

How Can NM Review & Ammend our Current Laws and Hold all Statutes in One Location?

Problem:

New Mexico's current laws guiding how we treat individuals with mental health, addiction, and co-occurring disorders appear in many different locations in our statues, and may need a major update...especially when addressing individuals proven non-competent to stand trial.

Solution: Combine New Mexico's Multitude of Statutes Guiding BH care into an Act that allows the system of care across the state to be more proactive, and uniform. (Similar to the Florida Mental Health Act).

DRUG OVERDOSE IN NEW MEXICO







New Mexico has the HIGHEST alcohol-related death rate IN THE NATION

New Mexico's death rate (86.6 per 100,000 population) in 2020 was more than twice the national rate (41.5 per 100,000 population) in 2020.

Request from Courts Corrections

1) \$100,000 suggested appropriation to hire 2 full time staff attorneys, and 2 UNM Law School interns to review the NM BH Treatment Laws and make recommendations to this committee by June, 2024. (Possibly using the Florida Mental Health Act as a Guide.) This staff would take recommendations from PDs, DAs, BH Judges, and the Supreme Court **Commission on Mental Health and Competency** to streamline, and standardize laws for a more unified system of care...,as well as address problems with our current competency laws.

2) Joint funding of 1 billion in an endowment to BHSD & DOH from CC and HHS committee in a joint bill to be put in escrow until a comprehensive plan for regional facilities and staffing can be set by DOH & BHSD working collaboratively as follows: A.) To upgrade 2 existing state treatment hospitals (LV & Roswell) to treat BH as regional facilities. B.) To build regional facilities in Las Cruces, Gallup, and revamp of Gateway, and Westside shelter in Albuquerque, with the goal to provide residential and AOT treatment for those in current court diversion and ore-diversion, as well as those outside the court system following the Miami model. C) Facilities will be operated by the state DOH & BHSD jointly with local community input. D) This endowment would also provide funding for long-term care centers for those unhoused, with severe mental and physical disability in each region. E) Would provide funding of an independent over-site agency of all facilities, providing yearly audit to LFC. 3) Review by this committee regarding the Behavioral Health Collaborative effectiveness over its 19 year existence, and follow up consideration of potential dissolution by statute if it is deemed to no longer be an effective agency.
