Background

- Launched in 2021
- Main Source of Funding: Carruthers Chair in Economic Development, NMSU College of Business (2 yrs.)

Purpose:

 Marshal resources from across NMSU to promote business expansion and economic development in the New Mexico border region.

Approach:

- Work closely with businesses, governments, NGOs, and other border stakeholders to identify economic
 development opportunities as well as impediments to economic development and to propose solutions to help tap
 into opportunities and overcome impediments.
- Complement existing development efforts by providing services unique to NMSU
- Work with NMSU personnel from the Colleges of Business, Engineering, Arts and Sciences, Arrowhead Center, ...

Key gap:

 There is a need for data, independent analysis, and other relevant information to support economic development along the New Mexico border, as current data are either fragmented or held for proprietary use.













Covid-19 and Transborder Trade Flows

Laredo Port of Entry, Texas





El Paso Port of Entry, Texas





Santa Teresa Port of Entry, New Mexico




Northbound Border Crossers
