 Challenges impacting 68,456 locations were submitted
 - Insert Tribal challenges
 - 30-Day Final Determination Phase (July 4 Aug 3)
 - Results submitted to the National Telecomm & Information Admin (NTIA)
 - Aug. 29
 - Waiting approval
 - Tribal Support
 - OBAE ran 9 regional events, including a tribal event at Jemez
 - Hired two contractors to run independently to support challengers through the process
 - 6 tribes used support
 - Office hours with OBAE staff



BEAD: PAU Design Process

- Project Area Units (PAU)
 - Clusters of locations that applicants will apply for BEAD funding
 - Draft PAUs published June 26
- Design Criteria
 - Geographic boundaries
 - Underserved locations relative to unserved locations
 - Proximity of existing network infrastructure
 - Geographic/topographic factors
 - Potential for competition
 - Economic and technical viability/efficiency
 - Community needs
- 165 PAUs in total





BEAD: PAU Design Process – Tribal



- Tribal Engagement
 - APCG
 - Navajo Nation
 - OBAE Contractors



- Tribal Lands are their own PAU
 - New Mexico's 23 Nations, Pueblos & Tribes each have their own PAUs
 - Navajo Nation = Navajo Delegate District boundaries
 - Facilitates requirement for Tribal Consent
 - Zero Match requirement for Hi-Cost Areas
 - Not all Tribal areas are Hi-Cost Areas per NTIA




BEAD: Initial Proposal Volumes 1 & 2

- Approved by the National Telecomm & Information Admin (NTIA)
 - Proposals lay out how OBAE will structure and conduct grant-making efforts
 - maximize the allocation of \$675M
 - Letter of Credit Waiver for Tribes
- Grant Program Design
 - Once approved, OBAE has 1-year to
 - design and execute our grant program for subgrantee selection
 - submit a Final Proposal to NTIA
 - Once Final Proposal is approved, OBAE can make the awards and begin deployment
- Period of Performance for subgrantees
 - 4 years




OBAE offering a Letter of Credit Waiver for Tribes

- BEAD Program rules require subgrantees to obtain an irrevocable standby letter of credit from a qualified financial institution or a performance bond executed by a surety company listed on the Department of Treasury's list of approved surety companies
 - Demonstration of financial capability to participate in the program and successfully complete a project.
- OBAE recognizes the unique sovereign status of New Mexico's twenty-three Tribes and Pueblos. In addition to NTIA's letter of credit guidance for subgrantees, OBAE will allow a Letter of Credit Waiver from Tribal entities.
 - The waiver will require self-certification by council resolution
 - The waiver only applies to the letter of credit. Other financials reviews must be completed during the pre-qualification and curing processes


BEAD Prequalification Application

- First step of subgrantee selection process for BEAD
- Applications are based on OBAE's IPV2 framework
- Process enables prospective applicants to establish their qualifications and capabilities to plan, finance, deploy, and maintain broadband networks
- Allows OBAE to review specific projects separately from organizational qualifications
 - Applicants can demonstrate their organizational qualifications only once, rather than provide that information with every individual project application









Digital Equity (DE)

- DE ensures fair access to and effective use of digital technologies









DE: Inclusion for Tribal Communities



- OBAE developed and aggressively implemented a comprehensive plan to foster DE for Tribal communities
 - Hosted Tribal consultations with Tribal Leadership
 - Tribal consultations with 100% of 23 NM Nations, Pueblos and Tribes
 - Planned and launched several Summits
 - Co-hosted "Internet for All: NM Broadband Summit" and Tribal Roundtable with NTIA Director Alan Davidson
 - Highest-attended local coordination event with NTIA in the nation (372 participants)
 - Launched Inaugural statewide Tribal broadband convening
 - Over 80 attendees
 - Held mapping sessions to confirm unserved and underserved premises




