



Temporary Assistance for Needy Families: Workforce Outcomes

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What is TANF?

- Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) is a federal block grant
- Provides \$16.6 billion annually to states, territories, and federally-recognized indigenous tribes to provide short-term financial assistance to low-income families with children
- States have flexibility to provide a range of services including workforce training activities, childcare assistance, and refundable tax credits
- New Mexico maintains the federal 60-month (5-year) lifetime limit on receiving assistance
- **Core goals of TANF:**
 - Provide assistance to families so that children can be cared for in their own homes
 - **End the dependence of parents on government benefits by promoting job preparation and work**
 - Prevent and reduce the incidence of out-of-wedlock pregnancies
 - Encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families

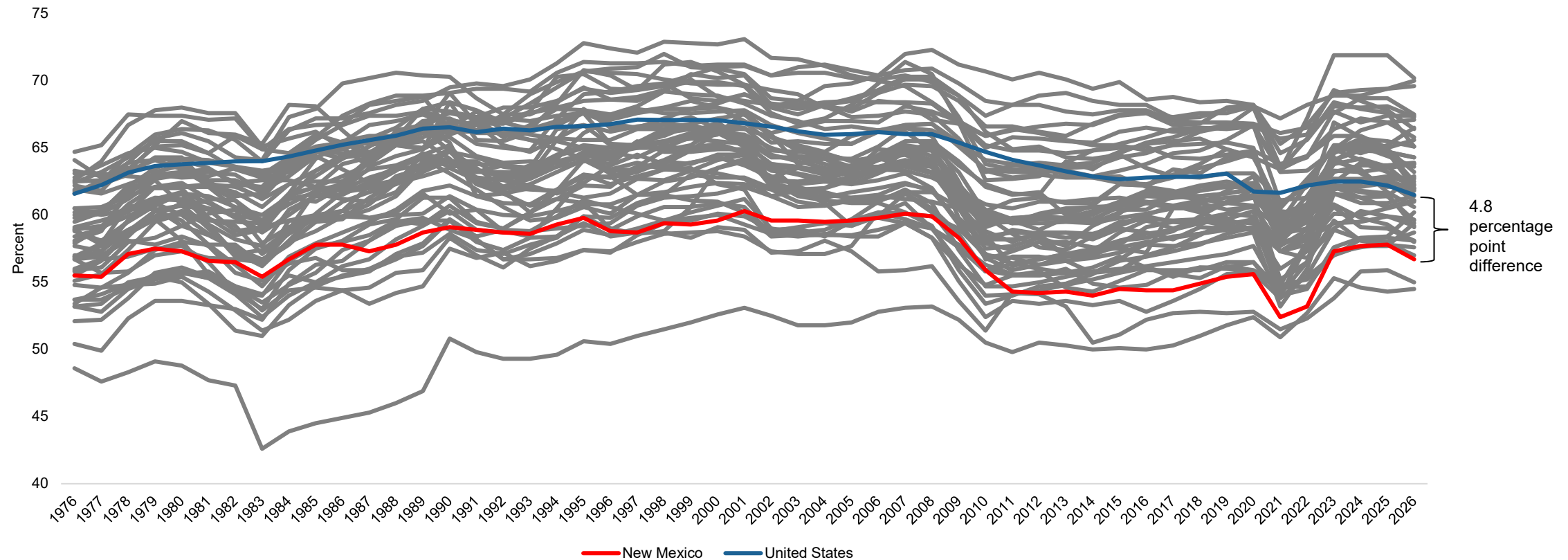


Key Takeaways

- Because TANF is issued in a block grant, states have some freedom in how the funds are spent across four broad purposes
- New Mexico allocates a higher proportion of its TANF dollars than most states, however, the state struggles with producing desired outcomes including exiting recipients into high-wage jobs
 - TANF recipients in New Mexico face barriers and poor outcomes when it comes to employment
- The most successful TANF work programs combine education, training, and support services to help low-income individuals find sustainable, high-income jobs

TANF Work Requirements

In compliance with federal law, non-exempt adults must work, volunteer, or participate in approved training.

This can include:

- Unsubsidized and subsidized employment
- Job search
- Education and Training
- Community Service
- Vocational Rehabilitation

Limited participation available in New Mexico for recipients include individuals who are:

- In their third trimester
- Caring for a child under a certain age or a disabled family member
- Experiencing a disability or inability
- Domestic violence survivors



New Mexico Works

- In 2021, Workforce Solutions Department (WSD) took over program administration of New Mexico Works (NMW), New Mexico's TANF program, from HCA to streamline services and improve workforce outcomes.
- According to the WSD, the NMW “connects TANF participants to exciting career opportunities through Career Link and Wage Subsidy Programs.”
- Under HCA NMW was geo-specific and only urban recipients received services
- Under WSD the program is state-wide
- **Key Takeaway Today:** Career Link continues to grapple with placements for participants and connects participants to low-wage jobs



Career Link vs. Wage Subsidy

Career Link:

Private-sector, part-time employment

- Places participants with private industry employers, 20hrs/week
- Employers receive a financial incentive at no cost to hire eligible participants

Wage Subsidy:

Government-agency, full-time placement

- Places TANF participants into full-time (40hrs/week) jobs within government agencies
- Positions last up to twelve months

- For a family of three living in Deming, a single mother could work about 36 hours a week and still be eligible for TANF if she was making minimum wage.
- In Santa Fe, that same mother could work about 28 hours a week and still be eligible for TANF.



