

#### NM Grown Successes in K-12

- 10 Year History of NM Grown in Public Education Department
  - Foundational for NM Grown expanding to other Agencies
  - NM is hosting National Farm to Cafeteria Conference in December 2025
- NM Grown purchasing is a core healthy universal school meals quality improvement strategy



### Success in NM Grown Across State Agencies


- 242,046 K-12 students
- 7,530 early childhood student ages 0-5
- 4,191,156 meals to 50,680 Seniors
- Award funds are catalyst to build relationships and practice of local purchasing
- Schools and providers purchase beyond NM Grown Award
- Win for farmers, win for kids, win for communities
- Celebrates NM agricultural traditions





### Next Steps for NM Grown

- Increased Participation Results in Smaller Awards
- Local purchasing power small in relation to overall budget
- Need more farmers to join Approved Supplier Program
- Need for consistent, stable funding across agencies
- PED will honor \$0.10 per meal in statute moving forward
- PED is encouraging schools to use Healthy Universal School Meals Allocation to increase NM Grown purchasing
- Adding Bureau of Indian Education and Tribal Schools

- Spends more than \$1 million on NM Grown annually
  - \$84,100 NM Grown Award, spent \$1,046,509
  - 100% beef served is NM Beef
  - Consistent purchasing of lettuce for salad bars

#### Bernalillo Public Schools, Debbie Trujillo


- Pairing NM Grown with Increased Scratch Cooking
  - Large purchaser of NM Pinto beans
  - Cooking 100% fresh beans in 25-26 school year

- Bluffs Farm
  - Carson Stark, learned about NM Grown as a student in Farmington, was inspired to become a farmer and sell to schools



### Grower Spotlight: Manny Encinias

- Trilogy Beef, 6th generation farm, 13 generation New Mexicans
- Provides year-round market stability for Trilogy Beef and other businesses in local community
- Approved Supplier Program provides unique opportunity that doesn't exist in commodity-based market.
- Feeding highly nutritious foods to multiple generations through schools and senior centers
- NM Grown created opportunity to pass farm and agricultural business onto his daughters that didn't exist 3 years ago.
