Strengthen the Continuum of Care

- Detox Center (Phase One) to open in near future
- Crisis Stabilization Unit (Phase Two)
- Residential Treatment Center
- Transitional Living Programs- Gender Specific

Increase Resources to Improve the Continuum of Care

- Detox Center: Reinstate \$300,000 perpetual operating funding lost when the center closed in 2015
- Address the workforce shortage of counselors and therapist thru incentives for recruitment and retention
- Expand evidence-based treatment programming

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Collaborate Regionally- Continuum of Care

- San Miguel

Proposed Timeframes

Short-Term (next 12 Months)

- Support TeamBuilders rebuild mental health services
- Funding for (Phase One) Detox Center
- Increase Medicaid billing technical assistance

Mid-Term (12-24 Months)

- Fully implement (Phase Two) Crisis Stabilization Unit
- Planning/Business Development: Residential Treatment Center and Transitional Living Programs

Long-Term (2 to 5 Years)

Open Residential Treatment Center

Open Transitional Living Centers- Gender Specific