Programmatic vs. Cash Assistance Spending for TANF Block Grant

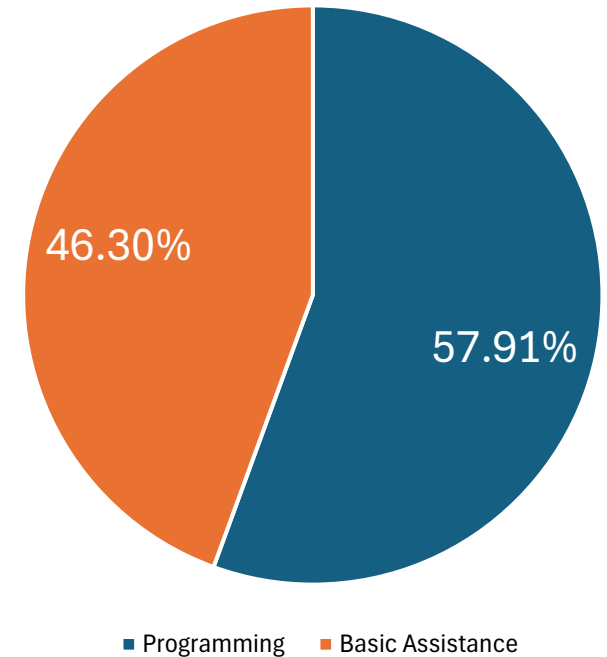
Programmatic Purposes:

- Help participants find, obtain, and remain in work by building necessary skills
- Remove barriers to work

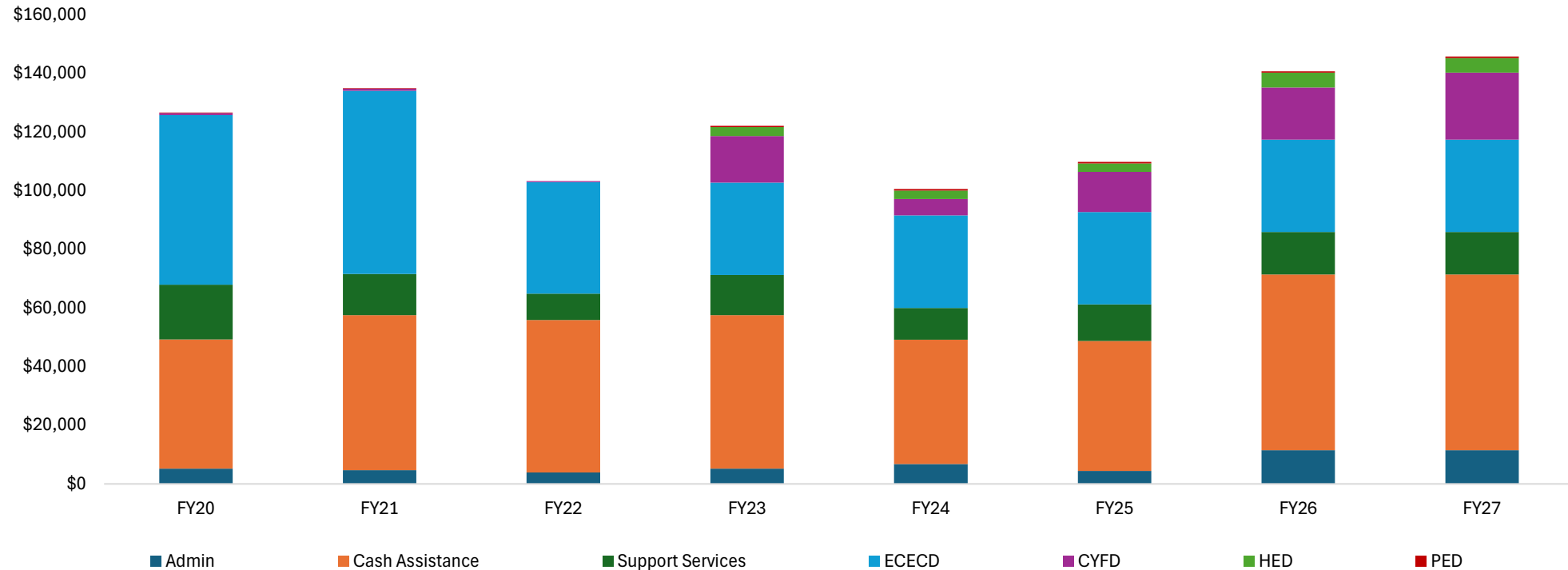
Basic Cash Assistance:

- Help families temporarily meet basic needs

TANF Spending in New Mexico, FY20-FY27 (in thousands)



