Broadband for Libraries Purpose


- Access: Ensure every community with a library has one location with free access to high quality, dependable broadband
- Affordability: Ensure all public libraries have the support they need to leverage federal E-Rate funding of up to 95%
- Efficiency: Find central solutions to common problems so libraries can focus on serving New Mexicans
- Rural Economic Development: Drive down connection costs for businesses and residents so rural, suburban, and urban residents can live and work where they want to be

Broadband for Libraries Background

There are 98 Public and Tribal Libraries in NM

Prior to the program

- 60% did not have a connection faster than 30 Mbps
- 68% did not take advantage of E-Rate
- 53% did not have a fiber optic
- BB4L Program provides:
 - Technical/IT Support
 - E-rate consultant support
 - Project management
 - Procurement
 - Matching Funds



Broadband for Libraries Background

The Library Broadband Infrastructure Fund (LBIF) was created by the 2018 Legislature and received funding in 2019 via Senate Bill 280 (Chapter 277):

"one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for expenditure in fiscal years 2020 through 2023 to the library broadband infrastructure fund for expenditure by the department of information technology for library broadband expansion and improvement statewide, including assessments and contracts, contingent upon the execution of a memorandum of understanding for use of the funds with the cultural affairs department."

Funding will be available through FY23.

Broadband for Libraries Update Results To-Date

Results:

- All have upgraded internal network equipment, and fiber optic connections
- In the first round, average speeds increased over 3500% while internet bills decreased 90%; average cost per Mbps is \$5.45

Minimum 100 MB Fiber:

- Increased Capacity: 100/100 fiber optic internet connection can support a minimum of 100 users or devices at once without showing any lag or slowdowns, over 30 simultaneous video calls at 1080p resolution (HD).
- Scalability: Fiber optic is virtually limitless; once installed it can be scaled up. It supports symmetrical two way communications, such as video conferencing.

Broadband for Libraries Update Federal Funding Leveraged

FY20 Federal funding leveraged:

- In FY20 we spent \$76,316 Library Broadband funds (\$67,953 Category 2 match, \$7,630 E-Rate consultant, \$733 travel expenses)
- Libraries received \$579,459 federal E-Rate funding (projected based on approvals)


