New Mexico SAFE seeks to move New Mexico toward a holistic model of public safety – a system that is substantially smaller, smarter, and committed to the personal safety, health, equity, rights, and dignity of individuals and communities. To accomplish this, the public debate around crime and solutions must shift to a discussion fueled less by a desire for punishment and more by an understanding of the need to support our communities. Accordingly, a sharp and pragmatic plan for increasing public safety will address the social and economic factors that have caused our state to have one of the highest crime rates in the country.