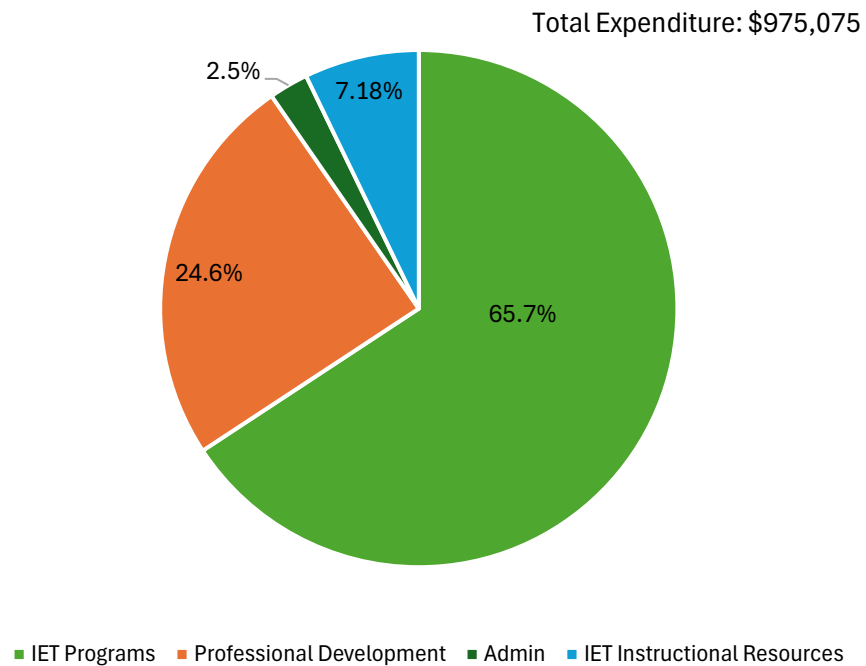

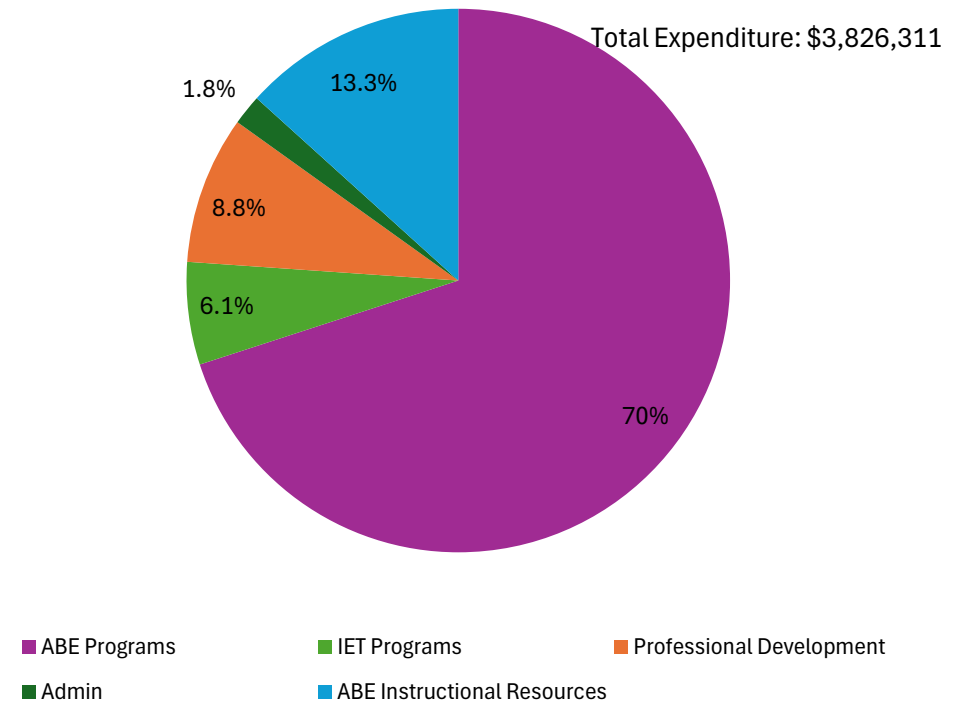


HED TANF Spending

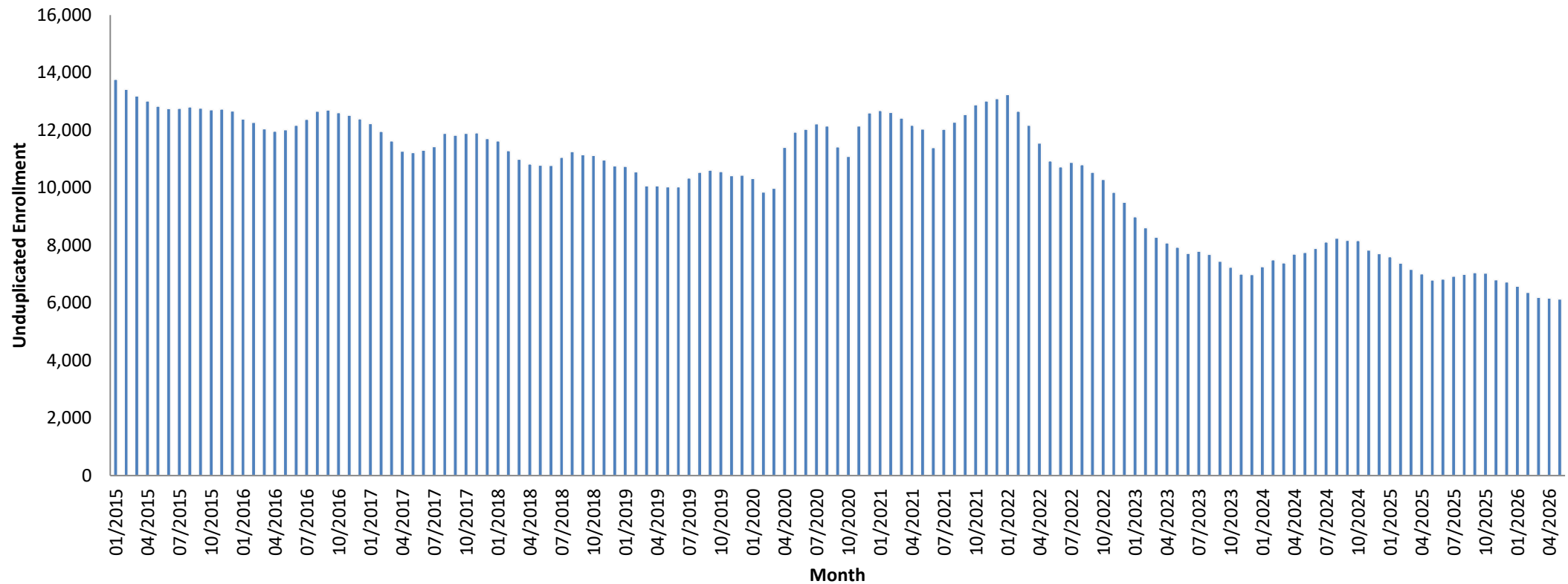

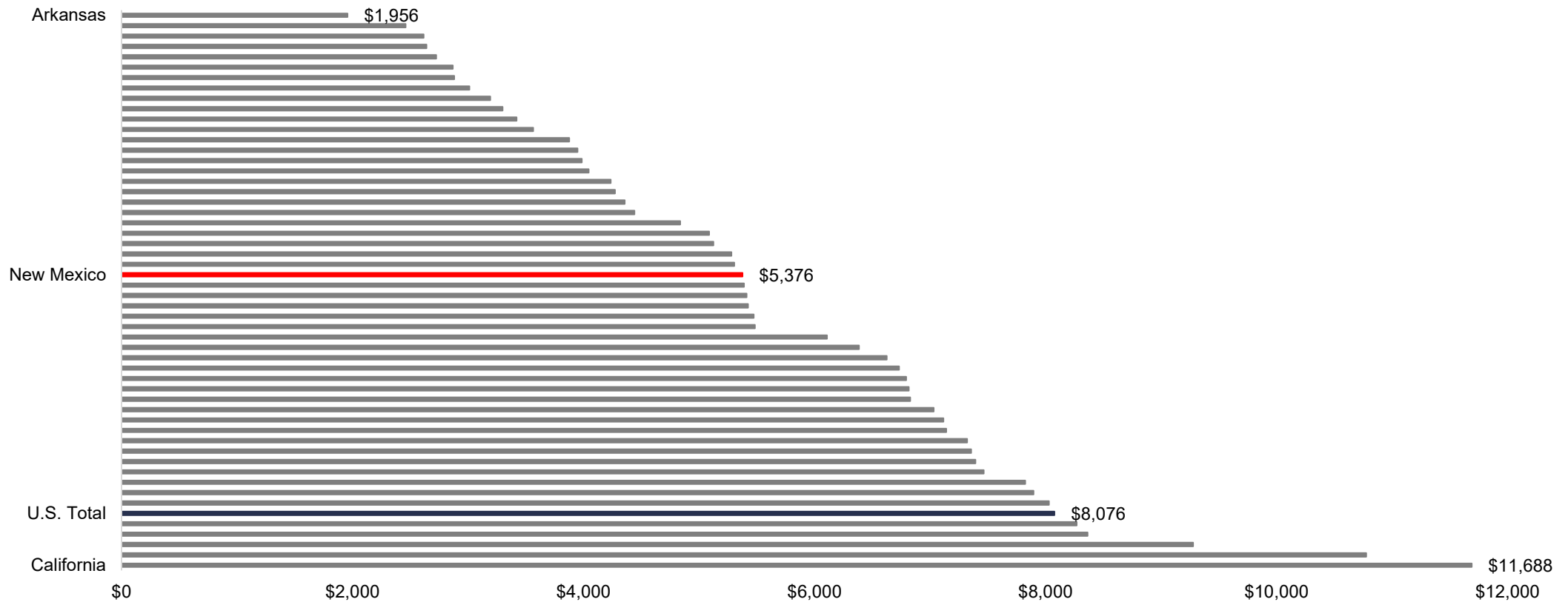
