
Alcohol Taxes Save Lives & Money

Increasing New Mexico's Alcohol Excise Taxes 25¢ Per Drink is More Equitable Than You Think

Among Adult (18+) Non-Excessive Drinkers Cost Paid by Income Group (proportion)



Alcohol Excises Taxes are not based on whether a person is rich or poor. They are based on how much a person drinks. The 49% of New Mexicans who do not drink will not pay an additional cent, regardless if they are rich or poor.

- 49% of New Mexican's don't drink and won't ever pay an additional cent.
- Non-excessive ² drinkers, earning \$75,000 per year or greater, will pay an average additional tax of \$11.52 per year.
- Non-excessive ² drinkers, earning less than \$25,000 per year, will pay an average additional tax of \$8.09 per year.
