Community Taken: Community Returned

Federally recognized "Fort Sill Chiricahua Warm Springs Apache"

Once 14 million acres of land Southwestern NM, Southwestern AZ

1886 – Removal, prisoners of war. Florida, Alabama, Oklahoma

2011 – Received federal Indian reservation designation in Luna County

2012 – Tribe included in State-Tribal Collaboration Act, won suit vs. State of NM

2021 – Land back recipients from Luna County private owners

2023 - Added 1,880 acres to reservation through land exchange with State of New Mexico

TODAY Building Community: Adverse Past to Bright Future

814 tribal members

Opening a Tribal Historic Preservation Officer (THPO) on reservation, Tribal-Cultural Consultation government officials – 3 staff

Remain connected to homelands, travel to perform tribal cultural activities

Award 35 adult and higher education scholarships each year.

Provide over 50 full-time jobs in NM.

35 – 40 employees (truck stop) - Creates jobs, largest job creator in 15 years





2026 Capital Outlay Requests


Fire station – \$1 million request

Housing - \$1.19 million (planning, design, construction)

Quality, high-efficiency affordable housing

Critical to reestablishing permanent home, job retention and growth

Survey is completed and design phase is underway.


Building community: Knowing and sharing your culture

Cultural Center - \$1.25 million request

- Thank you for past funding. (\$550k)
- OPreparing to receive more donated art, artifacts.
- Tourist destination.
- OPlan for 5,000 sq. ft.
- Archival grade HVAC system to preserve, display tribal cultural artifacts, meeting and educational rooms
- OHalf-acre outdoor walk, tribal cultural dance ground, observer seating and gathering areas.

(Carl Mangus – son of Chief Mangas Coloradas, last holdout; Tahdeste – tribal negotiator in dangerous times; Chief Loco – Last living chief, sought peace, survived bear attack; Tribe clothing bead work)





Notable Tribal Members

Allan Houser

First Fort Sill Apache child to be born free. One of the most celebrated Native American sculptors of the 20th century. (Sculpture by Allan Houser)

Mildred Cleghorn

Plaintiff in Cobell v. Salazar (1996) Won suit against U.S. Dept. of Interior and Treasury for mismanagement of Indian trust funds. Largest class action lawsuit in U.S. at the time.

First chairperson of the tribe, textile artist

Nancy Marie Mithlo - Professor, curator, visual anthropologist