New Mexico TANF Enrollment, January 2015 – May 2026

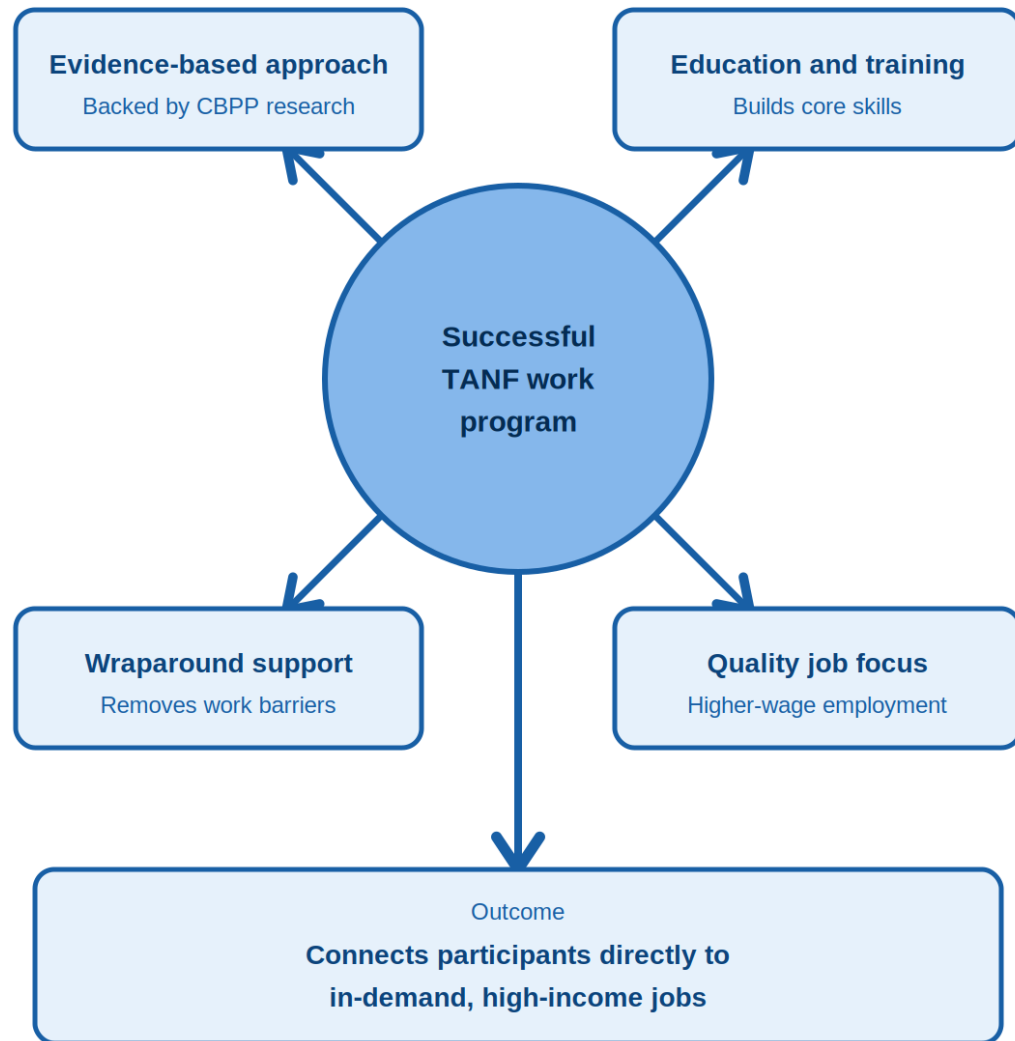
Average Annual Amount of Cash Assistance Families on TANF Receive by State (FFY24)

