



RE: Request for State Assistance - Completion of the Navajo Code Talkers Museum in Tse Bonito

Dear Honorable Governor Grisham,

On behalf of the Navajo Code Talkers Museum Board, LLC (NCTMB), I respectfully submit this letter requesting your assistance to ensure the realization of a long-standing and deeply meaningful project—the construction of the Navajo Code Talkers Museum in Tse Bonito, New Mexico.

The State of New Mexico has generously appropriated more than \$9.6 million in cost-reimbursable grants over several funding cycles to support the design and construction of this landmark museum. We are profoundly grateful for this commitment to honoring the legacy of the Navajo Code Talkers. Unfortunately, these funds remain largely unspent due to ongoing administrative delays and misalignment of priorities with our designated fiscal agent, the Navajo Nation. The original \$1.2 million grant awarded in 2009, of which \$864,000 remains, is at risk of reverting back to the State if not utilized by 2027.

The Board has encountered repeated inaction in our efforts to access and deploy the funding. Most recently, a March 2025 meeting with our fiscal agent resulted in no follow-up or implementation efforts. Moreover, the Navajo Nation has expressed interest in relocating the museum to Shiprock—a move the NCTMB respectfully opposes. The proposed site in Tse Bonito holds historical and cultural significance to our Board, our families, and most importantly, to the legacy of the Code Talkers themselves.

Therefore, we are seeking your direct intervention to identify an alternate path forward. Specifically, we are requesting the Governor's Office to support:

- A reassignment of fiscal agency or the creation of a new administrative mechanism that allows NCTMB to access and implement the appropriated funds;
- Preservation of the original museum site in Tse Bonito as the designated construction location.
 So many Companies, individuals, and many Navajo Code Talkers have invested their ideas, blessings, and money in the Tse Bonito lacation.
- Immediate coordination with your office to reinitiate design and planning processes under proper oversight and partnership.



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The Navajo Code Talkers made extraordinary contributions to our nation's history. Their story deserves a permanent home worthy of their sacrifice and service. We firmly believe that with your leadership, we can break through the current bottlenecks and deliver a project that reflects the values, resilience, and cultural heritage of the Navajo people and the State of New Mexico.

We welcome the opportunity to speak further and provide any documentation or partnership necessary to advance this request. Thank you for your continued advocacy for Native communities and historic preservation.
