

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
Overview of NMNEC

NMNEC Goals

- Increase number of nurses with BSN and graduate degrees in New Mexico
- Improve efficiency, quality, and educational outcomes of nursing education through cooperation among community colleges and universities
- Increase workforce diversity by improving nursing education for minorities, particularly in rural areas



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
Growth: BSN Students 2013-2018

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Successful Statewide Outcomes

- 75% of the prelicensure nursing programs in New Mexico are teaching the common nursing curriculum
- Opportunity to enroll in a BSN program has increased by 96%
- Number of program locations offering the BSN degree option has increased from two to sixteen (700% growth)
- BSN degree now offered in nine rural locations
- Significant tuition savings for Community College-based BSN students (approx. 50% savings)

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Successful Community Outcomes

- Higher educated entry-level nursing workforce
- Research supports better Patient Outcomes
 - Lower re-admission rates
 - Lower infection, death, accident rates
- Keeping the BSN-prepared nurse in their community
 - Those who receive their degree close to home most often secure employment in their home community
- BSN degree provides pathway to management, advanced practice, and nursing educators
