STATE TRIBAL COLLABORATION ACT

11-18-1 TO 11-18-4, NMSA 1978

Mandates that New Mexico State Agencies* communicate, collaborate, and consult with NPTs.

*IAD does not, nor does it have authority to, enforce STCA. Rather, STCA is state law for all state agencies.

1

Develop and implement a State Tribal Consultation Collaboration & Communication (STCCC) policy

- •Promotes effective communication and collaboration
- •Promotes positive government-to-government relations
- •Promotes cultural competency in providing effective services

Consult with representatives to create STCCC

•Designated by the NPTs in the process of developing the STCCC

Make a reasonable effort to collaborate

•Specific to the development and implementation of policies, agreements and programs of the state agency that directly affect NPT and Native citizens

4

Maintain contact lists for public reference

• Includes names and contact information for the chief executives of the NPTs and for the state agency Tribal liaisons

5

Designate a Tribal Liaison

- •Reports directly to the office of the head of the state agency
- •Serve as a contact person
- •Ensure that training is provided to the staff of the state agency

STATE-TRIBAL CONSULTATION, COLLABORATION AND COMMUNICATION (STCCC) POLICIES

11-18-3(A), NMSA 1978

- Updated at the discretion of each agency
- Posted on agency and IAD website
- Each of the 23 State Agencies have effective STCCC policies


MAKE REASONABLE EFFORTS TO COLLABORATE

11-18-3(C), NMSA 1978

- STCA has no enforcement mechanism
- Annual reports highlight agency collaborations and other engagements with NPTs





STCA REQUIREMENTS

ANNUAL REPORTS

The report shall include:

- The STCCC the state agency adopted pursuant to the STCA
- Names of and contact information for the individuals in the state agency who are responsible for developing and implementing programs of the state agency that directly affect AI/AN
- Current and planned efforts of the state agency to implement the policy set forth in the STCA
- Certification by the state personnel office of the number of managers and employees of each state agency who
 have completed the training required by the STCA
- Description of current and planned programs and services provided to or directly affecting AI/AN and the amount of funding for each program
- Method the state agency established for notifying employees of the state agency of the provisions of the STCA

IAD CAPITAL OUTLAY UPDATES

ACTIVE CAPITAL OUTLAY PROJECTS BY FISCAL YEAR (FY)

FY 2025: 119

FY 2024: 176

FY 2023: 142

FY 2022: 148

- For FY 2026, 122 Capital Outlay projects were allocated to IAD, totaling \$63,307,059
- Every Nation, Pueblo and Tribe in New Mexico has at least one Capital Outlay project administered by IAD
- Tribal-serving entities allocated Capital Outlay projects include Navajo Preparatory School, Navajo Technical University, Santa Fe Indian School, Southwest Indian Polytechnic Institute, the Institute of American Indian Arts, Dine College and Navajo Code Talkers


INTER-GOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT STATUS AND INTERNAL REVIEW PROCESS

- ► FY26: All CO IGAs that had a budget were sent to NPTs July 1, 2025.
 - NPTs completed the Bond Questionnaire and any outstanding FY26 CO IGAs were sent to NPTs in September 2025
 - ▶ 100% of the IGAs for FY 26 CO projects administered by IAD have been sent to the respective entity.
 - ▶ 46 of 122 FY26 CO IGAs have been executed (38%)


- ► IAD Internal Review Process
 - Upon receipt of NPT-signed IGA, IAD General Counsel reviews for legal sufficiency; then, IAD Secretary reviews and executes IGA
 - CO/TIF Administrator sends executed IGA to NPT
 - Once the IGA is fully executed, the NPT may begin submitting Notice of Obligations (NOOs) to begin the work
 - Upon review and signature of the NOO, while the NPT is beginning the work for the project, the IAD CO/TIF Administrator will submit the NOO through IAD Finance for Purchase Order approval and creation

IGA PROCESS FLOWCHART

- Generally, includes all Capital Outlay awards and reauthorizations from Capital Outlay and Capital Outlay Reauthorizations bills, administered by IAD
- Funds carry specific legislative directives/intent
- Expiration of funds is outlined and set by the legislature



CAPITAL OUTLAY IGA PROGRESS & EXECUTION



For FY26, IAD sent all CO IGAs, which had funds budgeted, on July 1, 2025.

IAD sent 100% of CO project IGAs by September 30, 2025.