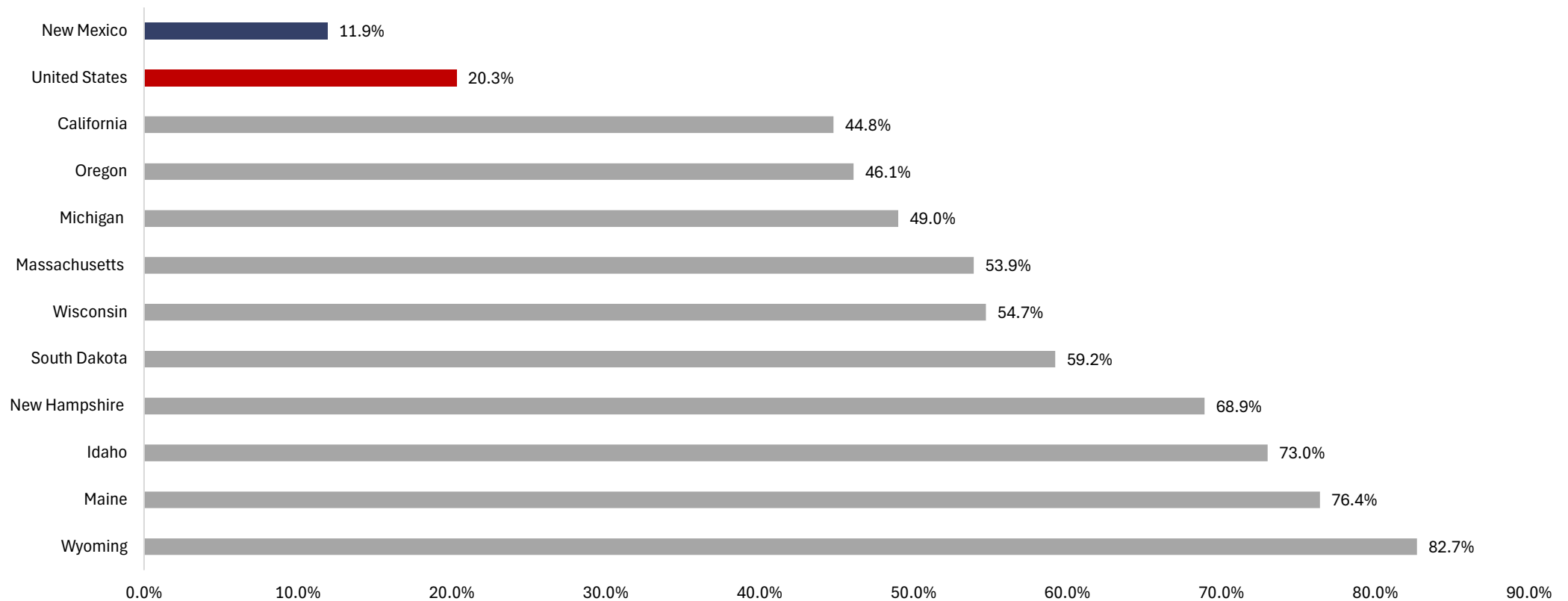
Successful TANF Work Programs

- Nationally, TANF prioritizes getting participants into employment as quickly as possible
 - As a result, participants tend to end up in unstable, low-wage jobs
 - This includes the New Mexico Works program

