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SOS IT Successes Continue...

Software replacement and modernization efforts have brought efficiencies, convenience and integrity to elections and business at the SOS

Business Filing Modernization (NMBFS)

- Completed June 2016 total cost: \$1.27M
- System replaced nine disparate legacy systems including Corporation Filings
- Public Portal allows for numerous selfservice features
- Corporations Bureau continues to maintain a 1-3 day turnaround on filings due in large part to technology and process improvements
- Credit card security improvements currently under way (PCI compliance)

Election System Modernization (SERVIS)

- Go live December 2017 estimated cost: \$1.9M
- Improved election result delivery to the public w/automatic recount flags
- Uniform statewide result canvassing
- Streamlined ballot creation and election project programming
- End to end election system testing and mock elections
- Zero audit findings by independent election auditor

Online Voter Registration – convenient, accurate, and efficient

- Over 120,000 online registrations and updates since the January 2016 go live
- More accurate voter rolls
 - Convenient access to update record
 - Integration with MVD
 - No mistakes due to poor penmanship or key entry mistakes by county
- More timely receipt and processing of electronic registrations
 - No lost registrations
 - Reduces follow up for county staff on incomplete applications
- Accessibility features for blind voters
- Multi-language English and Spanish

Moving on to Campaign Finance....

Campaign Finance Modernization - Background

- HB105 unanimously passed during the 2016 legislative session requiring specific system requirements – Effective Date: December 2017
- Legislation was crafted in response to intense media scrutiny and ongoing campaign finance scandals
- Legislation focuses on...
 - greater transparency,
 - more meaningful data making connections across the reporting entities (lobbyists, political committees, candidates), and
 - easier, more error free reporting

FY19 Funding Request

- SOS has sought funding for this project since 2016.
- SOS will be out of compliance with some provisions of HB105 until funding is secured.
- FY19 C-2 and capital outlay request has been submitted for legislative consideration.
- Total Estimated Project Cost: \$985,000
 - Software license, customization, and implementation costs
 - Project Management
 - Security Assessment
 - Independent Verification and Validation

HB105(2016) – Some Specific Requirements

- Use unique identifiers and master drop down list of candidates, political committees (PACs), lobbyists and, to the extent possible, master lists of contributors, occupations, expenditure types and contribution types
- Provide data in open, structured formats for easy search and download for public inspection
- Provide for cross checking and compliance features
- Provide for online registration and fee payment by lobbyists and PACs
- Improved integration between lobbyist and candidate reporting requirements
- Provide ability to directly upload from other third-party campaign management tools

Expected Benefits

Transparent campaign finance disclosure is essential to public accountability and understanding the influence of money in elections

- Improved compliance and enforcement
- Real time disclosure online registration by lobbyists and political committees
- Improved data integrity cross checking of donations across reporting individuals
- Improved transparency uniform data entry and data access for easy data analysis
- Improved staff efficiencies automate paper processes; reduce data entry requirements

CF System Replacement - Critical

This project is not a technology searching for a problem - HB105 mandates **specific** system functionality

- Current CFIS was built in 2010 to replace a paper reporting system and no longer meets the demands of the public
 - Current system cannot be successfully modified to meet new system mandates data across reporting entities is largely maintained in separate silos
 - Cross checking and cross reporting between candidates, political committees, and lobbyists is not possible with current system design
- Campaign finance scandals have increased demands for...
 - Transparency, Data Access, Data Analysis
 - Compliance and Enforcement

Proposed Solution – Customize an existing commercial or existing state system

- All 50 states have some sort of CF system most are provided by a niche vendor that provides a base product for electronic campaign reporting
 - Customized for specific laws in each state
- Allows for quicker implementation
- Able to see how software is performing in other states and gauge satisfaction rate with vendor performance and support

Some Alternatives to COTS

Overhaul current CFIS to meet new mandates

 Analysis by SOS IT programmers concludes overhaul of CFIS is risky and not likely to succeed - current silo type database design does not accommodate the cross checking required by HB105

In house system development

 SOS IT staff has development expertise but is currently overextended so this approach will take awhile to complete

• Ground up "from scratch" system development

- Opportunity to work with MapLight to build system to exact NM specifications estimated "from scratch" development cost of \$2.34 million
- Possible opportunity to receive philanthropic or grant funds to assist in covering some costs

Planning, Readiness, and Support

- SOS has conducted research to determine best approach and available solutions
 - Review of other state systems vendors, costs
 - Discussion with stakeholders legislators, NMFOG, Common Cause, staff, media
 - Third party reports and scorecards National Institute on Money in Politics and Center for Public Integrity and Global Integrity
- An extensive system requirements document has already been developed
- RFP will be issued upon securing funds

Conclusion

Please consider funding this request during the 2018 session

- CFIS is our most public and most scrutinized system
 - Current system is misleading and difficult to understand
- The State of New Mexico has an opportunity to move public perception about our public officials and electoral process toward the positive
- We have an opportunity to implement one of the best disclosure systems in the country
