RE: FY26 Allocation-Based Award Amounts

The Indian Education Division (IED) of the New Mexico Public Education Department (PED) is releasing the allocation-based award amounts for eligible partners. Eligible partners and grantees include the 22 pueblos, tribes, and nations and local education agencies (LEAs) identified as Historically Defined Indian Impacted School Districts (HDIISDs) for the 2025–2026 school year.

In FY25, the Indian Education Fund totals \$30 million. Of the total funds, \$750,000.00 is designated for IED operations to effectively oversee and implement initiatives. A substantial \$23.4 million is allocated directly to New Mexico's Pueblos, Tribes, and Nations to advance Native American student outcomes. An additional \$5.85 million is distributed to eligible districts and charter schools for the same purposes. These investments are overseen by Assistant Secretary of Indian Education KatieAnn Juanico and supported by Deputy Director Damian Wierzbicki, ensuring targeted collaborative implementation that honors tribal sovereignty and advances educational equity statewide. The total award amount in column G is calculated by combining the fixed base amount with additional funds based on student counts. Specifically, 80% of the total funding is provided as a fixed amount—in this case, \$850,909.09. The remaining 20% is determined by the number of students enrolled in public schools, using a tiered per-pupil rate. For students without an Individualized Education Program (IEP), the funding rate is \$108.94 per pupil, while students with an IEP are funded at \$217.88 per pupil. For example, Acoma has 683 total students, of which 146 are special education students with IEPs. Therefore, the student-based funding includes \$58,501.36 for the 537 general education students and \$31,810.80 for the 146 students with IEPs. When combined with the fixed amount, these components total \$941,221.25, which represents the full award amount for the fiscal year.

FY26 Award Amounts for each district or charter, defined as a Historically Defined Indian Impacted School District (HDIISD), includes a fixed amount of \$75,000.00 The total award amount for FY26 is calculated by combining the fixed allocation with a per pupil amount. Each district and charter receives a fixed based award of \$75,000.00. In addition, the award includes a per-pupil allocation of \$98.64. For example, Albuquerque Public Schools has a student count of 6,619. This results in a calculated per-pupil amount of \$652,898.16. When the fixed amount and the per-pupil amount are added together, the total award for the district equals \$727,898.16.