TANF Work Participation Rates



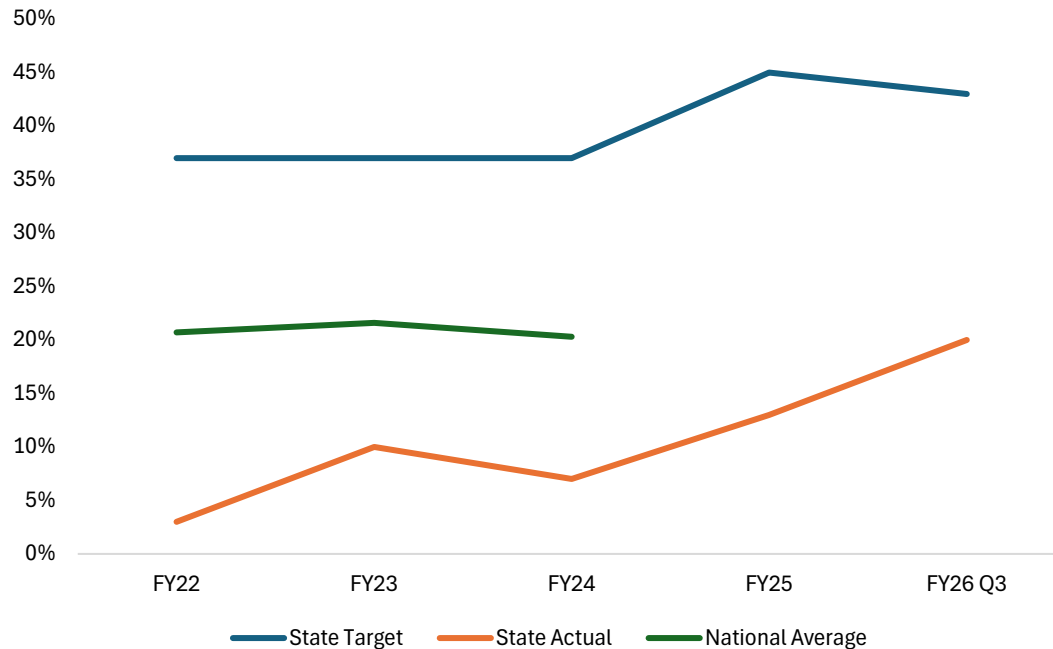
Successful TANF Work Programs

- California and Washington both have extremely successful TANF programs
- These programs focus on mandatory job search, training, or education
- The programs also provide childcare assistance, transportation assistance, access to housing, and health services
- The programs focus on providing wrap-around services that collaborate with multiple agencies and the community



