

NM Ed Fellows Program intentionally expands the local educator workforce while providing high-quality, hands-on clinical experience. Educator Fellows support classrooms by serving as instructional assistants through targeted small-group instruction, improving student outcomes while easing staffing shortages.

Statutory or Regulatory Requirements


HB2 (2025 Session) For the recruitment and retention of educator fellows and grow your own teacher scholarship pursuant to the Grow Your Own Teachers Act, including one million dollars for teacher recruitment pilots and programs to improve the teacher workforce pipeline. The public education department shall prioritize awards to school districts and charter schools that provide local matching funds for participating educators. The other state funds appropriation is from the Grow Your Own Teachers Fund.

Program Objectives


- Increase diversity within the educator workforce

- Build sustainable, localized educator pipelines for districts and charter schools



- Salary and benefits paid through grant
- LEA cost match of \$3,840 per fellow
- Seeking a degree and/or license
- Paid leave to complete higher education coursework
- Providing program coach and mentor teacher
- Monthly communities of practice sharing research based best practices

Educator Fellows Benefits

- Removes critical barriers for individuals who are working toward licensure in education
- Addresses critical educator shortages using locally grown talent
- Provides immediate classroom assistance while preparing future licensed teachers
- Supports Martinez Yazzie action plan by diversifying the educator pipeline, and providing supplemental immediate support in classrooms improving student to teacher ratios
- Strengthens long-term workforce sustainability statewide



Notable Statistics

- 86 LEAs/ approximately 180 Schools
- 370 current certified licensure candidates, 100% classified licensure
- Anticipate approximately 85 candidates eligible for Certified Licensure end of 25/26 SY, 80% Level 3 EA license
- 70% People of Color
- 11%-13% Native American Bernalillo, Cuba, Hozho
 Academy, Zuni
- 40% Second Career Choice
- 60% First Generation College Students
- Significant EPP enrollment increases across NM EPPs

Martinez - Yazzie

- Educator Fellows is a concrete implementation of the recommended Martinez Yazzie action steps, addressing workforce diversity, instructional quality, and student support simultaneously. (1.1e, 2.1a, 2.1e)
- Pre-service teachers earn a salary and benefits, thus removing economic barriers that have historically excluded Native American, Hispanic, and first-generation educators from the profession.(2.1c, 2.1e)
- Fellows immediately strengthen classrooms through small-group instruction while preparing to become licensed teachers, delivering short- and long-term impact. (1.1i,2.2c)
- Investing in local educator pipelines is a sustainable strategy to meet court mandates and stabilize New Mexico's educator workforce statewide. (2.1c, 2.1f)







"We cannot revitalize languages without Native speaking teachers. We cannot transform deficit narratives without Indigenous role models in our classrooms. Educator Fellows is not just crucial to Yazzie/Martinez; it is foundational to realizing the court's vision. Looking Ahead

- Ensure sustainable opportunities for all LEAs that are interested in the program
- 10 LEAs applied after deadline are on a waiting list, and existing LEAs that are requesting for expansions (35-50 more Ed Fellows if funding allowed)
- Work with the legislature to create an equitable district match system
- Track 3-5 year retention
- Coaches for the program/ERB Independent Contractor challenges
- Registered Apprenticeship Model
