
Tribal Water Rights Adjudication and Settlements November 13, 2025



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Steps to Reaching a Final Settlement Agreement

Negotiation Process:

- Federal Assessment/Negotiation Team
- Pueblo/Tribe/Nation, Federal Team and New Mexico evaluate Tribal water rights claims
- Negotiations expand to include administrative issues and local entities, acequias, irrigation districts, municipalities, cities, etc.
- Local Settlement Agreement signed by all Parties, except the United States which requires Congressional authorization

Congressional Approval Process:

- Federal Legislation drafted
- Bill Introduced in House & Senate
- Committee Hearings and final votes in House & Senate
- Funding Mechanisms/Sources identified
- Signed by POTUS
- Local Settlement Agreement must be amended to conform to final Federal Legislation

State Court Process:

- Court Adjudication → Entry of Partial Final
 Judgment & Decree adjudicating water rights within
 a stream system/basin (includes inter se)
- State funding process Indian Water Rights
 Settlement Fund



Overview of Water Rights Settlements with Pueblos, Tribes, and Nations

7 Pueblos, Tribes, and Nations have reached final settlements with Congressional, State, and Judicial Approval:

- Jicarilla Apache Water Rights Settlement
- Taos/Abeyta Settlement Agreement
- Navajo San Juan Settlement Agreement
- Aamodt Settlement Agreement (Nambé, Pojoaque, Tesuque, San Ildefonso Pueblos)

One Tribal Water Right Claim Was Litigated to Final Judgment:

Mescalero Apache Tribe (Rio Hondo/Pecos River Stream System)

Implementing Existing Settlements

Taos/Abeyta Settlement Agreement

- Original funding for mutual benefits projects was not indexed
- The shortfall is approximately \$220 million
- With a 75/25 federal/state cost share breakdown, the state share is ~ \$43 million
- OSE special appropriations and other state funding will cover approximately \$15.6 million, leaving a need to fill an additional \$27.4 million.
- Parties are working with Congressional delegation to obtain needed federal funding
- Parties are seeking introduction of federal legislation to amend the 2010 Claims Act to supplement federal funding needed to continue ongoing project construction

Aamodt Settlement Agreement

- Construction on water supply project is underway
- Reclamation has alerted parties to likely significant cost increases - parties are working with Reclamation on review of indexing for the project to determine actual amounts
- Parties deciding on modified plan to keep project construction moving

Navajo San Juan Settlement

- Portion of project is operational, construction on remaining portion is underway
- Parties are working with Congressional delegation to secure passage of act to make needed amendments to authorizing legislation
- OSE/ISC working with City of Gallup on additional groundwater wells to bridge supply gap

Recent Settlements During the Lujan Grisham Administration

5 Local settlement agreements have been signed since 2022. Federal legislation has been introduced in Congress for each settlement:

- Rio San José Stream System
 - (S.562/H.R.1322 and S. 565/H.R. 1322)
 - Acoma Pueblo
 - Laguna Pueblo
 - Navajo Nation

- Jemez River Stream System (S.562/H.R.1322)
 - Zia Pueblo
 - Jemez Pueblo

Rio Chama Stream System (S.563/H.R.1323)

Ohkay Owingeh

Zuni River Stream System (S.564/H.R.1444)

Zuni Pueblo

Each bill has passed the Senate Indian Affairs Committee and is currently awaiting hearing in the House Committee on Natural Resources, Subcommittee on Water, Wildlife, and Fisheries.

Status of Congressional Progress

New Settlements:

S. 562/H.R. 1322 - Rio San José and Rio Jemez Water Settlements Act of 2025:

Title I: Pueblos of Acoma & Laguna in the Rio San Jose Stream System; and

Title II: Pueblos of Jemez & Zia in the Rio Jemez Stream System

- S.652 Passed Senate Committee on Indian Affairs on 3/05/2025 and reported out favorably without amendment.
- H.R. 1322 Introduced in the House Committee on Natural Resources on 02/13/25 and referred to the Subcommittee on Water, Wildlife, & Fisheries hearing. No date set for hearing.

S. 565/H.R. 1324 - Navajo Nation Rio San José Stream System Water Rights Settlement Act of 2025

- S.565 Passed Senate Committee on Indian Affairs on 3/05/2025 and reported out favorably without amendment.
- H.R. 1324 Introduced in the House Committee on Natural Resources on 02/13/25 and referred to the Subcommittee on Water, Wildlife, & Fisheries hearing. No date set for hearing.

S. 563/H.R. 1323 - Ohkay Owingeh Rio Chama Water Rights Settlement Act of 2025

- S.563 Passed Senate Committee on Indian Affairs on 3/05/2025 and reported out favorably without amendment.
- H.R. 1323 Introduced in the House Committee on Natural Resources on 02/13/25 and referred to the Subcommittee
 on Water, Wildlife, & Fisheries hearing. No date set for hearing

S. 564/H.R. 1444 - Zuni Indian Tribe Water Rights Settlement Act of 2025

- S.564 Passed Senate Committee on Indian Affairs on 3/05/2025 and reported out favorably without amendment.
- H.R. 1444 Introduced in the House Committee on Natural Resources on 02/18/25 and referred to the Subcommittee
 on Water, Wildlife, & Fisheries hearing. No date set for hearing

Status of Congressional Progress

Amendments to Existing Settlements:

S. 637/H.R. 1482 - Navajo-Gallup Water Supply Project Amendments Act of 2025

- S.637 Passed Senate Committee on Indian Affairs on 3/05/2025 and reported out favorably without amendment.
- H.R. 1482 Introduced in the House Committee on Natural Resources on 07/22/25 and referred to the Subcommittee on Water, Wildlife, & Fisheries hearing. No date set for hearing.

S. 640/H.R. 4598 - Technical Corrections to the Northwestern New Mexico Rural Water Projects Act, Taos Pueblo Indian Water Rights Settlement Act, and Aamodt Litigation Settlement Act

- S.640 Passed Senate Committee on Indian Affairs on 3/05/2025 and reported out favorably without amendment.
- H.R.4598 Introduced in the House Committee on Natural Resources on 07/22/25 and referred to the Subcommittee on Water, Wildlife, & Fisheries hearing. No date set for hearing.