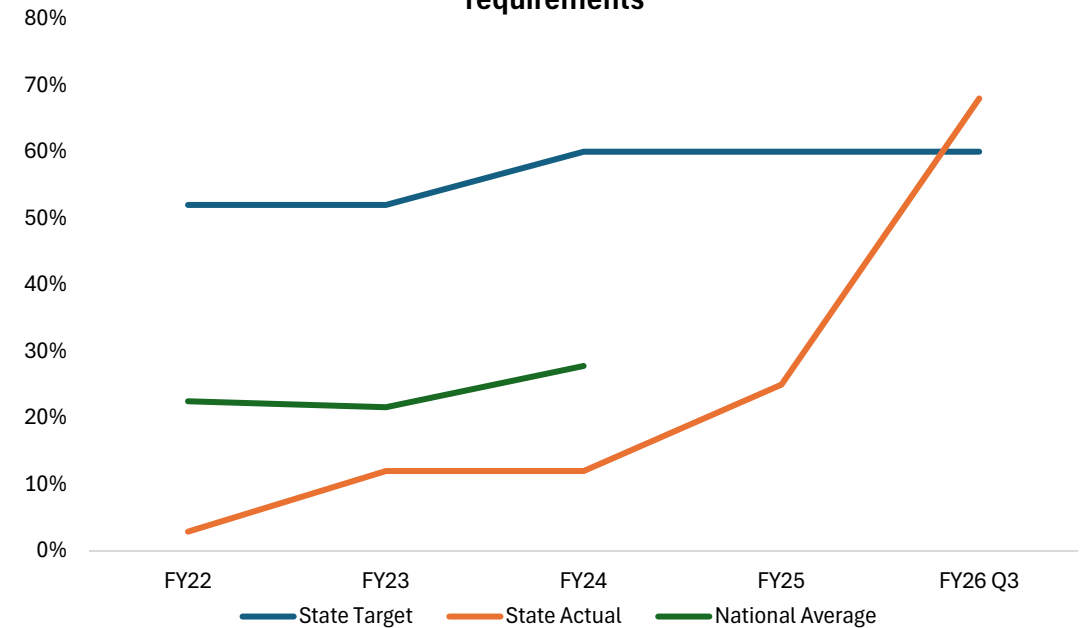
TANF Performance

**From FY22-FY26, this performance measure has consistently received a red rating according to LFC standards.

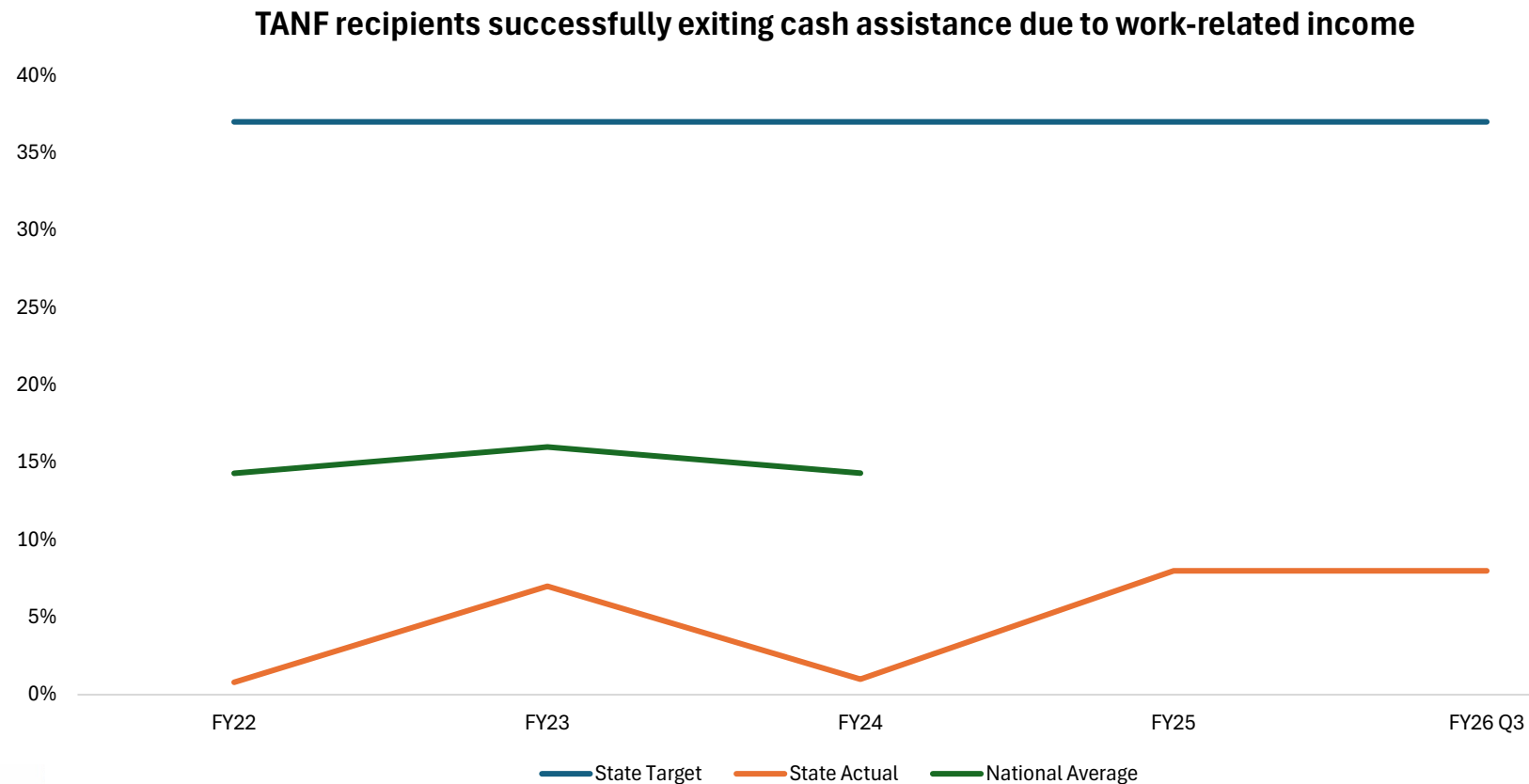
Two-parent recipients of TANF meeting federally required work requirements

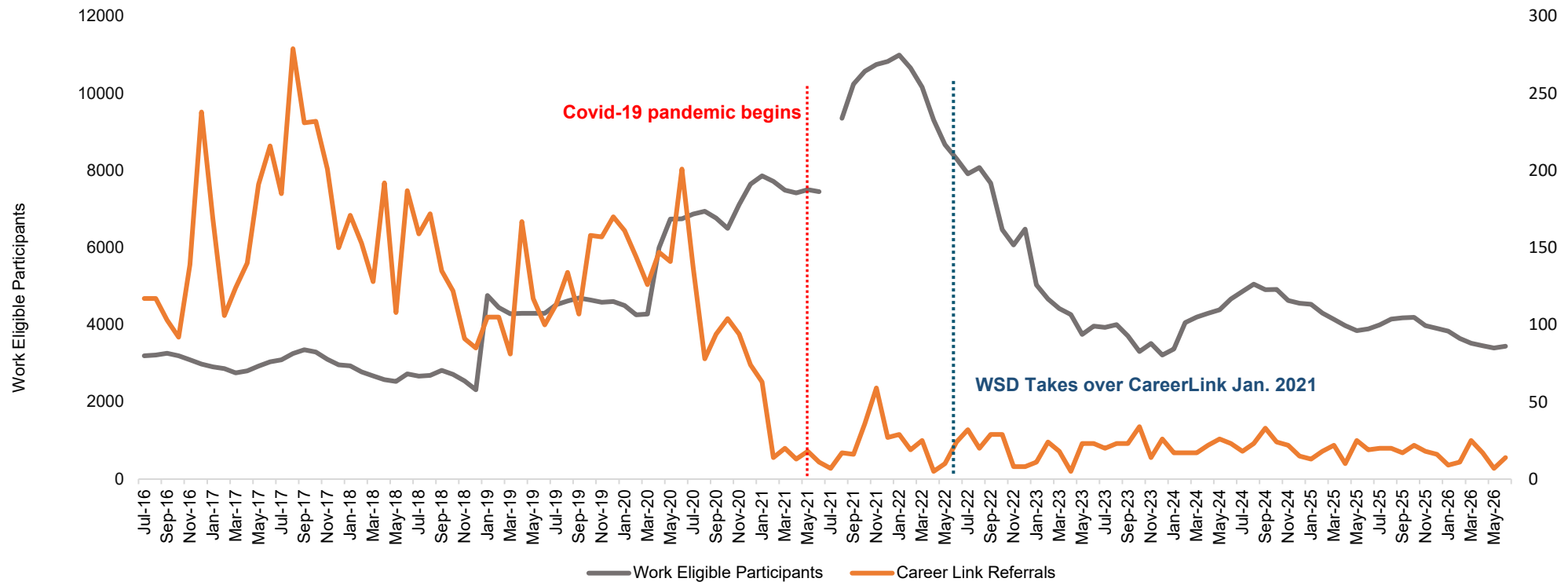
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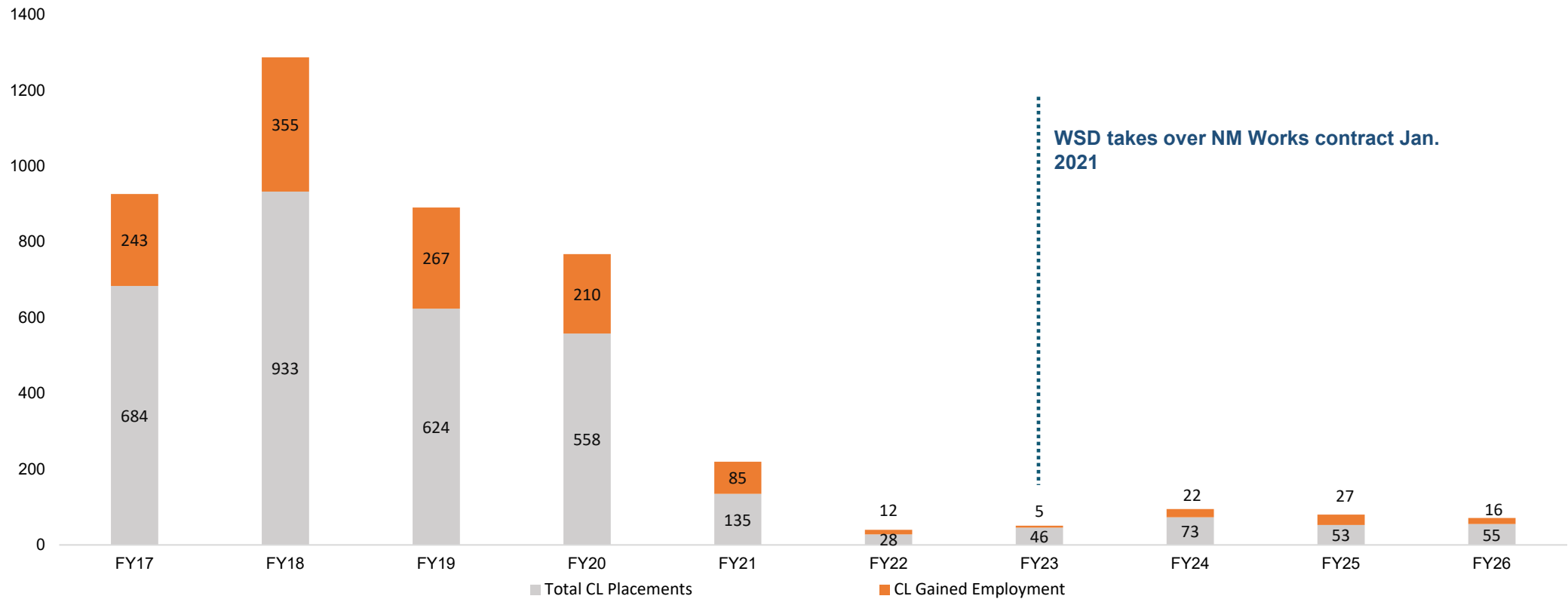
Decline in Number of Career Link Referrals

