Where We Started

Founded in 1982 as a grant funded agency and soon after became a joint project between the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the New Mexico Department of Health to support Native American families with 0-5 year old children who had or were at risk for developmental delays.

- 1 Program
- 30 Native American Children
- 6 Pueblo Communities



Who We Are Now

By 1992, funding changes lead NAPPR to incorporate as a 501(c)3 Urban Indian Organization.

Primarily funded by 3 federal grants, NM Early Childhood Education and Care Department, serving both Native and non-Native Americans.

- 4 Programs
- ~700 individuals per month
- New Mexico, Southern
 Colorado, and El Paso, TX

What general services do we provide?

Early Intervention

Provides family service coordination, developmental services, and various therapies to infants and toddlers.

Early Head Start

Provides classroom education as well as home visiting to promote school readiness, child development, and education on health and nutrition to children and parents.



Tribal Home Visiting

Provides curriculum based education and resources to pregnant women and young families to support raising Native American children.

Dental Support Center

Provides support, guidance, and training to dental professionals and community members to improve oral health of Native Americans.

Children birth to 3 years old with an established health condition, developmental delay, or is vulnerable to medical, biological, or environmental risks.



What?

Perform child evaluations, create plans and establish goals with the family, to provide services (therapies, referrals, etc.) which align with the child's individualized development.

Where?

6 counites: Bernalillo, Sandoval, Cibola, Valencia, Socorro, and Santa Fe

How?

Fee for service -NM's Early Childhood Education and Care Department's (ECECD) Family Infant Toddler (FIT) Program



Income eligible pregnant women, infants and toddlers up to 36 months

Where?

2 counites:
Bernalillo and
Sandoval

What?

Childcare center and home visiting services that includes curriculum based education, parenting resources, and family group meetings twice a month.

How?

Federal Grant - Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Head Start





Self-identified Native
American families who are expecting a baby or have a child age 0-5 years old.

What?

Culturally enhanced home visiting services to support caregiver and child health, early child development, and family self-sufficiency.

Where?

3 counites: Bernalillo, Sandoval, and Cibola

How?

Federal Grant –
Administration for Children and Families, Office
of Early Childhood Development



The 22 Indian Health Service/Tribal/Urban dental programs within the Albuquerque Area (as defined by IHS) and the communities they serve.

What?

Support dental professionals through continuing education, providing culturally relevant educational materials and oral health promotion/disease prevention supplies to enhance the oral and overall health of American Indian/Alaska Native communities.



Where?

New Mexico, southern Colorado, El Paso, TX

How?

Federal Grant -Indian Health Service, Office of Oral Health

- •Indian Health Service/ Tribal/Urban dental clinics
- Native Americans
- •No clinical care; referrals to local clinics
- •New Mexico, southern Colorado, El Paso, TX
