Agencies reported

4,039 Sex crimes 21% Native victims & offenders

Sexual Assault (SA) **Service Provider Agencies**



SA agencies reported 1,631 Clients received services

Native survivors 20% Native offenders

Sexual Assault **Nurse Examiners (SANE)**



1,018 Patients served 19% Native victims

41% Male SANE patients were children

According to the Sex Crimes Data in New Mexico annual report, Native survivors were most likely to have consumed alcohol &/or other drugs at the time of their assault.

Recommendations

- Early intervention and prevention outreach and education
 - o A significant number of children are victimized before age 12. Victims victimized by a relative are less likely to report and seek services.
- Age-appropriate education in schools & training for school counselors and nurses
 - o Childhood sexual abuse is a precursor for future sexual assaults.
- Coordinated Community Response with Law Enforcement and Service Providers
 - o Witnessing domestic violence as a child increased one's risk to future sexual assault as an adult.
- Increased mental health outreach and education with community & professionals
 - o Data shows most survivors received sexual services while seeking help for mental health problems (55%), or because they were encouraged by someone to seek help (49%).
- Encourage data reporting to NM Interpersonal Violence Data Central Repository
 - o Limited data available for sexual violence tribal communities. Data helps in guiding culturally-appropriate programs, prevention strategies and services.