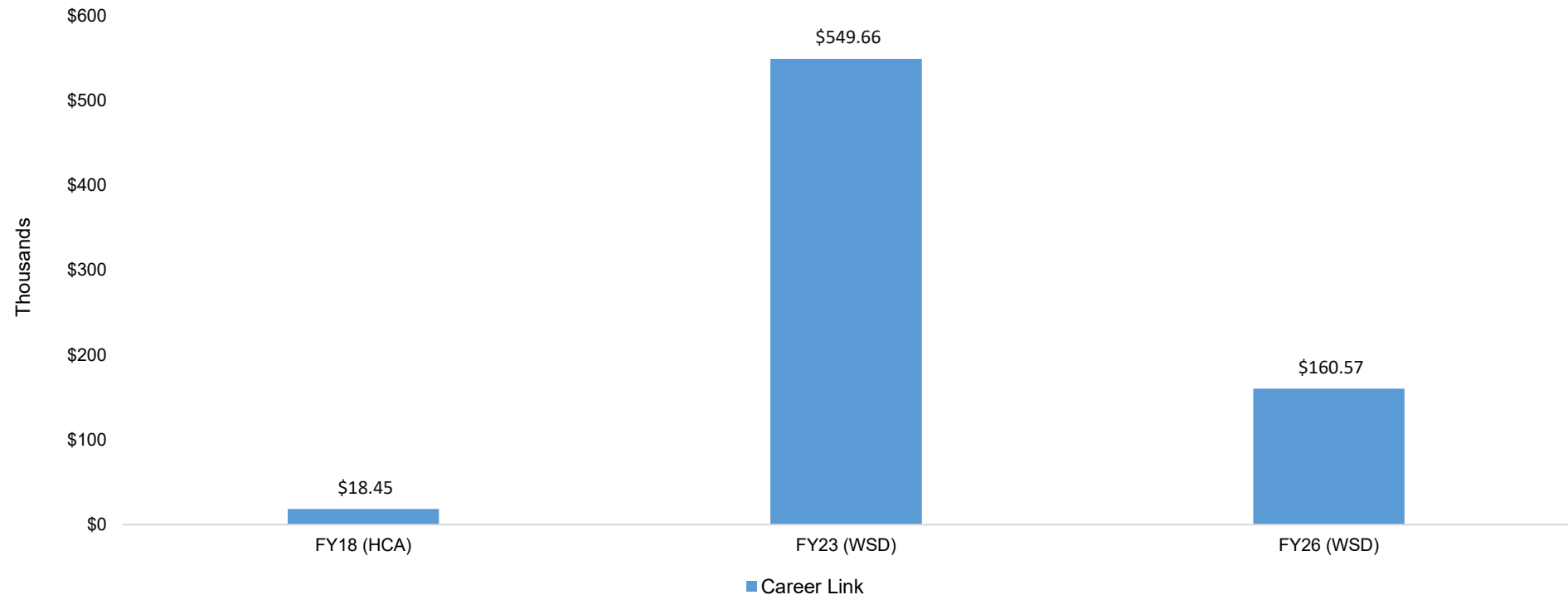
